Dear Friends,



Time rushes on and memories of our weekend-away-at-home in September are beginning to fade. All the same, so many people were blest by the ministry of Ian Macfarlane, that the Elders have decided to invite him to visit us again at the end of November. We experienced a new freedom and touch of the Holy Spirit at Walstead and we want to make sure that we do not lose the spiritual momentum.

It was in the early 1970s that the Church began to re-discover the presence and gifts of the Holy Spirit. I was ordained in 1972, so this re-discovery has been the background to my ministry ever since. For some churches and individuals this has been a tremendous blessing. It has released opportunities and gifts that had either been forgotten, or never discerned in the first place. Sadly, for others it has been a threat and even a kind of condemnation. Now that God seems to be opening our fellowship to a deeper appreciation of the work and gifting of the Holy Spirit, we must ensure that no one feels threatened or misunderstands what's happening. Here are four things to keep in mind as we move forward together into the fullness of all God has for us.

- The Holy Spirit is not a separate part of God. He is the life of the risen Lord Jesus, active and present with His people. In St. John 14:18, speaking of the coming of the Holy Spirit, Jesus says "I will not leave you as orphans, I will come to you."
- No one should ever feel a "second-class Christian" if they don't feel excited and effervescent all the time. We couldn't have placed our faith in the Saviour in the first place had He not breathed life into us through the Holy Spirit. Ephesians 2:4&5 "God Who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ, even when we were dead in transgressions." That enlivening miracle is the work of the Holy Spirit.
- Experience is great, but faith is essential. It's wonderful to feel excited and full of spiritual blessing and we should welcome the touch of the Spirit and be grateful for it. The Christian life was not

meant to be a dreary trudge through the desert! All the same, true discipleship involves self-discipline and effort. We have a race to run and a prize to win and we can only do that as we look to Jesus and let Him energize us by His Spirit – Hebrews 12:1&2 “..... let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus

- The gifts of the Holy Spirit – wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing etc: are not for individual use. They are, as 1 Corinthians 12:7 says “..... for the common good.” This new touch of blessing that God is giving us is for the whole church. No one need be left behind.

Our loving Lord has so much to give us. Let’s claim His gifts together and use them to live and witness more effectively for Him.

Prayer Focus

By the time you read this it will be a few weeks since *2010* ^{trial}. Is this now a nice



memory or are you seeking God’s potential for your Life and that of the Church?

This is first and foremost a work of the Holy Spirit but he uses various means. One is the Word and it is important that we make every effort to understand what God through the Spirit is saying to us.

Another is prayer and we would urge all to continue to seek the Lord that as individuals and as a Church we realise all that He has for us. This will involve waiting on Him and seeking his face in prayer. As well as our own prayer times, this could be something that we seek in the regular prayer meetings or for some in prayer triplets etc.

He has promised “the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is like the working of his mighty strength which he exerted in Christ when he raised him from the dead, and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms”. God’s power is limitless and it is He who promises us the power to reach that potential. Jesus said “How much more will your Father in Heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him”.

What is the Church?



I hope that for most of our readers the idea that “church” is not a building, but the people who meet there, is not novel. However, I want to open out this

idea, and show what the Bible says about the Church, and to touch on who the Church is, and how the Church should live in this day and age.

Nonetheless, in a short article, I can barely scratch the surface of such a vast subject; if you wish to discuss the topic further, please speak to me, or to Charles Martin (or your own minister, if not part of Lindfield URC).

In order to clarify, I will use the terms “Church” (capital ‘C’) when referring to the people, and “church” for the building where we happen to meet.

The word for Church in the New Testament is the Greek Ekklesia, which means “called out ones”. In fact, God’s people have been called by Him from at least the time of Abraham, who was called by God to leave his home town, and set out for a land “which he did not know” – Genesis 12:1-5. This calling then extended to the whole nation of Israel, who were instructed to bring blessing into the world that they came in contact with. The Christian Church continues this calling. Abraham’s calling was not on the basis of his merit; nor are we called because we have anything to offer to God, but that we may serve His purposes on the earth.

The Christian Church stems from Jesus’ calling first the twelve, then the wider group of disciples. Jesus stated “I will build my church...” (Matthew 16:18). The apostle Paul was clear that all those who believe in Jesus were called-out before the foundation of the world (Eph 1:4). Peter too, in his first letter chapter 2, speaks of us being chosen (1 Peter 2:9). Indeed, we who believe in Christ are part of God’s choosing of Jesus (v4). It is on the rock of belief in Jesus, and Jesus himself, that His Church has been, is being, and will be built (not upon Peter, or any other apostle). So, we also ‘like living stones, are being built into a temple of the Spirit to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ’ (v5). Having introduced a doxology of praise to Jesus, Peter returns, in verse 9, to his detailing the Church’s purpose: “But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s special possession, *that* you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light” (my emphasis).

So, our first analogy for the Church is a spiritual 'building', not of bricks, stones and mortar, but the living, breathing people of God, who are building our own lives on the rock of obedience to Jesus (Matthew 7:24-27).

Charles Martin spoke recently of the church being either an Ark – for the safety only of the members, or a Lifeboat – taking to the seas to rescue those in danger. He was clear that Jesus would choose the latter as the correct picture. The function of a priest is to represent man before God and God before man; so in Peter's description above, we are called out to present God's kingdom of light to a people in darkness.

Paul also speaks of the Church as Christ's building that He now inhabits and that He causes to grow. "Now, therefore, you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone, in whom the whole building, being fitted together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord, in whom you also are being built together for a dwelling place of God in the Spirit" (Ephesians 2:19-22). However, another favourite picture of the Church is Jesus' body. In 1 Corinthians 12:12 – 31, he describes how the parts of the body exist for one another. So in the Church, as Christ's body, we live to encourage, build up, heal and correct one another – with the purpose that we are strong and healthy in order to fulfil our purpose as the spiritual building (or lifeboat). The following chapter underlines the way in which this is to be continued – in love for one another, as Charles confirmed in his message referred to above.

Both Peter and Paul speak of another key to entering Christ's Church – what are His building materials? These include spiritual values such as love, hope, faith, joy, peace, patience, wisdom and humility, to name a few. Only the Master Builder, Christ Jesus, can build His Church with these spiritual materials.

The activity of the Church is therefore to be "24/7" to use a modern idiom. We maintain our relationships with one another, and present Jesus to the world, day in day out, and not merely at our meeting on one day of the week.

Jesus modelled this building of His Church by relationship and teaching. His great commission at the end of Matthew (28:16 – 20) includes both the outward (...disciples of **all nations**...) and inward aspects mentioned above (make disciples.....teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you).

What of the buildings?

Church, in the Bible, is not described as a cathedral or any sort of building. The first-century Church brethren met in members' private residences (Romans 16:5; 1 Corinthians 16:19), as they sometimes do today. The apostle Paul sometimes spoke to brethren, as well as potential converts and perhaps curious listeners, in various Jewish synagogues. Nevertheless, as the Church grew in size, was increasingly expelled from the Jewish tradition, and extended to Gentile areas where no other synagogue existed; it became expedient to construct buildings for the express purpose of meeting together. There is no inherent merit in meeting in either a grand building, a humble house, or a community hall - the purpose being to fulfil the commission given to the Church.

Church traditions

Over the years churches have built up many traditions, most of which are helpful in pointing members, and others, to biblical truths. However, I believe that there are only two traditions that are foundational to Church life. Both were instituted by Jesus, by example and command:

Baptism following repentance and faith

Jesus himself set the example of being baptised by John (Matthew 3:13 - 17; Mark 1:9 - 11; Luke 3:21 - 22). John's baptism was a "baptism of repentance" (Matthew 3:11) yet despite John's protestations that he should be baptised by Jesus (who had no need to repent) Jesus submitted to this act, as fitting to fulfil his Father's will (3:14 - 15). Once again, in his commission at the end of Matthew, Jesus commanded his followers to baptise those who they make disciples of.

Holy Communion/Lord's Supper

Similarly, the night before his crucifixion, Jesus partook of the Jewish Passover meal, and applied this to himself, as the true Lamb of God through whom we obtain redemption from the power and penalty of sin. He then commanded that we continue to remember Him, by eating and drinking in the same fashion.

We may therefore identify the members of the Church, by our mutual participation in these two sacraments.

As Lindfield United Reformed Church (and the other Church fellowships in

Lindfield) we meet together regularly to enter into the purposes described above. As such the local church will include a mix of those people who are part of the Church – having recognised God’s calling, and responded in repentance, faith and obedience through Jesus Christ, being ‘born again’; with others who are enquiring, but have not yet understood and responded. We may also find those who are opposed to the Christian message amongst us – Jesus made it clear that the kingdom of heaven would grow up alongside “weeds” (Matthew 13:24 – 30, 36 – 43), and that not all within the church community would be genuine (Matthew 7:15 – 23). Nonetheless, He instructs us not to uproot the (apparent) impostors, but to allow God to distinguish at the right time (13:28b – 30).

May we be encouraged as we reflect upon our holy calling in Jesus, challenged by the tasks and opportunities to serve the one we love, and sure that we are building on the right foundations.

ALPHA update

Monthly Mission Giving – November

This month we devote our giving to the work of RELEASE INTERNATIONAL supporting the persecuted church worldwide.

Release International was inspired and founded through the first-hand experience of persecution by Pastor Richard Wurmbrand, who was imprisoned for fourteen years and tortured by the Romanian secret police during the Cold War years of the 1950s and 1960s. He spent three years in solitary confinement in a cell thirty feet below ground, never seeing sun, moon, or stars, flowers or snow, never seeing another man except for the guards and interrogators who beat and tortured him.



Release International was founded in 1968, when it was known as Christian Mission to the Communist World. Richard Wurmbrand himself died in February 2001, but his vision and passion to serve persecuted Christians around the world continues in the ministry of Release International today.

Release International serves the persecuted church around the world in five key ways:

1. Providing for the needs of the families of martyrs and prisoners. Financial and medical help is provided, assistance for families to become self-sufficient in the longer term and orphans cared for.
2. Helping evangelical churches to survive persecution and its effects, assisting leaders and believers to pay fines imposed on them by the police, providing "safe houses" for new believers in dangerous circumstances.
3. Helping the persecuted church win to Christ those who are opposed to the gospel. Release International helps to strengthen the persecuted



church in its mission by supporting the work of local pastors and evangelists, who often minister the gospel in difficult and dangerous circumstances. Literature is provided with other resources and equipment for evangelistic presentations.

4. Providing Bibles, literature and qualified teachers to equip the church to survive and grow despite difficult circumstances, sponsoring Christian radio broadcasts, supporting underground Bible schools to train emerging Christian leaders in areas where the church is being persecuted
5. Being advocates and a voice for the martyrs and the oppressed by raising public awareness of particular situations, campaigning through letter-writing on behalf of those who are imprisoned and tortured for their Christian faith



RELEASE INTERNATIONAL produces excellent publications giving information about what is happening to the Christian Church across the world. They also have an excellent website

(www.releaseinternational.org), where you can sign up to receive regular e-mails giving up-to-date prayer requests.

The **11:00am service** is usually more set and formal.


(Exceptions to these times are shown in the Diary).

Morning and Evening: Charles H. Spurgeon (Revised and updated by Alistair Begg)

"Charles Spurgeon's 'Morning and Evening' has earned the right to be called a devotional classic. Generations after Spurgeon's death, Christians are still finding his timeless and original engagement with God's word to be a refreshing way to begin and end their day.







Admission is free and there will be a retiring collection at the end of the event and any monies after expenses will be sent to Tear Fund to support their relief work in Pakistan.


