### Dear Friends,

It's difficult living with uncertainty, but often there is no alternative. By the time you read this letter, I may know more about my immediate prospects, but now, all I can say with confidence is that I will have to undergo open-heart surgery in the near future. As yet I have no definite date\*, but it's likely that at sometime in July I will be admitted to hospital for a second heart by-pass.

This won't come as a surprise to anyone. You have all been aware for some time now that I haven't been well and the kindness and concern you have shown has been very supportive. I don't want to bore you with details of my personal life, but it does give me an opportunity to "practise what I preach". All of a sudden, faith has ceased to be a concept to commend to others and become a much deeper reality in my own life as I face the future.

When we are young and fit we tend to take good health for granted, but as the years go by and age takes its toll, it's a different matter. The need for security and re-assurance becomes greater. So, is that what faith amounts to – a kind of emotional comfort zone to bolster our confidence when life gets tough? I don't think so. Faith is the life-line we have to God, the conduit along which our need flows to Him and His mercy and healing power comes to us.

For a Christian, faith is the air we breathe from the first moment we accept Christ as our Saviour and make Him our Lord, to the moment He calls us home. To some people, that may seem simple and childish, but for me, at the moment, it's the thing that makes life possible. I know I am in His hands.

Maybe you also are coping with uncertainty. The new government promises "an age of austerity". That won't be welcome news to people who depend on benefits which are likely to be cut, or someone trying to run a business if they have to pay more in tax. Relationships are much less stable now than in the past and to find yourself rejected, facing life alone must be devastating. Bereavement and unemployment are just two of the disasters life can bring, but in it all, what can make the difference between survival and going under, is a personal relationship of love and faith in the God Who keeps His promises.

No one will be surprised that an old hymn comes to mind, so here it is:

"All the way my Saviour leads me, what have I to ask beside? Can I doubt His tender mercy who through life has been my Guide? Heavenly peace, divinest comfort, here by faith in Him to dwell! For I know whate'er befall me, Jesus doeth all things well."

Over the next few months, I will have another opportunity to prove that those words are true. Whatever your circumstances, let me invite you to join me along the way.

# Prayer Focus

In the autumn we will be holding an Alpha course. It will need participants. Pray that we will be led to people to invite. That many will attend and come to know the Lord.

Additionally there are several in the fellowship with real needs, continue to pray for them.

### About me by Josh Thomas .....

Hi, I'm Josh, I am 21 years old and will be moving to Lindfield towards the end of July to take up the post of Youth Pastor from August.

I have been involved with Christian youth work for about five years in varying capacities from volunteering to help with a youth club once a week, to most recently being a student youth worker working for Woking United Reformed Church whilst studying to gain my JNC (the qualification for youth work.)



During the past two years, as I said, I have been based in Woking running a number of youth activities within the church here. These have varied from a once weekly Christian based youth club, to running a drop-in centre for young people in a deprived estate. I have specifically been in charge of running our weekly Sunday morning group and this has very much been about looking after the pastoral needs of our young people and developing them on their Christian journeys. I have felt passionately about this and am looking forward to carrying out this kind of role in my new post!

So that's my professional background but I want to give you a flavour of how I came to apply for this role and the calling that has led me to take it up.

I was born in Portsmouth and grew up in a town called Waterlooville (just outside Portsmouth.) I attended a United Reformed Church on Hayling Island where my family had always been involved since my Grandfather was Minister to that congregation. I grew up within this Christian family and so always had an understanding of faith and what it was to be a Christian. However like many teenagers, I questioned the need to go to Church to be a Christian. When I was fifteen I was asked to go as a representative from the area to FURY Assembly (the national assembly for the young people in the URC.) It was here, meeting with other young Christians and being able to talk about our experiences as well as spending time worshiping together, that God really seemed to become real to me. I started going to Church more regularly and became a Church member

aged 16. When I was 17 years old I was part of a team of young people who visited Jamaica with Christian Aid, I saw a lot of incredible things whilst out there and a lot of the Jamaican people inspired me with their faith. Some of them had so little material possessions but their faith that God would provide was amazing. When I returned I was asked to run a youth session based on my experiences out there. I didn't have much experience but did my best and surprised myself with this ability I didn't know I even had. It was from this point I felt God's call on my life to disciple young people in the same way I had been discipled. Without Christian youth work and its practitioners I'm not sure I would be the person I am today and I'm convinced God is calling me to be that light for Him within the lives of young people today.

In my spare time I am a keen musician and play guitar, bass guitar and drums as well as dabbling in song writing, I also enjoy playing and watching football and I follow Chelsea football club. Many of you have met my girlfriend Hannah who will be studying at Brighton University from September but if you haven't I am sure you soon will!

I am looking forward to joining you all very soon and cannot wait to start working with the young people of Lindfield!


### **BOYS' BRIGADE**

### **Book Review**

### "A Man With a Mission" by John Taylor.

I would like to recommend an autobiography called "A Man with a Mission" by Canon John Taylor OBE. John began his career in civil engineering, but then at the young age of 21 he felt called to a vocation in the church. He became a lay-minister with the Mission to Seamen, first in Cardiff and then in London. He learnt how to communicate with people whether in the port or with the families left behind when their men were away at sea. He then met his wife, Rose, and they were soon sent to Hong Kong, with very little money but plenty of faith. He has a delightful sense of humour which got him into and out of a few tricky situations.

After studying for ordination, followed by a period as a curate in two parishes in Wales, he and Rose went back to the Mission to Seamen and were sent to Dar es Salaam, where they stayed for 12 years. By now they had a son and a daughter who were sent back to the UK for their education. This must have been at great cost to them all.

Things couldn't have been more different here to the UK, but he was obviously really loved and became chaplain. He was then promoted to Archdeacon and eventually Canon.

His last posting abroad was such a contrast - Bangkok. He worked amongst the prisoners and refugees and the disillusioned expats from Britain.

His gifts were so varied and he became involved just as much with fundraising as one-to-one ministry with the crew and families or buying toothpaste for a prisoner! It was while he was in Bangkok that he was appointed to a top job - chaplain at the British Embassy.

His sense of humour and his belief that to show God's love meant practical everyday help, were as important as his words. He felt he could no longer carry on when he lost his beloved help-mate, Rose, and he regretfully came home. He is now retired, aged around 80, and lives in the former rectory of a Sussex parish.

### THE LAST OF THE 39 BOOKS!

On Sunday evening 4th July, I'll be giving a brief overview of the book of Malachi. It's the last book in the Old Testament and will bring to an end my occasional Sunday evening introductions to the Hebrew scriptures that Jesus read and knew.

I've enjoyed getting to understand the Old Testament a little bit better and hope you have too. I hope that it has helped us to see how this collection of 39 books fits together, and to see their place in the spiritual journey of God's ancient people. And I hope we've been able to apply the teaching of these inspired books to our own walk with God.

For those who want to deepen their Old Testament knowledge, there are dozens of helpful books. I can't provide a comprehensive list, but I've found the following very readable:

"Introduction to the Old Testament" John Drane - an excellent reference book:

"The Bible Jesus Read" Philip Yancey - helpful, practical;

"After Eating the Apricot" John Goldingay – some unorthodox insights into the early part of the Bible.

# FAMILY BARBECUE showcasing SAMARITAN'S PURSE Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> July 2010

Samaritan's Purse – we normally think of Christmas time and shoe boxes however the vision that children and families in need will have hope – for today, for tomorrow, for eternity. Through local churches in Africa, Eastern Europe and Central Asia Samaritan's Purse proclaims and demonstrates the love of God amongst impoverished communities.

There are several areas where development work is carried out.

**Positive Impact -** a campaign to care for children affected by HIV and AIDS. Around 15 million children are orphaned by AIDS in the world. Children are left to play the part of adults, caring for themselves and their siblings. Samaritan's Purse has trained over 400 churches in places like Swaziland and Kenya to care for over 20,000 children in need of protection. Look at www.positiveimpact.org.uk for more information on this campaign.

**Turn On The Tap** – is a campaign for safe water in the developing world. Imagine having to live with drinking water that isn't safe to drink! Imagine having to walk about four miles to get it! That's what happens to millions of people in our world. This is changing – slowly... Thanks to the work of Samaritan's Purse over 200.000 children and families in places like Liberia, Uganda and Ethiopia now have one of life's bare necessities – clean water. **Good Thought** — an initiative to connect with and understand the Global Church. Church Partnership Programme — giving the church an opportunity to connect with a church or project in the developing world — partnering together in God's Global mission. When disaster strikes support through an Emergency Team response and to raise funds to help in these areas. Look at www.samaritans-purse.org.uk/churchpartnership

**Alive to Thrive** – A campaign to ensure families in Africa have the means to thrive, not just survive. In rural parts of Liberia, Kenya and Zimbabwe, jobs are hard to come by, the land is hard to grow crops and families can be left wondering where the next meal is coming from. In Jesus' words in John 10:10 "I came to give life – life in all its fullness". This means ensuring that families have a livelihood, the ability to fend for themselves and put

meals on the table. It may be giving rabbits or training farmers. Look at www.samaritans-purse.org.uk/alivetothrive

And of course **Operation Christmas Child** - our annual shoebox appeal which we all enjoy doing. Please get your shoe boxes early. "I know that the Lord secures justice for the poor and upholds the cause of the needy". Psalm140:1

Our prayers can help the heart of the work this organisation is doing. It sustains us and the workers when we face tough situations in different places where we work. We can pray for emergencies and disasters that affect families across the world, for wisdom for Government Leaders and for aid agencies, including Samaritan's Purse as they work to bring relief to children and families in need.

We can pray for the water sanitisation programmes and pray that God will give them perseverance and strength to continue the vital work for children and families to receive clean water. Pray for outreach groups working with children and families who have been affected by HIV and AIDS that they would be renewed with joy and strength. Give thanks for goats, mature hens and other livelihood gifts that have been bought for families, and pray that they know the love each gift comes with from people who care deeply about children and their families' difficult plight.

### Letter from Nigel Uden to Churches...

Dear friends

I am writing to tell you that I have accepted the call to be the next minister both of St Columba's United Reformed Church, Cambridge and of the United Reformed Church in Fulbourn, a village five miles outside the city.

For some three years I have been pondering, in company with mentors, a deepening inclination to return to local church ministry, but have felt it right to continue in the Synod whilst together we dealt with the structural matters that followed the General Assembly's decision to remove District Councils.

I cannot overstate how I appreciate the privilege that the last nine years have afforded me, the significant amount I have learned and the happy relationships that I have enjoyed with ministers, staff, young people, committees and countless folk in the churches. Ever since I candidated for ministry in this Synod more than thirty years ago I have appreciated it; I will now hold it dear. I owe my family, Bethan and Jess an immeasurable amount for their utterly unselfish support and unfailing love throughout my service amongst you.

Please be assured of my prayers and good wishes for all that the future holds. As Pentecost approaches I am drawn to words with which Peter Marshall led Congress to pray in 1947, "Lord Jesus, you have promised to give us the Holy Spirit. ... We know deep down in our hearts that without your guidance we can do nothing, but with you we can do all things. Let us not be frightened by the problems that confront us, but rather give you thanks that you have matched us with this hour. May we resolve, God helping us, to be part of the answer, and not part of the problem; for Jesus' sake." So be it.


