Dear Friends,

This edition of Good News spans two months – December and January. It's been suggested that my Pastor's letter should be longer than normal, giving me a chance to talk not just about Christmas, but also to look a little further into the future at where God may be leading us. Of course, the thought of having to suffer a double dose of ministerial musings may strike dread into your heart. You may throw down the magazine in frustration and decide to make a cup of tea to recover your presence of mind. If you do, I quite understand, but if not, take courage and read on!

Christmas comes but once a year

As we grow older, Christmas becomes more and more a time for remembering the past. Families used to be larger on the whole and in former years, relatives seemed to keep in touch with one another more. Communities are more fragmented nowadays and with the price of housing in the South East, young people have to move away in order to have any hope of buying a home of their own. It's easy to give in to the temptation of sighing "It was so much better in the old days!" I want to urge you to resist that temptation.

We all get a bit sentimental at Christmastime and there's nothing wrong with that. The glow of the candles, the cuteness of Mary and Joseph as they occupy centre-stage in the nativity play (even if Joseph can't hide his boredom) all add to the uniqueness of the season. In just the same way, we love to see the care and skill with which the church is decorated and woe betide any minister who fails to choose enough traditional carols to be sung from the beginning of December until Boxing Day! But all these things, precious as they are, are peripheral. The truth at the centre of Christmas is much more important and that doesn't change. If some of the accreted traditions which obscure it are falling away, surely that is a good thing.

We complain about secularism being a threat to Christmas, but why not use it as an opportunity? The Incarnation – the coming of God into the world as a human being has very little to do with Christmas cards, mistletoe, cranberry sauce and Santa Claus. It's about an act of the most incredible generosity. It's about a God who was prepared to identify Himself totally with the objects of His love, not just to care from on high, but to come and share the cold and dirt of a stable and the agony of a cross. That's the message we have to proclaim and if the cold winds of secularism blow away some of the cobwebs which have grown over it, we ought to be thankful.

I'm not suggesting we shouldn't enjoy ourselves. What better excuse for a party could there be, than the fact that the Word became flesh and lived for a while amongst us? Let's spend what little we can afford to brighten the lives of those we love and do so with a good conscience! But let's never forget that, at its heart, Christmas is about sacrifice – the sacrifice of a young girl's obedience and supremely, the sacrifice of the One who did not grasp and keep hold of His divine status, but was content to take the lowest place, let it go and was found in fashion as a Man.

So what of the future?

In one sense, we must leave the future to God, but in another, we must be sensitive to His leading and ready to respond to His challenge. So where is He leading us? I believe there are two over-riding priorities.

He wants us to seek a deeper relationship with Him and a fuller experience of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit.

"Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me"
but do we ever consider the next line of the chorus?

"Break me, melt me, mould me, fill me"

Don't ask for a fresh anointing of the Holy Spirit unless you are prepared to be broken! As someone who has known something of that experience, take it from me, it's not a path to be contemplated lightly.

And remember, the Holy Spirit isn't interested in giving spiritual gifts to people who want them for themselves. If you seek the Spirit's gifts, He will expect you to use them for the good of the whole church.

We must remember the first of the six immutable laws of sowing in reaping – <u>if you don't sow, you won't reap.</u>

One of these days I'll share the other five with you, but just now let me ram home the first. If we don't sow the word of God and share the Gospel in any and every way we can, we will be the last Christian generation, because God has no grand-children. Every generation needs to be challenged afresh and confronted with the necessity to repent and believe.

We have a wonderful Outreach Group, but we can't leave all the work to them. They are the "idea factory". It's great to listen to Dan MacQuillin waxing lyrical at Church Meeting about the opportunities we have because our building is at the centre of the village, but unless everyone pitches in to use those opportunities, we might as well be on Mars!

The autumn Alpha Course was such an encouragement and God bless those who worked so hard to organise and lead it, but it's not an end in itself. We must be ready to find other ways, just as effective, to bring people to faith in Christ. As fire exists by burning, so the Church exists by reaching out and if it stops doing that, it might as well arrange its own funeral.

Thank God that that kind of spineless lethargy does not characterise our fellowship here at Lindfield. There is so much in our church life to encourage and inspire us.

Let me wish you a wonderful Christmas and God's richest blessing in all the days to come.



Sunday Services explained....

The **9.30am service** is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. There is a crèche, and after about 20 minutes, children and young people up to age 14 go out to their own groups on most Sundays.

Coffee is served between the morning services.

The **11:00am service** is usually more set and formal.

(Exceptions to these times are shown in the Diary).

At **6:30pm** it is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Personal prayer is available after every service. Prayer requests and brief statements of praise for answered prayer can be put in the red book on the concourse table. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We do not take up an offering during the services, but those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service. Thank you.

Recordings of services can be borrowed free from the church.

Reflections of India

Most in the church will know that we took another trip to India again in October. The main purpose was to visit a new hospital in Thane – about an hour's drive from Mumbai. This replaces an existing hospital and opened in November. It is 'state of the art' on 7 storeys plus $2\frac{1}{2}$ below ground, has 75 beds, and is fully equipped to carry out almost any operation and treatment. Amazing what can be achieved there on a budget of £6m! Great emphasis, however, is placed on the spiritual needs of patients, as well as the physical.

As well as spending time with the doctor/surgeon who heads up the hospital project we met, as always, some amazing people:

Abraham – once a fundamentalist Hindu, violently opposed to Christianity now working as an evangelist in 30 tribal villages. He nearly died from a snakebite but made a remarkable recovery although his leg was not a pretty sight! An article in the press recently warned the local people to beware of this man who was spreading the 'viruses of Christianity'.

Andy & Sheba who head up an HIV/AIDS work in Thane with about 25 on their team. This work will occupy part of the old hospital eventually. AIDS is an increasing problem but they are seeing many helped both physically, emotionally and spiritually.

Charron - an evangelist and church planter in Haryana. He has started a school for Gypsy children, runs kids work in a very Hindu area and heads up a church, meeting in his own very poor home.

Saurab – heading up a Rehab & Counselling Centre for drug & alcohol addicts in Dehradun. A fine Christian, once an addict himself, heavily into Yoga, able even to levitate. He was released after months of prayer and counselling and now serving others. He has a number of ex-addicts on his staff who are also keen Christians.

Young People's Group. Many converted from Hindu backgrounds and families and have endured persecution and violence even from their own parents and siblings for converting but, as one young man said to us, 'there is no turning back'; - Apathy is not in their vocabulary!!

Sam & Margaret who head up the work in Dehradun. Lovely couple with an open home for all and sundry. Their church continues to grow in spite of opposition and there was a deep sense of the Lord's presence in their worship.

Just some of those that we sought to encourage but as always challenged us with their commitment - 'poor but making many rich, having nothing yet possessing everything' (2 Cor 6: 10).

December Mission Giving

Worthing Churches Homeless Projects (WCHPs)

As we have done for several years now, we shall be devoting this month's mission giving to help the homeless through the work of WCHPs.

They began back in the early 1990s as a 'soup and sandwich' run by a small number of concerned Christians and has grown into a multifaceted organisation with specialist permanent staff assisted by an army of volunteers, offering support to many who have found themselves at rock bottom, lonely and without a home.

WCHPs believes that everyone has the right to a home, regardless of the difficulties and issues they may face in their lives. They also believe in showing those who need their help, that the wider community is there to support them and to offer hope for a better future.

Most homeless people are so because of a relationship breakdown, leaving the armed services or, in the case of and young people, coming out of care. Others may have suffered bereavement or extreme financial hardship. All have a story to tell, some very sad. All are different, but each is special to God.

WCHPs operate a variety of projects including:

St Clare's Day centre which is open 365 days a year, providing a vital lifeline of support for those on the street and offering hot and cold food, drinks, showers, a change of clothes, washing and drying facilities, medical services, chiropody, hairdressing, advice and support.

Rupert Bacon House provides short term accommodation offering residents an opportunity to explore a way forward by engaging in key working sessions with WCHPs staff as well as living in a more secure environment.

Delaney house, specifically set up to work with substance misuse clients. Access to Delaney House, is via an assessment process at St Clare's Day Centre. Through an in-depth programme residents can explore and reflect upon possibilities of change. Many are in need of medical help and rebuilding of shattered lives and find in Delaney house a place of refuge and hope.

There is 'Move On' accommodation provided in a 5 bedroom unit that is designed to specifically help clients at the very sensitive stage of 'move on'. Some clients find as they move into the community they face a real challenge regarding independent living. This accommodation provides a six to eight month opportunity to have a far greater degree of independence, explore how to budget, maintain a tenancy and gain further life skills.

Cornerstone House provides supported accommodation for those with longer term needs. Clients are usually engaged in full time education, voluntary work or have entered back into the job market. The Community Link Team provides additional support. Cornerstone House provides residents with the tools to access independent accommodation, supported by the Homelessness Prevention Worker as they settle into their future surroundings.

A dedicated Charity Retail Shop was opened in Worthing town centre in December last year where good quality items (no electrical goods) are always needed, collection/delivery can be arranged if necessary.

January Mission Giving

Febabroadcasting hope.

Feba UK is a Christian charity, committed to reaching people who are unable to easily have access to the Christian Gospel throughout Africa, Asia and the Middle East. Using short wave, medium wave, FM or the internet, Feba programmes are produced wherever possible in-country by local followers of Jesus, often in partnership with like-minded organisations. The good news of Jesus is brought to people in a language they understand, and to those who may also be visually challenged.

The programmes produced are fresh, compelling and engaging, developing innovative approaches to address issues facing individuals, families and communities. Feba broadcasts seek to build up trusted relationships with audiences, becoming a sustained and consistent presence in their lives. Contents range from Bible teaching to farming techniques, leadership skills and training to health care. Whatever the content, the purpose is to communicate God's love.

Feba is a network of eight autonomous interdependent national organisations based worldwide. The work is co-ordinated from regional centres which allow the producers to share the same cultural issues as their audience; they also appreciate the same values, traditions and fears as their listeners.

Our prayers and financial support are always greatly appreciated by the team at Feba, particularly in this difficult climate. We have so much freedom to read the bible, listen to the radio or to choose the channel we listen to. How privileged are we? In <u>this</u> election Lindfield has 2024 votes and has already won a prize for being one of the first communities to register 100 online votes.

So if you see a local parish councillor wandering around the church during the next few weeks wearing a purple rosette and with a clipboard in his hand, beware it's not Santa but he does want your vote! But why the church in particular you may ask, but why not, as good communication is what the church is all about and after all, we exist to communicate the Gospel.

The Lindfield Communications Forum are trying to get the Alma Road telephone exchange upgraded so that the village gets a faster broadband service. Currently all users of our exchange receive one of the slowest services in the district, a situation which will get worse next year as the Haywards Heath exchange is currently being upgraded. We believe that upgrading the Lindfield exchange so that it is equipped with the latest fibre optical system will bring considerable benefits for all its users but in particular to local businesses and school children.

The supply of telephone and broadband connections at the exchange and between the exchange and our houses is the responsibility of BT, regardless of the service provider that individual householders have contracts with for these services. We have, therefore, to persuade BT that there is enough demand within the village for this faster service and we believe that by entering Lindfield in BT's Race to Infinity, there is an opportunity before the end of December to do just that.

I suspect by the time you read this at the end of November that most home computer users will be aware of bt.com/racetoinfinity and will I hope, have visited it and voted online for LINDFIELD, if not please do it NOW.

The reason for me walking around the church (and other places) with my purple rosette and clipboard is to try and enlighten those who do not have a computer or use the internet about the advantages to others in the local community that the improvement in broadband speed will provide. Then I hope they can be persuaded to provide me with the details needed for me to register their votes by proxy.


