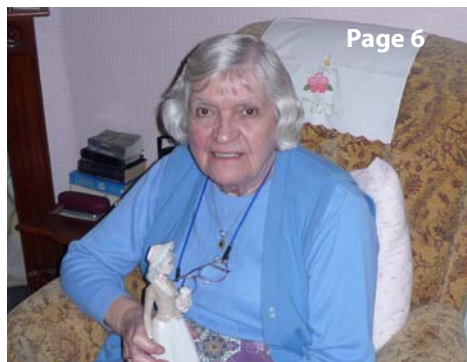

Many of us have been served by bright young students in McDonalds in this country and around the world. So I was rather surprised, to say the least, to learn that our own Elsie Anderson is proud to have been a McDonalds crew member for six years – when she was in her fifties!

Mike Gardiner recently interviewed her for GoodNEWS in her home in Hanbury Lane, where her parlour is filled with photos of her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.



MG: Tell me, Elsie, how did an East End Granny become a McDonalds crew member?

EA: I'd been working for a catering company, and when they moved, we were all made redundant. At the same time, McDonalds were recruiting staff for their new store in East Ham High Street. Lots of the youngsters were applying and urged me to. When the interviewer saw me, his response was, "Are you sure you want to work for McDonalds?" At that time, I knew nothing about McDonalds – I'd never even been in one – so all I could say was "They talked me into it!" "Well, I expect we can find something for you to do," he replied and signed me on. So at 54, there I was, a McDonalds girl!

MG: How did you enjoy the work?

EA: It was lovely – I was in my element, once I'd got the hang of the cash register system. It was a busy restaurant, with upstairs and downstairs and I knew lots of the customers – many of them were our neighbours. The people who were surprised to see me were the bosses who came over from the States for the annual inspection!

MG: Didn't you feel out of place, though, working with a crew of teens and twenties?

EA: No way. They were like my own children, and soon everyone was calling me Auntie Elsie. We had youngsters from

different ethnic backgrounds, and many were lonely or had family problems. They came to regard me as their real auntie, and would tell me their troubles and ask my advice. I got to meet their boy- and girl-friends, and Les and I were invited to their weddings. In all, went to twelve!

[Elsie shows me the photos in an album, including the wedding of Bob, the manager. And then a photo of Bob's son's wedding last year – sent with a Christmas card. The son whose Christening Elsie attended twenty-odd years ago!]. .

MG: How did you get to know them so well, if you were so busy?

EA: Ah, our friendships went beyond working hours. They trusted me with the profit from the pool table in the staff room, and I used it to organise parties and regular staff outings. We went on coach trips around the country, and did several day-trips to France.

I pose a last question: "What about the jibe that McDonalds serve junk food?" This makes Elsie cross. "McDonalds serve good food cooked under the highest standards of hygiene. – their food is better for you than fish and chips." She proudly shows me the figurine that was presented to her when she retired at 60. And where's the gold bracelet?, I asked her. "Oh, I gave that to one of my granddaughters" Typical of Elsie, I thought.

Wider World

Persecution in North Korea

Christians in North Korea are reporting that their situation has not improved at all under the new leader Kim Jong-un. N. Korea has topped the Open Doors World Watch List of the fifty worst persecutors of Christians for ten years in a row.

Open Doors USA says the new leader has not made "any essential changes" in the year since his father's death. Kim Jong-un has reportedly increased the number of spies in China, where Christians have helped N. Korean refugees. Border patrols put pressure on captured smugglers to disclose information about Christians helping defectors. Some arrested Christians are tortured then released in order to betray others. They are often deliberately badly injured in the hope that their Christian friends will come forward to help them and then be arrested themselves.

Every aspect of life is strictly controlled by the authorities and Christians (who number over a quarter of a million) are reporting that they feel just as isolated from the outside world as they had done under Kim Jong-il, and 50,000 to 70,000 are in jail suffering horrific conditions.

As an Open Doors co-worker involved in ministry among N. Koreans says "We can only pray for them. We know that Jesus will never leave them, nor forsake them".

Bibles in China

The only printing company authorised to print the Bible in China announced in November 2012 that over sixty million copies of the Christian scriptures have been printed and distributed throughout the country, although many poorer Christians in rural areas are still waiting to receive a copy. Many worshippers have never even seen a Bible.

There are officially around sixteen million Christians in China today, although it is believed that there are many, many more who worship separately from the churches run by the government.

Sadly, the Chinese government continues to persecute church groups not affiliated with the state's church organisations.

Bible in a Year

Several years ago a group of us accepted the challenge to read the Bible in a year (- daunting!). We did, using the original one volume “Cover to Cover”. At the end of the year the question for me was “what now?”.

So I repeated the exercise using another Bible programme and again the next two years (Everyday with Jesus Bible, The Message etc). Each one added a different approach. Then the new complete chronological “Cover to Cover” was published, much easier than the original where you had to find all the texts. Now just published is the NIV edition of “Cover to Cover” with more charts, maps and illustrations as well.

This variety prepared me well for reading, last year, “The Big Story”, which reveals God’s covenant Plan for everyone. It is a journey of discovery through the Bible following God’s story from cover to cover, from first creation to final creation. It is fascinating and, as I near the end second time through, I’ll probably go back to the start and do it a third time in 2013 – remembering that we (you and I) are part of that story – what a challenge!

The new “Cover to Cover Complete” is available from all good book stores and Amazon (from around £17.77 including p&p) and uses, for the first time, the NIV 2011.

CWR’s one year chronological reading plan incorporates the full Bible text and each day ends with a devotional thought

written by Selwyn Hughes and Trevor Partridge. It is divided into manageable daily sections with maps, diagrams and timelines, which enhance your understanding of the Bible and biblical times and provide a highly motivating reading experience.

For the last couple of years I have been reading the Bible in a year

as part of my quiet time.

I was challenged a few years back by the thought that if I haven’t actually read the Bible, how can I claim that I believe it? Surely I’m only really claiming that I believe the bits that I’ve heard in church or studied in House Group. The WHOLE Bible, however might have some really interesting things to say and I need to investigate.



For the last two years I have worked my way through the 'Cover to Cover Complete' Bible in a year as it happened.

This is a great resource as it presents the whole of the Holman Christian Standard Bible in Chronological order, so on the first of January you read Genesis 1 and John 1, In the spring you'll work your way through Kings and Chronicles side by side and in the autumn you get to the gospel accounts, again side by side.

Just before Christmas you work through Paul's letters to the churches at the same time as Luke's accounts of these missionary journeys in Acts.

If anyone would like to borrow my Bible for 2013, just ask. It will be sitting on my bookshelf unused as I will try something different next year. I would encourage anyone who struggles to read the Bible or who thinks they know all about it to go on this adventure in the New Year. It takes about 10 minutes a day and you'll be amazed what you discover.

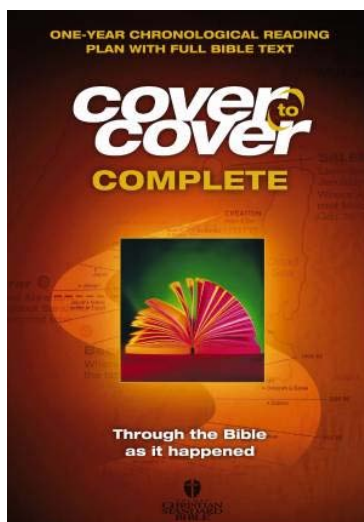
incredibly rewarding.

Feba UK is a Christian charity, committed to reaching people who are unable to easily have access to the Christian Gospel. Feba works with hard-to-reach communities in Africa, Asia and the Middle East, serving them at their point of need.

They might be communities:

- Living in remote geographical locations or cultural isolation with little or no access to support and services such as medical facilities
- With high rates of illiteracy
- Facing reduced life expectancy due to insufficient health information
- With reduced access to news, information and varied ideas due to lack of media exposure or media being heavily controlled by authorities
- Facing discrimination and oppression leaving them voiceless and lacking empowerment
- Experiencing high levels of unemployment or low-yielding daily work leaving them unable to provide for their needs

Feba programmes are produced wherever possible in-country by local followers

of Jesus, often in partnership with like-minded organisations. The good news of Jesus is brought to people in a language they understand, and to those who may also be visually challenged. The most suitable media is used for each community reached. In some communities, that will be short wave. In others, it may be community FM, medium wave or the Internet and social media. In disaster situations, it's sometimes appropriate to distribute radios to those affected so that they can access vital information.

The programmes produced are fresh, compelling and engaging, developing innovative approaches to address issues facing individuals, families and communities. Broadcasted material can:

- Provide information and education relevant to a community's needs and issues
- Enable communities to help themselves and make positive life changes
- Provide an opportunity for self-expression, giving communities a voice
- Encourage reconciliation between individuals, families and communities
- Instill joy and relief through entertainment and humour
- Awaken the possibility of a relationship with Jesus
- Provide Bible teaching and encouragement for those who choose to follow Jesus

Wycliffe Bible Translators

Through the Bible, God speaks directly to every man, woman and child. But unless people have the Bible in their home language, they cannot read his message of life, hope and salvation. Thousands of languages still don't have a single verse of Scripture.

These two agencies are both committed to the translation and distribution of The Scriptures throughout the world. The following is an extract from the Wycliffe website which gives information about what has already been achieved and what is still to be done so that everyone has access to the Bible

How many languages have Scripture? Over 2,800. Of these, 518 have a complete Bible, another 1,275 have the New Testament. 1,005 others have at least one book of the Bible.

How many languages still need translation? In addition to over 1,500 active projects, work needs to begin in a further 1,967 languages.

How many people have no Scripture? Around 209 million speak these languages where translation still needs to begin.

In how many languages have Wycliffe been involved in the completion of a New Testament or Bible? Between 1999 and 2012 Wycliffe personnel have helped in the translation of more than 300 New Testaments and begun new work in over 700 languages.

What is the potential impact of work that's underway? Wycliffe staff are currently involved in 1,537 active language programmes. About a third of these languages have populations less than 10,000, a third between 10,000 and 100,000, and a third over 100,000 speakers. Additional work is being undertaken by other organisations in a further 500 languages.

How many countries are affected by the work of Wycliffe? Almost 100. This includes work among people who live outside their traditional homelands.

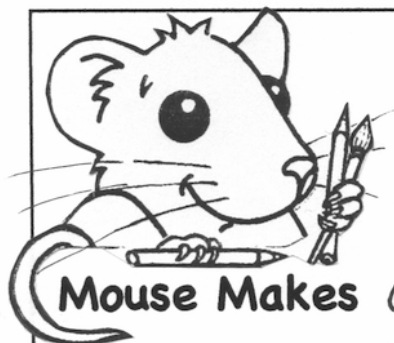

Synod Together

On the 10th November last year we were able to take a group of four young people to the annual Synod Together youth day in Orpington, Kent. It was during this event that we were presented with our Child Friendly Church Award.

The day started with a time of all age worship together after which our award was presented. The rest of the day was made up of various workshops exploring the topic of multi-sensory worship and culminated in putting all the things we had been doing in our workshops into an act of worship at the end of the day.

The workshops focused on all of the senses; smell, taste, hearing, sight and touch and we explored different ways in which worship could incorporate all of these. This included doing activities such as song writing and arty things to enhance worship. The young people rotated through all of the workshops throughout the morning to get a taster session and in the afternoon they were able to choose the activity that resonated most with them to fully focus on planning

the final act of worship.

The day ended after worship and we had two new songs, various bits of artwork to look at and an agape supper.

Synod commitments

As many of you will know as a condition of receiving Synod Turn The Tide funding which goes towards my employment, I have a commitment to run certain aspects of the Synod's youth and children's work.

In this article I want to give you a flavour of some of what I am involved in and ways in which you can pray for the work going on in the wider youth activities run by our denomination.

Synod Youth Executive – This was set up when I first arrived in Lindfield and its main aim is to ensure young people have a voice and are actively involved in

the planning of various youth activities in the Synod. It is made up of around ten young people all aged between fourteen and twenty-five from around the Synod and Lindfield is currently represented by Alex Jeffs who has been involved since the beginning.

As well as the planning of events the group are supported in their development as leaders and we are able to offer training to them in areas such as presentation skills, first aid and leadership skills. The group meets four times a year and you may well have seen them on their residential weekend in Lindfield back in February.

The group has changed a bit over the two years but they always enjoy meeting together for fun, fellowship, and most importantly, being able to worship together. The group, as I said, has changed recently with key members moving on to new things such as university so our first meeting back next year in Reigate will be very different, please pray for them as they adapt to their new positions.

Synod Together – As in the above article, this is a fun youth day, which is run in conjunction with the annual Synod Together meeting. I have been involved in the last three of these days as part of the organising committee and through running various workshops, helping to lead worship and leading other games and activities. This year I was in charge of leading the workshop on hearing and

we made this into a mini songwriting workshop and, amazingly, the group came up with two new songs and a poem on the day. Matt Redman, watch out!

Training – The last major aspect of my Synod commitment is running training sessions. This could be alongside Nick White (Southern Synod's Children's and Youth Development Officer) or on my own. Over the past two years this commitment has been fulfilled through running a safeguarding training day at the Tiger in Lindfield and also opening up our Young leadership training event. As you can see, although these activities benefit the Synod they also benefit our leaders and young people!

The work with the Synod is very important to me as, when I was growing up, the youth work at my home Church was limited, it was through getting involved in activities such as those listed above that I personally came to faith. I am therefore very passionate in ensuring that there is quality youth work available for all young people in our Synod, whether they come from a Church like ours, blessed with young people or if they are perhaps the only young person in their Church, they all deserve to learn about Jesus' love in an accessible way which they can understand.

Please pray for the above activities and all those leading and helping them. Without them many young people would have no way of meeting other young Christians.

My Story

Although many of you won't know me, I am sure you will know my brother, David. We moved as a family to Lindfield in 1985 when we were both in our teens, and started attending the church with our parents, Harry and Diana.

I was strongly influenced by the preaching of the minister at the time, Norman Smith, and also the love and support shown by so many in the church, and became a Christian in the summer of 1987.

After a few years away at University, I then worked overseas for several years as an aid worker in Cambodia and in Tanzania, before returning to the UK and settling down in Nottinghamshire and starting work in a financial role in industry. I also met my wonderful wife Stella, and we have 2 children, Rebekah (12) and Peter (9).

Despite being involved in a lively church, and in many ways being quite settled, Stella and I both felt a strong desire to seek God for a new direction in our lives. We both have a passion to see the church respond to God's special concern for the poor and vulnerable

I had been helping in a church project to help those with needs related to drug and alcohol dependency, and we realised that many of the people we were working with also had significant financial problems. I was invited to a training day run by Christians Against Poverty, to be able to run the CAP Money Course.

CAP Money is a revolutionary money management course for churches that teaches people budgeting skills and a simple, cash-based system that really works. This course will help anyone to get more in control of their finances, so they can save, give and prevent debt.

After running the course several times, I applied for a job at CAP's head office in Bradford, and started work in January 2011 as a Caseworker, working with clients to support them on their journey out of debt.

Since moving to Brighouse we have been really blessed as a family, I am really enjoying the work, and we have settled in a great church in Huddersfield.



The work of Christians Against Poverty

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) was started in 1996 by John Kirkby; the vision for the charity was borne out his own situation, when the lives of he and his family were devastated by the misery associated with spiralling debt and brokenness.

16 years later CAP has grown beyond anything John could have imagined, with 210 church based centres and over 400 workers throughout the UK, helping over 20,000 individuals each year.

In the UK today there are hundreds of thousands of people, from all backgrounds, who live in fear due to their financial situation. Debt causes isolation, fear of answering the door, sleepless nights, hiding from family and friends, shame, brokenness.

In Matthew 25, Jesus says 'Truly I tell you whatever you did for one of the least brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me'

CAP is a 21st century expression of God's heart for the lost and broken, we pray with clients, invite them to church and as well as helping with their debts, every year hundreds are brought into local churches and see their lives transformed.

Before working with CAP:

- 67% of clients missed meals, with 1 in 4 doing so regularly.
- 80% of CAP clients said they lived in fear.
- 1 in 3 either considered or attempted suicide before seeking help.

The CAP budgeting system prioritises food, so that families can feed their kids. We negotiate with creditors on behalf of our clients, to ensure that a sustainable plan is in place to help them to deal with their debts and live with dignity.

CAP is committed to working through local churches to help give practical expression of God's compassion for the poor and bring the love of Jesus to the local community.

Australian Adventure

I have just returned home after being away for 6 weeks in Australia and New Zealand. I travelled with a friend who, like me, has family living in Sydney, and for the first three weeks we spent time catching up with everyone before my friend, my sister and I went on to New Zealand for 2 weeks.

Sydney is a beautiful city and as it was late spring the weather was very pleasant. I love all the Australian flowers and many were already in bloom. Probably the most striking at this time were the Jacaranda trees which provided avenues of mauve colour everywhere. We went to the theatre and a couple of concerts at the Opera House passing Circular Quay en route where all the ferries and some cruise ships dock.

Aborigine groups were also present displaying their unique art work and playing their musical instruments, while some were deep in conversation on their mobile phones!!

After three busy weeks we flew to Auckland and drove to Rotorua where we experienced noxious fumes in the air coming from all the hot springs. We went to an area where mud bubbled in pools and where many of the pools in the volcanic craters were bright green, orange or yellow. Surprisingly life (bacteria)

existed in these toxic environments. We were treated to the eruption of a geyser where hot water shot in the air reaching heights of about 25 metres.

We returned to Auckland and flew to Queenstown in South Island. From here we followed old gold mining trails (but didn't make our fortune!), we went to part of the area where some scenes from The Lord of the Rings were filmed, and we had an overnight cruise in the beautiful fiord region on the west coast where albatross, seals, dolphins, penguins and other amazing wildlife could be seen.

We also went to a morning service in the Parish church in Queenstown where there was a warm welcome and a greeting in both English and Maori. Their text for the day was " I am the first and the last says the Lord Almighty who is,who was and is to come" A reminder that our God is the same faithful God wherever we live in the world.

It was interesting that they also ran a food bank, and that the need to help people with financial problems was as great in New Zealand as in the U.K

We visited a Kiwi sanctuary (the Kiwi is a very threatened species, vulnerable to many predators) where we had a very interesting talk on the conservation of the Kiwi and wildlife in general. They had various animals and birds on display helping illustrate their talk, and one of their "stars" was a possum called Pestilance! He was a very lucky animal to be kept as a display "pet " as normally they are trapped and culled and end up providing wool for jumpers, gloves etc as they do indescribable damage to the environment and kill young kiwi to mention just a few of their sins!

Our journey home involved a visit to Dunedin where we went to an Albatross sanctuary where the birds were sitting on their nests, and we flew finally from Christchurch to Sydney and on to HongKong for three days before arriving at Heathrow at 4.30 am and back to the cold. We were very glad to be wearing our possum jumpers!!

We had certainly enjoyed a great holiday, and were undoubtedly guided and protected in all our travels by our loving God who enabled us to experience another part of His wonderful world.

Book Review

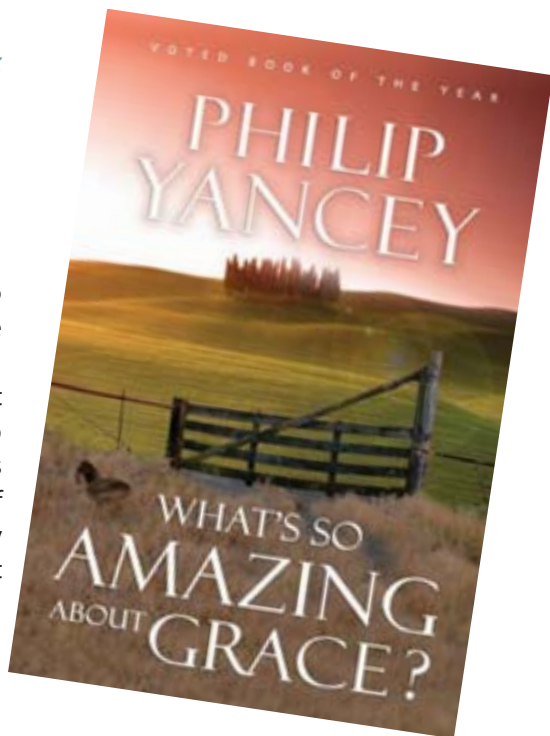
What's so Amazing About Grace?

by Philip Yancey
Zondervan, 1997

Philip Yancey is a successful and compelling author and journalist who has made it his mission to “speak to those living in the borderlands of faith”. Having rebelled against his fundamentalist Christian upbringing in America’s Deep South, he began a journey back towards faith far removed from the ‘toxic’ church of his youth that, as he highlights, frequently lacked grace during his upbringing at the height of the African-American Civil Rights Movement.

In this book he attempts to reveal the nature of grace and its profound implication on our lives. Exploring the intimate relationship between grace and forgiveness he chews over many difficult issues, such as what grace really looks like and how it fits in to a world full of pain and un-forgiveness.

Brought into focus by many startling stories that shine a light on, as Yancey describes it, the ‘scandalous’ nature of grace, he challenges us to move away from our comfort zone and live lives that outwardly proclaim the amazing message of God’s grace.
