

Happy Birthday Irene!

Our oldest Church member, Irene Curtis was born a long time ago, in fact 100 years ago on April 28th 1914 - just before the outbreak of the first World War!

Around thirty-five people came to her special party held in the Lindfield URC lounge to celebrate the auspicious event.

After blowing out the candles on her cake (in one puff), Irene made a short speech thanking God for the fact that she was still alive, in good health and did not have to take any pills!

Irene lives alone, does her own cooking and even looks after the garden with a little help with the mowing. She swam regularly and only gave it up when she was a mere 97!

Her father fought on the Western Front and when he was reported missing and nothing was heard for a while, Irene's mother assumed he had been killed. Not so! He was alive and, on his return, could not find them for a while as they had moved!

Irene spent her working life in the diamond trade in Hatton Garden, London, and in the 1970's moved to Backwoods Lane here in Lindfield. She has been a Church member since September 1996. She comes from a long-living family as her brother is 102, her sister is 98 and a half-sister, a mere 90. Every year she goes on holiday with her niece, and her brother and sister. This year they are all off to Wales.

Home Groups

'Doing Small Church in a Large Church'

Home Groups need to be central to our life as a church family. In a church, they are one of the primary places where we can grow together in Christ, and support, serve and encourage one another in the Christian life.

Why join a Home Group?

There are many benefits of joining a group. Not least is the opportunity it gives to get to know other members of the church family at a much deeper level than is ever possible on a Sunday.

Then, through Home Groups, our aim is for:

- ***Our lives to be transformed by God's truth (Romans 12:2)***
- ***Our community to be matured in love (Ephesians 4:15-16)***
- ***Our world to be engaged with the gospel (1 Peter 2:9-12)***

Our groups meet every other Thursday evening in homes during term time. It is a time of Bible Study and prayer. Each group arranges times to meet together over a meal or social activity. We have some groups that meet at different times and on different days, so if Thursday evenings are unsuitable for you please let us know.

Being part of a Home Group

In joining a Home group you are making a commitment to be part of a community of believers. You are committing to learn and grow with one another, and to serve, love, encourage and care for one another. On your part, this will involve:

Presence

The Home Group evening should be a top priority in your diary. We realise that business trips and emergency situations are unavoidable, but belonging to a Home Group means being there when it meets.

Participation

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul says that the church is like a human body. It only grows when every part is doing its bit. This means we have responsibilities towards each other as believers. Belonging to a Home Group means; sharing our lives with others through encouragement, care, support, service and the use of our gifts. It also means actively working to help others grow to be more like Jesus.

Prayer

One of the key ways we can serve each other is through prayer, because it's through our prayers that God does his work. Belonging to a Home Group means praying regularly for the members of the group.

Though living in community comes with all sorts of challenges (something the Bible is very realistic about!), it is where we grow best as Christians and as a church. Our prayer is that through our Home groups, we will 'in all things grow up into Him who is the Head, that is, Christ' (Ephesians 4:15).



Spring Harvest

Spring Harvest is a Christian Festival at Easter, run at both Butlins in Minehead and Skegness. The Big Top tent in Minehead hosts 3,500 people. Four families from our Church family at Lindfield URC headed for Minehead in Somerset this year.

There follows a review of how we all got on:



In early April this year, Lydia, Joe, Freya and I packed our bags and pointed our car towards the setting sun. We were headed for Spring Harvest at Minehead. It had been two years since our last visit but as we rounded the corner and saw the 'Skyline' it felt like we had never left.

Spring Harvest (www.springharvest.org) is a charity that has been in action now since 1979 with a brief to equip the church for action. The annual conferences are held at Butlin's in Minehead and Skegness and feature bible teaching, discussion groups and worship for all ages in a relaxed fun atmosphere.

This year the theme of the conference was 'Unbelievable: confident faith in a sceptical world'. This theme was based around Romans 8 and the Apostles Creed, which unites all Christian churches as a statement of faith. Within the theme we worked through 'the unfathomable Father', 'the unbeatable Son' and 'the unstoppable Spirit'.

The morning bible studies were a great place of teaching where we worked through the theme looking at a different aspect each day. The bible teaching was run by Steve Brady, Principal of Moorlands Bible College. Steve was very knowledgeable and able to open up each of the topics for us with a good dose of practicality and scouse wit. After the morning teaching session it was time for discussion groups. The stream I followed was hosted by Justin Brierley from Premier Radio. You may remember him from our Friday night 'Apologetics' event at the Bent Arms during our 'Gospel Gold for Lindfield' mission in 2012.

We unpacked some of the big issues surrounding our faith contrasted to the sceptical world view. I found these sessions to be of greatest value to me personally. The afternoon was filled with optional seminars or sports, creative arts and general fun on or off the Butlin's site. In the evenings there were main celebrations of different styles

and sizes from the big top - loud band and 4,000 people to the 'White House' alternative creative service or you could just stay in your Chalet and watch the big top live on your TV.

It was a great time away and we are now looking into next year to see if we go back again. The three weeks will run from March 28th to April 10th 2015 and the theme will be 'Immeasurably more'- looking at how God is and can provide immeasurably more than we could ever imagine. Robert Louis Stevenson said in 1881, 'to travel hopefully is a better thing than to arrive, and the true success is to labour.' His mother told him he should come and discuss Christianity with the imam. He told his mum he would do so if she came to church with him on Easter Sunday!

God works where we work. We just have to ask Him where He wants us to work.

At a time when I think there may have been an EEC quota introduced on Christian fish car stickers, due to overfishing, you may feel a bit isolated in your faith in day to day life. Spring Harvest is a huge encouragement to be with other Christians, have fun, and communally celebrate Christ living in us.

Paul wrote to the Thessalonians, 'We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; Remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labour of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father;' Now that's travelling hopefully!

Big Issue

In all weathers, as I cross London Bridge on my way to work, Sharon is there with a friendly smile and a wave. When I buy a magazine we usually have time for a chat. One day Sharon told me that she was embarking on a journalism course. "Would I be willing to have an article she had written in our magazine?" Of course! So here is the article. I hope that it gives you an insight into the life of a Big Issue Seller and that you get to know and like Sharon as much as I do.

Selling the Big Issue at London Bridge

My name is Sharon and I sell the Big Issue at London Bridge – the south end, near to the station. I recently completed a journalism course and then produced the following article at the request of a church in Crawley, West Sussex. I then offered the writing to another of my regular customers, John Merrett, for his church. Read on, I hope you enjoy it!

I thought I would explain a little about the Big Issue and how it helps people who are homeless or vulnerably housed to get back on their feet. Three years ago, after being made redundant from my job, my landlord informed me that he would not accept rent in the form of Housing Benefit which basically left me homeless. I applied for Job Seekers Allowance and therefore had to actively seek work, but whenever prospective employers became aware that I was homeless, I was told in no uncertain terms that I was unemployable.

My partner and I ended up living in a summer house in someone's garden and I completed four training sessions in order to be able to sell the Big Issue.

As a Big Issue vendor you are an ambassador for the brand and are expected to uphold the reputation of the magazine. You wear a tabard and a vendor badge with your vendor number on it at all times whilst selling and good standards of customer service are expected.

Every Monday the new version of the Big Issue is available for vendors to buy – we pay £1.25 for each copy and sell it for £2.50, thereby earning half the cover price as profit. Selling is hard – it is affected by a lot of factors that I had never considered before. The weather has a big part to play in how successful you are: sunshine always puts people in a good mood, making them more likely to buy, just as rain makes people huddle under their umbrellas and only look at the floor!

Very cold conditions are likely to make people feel sorry for you standing out in the freezing wind. The school holidays are always hard – lots of my customers go away at these times because of the rules governing when you can take your kids out of school and the period between Christmas and New Year is normally very quiet.

Most of my income comes from wonderful “regulars”, people who buy every week and I am also given food and clothes. I have a white board that I place by my pitch and I put sales figures on it and also requests for any items that I need, such as when my rucksack fell apart and I needed a better one. People are always glad to find that there is something they can help me with.

As I mentioned, I recently completed a short journalism course run by the Big Issue for people who have been affected by homelessness and along with lessons on writing an interesting article, we also learned how to take professional-looking photographs on a digital camera. I really enjoyed the course and felt that I took away some useful new skills. The Big Issue now has a new website called Answers From The Big Issue which gives details of some amazing charities and some very interesting social enterprises that all deserve support, and it is hoped that in the future, people who completed the course will be paid to write about these sort of groups for the website.

The tutors on the journalism course advised us all to get a blog to get our names out there and seen on the web – the address of mine is londonbridgesharon.wordpress.com, and it has examples of my work from the course as well as my thoughts, and examples of my photography.

I hope you have enjoyed a look at the life of a Big Issue seller – please feel free to leave comments on my blog!

Sticky Faith

Back in March this year I attended a training event at Swanley URC on this topic of sticky faith. This is to show how we can instil in our children and young people the desire for a faith that sticks with them, throughout their lives, not just whilst they are living in the area and worshipping with us. There was a team of people from various different

UK youth organisations who presented the American research to us and we had an opportunity to delve deeper through participating in workshops on either parenting, schools work or using the findings on a Sunday morning. I went along to the schools work session which also focused on children and young people who may not have come from a Christian home.

The day started with a brilliant analogy. There was an inventor, who had the aim to invent the world's strongest adhesive. This is something so sticky it could stick together any two items and never come unstuck! In short, he failed quite spectacularly as well! He threw his test strip away and gave up.

A few days later a colleague of his was looking for something to act as a bookmark for his hymn book when he came across the test strip in the bin, he used it and to his amazement it stuck brilliantly to the page without leaving a single mark when peeled off.

This was the start of something big; this was the start of 'The post-it note', a church youth workers best friend!

The inventor had failed in his initial brief but had still created something of great worth even if he had not initially seen it! We do not want to give our young people a post-it note faith, however, that just peels away, we want to give them a gaffer tape faith that will withhold even the toughest situations.

So how can we do this? Well it really is not rocket science you will be pleased to hear!

I mentioned in my introduction the DVD resource that has been created by the Synod Youth Executive, they spoke to young people from a variety of churches about what helps them to feel included

in church life and also the things that can hinder this. There was nothing revolutionary in the findings but the final product can serve as an excellent reminder to us of the areas we do well in but also the areas we may struggle in. There are some familiar faces in the DVD as aspects were recorded here on a Friday evening, so what you get is honest but well thought out opinions from young people you may even know.

Their findings are incredibly similar to the findings of the sticky faith team themselves and can be summed up under four sub headings.



It sounds obvious but young people just like the rest of us want to feel included, if they feel they are walking into a private members club where they are not welcome, they are not going to want to return! We are good in this area as a church and many visitors have commented what a welcoming congregation we are, keep up the good work!



Responsibility

Many of the young people expressed a desire to be given responsibility and to feel like they are trusted. One of the boys in the DVD said "I like it when people know me for me and not as the son of my parents". Young people amaze me at times with the things they achieve we just need to keep on finding them jobs and responsibilities they can cope with along with everything else they have going on!



Accessibility

This one is no surprise but of the young people surveyed nearly all said that when they did not understand words or more generally what was going on in the service they switched off and became disengaged. I imagine this is true of many adults as well! Ensuring we keep our services accessible will mean they are not lost and might even help the adults!


Pastoral Concern

BIBLE BY THE BEACH

“An inspiration to the whole family”

With Jonathan living in Eastbourne for a year it was a great opportunity to go to Bible by the Beach as a family for the first time this May. With other commitments we only attended on the Saturday and Sunday, but what a blessing those two days were!

The theme was “True Humanity” and the events were all held in and around the Congress Theatre, a short walk from the seafront. That meant we could enjoy sitting on the beach at lunchtime and have a stroll along the promenade or around the car show that was also happening over the weekend. The sea air was great to blow away the cobwebs after a busy week in London and to help re-energise between sessions!

In addition to the Bible Study sessions I went to seminars on “Being a man of God” by the excellent Ian Coffey from Moorlands College and an insightful talk by David Burrowes MP on life as a Christian politician. For me though, as a scientist with two medically oriented sons, the most interesting talk was a thought provoking presentation on “Medical Ethics” by John Wyatt, a Professor of Ethics and Perinatology at University College London. He chairs the Medical Study Group of the Christian Medical fellowship and

Jonathan attended a lecture he gave on ethics while studying in Leicester. Some of the statistics he shared were astonishing. While there were about 700,000 live births in UK in 2011, the same year there were 196,000 abortions (only 1.2% of which were due to disability) and yet only 70 adoptions of babies! I am looking forward to reading Professor Wyatt’s book on Matters of Life and Death – human dilemmas in the light of the Christian faith. I bought it from the fantastic book stall, one among many great exhibition stands...and managed to get it signed by the author!

On the Saturday evening there was a concert by Lou Fellingham, the singer from the Christian band Phatfish. She was backed up by a band including her husband Nathan, who wrote the beautiful song that was last on their playlist, “There is a day”. Lou had a lovely voice and was equally lovely when we met her for a chat after the concert.

On Sunday morning we worshipped at Jonathan’s church, Kings Centro, in another theatre, the smaller but more atmospheric Royal Hippodrome. The worship was lively and followed by a really stimulating sermon on Luke 24 by Wallace Benn,

the former Bishop of Lewes. He reminded us of the facts of Jesus' resurrection and how the whole Bible, Old and New Testaments, is about Jesus. To make the point he played a short video clip from YouTube of an 11-year old American boy revealing the role of Jesus in every book of the Bible – very impressive! We met up with Sue, Fo and Janet at the Church and enjoyed coffee and cakes with them afterwards. We also bumped into David and Fay in various sessions, so there was a good LURC attendance, but plenty of space for more next year! Our final Sunday session before the late night

drive home was one of praise and worship around good, sound teaching by Andrew Wilson, of Kings Church Eastbourne, on the Scroll and the Lamb in Revelation 5.

Although we were only there for two days, Bible by the Beach was an inspiration to the whole family, a time to be together, learn together and worship together. We would thoroughly recommend it to anyone who is looking for good Bible based teaching next year. Val and Adrian have always sung its praises and I can now see why!

Iraq

The village of Zanan Bchuck in Iraq suffered repeated attacks by the Ba'ath regime's genocidal campaign against the country's Kurds. For years the population lived with the ever-present threat of violence.

The villagers refused to be defeated, however, and Christian Aid's partner in Iraq - Rehabilitation, Education, and Community Health (REACH) has worked with the community to rebuild the village. REACH has reconstructed a reservoir to harvest rainwater, built new greenhouses and helped families to grow vegetables and to raise sheep, cows and poultry.

REACH has also supported the community to lobby their regional government for essential services, and, as a result, the village is now full of confidence and spirit. They now have their own well in the village and a tarmac road nearby so that they can easily take their crops to be sold in the market. It is hoped to connect the village to an electricity supply soon.

How encouraging to hear some good news from a very troubled country.

Who do they Say that I Am?

Curious! Maybe or!!!

Hello! What is your name? Where are you from? Why have you come to Lindfield?

What do you do? Do you work? Do you work in the local hospital? Which Care Home do you work?

You are not old enough to retire! I have heard about you! Which African country do you come from?

These are just some of the many questions I get asked since arriving in Lindfield. In attempting to provide some answers to some of the many questions I will give a brief resume of my journey. I will do this not because I get tired of the questions, but to remove some of barriers we build that can limit the possibilities of God's plan.

I was born in the Caribbean and named Rosieta (I prefer it not to be shortened because my Grand-dad named me) I like it to be correctly spelt because the emails will not get to me (smile) so remember the rule: the i comes before the e, except after c (another smile). I came to the UK almost sixty years ago and worked in a variety of jobs while gaining one undergraduate degree and three post graduate degrees.

The majority of my working career was spent in local authority, especially in education. I worked in all sectors up to Assistant Chief Education Officer level. I assisted in various aspects of community liaison and development, including women's groups and on issues of equality and welfare.

For many years my parents and I began house groups when the welcome in many established churches was not conducive to non-whites and I am happy to say that many congregations became integrated because of our efforts and are still thriving as a result of God's plan and persistence in the faith. This faith journey took on a different emphasis when I decided to listen to a number of ordained ministers who kept asking if I had not heard "the call".

This call led to an instantaneous acceptance from Oxford University as a candidate for ministerial training. However, God had a different plan. I had to give up my Oxford place and go to America to study and work. I did both in Pennsylvania, Israel (country), North Carolina, the Caribbean, New York, New Jersey, South Korea and New Jersey. On the way I was ordained into the Moravian Church and gained three more postgraduate degrees plus a plethora of experience in various aspects of ministry.

ROC Update

The men in the Homeless shelter knew me before I had even arrived to be a Counsellor, the Drug Rehab centre was an education never to be forgotten as was the work with middle school children and their parents. Two of my favourite areas were working with Seniors and with individuals and families in hospitals. No I am not and was never a nurse, but I became very good as a healer of wounds in many other ways.

Now that I have retired, I miss the little children and the older folks. Both groups gave me as much and even more pleasure than I could give. I have come to Lindfield because I believe this is where God wants me to be. Each day I wait to hear what God wants me to do. As I listen and wait I know that "God Knows What God is Doing", so I am patient and can deal with most of the questions, even though I may not give the answers you hoped for. So who do they say I am? I pray that I am and can be recognised as a child of God, who intends to follow the command to 'go out and do' to the ends of the earth.

Christians from the three churches in Lindfield have recently joined together under the capable leadership of Peter Diack ably assisted by his wife Jennifer and a team of volunteers to commence ROC on Saturdays. This is not as the name first suggests but is part of the nationwide initiative called Redeeming our Communities. Whatever the need in a particular locality then ROC endeavours to meet it. Already we have had expressions of gratitude that there is such a gathering on a Saturday afternoon.

There will be a varied programme over the coming months including community singing, table games, talks on living healthily and safety in the home by the police, ambulance and fire services. No one is under obligation to do anything and if people would rather sit and chat and share, then there is the opportunity to do just that.

Most importantly we want to show the love of Jesus to those who come along on a Saturday afternoon.

June Mission

During May and June the church is supporting the work of Operation Mobilisation, an evangelical Christian organisation working all over the globe. After the introduction to the work of OM in last month's Good News, I would like to tell you more about the specific project we are currently supporting – the construction of a church in Bucşani, Romania. OM Romania have recently planted a church in a Roma community, but at the moment they have no building to meet in. Pastor Marian Bălan said in a recent prayer letter:


“Twelve years ago I was in Italy and saw huge cathedrals with many statues, but hardly any people. In contrast, the Christians in the village of Bucşani often pray in the rain. Our church services of adults and children take place in the open air.”

We don't even have benches. In winter we squeezed into a small 9 sq.m. room, which was so small that the children couldn't fit in, which made them very sad. At the moment we meet each week in the yard outside. We would like to buy a piece of land and build a church where both we and our children can enjoy God's presence.”

A group of South Africans from a church in Norwich have already committed to sending a team of skilled workers to construct the building in August. They are in the process of buying a small piece of land (12m x 25m) and are now just seeking funds for the materials.

Please can we urge you to pray for the ongoing work of OM in Romania. The team there have been really encouraged by the news that we can support this project. Remember that more information on the work of OM can be found on the missions stand on the church concourse or online at www.uk.om.org.
