Triathlon Update

n the summer edition of Good News I reported on the Mid-Sussex Triathlon that Jonathan used as training for the European Age Group Championships. Several people asked how he got on so I thought I would give a brief update.

Helen, Jonathan, Alex and I flew to Munich where we hired a car for the two-hour ride southwards to Kitzbühel. As we entered Austria we first became aware of the Tyrol mountains and their outstanding beauty. You could see the inspiration for the Sound of Music and why, in praise to God, people were encouraged by Isaiah to "shout from the mountaintops!" (Isaiah 42: 11).

Most visitors see them snow-covered in the skiing season, but they were fantastic with a rich green coat of grass and multi-coloured splashes of wild flowers. The mountains made the triathlon course quite demanding and it was somewhat unnerving on a reconnaissance drive to see some of the roadside trees on the steep descents wrapped in mattresses in case of collisions! We had great weather for the week, except on race day itself, when it poured down, making the routes even more demanding.

Jonathan acquitted himself well at his first international event, coming 19th out of 48 in his male 25-29 age-group category and 6th out of 16 in the GB team in that group. It was a wonderful experience for the whole family, with the bonus of being there to cheer Alistair Brownlee on to victory as European Champion in the elite men's race the next day!

The Shard

A few weeks ago Mike and I excitedly made our way to The Shard, near London Bridge. We had booked tickets to ascend the 72 storeys to the viewing platform. I was hoping that I wouldn't feel dizzy when we got to the top!

Completed in 2012 The Shard is the dream child of the developer Irvine Sellar. He had an ambitious vision to create an architecturally striking vertical city incorporating retail, offices, hotel, apartments, restaurants and a public viewing gallery. The Shard is 310 m. high; however, the viewing platform is just 240m. above street level and the lifts would take us up to the 72nd floor. And no, I wasn't dizzy, there was just too much to see.

The 360 degrees panoramic views are stunningly beautiful. London spread out before us like a toy town. The mighty river Thames appearing as a gentle silver stream curling and weaving its way to the sea.

Trains like tiny caterpillars crawling in and out of London Bridge Station. Tower Bridge looking as if it had been built of Lego piece, and The Millennium Bridge appearing very fragile indeed. There was so much to see that we spent 40 minutes marvelling at the scenes before us, and the people? They indeed were like little insignificant dots.

As I looked at these 'little dots' the verses from Psalm 8 came to mind, 'What is man that you, O God, are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him? You made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honour.' These seemingly little dots, full of the joys and cares of this life, are known to God, they are human beings loved and cherished by Him. I found myself longing for each human being to know that Jesus Christ died on the Cross and rose again for every individual, so that they could personally come to know this great God, the creator of this wonderful universe.

Last Supper

On a two-day working visit to Italy in early July, I was fortunate to be given a guided tour of some of the lovely, historical churches of Milan, including the monastery of Santa Maria delle Grazie.

It was a great surprise and delight to me to see Leonardo da Vinci's enormous (29 x 15 feet) mural of the Last Supper covering one wall of the monastery's refectory - I had always assumed it was painted on canvas!

It was painted between 1495 and 1498 and, although flaking since 1517, much faded, damaged on many occasions (with the loss of Jesus' feet when a doorway was made under the painting in 1652!) and since subjected to multiple restoration attempts, the skill of the artist is still plain to see. The refectory is now maintained under carefully controlled climatic conditions and accessed through air locks. Once inside the room there are benches before the mural from which you can gaze and imagine the consternation of the scene, as Jesus says to his disciples, "I tell you the truth, one of you will betray me" (Matthew 26: 21).

Jesus is the focus of the painting and it felt to me as if the monks could imagine they were dining in their refectory with Him each day and also be challenged daily to reflect on their own relationship with Jesus.

Psalms for Today

A t a recent group meeting, members were asked to speak of their favourite Psalm and its significance to their lives.

Imagine the chosen variety of songs and poems from the Book of Psalms. Some brought back memories when God spoke to them during times of uncertainty bringing consolation to a troubled heart.

Psalms are often used to celebrate times of joy with its hymns, praises and thanksgiving. They also give comfort in times of great sadness with words flowing like the balm of Gilead.

It was acknowledged that God is indeed an ever present help in times of trouble hence the shepherd psalm was figured very prominently. Psalm 24 takes one from the not knowing stage, to the assurance that God is always with us.

✓ One thing have I asked of the Lord; one thing I seek; that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life; to behold the fair beauty of the LORD and to seek him in his temple.

This psalm celebrates the divine quality of God which we find desirable, beautiful and irresistible.

Augustine said that "a God s-shaped hole within us that remains a painful emptiness until it is filled, and it can only be filled with the one for whom it was made, and who made it.

God made us for Himself, and we long for God like aliens longing for a homeland – we are fascinated by God"

Having made a request to dwell in the Lord's house and to behold His beauty, the psalm pleads for, and then confidently celebrates, closeness, a tender familiarity that is beyond God's mystery and power. Dwelling in the house of the Lord means that one can know God intimately and share secrets.

We, like the psalmist cannot imagine the lengths that God would go to answer our request for a relationship.

God set aside His power and mystery to come and His home among us, so that He may be known everywhere. His dwelling place is with us, wherever we are and whatever we do.

is for young people in school years 7-11

In this way we cover the whole age spectrum from 3 – 16 years. Glowworms, Stars and Lasers use Scripture Union material so that each group is considering the same story or theme but the material is targeted at different age ranges and the LEDs follow their own syllabus which is determined by the leaders.

Each group obviously seeks to engage with the children with activities appropriate for their age so that these vary slightly from group to group but it would be fair to say that they include lots of exciting crafts, games, stories, songs and discussion. If you like the sound of this but are over 16 while I regret we cannot cater within the groups for older 'kids' there is always a welcome for new helpers, either regularly or over the summer when the regular helpers and teachers are having a break!

Once a month we have Jigsaw, this is a totally different session when the three older groups all meet together. Then we have lights and music, worship, puppets and a lot of fun!

In the last year we have also been able to launch our prayer buddy scheme where each child in Lighthouse has a specific 'prayer buddy' who prays for them as an individual and I hope and trust that this has been a real blessing to both the 'prayer buddies' and the young people that they have been praying for.

We would always love to welcome new children and young people but are also very aware that God has blessed us already with a fantastic group of young people and we seek to honour God and them week by week as we spend time together. If you know of any children that may be interested then please mention Lighthouse to them and encourage them to come along. Please keep the teachers and children in your prayers, that our activities and vision going forward for 2014/15 would be Gods' planning and not just ours and that we would all grow closer to Him.

September/October Mission

uring September and October we will be supporting Crawley Prison Fellowship in their work at Lewes and Ford Prisons.



HMP Lewes





Prison Fellowship's mission is to show Christ's love to prisoners by coming alongside and supporting them. One Gospel Message driving the work is Matthew 25 verse 35: "I was in prison and you came to visit me."

Crawley Prison Fellowship, one of 120 Prison Fellowship prayer groups in England and Wales, comprises volunteers from churches in Central Sussex.

The Group meets monthly to pray for prisoners, their families, and prison staff and review and plan the work of the volunteers. HMP Ford

Support to the Chaplaincy at HMP Lewes includes taking Chapel services and going into many of the prison wings to offer Bible study and to pray with prisoners. Services are also taken at HMP Ford.

At Christmas, presents are provided to prisoners' children (Angel Tree). This now covers both Ford and Lewes prisons. Over 200 presents were delivered last year. Each gift is sent as though from the father in prison and a message to his child is included.

The Group provides a tutor and mentors to run four six-week Sycamore Tree Victim Awareness courses each year at HMP Lewes. These are based on the Bible story of Zacchaeus who, after meeting Jesus, changed his whole way of life. Sycamore Tree is increasingly seen as the first step in the rehabilitation process. Once an offender has appreciated and accepted the effect of his/her crimes on victims and the community, then preparing for a release which will not involve reoffending, is much more possible.

The success of this course is such that the prison management at Lewes have now asked whether it will be possible for the Group to run more courses.

What is the Impact of the work? Some comments:

"The Christian volunteers who give up time to come into prison carry a lot of respect and mean a lot to the guys ... when I left prison all I wanted to do was go back in (legally) as a volunteer."

A Prison Fellowship Group leader

"The baptism was wonderful, Prison Fellowship volunteers were there and gave me encouragement that I could be a strong pillar for other offenders to lean on and that I could share how my transformation had come about." "A daughter, who had received an Angel Tree gift from her father in prison, visited him shortly after Christmas. She asked: 'how did you know what I wanted?' Afterwards the Dad told the prison chaplain that it was wonderful he had been able to connect with his daughter in this way."

"The Sycamore Tree Course an amazing and powerful experience. The volunteers guided me to really look at my past, see how my actions had affected all those around me, but most importantly it let me make some amends and find forgiveness. This experience gave me strength to put the past behind me and move on. The lessons I learned here I carry with me and draw on regularly."
