Growing Old Faithfully

Three Sundays a month I roam Central Sussex and beyond leading worship in a great variety of local URC and Methodist churches. One thing has struck me quite forcibly as I view the faithful from the minister's elevated vantage point – and that is the average age of the worshippers. Many congregations have few if any children or young people. Those of working age, particularly men, are sparse – the vast majority are, like me, pensioners. There are, mercifully, quite a few exceptions and I like to think Lindfield URC is one – but this is the impression I have of mainline Christianity in England today.



Now this is by no means the rule – there are many churches, mostly of an evangelical or charismatic bent or conversely very “high church” in their liturgy which abound in younger generations. Also my experience with the World Council of Churches took me to many places, particularly in Asia and southern Africa, where churches are bursting at the seams and recent growth in China and the resurgence of Orthodox faith in Russia are amazing.

So what has happened to us?

Younger generations go where Christianity seems more activist and they get what appeals to them. For those at the evangelical end of the spectrum they espouse a gospel of strong, personal commitment to a Christ who sacrificed himself on the Cross for our salvation. Those of a more liberal, radical stance busy themselves in justice and peace issues, seeking to bring in the Kingdom that way. Both, of course, are fully valid responses to Christ's call to follow him and be his body at work in the world – they are complementary (and I sometimes wish they could see that and work together instead of constantly denigrating each other!).

But when the years roll by and one is a little less energetic, where lies our faith and calling? Sometimes I sit in church meetings of one sort or another and wish I were twenty years younger and could

have a crack at changing a few things – but that is wishful thinking. In his own good time God will sort these things out. The history of the church has always been of highs & lows – of retreat and then revival – it’s just that I shall not be around to see the renaissance of the traditional denominations in the UK.

I think there are three things which sustain me in my faith meantime.

First, there is an overwhelming sense of thanksgiving to God. I was always taught that private prayers and public worship should start with praise – but as I look back on a long life and ministry, I realise just how great have been his love and his gifts to me and how privileged I have been to be part of Jesus’ family and to be called to ministry in his church. I really do praise God for all he has so generously provided.

So secondly, it has made me deeply aware of my inadequacies and failures to live up to my Christian faith and to be worthy of God’s love and care. I guess I have not committed any major criminal felonies nor cardinal sins, but looking back I sense just how much I have been selfish, chosen wrong priorities and failed to live up to my professed discipleship. So confession becomes more than just a nominal part of my prayer-time – I am deeply sorry that I have not been a more faithful follower of him who lived and died so entirely selflessly for others.



But thirdly, those two factors have led me to a new and intense understanding of God’s grace – of his utter love, so freely poured out on me and all his people - his creation. In the busyness of one’s earlier working life one accepts these theological concepts intellectually, I am sure, but it is not till one has lived one’s life and looked back that one really takes on board the magnitude – the magnificence of what God has done for us in coming incarnate in Jesus.

Hopefully in this knowledge I will grow old faithfully!




The Bible Society is working to circulate the Scriptures across the world, in the church and through the culture just like air conditioning circulates air through a building.

The strategy of Bible Society (how we achieve our mission) centres on Bible availability, accessibility and credibility. It's what we call the 'lifecycle' of the Bible. These strategic approaches encompass all of our activity: translation, production, distribution, literacy, engagement and advocacy.

We believe this work can be transformative.

The lifecycle of the Bible



Translation: making the Bible available in new spoken and signed languages, and revising existing Bibles to bring the language up-to-date, so that everyone can experience the Scriptures in their 'heart language'

Production: printing physical copies of the Bible and producing visual, audio and digital forms of the Scriptures in order to meet the demands of the millions around the world who want a Bible of their own

Distribution: taking the Bible to places it might otherwise be hard to come by, in formats that people can use

Literacy: helping people to read and to read well, using the Bible as a resource
Engagement: helping people grapple with the Bible, read and respond to it wisely

Advocacy: giving the wider culture a reason and opportunity to encounter the joys of the Bible.

Help provide Bibles for Chinese Christians
Millions of people in China are coming to faith, but many cannot afford their own Bible. Will you help provide Bibles for Christians in China?

In the last 12 months, a million* people have come to faith in China. Incredible! That's equivalent to three people making a commitment to Christ before you finish reading this.

These new Christians are mostly from rural areas and many are desperately poor. In some places up to ten Christians have to share a single copy of the Bible between them.

Christ's Light

It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness.

It was the message on a poster displayed in the church hall for many years, and the theme for the morning services on the first Sunday of Advent.

We can't, individually, solve all the problems of loneliness and despair. We can't feed all the hungry people. We can't end all the wars.

But we can have an encouraging word for those who cross our path. We can buy a copy of the Big Issue from the seller in Haywards Heath. We can give a tin of beans to the food bank. And in all our relationships, we can try to be conciliators rather than conflict-mongers.

The first Advent candle was lit, pointing to the coming of Jesus, who shows the way from darkness into light.

We read from Isaiah's prophecy, looking to a time when we will walk in the light of the Lord (Isaiah 2.5). And from John's gospel, of the light that shines in the darkness, the coming of the true light that gives light to every man. (John 1.5&9). We noted that John uses the present tense "shines" not "shone" reminding us that action is still required today.

Light is one of John's favourite words; it appears at least 20 times in John's gospel.

Throughout, there is a contrast between light and darkness. Jesus is portrayed as light and his enemies as darkness.

As his gospel progresses, John develops this struggle. And, lest anyone misunderstand, if we read on, we find Jesus expressing it very clearly: "I am the light of the World. Whoever follows me, will never walk in darkness" (John 8.12).

Some don't want their lives to be exposed to God's light; perhaps because of apathy, perhaps because of what will be revealed, or because it will mean changing their ways.

The challenge given to us, during Advent, was:

- To profess afresh, our desire to walk in the light of the Lord
- To be witnesses who testify to the light
- To allow the light to shine into our lives.
- And to reflect that light in our interaction with others.

Martin Luther King was a great Christian warrior for peace, a campaigner for equality and civil rights. He famously observed that you cannot fight darkness with darkness. You get only double darkness. Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that, he said.

We may not be able to do all we might like, but instead of cursing the darkness, we can light a single candle.

Sunday Services

The **9.30am** service is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. Most weeks, children leave after 20 minutes for their own activities (including crèche). Lighthouse (Junior church) is for children and young people up to age 14. Holy Communion (1st Sunday)

Coffee is served between the morning services.

The **11:15am** service is a more traditional service than at 9:30. Holy Communion (4th Sunday) Where there is a fifth Sunday in the month, normally a joint service is held at 10:30am

At **6:30pm** it is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Personal prayer is available after every service. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We do not take up an offering during the services, those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service.

We will, however, be running a special weekend away for all those involved on the weekend of the 31st January – 2nd February so it will be great to get everyone back together and reminisce on what has truly been a unforgettable journey and experience.



Valentine's Day

I was asked to look into Valentine's Day for this latest edition of the Magazine. In our house, Dan and I always give each other cards, and we often try and go out for a nice meal in the evening. We do this, because that is what "you do" on Valentine's day. But I thought there must be a more Christian perspective to the celebration. In my research I came across this blog online, by Bible or not.

'In February it is Valentine's Day, the day when couples celebrate their love for each other, the day when children exchange "Valentines" with each other in school and everyone talks about love. Expressing your love for another is wonderful, yet in the world we live in it seems that the expression of love can be a bit backwards. How often is love described by what a person does for us, how they make us feel, how they make our lives better?



Biblical love is not about getting, it's about giving, and it's about giving without the need of getting in return.

The Bible tells us that:

“Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails.”

1 Corinthians 13:4-7+ NIV

Love here is described by what love does when you give it away to another. If you truly want to express your love to someone, then don't just give them a card, or candy, or roses, or a ring, or some other romantic gift. Yes, make the day special, but more importantly, make your relationship special throughout your lives together. Express your love by being patient with each other, treating each other with genuine respect and honour. If you have two people, and each one is dedicated to the happiness of the other, then there is no need to look after what you should be getting. Focus on giving, focus on truly loving from a Biblical perspective, and the love and fulfilment you will get will far exceed anything you could hope for.

The Bible tells us that if you give without looking to receive, that you will receive in abundance:

“Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.”

Luke 6:38 NIV

So, as you celebrate Valentine's Day with the ones you love, try to keep the Biblical perspective on love, and don't stop when Valentine's Day is over. Keeping the Faith

The Bible is full of dramatic stories that we can relate to. Luke describes the time when the disciples were being tossed around in a boat on the Sea of Galilee during a sudden violent storm. They began to panic as the boat was being swamped with water and woke Jesus saying, "...we're going to drown!". Anyone who has ever been on a small boat far from land in rough seas can imagine their fear. However, Jesus, after rebuking and stilling the storm by command, turned to his disciples and asked them, "Where is your faith?" (Luke 8: 25). If he was to ask us the same question today, how would we reply? The question of our faith is something that "Good News" is addressing in a number of ways this issue.

Dan McQuillin writes about our Elders vision for spiritual growth for the membership of LURC this New Year, with a strengthening of our faith. Michael Davies writes about, "Growing old faithfully"; a wonderful target to aim for. The difficulties of staying and growing in faith are increasingly recognised through initiatives such as "Don't let your faith unravel", developed by "threads"; a collective of Christians in their 20's and 30's from all walks of life (threadsuk.com). Threads recognise that faith is tough, especially in your 20's, and that many don't stay the course but leave church when life gets difficult. Threads have an army of twitter followers and the following are examples of their top tips on how to "keep the faith":

- "Know that faith isn't fixed. It shifts and changes in time as we discover new things about God and ourselves."
- "Hang out with older, wiser people who have journeyed life well. Ask them how they journey with God through the hard times."
- "Through the ups and downs just remember, '...for this I have Jesus'"

Threads say about themselves: "We are scratching our heads about faith and life and what they have to say about each other. We are curious. We are wrestling with questions where there used to be answers, and are passionate about working it out together. We know our lives can be broken and dislocated and we also know Jesus is the ultimate fixer. We are humble, because we are not worthy. So we're not judges, and we don't do platitudes. Life can be full of knots, but we're living it to the full. We're inspired, and we're hopeful. We are threads". Their website is full of electronic threads of conversation – you will not agree with everything that is written, but it will certainly make you think.

The latest research report of the Evangelical Alliance, published in Autumn 2013, is entitled "Working faithfully?". It is a snapshot of the beliefs and habits of evangelical Christians at work in the UK, following a May 2013 survey answered by 1,511 evangelicals. It is a challenge to us in many ways, for example how we should support those in our congregation who are currently unemployed. Some quotes relating to this were eye-opening, ranging

from "Throughout my unemployment, I had brilliant prayer support from my church, and knew that God was in charge", to, "It was absolutely horrendous when I lost my job. Not helped by church teaching, 'God will bring a job along in His perfect timing'". What about faith in the workplace? Some 85% of those surveyed said that most work colleagues know they are a Christian. More than half say they often have opportunities to speak about their faith to non-Christians while at work. The comments also indicate that evangelicals' attitudes and behaviour at work and their sense of vocation are strongly influenced by their faith. You can download the full report from www.eauk.org.

When we go through periods of struggling with our faith, we can always return to Jesus' question, "Where is your faith?", and take comfort in the fact that he used the word 'faith' rather than, say, 'knowledge'. In his book, "Faith & Doubt" (2008) John Ortberg said that, "Faith is required only when we have doubts, when we do not know for sure. When knowledge comes faith is no more. Doubt

can motivate us to study and learn. It can purify false beliefs that have crept into our faith". John Young wrote in "The case against Christ" (1986), "A robust faith does not worry too much about dotting i's and crossing t's. Men and women with this kind of faith can live with uncertainties, because their faith is built on solid foundations". Evidence of those solid foundations was provided by John Young and, more recently, added to by Nicky Gumbel, who explored the question, "is faith irrational?", providing evidence of God the Creator, Liberator and Transformer ("Is God a delusion? What is the evidence?", 2008).

I pray that my and your faith has increasingly solid foundations and will grow day by day through the coming year. I am already looking forward to the first house group meeting of 2014 when we will tackle the subject "Faith under fire"! Perhaps it is best to end with the words of Jesus himself: "Have faith in God" (Mark 11: 22) and, "I tell you the truth, anyone who has faith in me will do what I have been doing." (Luke 14: 12).

The most important thing that I offer is the love of Jesus. Without his love and support from my own, and your, prayer I can do nothing.



Getting your kids through Church without them ending up Hating God



This rather striking sentence is the title of a book by Rob Parsons. As the Chair of 'Care for the Family', he has also devised a 'roadshow' with the same name.

I recently attended the Roadshow (I haven't read the book) and thought that possibly others at Lindfield URC might like to know what happened that night!

The evening was held at Victoria Baptist Church in Eastbourne, and included two short talks by Rob Parsons, interspersed with several sketches by 'Saltmine' Drama Group and a couple of worship songs. It was an inspiring evening, which included both humorous and thought provoking moments.

Here are the most memorable points:-

- 1 We must make our children/young people feel accepted, valued and included. In practice, this means that even if we are not comfortable with their outward appearance / behaviour (eg 'inappropriate' clothing, tattoos, smoking etc.) we should never make them feel unwanted.
- 2 Children/ young people should participate in our services as much as possible. This will help them feel that they belong.

- 3 We should tell our children how proud and happy we are to have them in church with us- before it's too late and they decide to spend their time elsewhere!
- 4 Our children /young people will be watching our own behaviour closely. We must be especially wary of our own hypocrisy. For instance, one of the Saltmine sketches involved a church leader who had no time for his teenage son, as he was constantly going out to church meetings. The best one yet was a 'meeting about reducing the number of meetings'!

Finally, Rob struck exactly the right note at end of the evening.

"Pray for them. For we all know that even if we achieve it, the title of this initiative is not enough, not nearly enough. We have a much greater goal for our children: We want them to love Him."
