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Dear friends

I was listening to Radio 4 the other day, where the journalist Orla Guerin reported that she had been speaking with the father of a Syrian family in Jordan. The world food programme had told the refugee that he would no longer be receiving aid. The family had had little to eat for the last week and were now considering either to cross the Mediterranean Sea into Europe, or to return to their homeland.

Compared to where they were “It’s better to go back to Syria to die there,” he had said. To move to a war zone they had fled, to stay somewhere without food, or to risk drowning in the sea, these were the options. I cannot possibly imagine having such a difficult dilemma to face, not only for one’s self, but for a family.

So many of us in this land have much to be grateful for; clean water, food, accommodation, healthcare, education, stability of government, a justice system not mired by corruption, and no armed conflict. It is right therefore that we be thankful and praise God.

We may at times have very serious ill health concerns, we may be struggling financially, we may have been a victim of crime, but we may still consider ourselves fortunate not to have to make a decision that may result in the death of our family.

Please pray for the families of those who are fleeing for their lives, and pray too for us, that we may know how to respond correctly.

In the services I led during August we heard of how God instituted various festivals, these each mark the passing of the year and caused the Israelites to remember to turn their mind to where their blessings came from, the one true God who created the heavens and the earth, and who causes the sun to shine and the rain to fall, as a blessing on all people, righteous and unrighteous.

The celebration of Harvest gives us a special time of thankfulness which relates to the time of gathering in of the crops of the field. Although it does not connect directly to those festivals ordained in Leviticus 23, and only came to our British churches in the mid nineteenth century, it bears a likeness to the festival of first fruits where a tenth of the early harvest was taken to the temple and given as an offering to the Lord.

Those gifts were used to feed the priest and his family, just as our harvest gifts are used to feed those in need, and will go to the Brighton and Hove City Mission.



There is of course another dimension to “Harvest” in the New Testament. Jesus told a parable (Matthew 13: 24-30, 36-43) where a crop of wheat is harvested separately from weeds that were sown by the devil; the crop is welcomed to a barn, the rest being burned.

The crop collected by the angels on the day of Judgement reflects the people of the kingdom being gathered for entry into heaven. That gathering in can only be done because of Jesus, and that he himself has already taken the punishment we deserve, when through the cross the price of sin was paid.

In our time of harvest we should remember to give thanks too for this harvest that is yet to come; in the meantime, may we grow in maturity that we may be a crop worthy for the Lord.

Bible Verse

Paul wrote to the Galatians: 'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free.' (Gal 5:1). To a church which consisted largely of slaves, he adds 'serve one another in love'. How does Paul encourage us to use our freedom to serve others?

Free to serve unselfishly all of us would prefer to be served by others, but Paul's challenge is 'do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh'. If you want to understand the word flesh, take off the h and read backwards ie self! If we are serving one another, it's not about my needs, but looking to the concerns of others. How available are we to serve others? Do we offer the excuse of being too busy or resent the time? When stepping out of our comfort zone, be prepared to risk rejection and misunderstanding!!

Free to serve lovingly: Luis Suárez was sent home from the 2014 World Cup for biting other players! Paul warns of the danger of Christians falling into the same trap: 'If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other'. We are called to love others, rather than using or exploiting them for our own purposes.

Are we prepared to think about people's needs and put ourselves in their shoes? Paul tells us to 'live and be led by the Spirit', for it's the Holy Spirit who will enable us to see others with the eyes of Jesus. 'A Christian is the most free lord of all, and subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone' (Martin Luther).

Church Meeting

The 'ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING' this year will take place on **SUNDAY 29th NOVEMBER**, when we will have just one morning service at 10.30am. For those of you who don't know, the Annual meeting is when the Elders are elected and the Church Officers (Secretary and Treasurer) are appointed. As well as reflecting on the past year, it will also be an opportunity to be part of the thinking and planning for the year ahead.

Food Bank

Haywards Heath Foodbank, part of the national Christian Charity Trussell Trust opened in April 2012. The first Trussell Trust Foodbank opened in Salisbury in 2000, but it is over the last four years that the number of foodbanks has rapidly grown to 430 across Great Britain. In Haywards Heath to date over 4,000 people have received food and almost half of them have been children.



In a typical week about ten vouchers are brought to the distribution centre at 9 Sussex Road and about 25 people are given food.

People from all walks of life:

- *A young woman's partner left her and she became a single parent with no support from wider family. She sought help from Foodbank. She was in the middle of her PhD, which she managed to complete. She returned during the summer holiday to ask how she could give back to Foodbank.*
- *A man who had been made redundant was looking for work for over a year and during that time came to Foodbank a number of times, each time staying a long time to talk. He finally got a job and called in to tell the volunteers that they had helped him at a time when he felt suicidal.*

Reasons people come to Foodbank are varied: benefit delays and changes, and low income are amongst the main causes. A growing number of people coming are in paid employment but on a basic wage they cannot make ends meet.

The food donated is non-perishable and the amount varies depending on whether it is for a single person or a family.

Nutritionists have selected the food to provide a healthy balance. The quantity is sufficient to last for a good three days. People can receive three lots of food for a single crisis. Food is donated from members of the public at local supermarkets, (the Co-op on South Road and Sainsbury's) from Churches, local businesses and at Harvest time from local schools.

Frontline care professionals, statutory agencies and charities are among the 45 referral agencies who issue Foodbank vouchers to people they meet during the course of their work who are struggling to put food on the table. Volunteers sort the food and make sure it is not past its best before date. It is then taken to the distribution centre to be packed as families in crisis arrive. The people exchange the vouchers for food.

The volunteers at the distribution centre offer a quiet haven, in a café setting, and take time to listen and signpost the people to further support.

Halloween

When I was a child my brother and I used to dress up in my dad's coats and grandad's flat caps on Halloween. We would go to friends' houses and neighbours who liked us. We would shout in loud voices when the door was opened, 'Anything for Halloween!' I had my mum's shopping bag to fill up with the goodies. We would have to sing a song or tell a joke. Sometimes we had to go into the house and perform in front of the whole family - Joy of Joys! At the end of the night we had a bag with about twenty five apples and endless hazelnuts that you needed a pair of pliers to open. If we met anyone really nice, or thought that the singing was particularly good, we rarely received a bar of chocolate. Sometimes if you met someone who was really really nice and deaf we received money. When you met the other kids in the street you told them the best places go and places to avoid.

So what has happen to Halloween, or All Saints Eve described as the 'time in the liturgical year dedicated to remembering the dead, including saints (hallows), martyrs, and all the faithful departed believers.' As I stood in Tesco's in recent years I was faced with Halloween on my left and Christmas on my right. I wondered why parents are happy to dress infants as dead people or paint their faces with blood pouring from their mouths. On Halloween as I drive around I am genuinely horrified at the imagery I see painted on innocent little faces.



As we anaesthetise death by wearing bright colours at funerals and have life celebrations, I often wonder how happy people would be if everyone turned up dressed in damnation at the crematorium for grannie's funeral. Why do we celebrate death?

As a Christian, I have periods in my life when I am acutely aware of Satan's closeness and presence beside me. He comes to kill and destroy. He is an awesome adversary. In the name of Jesus Christ I am not in fear, I am not alone. I stand strong in the peace and love of a God who gave His son for me. I am not defeated. I live with the eternal hope and knowledge that in death and life Jesus cares, and I will never be abandoned, whatever place I find myself in this life or the life to come.

Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

This Halloween don't celebrate darkness, celebrate Jesus the light of the world. One last word, please wear bright colours at my funeral and celebrate eternal life in Jesus Christ.



The triangle of grass is on the western boundary of the village at the end of Sunte Avenue at the junction with Portsmouth Lane. Whilst it is sometimes called Crossways now, it is properly called Smallsgreen Cross.

This old photo shows the same place when there was a postbox on the green. Would be a dangerous place to post a letter now that traffic has increased!

Sunday Services

The **9.30am** service is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. Most weeks, children leave after 20 minutes for their own activities (including crèche). Lighthouse (Junior church) is for children and young people up to age 14. Holy Communion (4th Sunday)

Coffee is served between the morning services.

The **11:15am** service is a more traditional service than at 9:30. Holy Communion (4th Sunday)

At **6:30pm** Held in the lounge this is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Holy Communion (2nd Sunday)

Personal prayer is available after every service. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We do not take up an offering during the services, those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service.

Recordings of services can be borrowed free from the church.

At the beginning of September Pulse Plus attended the evening service as part of their evening group. Eight of the youth came to the service and my hope is that they continue to come along each week.




Coming up this year – there will be an all age games evening on October 31st. This will be an evening where everyone young and old can come together and play all kinds of different games around the church.

Elders Elections

It has come round to that time again when, as a community of God's people, we consider who the Lord may be enabling to take on the specific responsibility of serving Him, and His church, as an Elder here in Lindfield.

There are a number of passages about leadership in the Bible. In his first letter Peter wrote specifically to and about Elders 1 Peter 5 (J.B. Phillips New Testament (PHILLIPS)).

“*Now may I who am myself an elder say a word to you my fellow-elders? I speak as one who actually saw Christ suffer, and as one who will share with you the glories that are to be unfolded to us. I urge you then to see that your “flock of God” is properly fed and cared for. Accept the responsibility of looking after them willingly and not because you feel you can't get out of it, doing your work not for what you can make, but because you are really concerned for their well-being. You should aim not at being “little tin gods” but as examples of Christian living in the eyes of the flock committed to your charge. And then, when the chief shepherd reveals himself, you will receive that crown of glory which cannot fade.*

You younger members must also submit to the elders. Indeed all of you should defer to one another and wear the “overall” of humility in serving each other. ‘God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble.’

So, humble yourselves under God's strong hand, and in his own good time he will lift you up. You can throw the whole weight of your anxieties upon him, for you are his personal concern.”

Peter mentions six characteristics about leadership:

- It is corporate and not individual
- It is for others and not for self glory
- It is by example and not imposition
- It is done to please God and not to receive human praise
- It is carried out in humility not in pride
- It is done in God's strength and not self reliance

So when it comes to electing new Elders what should we do?

- 1 We can all pray; pray specifically for the process of choosing Elders and for the current Eldership as they continue to serve.
- 2 Consider people for the role of Elder; but before speaking with them, spend some time praying for that person, what they do outside of and inside church, their family etc.

September/ October Mission

Also perhaps chat with one or two others. If you then feel that it is the right thing to do, speak with them and explain that you would like to nominate them for the role of Eldership.

Each nomination has to be seconded. (Nomination forms are available from Sue Waller - Church Secretary. Nominations have to with Sue by the church meeting on November 12th)

- 3** If you have been asked to consider being an Elder; before making your decisions, please do pray, and come and chat with an Elder or two, who will be happy to discuss the role and responsibilities, and to pray with you as you work through what God may be asking you to do. He may be asking you to be an Elder or this maybe a prompting to consider other forms of service within the church locally or beyond.

The Annual meeting of the church when Elders are to be elected is going to be held on Sunday 29th November after a 10:30 service.

At this meeting there will also be a review of the past year but most importantly we will be a looking forward to plans for the coming year.

Mission Giving in September and October this year is to support our local Prison Fellowship (PF) Group – Crawley Prison Fellowship which shows God's Love by working amongst the prisoners at HMP Lewes.

At our morning services on the 6th September, John Gloster, a Prison Fellowship Trustee told us about the work and gave examples of:


- The way in which the Sycamore Tree victim awareness course, run at Lewes and many other prisons, generates hope, for the future, in prisoners for whom it has been entirely lacking
- How relationships built up during the course can be developed further by regular mission work with prisoners on the prison wings, and
- How Angel Tree Christmas presents, provided by PF, not only bring joy to the prisoners' children but also change the lives of both the prisoners and their partners and their relationships with each other.

He pointed out that the PF mission field, in England and Wales, is a prison population that would fill Wembley Stadium.

Book Review

Captive in Iran

How would our Christian faith cope if we were seized from our peaceful Sussex homes one evening and locked away to suffer brutal interrogation for months on end in a squalid, disease ridden prison, just for sharing our faith? “Captive in Iran” is the inspiring story of two young women, Maryam Rostampour and Marziyeh Amirizadeh, who were subjected to a lengthy incarceration in Tehran’s notorious Evin Prison in 2009, for promoting Christianity. Inside the prison they could have lost their faith but, instead, it grew and they became a wonderful reflection of the Jesus they love, the Jesus who didn’t just carry them through their ordeal somehow, but carried them through triumphantly!



The young women had met at a Christian theology training centre in Turkey in 2005 and realised that they had both become Christians some six years before. Born into Muslim families, they had grown up with a longing to know God in a personal way that had not been satisfied by the teachings of Islam. The story they relate of their finding Jesus and their conversions is a miracle itself when you consider the circumstances of their environment in Iran. Following their training in Turkey they returned to Iran and set up two home churches from their apartment, one for young people another for prostitutes. They also handed out some 20,000 New Testaments in Tehran and other cities.

The story of their arrest started with completing a seemingly innocent form for car registration, on which Marziyeh had ticked “Christian” as her religion. The clerk demanded, “How is this possible? You have an Islamic name. Your parents are Muslims. How can you be a Christian?” Marziyeh’s reply was, “With the Lord, anything is possible”. A few days later their apartment was raided by the Revolutionary Guard and they were taken away for questioning, eventually ending up in Evin Prison without any access to family, legal aid, official explanations or the other aspects of a fair legal system which we take for granted.

Much later they learned that the official charges were apostasy (conversion from Islam), anti-government activity and blasphemy – all crimes for which the penalty was execution by hanging.

When questioned during one interrogation session as to why she didn't just compromise her faith and tell the Iranian authorities what they wanted to hear so that she would be released, Marziyeh replied, "It's pure love.....I love God so much that denying Him would be denying my own existence. How could I ever deny something that is in every cell of my body? I would rather spend the rest of my life in prison if that's what it takes to stay close to Him. They have imprisoned only our bodies; they can't imprison our souls. My faith and beliefs are still mine. As long as I have God I am free."

The women described how before imprisonment they had been evangelising in the way they thought God wanted, but it was a slow process due to the need to avoid the scrutiny of the Iranian regime. However, once in prison they could talk openly about their faith. Whereas before they searched for people to speak to, now the broken, desperate and lonely came looking for them having been told to, "Go see the Christian girls!"

The very prison system that had tried to silence them became a megaphone: their arrest, story and message of faith were news around the world – their interrogators were helping them share the Gospel! Evin Prison, the dreaded hell-hole of Tehran and a symbol of radical Islamic repression had become their church! In addition to the impact their faith was having on those in Evin Prison, their evangelical message spread well beyond the prison walls. When people learned that they were willing to die rather than deny their faith, they wanted to know what it was that was worth that sort of sacrifice, so news of their arrest and defiance led many to Christ.

Despite the hardships of their imprisonment, they had moments that helped strengthen their resolve. Clearing out a box of junk under a bed, Marziyeh found a pocket-sized Gospel of Luke signed on the inside cover by none other than Archbishop Ramsey, who had evidently gifted it to someone before his death some 20 years before. How it came to be in Evin Prison is unknown, but it was passed around and read by dozens of inmates, for many their first sight of a true Biblical scripture.

Having endured a horrendous 259 days in Evin prison, Maryam and Marziyeh were eventually released on bail on



November 18th 2009. Many around the world had prayed for their freedom and the Iranian Government had come under significant pressure from organisations such as Amnesty International, the United Nations and even the Vatican. They still had to return to court for a final hearing concerning their apostasy charge on 13th April 2010, but they were acquitted, the indescribable burden of the last year was lifted and they were truly free!

Despite their “freedom”, they would never be able to live a normal life if they had stayed in Iran. They were under constant surveillance and those who

contacted them were endangered. In truth, all Iranians were “Captive in Iran”, even outside of prison. Therefore they made the decision to leave Iran and on 22nd May 2010 they flew to Turkey and, eventually, USA where they now live and where, in 2013, they published their story.

The story of Maryam and Marziyeh is profoundly inspirational - the impact the gentle sharing of their faith had on fellow prisoners and even prison staff was life changing. I pray that none of us ever has to endure such hardships, but we can be assured that God will be with us whenever we need Him, as He was with “the Christian girls”.

In front of us was a vehicle we had never seen in our lives before. From the back view we didn't know if it was horse drawn or had an engine! Sure enough our engine was smoking and so Ray went back to tell our new friend that he could not take him any further as it was causing a problem with our engine.

The steam car was about three quarters of the way up the hill and after a few minutes it burst into life and clattered off up the hill overtaking me as I walked the last bit. Ray prayed over our engine and we slowly made our way to our destination. Later in the day he rang our mechanic for advice and so far all seems to be working well.

We felt God brought us along at that precise moment to help out as several vans and a bus passed us as we were towing this ancient vehicle up the hill. Something could easily have swept round the bend and gone into the back of us. His wife seemed very relieved that we helped them out of the danger zone, but we are still wondering how or if this amazing vehicle had an MOT!

I looked on the Internet and yes, they had steam powered cars back in 1902 and also electric cars! You live and learn!

It also allows you to subscribe to online prayer feeds from organisations such as Operation World, Open Doors and Tearfund, and to devotional prayer resources such as 'Praying the Promises' by Stephen Altrogge.

If you want, it can even give you reminders to pray, integrate contacts into your prayer lists and help you construct prayers of your own using guidance from 'Take Words With You', a manual for Biblical intercession written by Tim Kerr.
