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Dear friends

You may remember that this time last year I wrote the letter from Glasgow where I had been attending a meeting about Church Related Community Work in the United Reformed Church. My time on that national committee is drawing to a close but I had two final pieces of work for it a trip to Dawlish in Devon, and the next day to report (via Skype thankfully) the outcome of my visit to the committee meeting in Sheffield.

My journey to the seaside was rather complex and involved 4 trains in each direction, which of course relies on them all running and connecting in the way they should, which of course was a very unlikely possibility made more complex by my very first train being cancelled due to industrial action, however I managed to get another, and my connection which took me to Reading to join a GWR to Exeter. Stood on Reading's platform 7, with heavy rain falling on the roof I suddenly started to think of when I probably had last been there; it would have been before the millennium, around the time I was candidating for ministry. It was then that I realised how from the train I would see many of my old stomping grounds, paths I had walked or cycled along, stations I used to use, and even at one point, near Salisbury, on the way back home, a building I worked in when a sandwich student 26 years ago.

When we have not been somewhere for a long time how do we think of it? Does our mind play tricks? I seem to remember the 3 months of the summer of 1990 being lovely and dry, but am sure that not all of my walks to work were sunny, were they?

As years passed I have dropped out of touch with the friends and colleagues I once knew well, and wonder what I would now say or write to the people I once worked with so long ago, especially that my life is now so different. Then I was a young, single, physics student, now I am a not so young, married, father who is a minister - I wonder if their lives have changed completely too?

Over the course of the summer, in our church services, we will look at a letter sent by Paul to a group of friends, a church in Corinth. Since he had left them there had been misunderstandings and disagreements, questions of theology needed to be answered, and he also needed to encourage them. Much had changed in his time away, but he wanted to walk with them and help them rediscover the relationship we can have with Christ Jesus. Many of the topics raised are challenging, and the letter is written to a particular social context that is quite different from that we find ourselves in nearly 2000 years later, that said I do believe we will learn something of ourselves, our relationship to each other, and our relationship with our Lord as we explore 1 Corinthians.

As we approach my sabbatical I will be travelling again soon, but hope my epistle to you, will not find you straying from the path but following His way.

Sabbatical Preview A bit of a rest?

The question of a sabbatical, its purpose, and its timing can be a bit tricky. In the United Reformed Church ministers become eligible to a three month sabbatical after each period of ten years, though it should be noted this is not a holiday but must combine rest with a period of learning which should be of benefit to the local and/or wider church.

I was ordained a minister in Northampton on the 2nd October 2004, which made my "tin" anniversary 18 months ago. This was about the same time as I was reading the pastorate profile for Lindfield URC and asking whether this was where God was calling me, obviously not the right time to go on a sabbatical, however I did discuss timing of this break with the elders when I first met with them, and a year (and a bit) on from my induction you are now going to lose me for 3 months from the end of June through to mid-October.

During this time I am going to be exploring the connection between uniformed youth organisations and the churches that they are a part of, but often are apart from. I intend to conduct some surveys, and interviews, among Boys' Brigade officers, scout leaders and ministers of churches with uniformed youth; I am aiming to find what they think does and does not work well. I will also, in August, be on the international service team of "Roverway" a large camp in France with over 5000 Guides and Scouts (aged 16-22) from across Europe, where I might see faith from other cultures expressed among uniformed youth as many overseas scouting organisations are denominational.

But what has led me to this?

During my time in Northampton I saw growth in the Boys' Brigade leading to growth in Junior Church which led to growth in church membership from young people and their parents. Although we have excellent youth and children's work in Lindfield and our BB has been good at helping boys to develop in a positive way, it does not look at the moment that it is likely to be a beacon for church growth in the way that I have seen happen. I am struggling to understand why this is; here we have faithful leaders from the church working hard, and sharing their faith, with the young people.

I suspect that over the summer I will not find any specific answer or solution, but perhaps I will gain some ideas for us and later be able to share my findings wider.

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I hope you will be able to pray for me to know what is right in my preparations, my research, my arrangements, and for safety in my travelling.

Also please pray for Emmeline, Noah and Faith, particularly for the time I will be away in the first two weeks of August. I do ask too that you continue to pray for the officers, helpers and boys of the 1st Lindfield company, that seeds of faith will grow, and be seen to blossom and bloom, that we will see more and more of the advancement of Christ's Kingdom among these boys.

Sing to the Lord

f you regularly attend the 9:30 service you may have noticed that we have been introducing some new songs over the last couple of months. It is often at this time of year with initiatives like 'Spring Harvest' and 'Bible by the beach' that we come across new songs like 'Cornerstone' or 'This is amazing grace' that we can use to worship God.

In our services our songs are generally thought of as our 'worship times'. Of course we are called to live our lives as worship to Him, not just our Sundays. But there is something about meeting together and singing the truths from the Bible that help us to connect with each other and put Him central in our lives.

When we are choosing which new songs to sing it is sometimes difficult to take the 'big top' celebration atmosphere of a thousand people singing and translate it into our context. Often the songs that have most impact on the big stage do not resonate so easily with a smaller congregation. We also try to ensure that the words we sing are biblical and true. People will often be humming the tune of a song they sang in church long after the service is over, so good theology is very important in our sung worship.

In it's great hymn book, the book of Psalms, chapter 96, the bible tells us to:

• Oh sing to the LORD a new song; sing to the LORD, all the earth! Sing to the LORD, bless his name; tell of his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvellous works among all the people!

These new songs are often new expressions of His love from a new generation of hymn and song writers. They are written in modern language and express the constant truth of the bible to an ever changing society.

If we introduce a new song and it captures your imagination in a positive (or negative) way, always come and find either me or Adrian and tell us your thoughts. That way we will better understand how we can encourage you to get closer to Him.

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Joe Lunt A true Christian gentleman

Joe was at the inaugural meeting of 1st Lindfield Boys' Brigade in December 1971 when a good number of boys turned up to find out what the BB was all about. The company was then registered and so the 1st Lindfield began in January 1972. I joined the following September and a working friendship began which would last for more than 30 years.

Joe became officer- in- charge of the junior section where he remained until his retirement. During Joe's thirty years in that role we think about 300 boys passed through juniors on to company section. During the late 70's and 80's there were 48 boys in membership (140 in the whole company) and we had a waiting list. Joe knew each boy by name and their various needs. Joe was an excellent organiser, patient, caring and the boys always came first. We had some great days out during the 30 years.

I have met boys from then who still reminisce about the good times. Joe cared about the community to and never walked to BB or church without stopping to pick up rubbish and he always arranged for a good few boys to help with the village cleaning days.

Joe also spent hours on our renowned jumble sales and our Village Day stall. Nothing was to much trouble, he was always there to lend a hand when needed. Many a boy will have fond memories of Joe and many would have given their lives to Jesus after hearing the kind and encouraging words he would have instilled in their hearts. Joe is home now with the Lord he loved.

We continue to hold Betty, Simon and Jonathan in our thoughts and prayers. A few words to finish from the BB object. To advance Christ's Kingdom among boys

Joe certainly did that and many will give thanks for his witness.

Try Triathlon!

The Haywards Heath Triathlon, organised by Hedgehogtri Events, took place early in the morning on Sunday 10th April 2016. Based around the Dolphin Leisure Centre, competitors could either do a Sprint triathlon (384 m swim; 25 km bike; 5 km run) or a Supersprint, which was basically half the Sprint distances and designed to encourage newcomers. There was also a relay event at the Sprint distance for teams of 2 or 3 – instead of a baton, the team members just passed on the ankle timing chip at each transition.

Jonathan entered the Sprint event and had a great race, finishing first in his age group (20-39) in a time of 1 hr 12 min 02 secs. He was second overall, being only 7 seconds (=0.16%) behind the winner! However, it is encouraging to learn that the winner was in the 40-49 age group, so Jonathan has plenty of future opportunities to come first!

That's one of the great things about triathlon, it is a very inclusive sport and all abilities, shapes, sizes and ages take part. Obviously you need a bike, but it need not be a sleek carbon-fibre machine, some compete on old road or mountain bikes. Obviously you need to be able to swim too, but you don't need to be a Mark Spitz - one of the competitors had only learnt to swim at the Dolphin in the previous month!





Alex and I entered the relay as a team - Alex swam and ran, while I did the bicycle sandwiched between – and I am delighted (amazed) to report that we won!!

Okay, I now have to admit that we were the only relay team, but I couldn't have been prouder of Alex and the way he has bounced back from his illness to compete, when it was a struggle for him to walk half-way down our road not so long ago!

Thanks to God and many in our congregation for answered prayers! In a time of 1 hr 41 min 20 secs we would have come 77th out of the 102 entrants if we had been a single person! I hope that we might have encouraged others to think about trying triathlon, it really is a fun and friendly way to get fit and stay fit - and perhaps next year we'll have some competition for the relay event from others in LURC?! I find it a blessing that there are so many youth workers in and around the area who are able to work together to spread God's word. We also meet together often to plan the Christian Union timetable as well as to pray for our churches and youth groups.

We begin each Christian Union with an ice breaker question. This gives the pupils time to arrive, settle down and talk to one another whilst they eat their lunch. It also allows us as leaders to catch up with how they are doing, how their day or week has been and find how we can pray for them.

After the ice breaker, the six of us take turns in leading a small teaching or testimony. This term we are learning about David from the Old Testament. We are also providing the pupils with testimonies that show God's work happening in our lives, or the lives around us. I think it is important to be reminded that God is always at work, even when we don't always feel it.

The teaching comes to an end and we encourage the pupils to break up into smaller groups to pray together about what they have learnt and for the week ahead. We join a group to help lead the prayers and to allow each pupil to have a voice, no matter how shy they are.

We give as much time as we feel is needed for the prayers each week (unless the lunch break ends), and when the prayers come to an end we finish off the Christian Union with a fun game to allow the pupils to create friendships with one another. The leaders often try to win against the pupils, but this is rarely successful!

It is a privilege to be able to go into Oathall regularly and run a Christian Union, and to see God at work within the school. We are often encouraged by the Christian teachers who sometimes come by if they have the time.

Please pray that the doors will be kept open for us to continue to spread God's word in schools. Pray that we would be able to equip the pupils with what they need to be able to be God's messengers within their school. And pray that we can see God at work within our community.

Boys' Brigade



David and I had not attended Bible by the Beach (by the beach, not on the beach!) before but were encouraged by the enthusiasm expressed by Adrian and Val Cookney for this event – which they have attended for six or seven out of the eight years it has been running. We were pleased that our friends from home and members of our home group, Jane Harfield and Barbra Baliki, also attended.

Joe and Freya opted to spend the bank holiday weekend at home as they have Big Church Day Out (which is really a weekend) to look forward to at the end of May. David and I set off after work on Friday to arrive at The Congress Theatre. There was plenty of parking and a warm welcome as we registered – simply being ticked off on a list and given our Weekend Passes.

Bible by The Beach 2016 was all about being Distinctive – at home, at work and in all areas of our lives. The first event was the evening celebration; the worship was led by Andy Fenton, minister and leader of an organisation called 'Music Ministry', which serves the local church in the UK by training, teaching and equipping. Throughout the weekend Andy led the sung worship sensitively and reflectively, introducing one or two new songs.

The speakers were David Cook, recently retired from his role as Principal and Director of the School of Preaching in Sydney, Jonathan Lamb, CEO for Keswick

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Ministries and Paul Mallard, minister in Bath and trainer of church workers. The sermons were from Matthew 5, Sermon on the Mount, which answers one of life's four biggest questions 'How do I live?' (The others being: 'Where did I come from?' Where am I going to? and 'Why am I here?') challenging us to be salt and light and Daniel 1, 2 and 3 to live countercultural lives. We were encouraged to look for God's hand, as he is working out his purpose even in the most unpromising situations, to stand for God's honour, to serve God's purposes and count on His grace.

Various seminars were held and I attended 'Living in a Broken World' led by Paul Mallard. Through his own personal experience of suffering he encouraged us to grasp that suffering is universal but God is in control – God is Sovereign, God is Good and God is wise. Through suffering our fellowship with God can be deepened and we can be transformed to be more like Jesus – which is God's aim for each one of us. It isn't comfortable teaching but as the only condition for suffering is to live long enough - it is vital.

Paul emphasised that God hasn't washed his hands of the world - he has rolled up his sleeves. God loves us more than we can imagine and He wants us to know it! Of course, no-one has all the answers and the reality of our broken world is a mystery we cannot understand this side of heaven.

The second Seminar Lattended was 'Growing Healthy Churches' and 'Enabling Churches to Continue Growing'. Dr Ray Evans, minister of Grace Community Church in Bedford, explained how in the book of Acts, different people, who were considered beneath sharing spiritual truths with - were reached with the gospel in different ways - by Word, Deed and Life Experience. Word - Ray made the point that when considering inviting someone along to church we don't say their 'no' for them by not inviting them! He encouraged us to have an invite culture to understand our non-Christian friends and family are on a journey and that the 25th invitation to a Christmas Carol Service may be the one that is accepted. Deed - the most likely cause of men coming to church is seeing distinctiveness in other men by them living honourably.

The second part of this seminar concentrated on the problems that can arise as a result of church growth.

Ray outlined the need for Leadership Initiative and Membership Ownership, the formation of teams and empowering them suggesting this acronym:

- C Clarify the team mission what do we want to do?
- A Agree on team goals how or when are we going to do it?
- *R* Review our performance this is how we get better at what we do
- *E* Equipping our members who are going to be involved?

The teaching across the weekend left us in no doubt that we must go beyond just hearing Jesus and do as he says!

The programme provides ample down time in which to walk along the promenade, share a meal or a cup of tea or browse the bookshop.

David and I plan to return next year but intend to stay nearby in one of the many hotels or B&Bs. Why not join us? (and, I expect, Adrian and Val will too!)

Know Lindfield?



Answer to the May photo:

The large 3 storey building in the centre of the picture was built in 1840 as a piano manufacturing facility by Thomas Durrant.

It was highly successful and, as well as the home trade, exported pianos to expats and the Raj for 40 years until Durrant retired in 1881. After being put up for sale without success, the building fell into disuse for a few years. It then became the successful Assembly Rooms with a programme of theatricals, meeting rooms, lectures, exhibitions and recitals much as the King Edward Hall is now. On the ground floor there were Mission Rooms for gospel and temperance activities. However when the KEH opened in 1911, the Assembly Rooms fell into disuse, except for sundry warehouse use, but this time it was for an extended period until 1950.

Then it became a factory for skirt making and supplied famous names such as Gor-Ray and Slimma. At the end of the 1960s, after financial difficulties, the site was redeveloped for the car park, the Medical Centre and bungalows for elderly residents that we have now.
