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# **Dear friends**

he other day I pulled the phone out of my pocket, pressed a few buttons pointed it roughly in the right direction, and pressed the picture of the camera that was displayed on the screen. It got turned off and shoved back in the pocket. An hour or two later Emmeline asked if she could have a copy to share on Facebook so that friends could see it; out of the pocket comes the phone a few button presses and a little typing and off goes a copy of the picture from my phone to her via a combination of Wi-Fi, electronics, and fibre optics. How wonderful, how guick, how delightful, and how easy I think! But my wonderful wife was unimpressed; it wasn't the speed of delivery that troubled her, but that my photo was out of focus. Actually it was perfectly focused on Ryecroft's front fence, but out of focus on the supposed subject, our son. I had not taken time to think of what I was doing, to compose the photo, or to choose the focal point for the camera so I had the lovely curvy white metal appearing crystal clear, and a rather blurry boy.

There are occasions when, if we don't do the right thing in the right way, we never get the chance again. We might rush at a topic and fail, or procrastinate until the opportunity passes. Getting the timing right is crucial! There is much in the Bible on the matter of time, which is unsurprising as our God who created the heavens and earth made time exist as part of His work in "the first day", Genesis 1: 3-5. God always does things at the right time, the Kairos moment, and sometimes we have to wait for that to come,

but the waiting game can be hard.

One of the flavours of the Fruit of the Spirit is Patience, it's something that I'm perhaps not good at, but want to see grow in me, however when we seek to see such change the Lord often challenges us through needing patience for an outcome that seems to take too long to happen, and when we think someone is "testing our patience" it actually means our patience has already failed.

I wonder how the patience was for the disciples as they waited for something to happen after the ascension. They didn't know what, how or when the next thing would be, but Jesus had earlier promised the paraclete, which is an advocate or helper. The Holy Spirit had already been breathed upon them by Jesus on the night of His resurrection, but at Pentecost, with them together praying in a room, the Spirit came and blessed with new gifts and equipped the church to partake in God's Mission. This month of May, as we, with patience, await Pentecost, please consider how you pray with others, and how together we may be asking for the Spirit to guide us in the mission given by God, to be a witness in the world making disciples of all nations. Please also think of how you prepare yourself for worship – is it a rush, or do you take time to compose yourself so that when we gather we give the subject the focus that is needed, for the Lord is worthy of all our heart, our mind and our strength.

## The Queen at 90 Memories and reflections

### From Dorothy Brown

As a child growing up before the Second World War, I remember pictures of a pretty little girl called Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York, three years younger than myself. Soon joined by sister Margaret Rose, photos appeared in newspapers or magazines (no TV in those days). Cared for by 'Nannie Crawfie' and educated at home, they also joined small groups of Brownies, then Guides, formed from their friends, and lived a happy family life.

Soon came upheaval when their Father unexpectedly became King George VI, following the abdication of his elder brother, King Edward. The family moved to Buckingham Palace and Elizabeth became heir apparent.

Soon came the dark days of war. Elizabeth made her first radio broadcast to encourage other children being evacuated to safety at home and abroad. She and her sister went to Windsor Castle, but later, when old enough, Elizabeth returned to join the ATS (Women's Army Corps).

Peace happily restored, her marriage to Prince Philip of Greece gave the nation a much needed joyful event following the wartime years. Two children, Charles and Anne, were born, and life continued normally. Princers Elizabeth and the Duka of Ediphur

Away with husband Philip at Tree Tops, Kenya, news was received of the sudden death of her father King George VI, aged 54 years. Elizabeth was now Queen. Crowds flocked to cinema screens to see footage of the new Queen's arrival home. The slight, black clad figure calmly walking down the aircraft steps and greeting the long line of dignitaries assembled, was a most moving sight. Prime Minister Winston Churchill was reported to have said "I hardly know Princess Elizabeth; to me she is still a child."

The glittering Coronation Service which later followed was the first event to be televised. Thousands of people bought their very first tv (9") for this event, and neighbours and friends crowded into front rooms to watch the beginning of a new age. From that moment on, strengthened by her own personal faith and the support of her husband, our Queen has continued to fulfil the pledge she made on her 21st Birthday: "I will dedicate my life, be it long or short, to the service of my country." May God bless her and give her strength as she continues so ably in this task.

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## From Betty Billins

We went as a family to the owners of the farm where my Dad worked to watch the Coronation Service on their television. (It was quite something to be asked to go to the big house!) In the afternoon we had a celebration on the common, starting with a service. Then there was a fancy dress competition (see photo of me as Rule Britannia).

My Dad helped with children's and adults' races, and there were also activities on the Pond – no safety precautions in those days! And the swans took it all in their stride, too!



I remember the Queen opening Sight Savers, then in Heath Road in Haywards Heath. It was nearly dark and the car had lights inside so that we could see her.

A personal memory for me was when I was fortunate to be part of the Silver Jubilee Celebrations, when only two Section Sussex Women's Standard Bearers of the RBL were chosen to be part of a 1,000 Standard Bearers. Firstly we were on parade on Horse Guards Parade, inspected by Prince Charles; then we went by coach to Windsor Castle to join more standard bearers, totalling 2,700. These were inspected and the salute taken by our Queen and Prince Philip. It was a very long day, but one I shall never forget.

I went to the evening Festival of Remembrance in the Royal Albert Hall, in the presence of our beloved Queen. (A Women's Section member of RBL is only permitted to attend this once.)

Now through the media we are able to see how she has been as a mother. These times must be very special to her, as they are to all mums. One of my memories of her through the tv was the sadness the Queen showed when her beloved Royal Yacht Britannia was decommissioned. It must have been a place where the family could have privacy away from the media. When I visited it I could just imagine how precious this ship was to her Majesty.

I admire and look up to our Queen in the way she has served this country for so many years, with Prince Philip by her side. Would we want to do what our Queen does at 90?



# Ascension & Pentecost Where do they fit in?

A headline summary for the Christian Ayear would, I suppose, start with something like this:

Christmas is the celebration of the coming of God into human history as a man, Jesus. He came to show everyone what he is really all about (since we seemed quite unable to understand him through prophets, preachers or scriptures).

Then Good Friday is the time that Jesus gave himself, a painful sacrifice on a rough wooden cross, in the supreme demonstration of God's love as he took all the sins of the human race upon himself the darkest day in creation's story.

But Easter Day reverses all that because Jesus rose. He conquered the world's depravity and overcame death – the most beautiful revelation of all.

So, for a short while God comes back to walk again amongst his followers, comforting, teaching, reassuring them that all is not lost – sin and death really can be vanquished. They saw him, talked to him, had a meal with him, so they knew the truth. But what then?

Two very significant things happened. First, he apparently left them again! We have that strange account (have a look again at the first eleven verses of Acts) "he was taken up before their very eyes and a cloud hid him from their sight". So the physical Lord, they had followed was gone. On Good Friday, they thought he was dead, finished and their world had come to an end. But this time he was just not there anymore, but they had a different feeling about everything.

What was it he had said, the very last words recorded in Matthew's Gospel "And be sure, I shall be with you to the very end of time"?

So we come to Ascension – the end of Jesus's earthly ministry, his "incarnation". But that just means his presence takes another form. In Palestine two thousand years ago he was confined to one time and place. We had to meet a saviour who was truly man as well as truly God. But now he has no limitations, unlike a physical prophet or a spiritual guru at whose feet we have to go and sit. Now he is free, to walk with us, each one of us, every step of the way.

But wait a minute. If he is not here, how is his mission accomplished, how is he continuing his ministry in our needy world?

That's where Pentecost comes in. "You will receive power, when the Holy Spirit comes on you and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem....and away to the ends of the earth."

A key text for me is in Paul's word to the Galatians "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me". It is we who now carry on Jesus's work on earth – he is in us and has given us power in the Holy Spirit to enable us to do just that.

See how transformed were those disciples – first frightened, cowering away at the death of their leader, then excited, bewildered at his sudden reappearance, then bemused because he seemed to have left them again. Then, when they had gathered for the feast of Pentecost, they were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues......

Peter stands up to preach that powerful sermon, explaining everything – reminding them of the prophet Joel's words "God says: I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams...." ending "....and everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved".

Ascension sets Jesus free from bodily limitations to be with us and in us as we continue his saving ministry. At Pentecost he enables us for that daunting, but exciting task by filling us with the Holy Spirit – God's power in us.

# **Little Compton**

Little Compton is a large post war house which has been converted to provide 9 bed-sitting rooms which are arranged over two floors, with a stair lift. Outside Little Compton enjoys its own attractive gardens. There is also parking for up to 5 cars.



It is situated in the heart of Lindfield Village, parallel to the High Street and so within walking distance of the three churches, and all of the many local amenities, including pharmacist, post office, opticians, newsagents, hairdressers, 3 pubs and 3 churches as well as a very large village hall which has regular activities and entertainments on offer.

Little Compton is a unique home for nine elderly people who wish to live independently, but as part of a small community. Little Compton has а welcoming atmosphere which reflects its Christian ethos and values. The rooms vary in size and facilities, but all have an en-suite. There is a small kitchenette for communal use on the ground floor and soon to be on the first floor. The rooms are unfurnished but can accommodate small pieces of furniture and personal belongings to reflect each person's style preference and individuality. There is a communal dining room and conservatory where lunch and supper is served for all residents. There is a choice of menu that is set on a 4 week

rolling programme and provided from Compton House. Residents are responsible for providing their own breakfast and any additional foods, drinks and snacks.

The communal areas are cleaned regularly and there are laundry facilities for all residents, plus a laundry and cleaning service is available for a nominal charge. Little Compton is owned by Lindfield Christian Care Home who also own Compton House which is adjacent to Little Compton. LCCH is a non-profit charity with a Christian ethos, it is open to all and the aim is to provide a safe, homely environment for those who wish to live independently but no longer wish to live alone. Some of our residents still drive and most remain part of Lindfield life, with many of our residents' being regular visitors to the Tiger, coffee shops, tea rooms and the 3 Churches.

- Relationships built up during the course can be developed further by regular mission work with prisoners on the prison wings, and
- Angel Tree Christmas presents, provided by PF, not only bring joy to the prisoners' children but also change the lives of both the prisoners and their partners and their relationships with each other.
