



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Dear friends

While driving down the A303 to Spring Harvest I pointed out of the car window at the airfield I had worked at when I had been a physics student on a sandwich placement from university. I then thought about how I had tested some equipment for aircraft that are now no longer in military service (including Nimrod, Harrier, and Tornado) and realised that I had lived quite a few more years since that job than I had before it. Come next summer it will have been thirty years!

Back then probably few of us had a mobile phone, or a personal computer in our home, though many of us might have more than one of these under our roof today. As a family we often take for granted that with a few taps almost information we desire is instantly accessible, any programme on television can be viewed “on demand”, and any song played at any minute via a range of online music streaming services.

There are, of course, occasions when things don't work properly, and one of these situations occurred as the road outside our home was resurfaced in the February half term. Whether the problem was caused by the workers on the High Street, or that being pure coincidence, will remain a mystery but the manse lost its fibre optic internet connection, and we had to wait 3 days

for a telecoms technician to investigate where between us and the exchange it had dropped out. With no Netflix, iPlayer, or Amazon Prime to watch television reverted to being scheduled by someone else, and “forced” to watch other things we probably benefited from that brief interlude.

More recently it was a car that broke down. Emmeline had driven to the supermarket without a problem, then after shopping, it would not start. The engine made a very slight whir – the starter motor was clearly not doing its job, but what was the fault? The breakdown service were called and of course after a two hour wait, we discovered it was as simple as an 8 year old car battery that frequently did short runs, finally being exhausted.

Was I angry or upset, about this breakdown, actually no – I was a little joyful and praised God. The Lord had allowed the car to break down in a safe place at a time that didn't really matter. Emmeline had not been stuck on a busy road, or needing to urgently visit a patient, nor at some distant place miles away. When she called me and said what had occurred I had been able to go and swap cars with her so she could come home with the shopping. I grabbed a coffee, bought a newspaper and enjoyed a sunny afternoon outside, doing the crossword.

I then had the opportunity to chat with the mechanic about his work and the dangers that are sometimes faced at the roadside, and also to share something of my "work" too.

We delight in the modern conveniences we may have, but when things go wrong how often do we see the positives, the opportunities, and the conversations that might take place. When you hit a problem, perhaps like these simple, western, overdeveloped society inconveniences I've faced recently – or perhaps something far more serious to do with the likes of health, employment or relationships - consider how God may already be at work in that situation for your good, and how He may ask you to respond such that His kingdom will be seen to grow.

Ascension

Those in and outside of the church in western society are probably familiar with the period of Lent which lasts 40 days from Ash Wednesday (not counting Sundays, which you may remember I told you in March Good News are Feast Days). During Lent people try to come close to God, perhaps through fasting, or living differently in some way. With the sunrise of Easter, and the celebration of our Lord Jesus resurrected, Lent comes to a close but a new season begins Eastertide.

Eastertide is a 50 day celebration of Jesus overcoming sin's hold on our life, death is defeated and the believer is able to have the sure and certain hope of an eternity with God. During the first few weeks following His resurrection Jesus is seen by hundreds of people. He is not some ghostly vision but is seen to eat food, and offers himself to be touched by the disciples that they may be reassured of his physicality.

Yet during this time as resurrected Lord the earthly limitation of humanity being in but one place at one time still rests with Him, and so it was right that the Son of God returns to the heavenly Father's side, which he did on the fortieth day, here he intercedes on our behalf when we bring our prayers to God.



His Ascension is recorded in Acts 1, where he on a hillside he instructs the disciples to await the coming of the Holy Spirit, then engage in mission, to the ends of the earth. He is “taken up before their very eyes”, which in much art work depicts Jesus floating upwards into the clouds, though that is not the only way of interpreting the description that is given. This traditional image is based upon the classical concept of fiery hell in the centre of the earth, and heaven being above the clouds, with humanity living on the surface of the earth, midway between the two and so experiencing elements of each.

Thy Kingdom Come

If we instead read the “up” as a spiritual dimension rather than physical direction, we can still imagine Jesus being surrounded by cloud and disappearing before the disciples as he returns to the Father but are not left with the difficult thought of how far beyond the stratosphere did Jesus remain in human form. This removes from us what some scholars refer to as the “embarrassing question” of what physically happened at Ascension and allows us instead to delight in the spirituality of the occasion. That our earthly friend, is King of the heavens.

Christ, the risen and ascended Lord, has encountered fully the reality of life on earth. Jesus was born in humility, grew into manhood, tempted by the evil one, developed friendships and knew grief. He suffered mistreatment and an agonising death. He knows our joys and sorrows because he has been there and experienced our human emotions. As we pray, he adds that human experience, rejoicing and groaning with us, presenting our prayers to the Father.

One day Jesus will return to the earth, appearing again from the cloud. Then his kingdom will be seen in fullness and only prayers of praise will be needed as all suffering will have come to an end.

Why Worry?

What is worry? In some translations of the Bible the word 'worry' is usually translated 'anxiety' or care. The Greek word in the New Testament means to divide, part or tear apart. The word describes the effect of worry and what worry can do to us. Worry is often an anxious concern over the future, something we cannot do anything about and this is why it can tear us apart.

Worry can show us that we have no confidence in the sovereignty of God or in His word and worry can affect us personally. Listen to the words of Jesus in Matthew 6:31. So do not worry saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?" And in verse 34. 'Therefore do not worry about tomorrow for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.'

Worry is like a rocking chair you can spend a lot of energy rocking it but it will not get you anywhere. Freedom from anxiety is possible. The answer lies in Scripture where Jesus said simply and directly, 'stop worrying'. With your mind apply these words of Jesus and say, from this moment on, 'I am going to stop worrying in obedience to the command of Jesus. I am going to release the situation I am worried about to Him', Then have a time of thanksgiving which is another antidote to worry.

Here is a simple plan you may find useful. Sit down and write out the following.

What is my problem?

What does God want me to do about it?

When, where or how shall I begin?

Look for the solution in the Bible.

Many years ago we used to sing a song:

Said the robin to the sparrow. 'I should really like to know

Why these anxious human beings rush about and worry so.'

Said the sparrow to the robin, 'friend I think that it must be.

That they have no Heavenly Father such as cares for you and me.

In John 14: 1: Jesus said to them.'Do not let your heart be troubled. You believe in and adhere to and trust and rely on God; believe in and adhere to and trust and rely on me' [Amplified Bible].

Jesus has every detail worked out perfectly for each one of us. Just rest on His promises and experience His peace and love of your life.

Lent 2019

This year's Joint Lent Course, in 5 sessions, encouraged us to remember people who were background characters in the Bible, yet quietly and steadily played an important part in God's overall plans.

Sarai, wife of Abraham and mother of a nation.

Josiah – Old Testament Israel's last good king, being young, godly and obedient.

Mary Magdalene – loyal follower of Jesus, and the first but very unlikely, witness to Jesus' resurrection.

Epaphras – the faithful minister, founder of the Colossian church.

Barnabas – the voice of support and encouragement. Known as the "Son of Encouragement"

Volunteers from Churches across Central Sussex, show Christ's love to prisoners at HMP Lewes, by **praying** for, and with, them and their families, supporting **Chaplains**, and providing fellowship, at **Chapel** services. Christmas presents are provided for prisoners' children (**Angel Tree**) and **Sycamore Tree** Victim Awareness courses run.

For those who wish to **pray** there is a monthly prayer meeting and weekly prayer requests from prisoners. Volunteers can **engage** with the work of the group, in prison and through writing letters to prisoners. **Mission giving** goes towards Angel Tree presents and funding Sycamore Tree courses.

(To give, use special mission-giving envelopes and place your gift in the offertory at any of the Sunday services. Complete a Gift Aid slip if appropriate. Cheques should be made payable to Lindfield URC)

Sunday Services

The **10.00am** service is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. Most weeks, children leave after 20 minutes for their own activities (including crèche). Lighthouse (Junior church) is for children and young people up to age 14.

Coffee is served after the morning service.

At **6:30pm** Something Different. This is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Hello!

Last month, a few of us from church attended Spring Harvest in Minehead. This year's theme was 'Unlimited #WhenYouPray'.

On the Spring Harvest website, the theme was summarised as follows:

Jesus encouraged and taught us to pray as part of his family. We have unlimited access to an unlimited God. Prayer connects us with him, his people and his world.

In 2019 we will explore the exciting power and potential of prayer. Delving deep into the Bible, hearing testimonies and getting extremely practical, we'll engage with something that is simultaneously beyond our comprehension and also simple.

Prayer is being with God, alone, with others and for others. It is different motivations, different times, places and personalities. It is turning hearts and ears and faces. No right or wrong way to pray. Prayer is peace and warfare. Prayer is being present, listening, waiting, persisting. Prayer is uninhibited but inhabited. Prayer is unpredictable. Prayer is UNLIMITED.

Pete Greig came and spoke to us each morning, talking on Matthew 6:5-24.

Reading back on the few notes I made, Pete gave us three things to remember when we pray.

Keep it simple
Keep it real
Keep it up

Keep it simple

God knows our hearts. He is not interested in big words; He just wants to be in conversation with us.

Keep it real

God loves us and wants us to talk to Him from the heart.

Keep it up

Just keep praying! God answers prayers in two ways: suddenly and slowly. And when God answers prayers suddenly, He has usually been working on it slowly for years!

This year, there was a prayer trail around the Butlins site. Nine prayer stops around the site with instructions to help pray in a different way.

There was also 24 hours of prayer from day 3-4. One venue was dedicated to 24 hours of prayer where people can come and go and pray for what God puts on their hearts. There were also focused topics to pray for each hour. E.g. Thanksgiving, Unity and Family.

Though only 4 nights, it was a great time away. I left feeling refreshed and keen to continue finding out the unlimited power of prayer!





Today, 1st April, had lunch in the House of Lords (I kid you not). How's that for a bit of name-dropping, but two days after what was supposed to be Brexit day, I felt someone needed to go and sort them out!

Joking aside, let me tell you a story. Fifty years ago, an organisation was set up, the Ecumenical Youth Council in Europe (EYCE), to try and encourage young Christians to work together for peace and a better world.

In 1973, as freshly appointed Youth Secretary for the new URC, I found myself driving a minibus full of British Council of Churches (BCC) & denominational youth officers across Europe to Berlin. We weathered Checkpoint Charlie (remember those were still very much cold war days) and journeyed on to Hirschluch, a conference centre in Storkow, not far from the Polish border, where EYCE was holding its annual General Meeting.

That was a fascinating and to an extent life-changing experience. I spent six years involved with EYCE, including a spell on its Executive and attended meetings from Odessa in USSR to Joensuu in Finland, from Pinner (yes Middlesex) to Rome. I could bore you for hours with tales of all that – but I won't.

But what I want to share is something of the underlying concern felt in the luncheon party we had – nine of my elderly contemporaries, who had been involved in that scene in the 1970s – and one young German lady, Lisa, recently chair of EYCE. John, Lord Alderdice, former leader of the Alliance Party in Northern Ireland and Speaker at Stormont, when it functioned, was one – hence the invitation to meet at the House of Lords.

In our years involved in church youth work, the former BCC Youth Department and EYCE, there was still a sense that the Ecumenical movement was “The great new fact of our era”, as Archbishop Wm Temple described it - Christ’s challenge to his disciples that “you all may be one, that the world may believe”. We were working for a physical, structural unity of the church. It was hard going, but we believed it was God’s will and we were striving towards it. EYCE bridged the Iron Curtain. We brought much support and encouragement to young Christians in Eastern Europe – and remember it was they who made a mighty contribution to the movement which eventually led to the fall of Marxism and the wall.

Lisa shared the present fragility of EYCE. The European churches don't seem interested any more in working with neighbours or funding youth work. Sadly, the same seems true in the UK – no one now goes from Britain to EYCE General Meetings and work camps – we contribute nothing to the budget, whereas I remember the time when our young people and youth leaders were leading lights.

As we expanded the discussion we wondered how much more widely this tendency prevails. In my youth the churches were deeply into overseas mission, Christian Aid and world development. When the World Council had an Assembly, everyone knew the theme. Now we seem to have withdrawn into our local shells.

And it did not escape our attention, meeting as we were in the hallowed portals of Westminster, that Brexit is probably just a further manifestation of an insularity, which has crept into life more generally – look at President Trump “making America great again!”

The EU has prevented war between habitual combatants for three quarters of a century. EYCE was one small contributor to the end of a divided Europe.

Yet we seem to be retreating into our shells nationally in what was supposed to be a great new global paradise and I fear the churches are retreating into introversion and parochialism.

By the time you read this something may? have happened to sort out our ongoing relationship with our neighbours across the Channel. Let us hope and pray that that process may begin to lead us back towards a wider love for our neighbour, which is a critical ingredient of our faith and calling.

And let us also pray that EYCE, which has had such a formative effect on many lives (witness our gathering of alumni on 1st April), is enabled to find the support and resources to continue its ministry of encouraging young Christians to worship and serve together and break down the walls, which we humans seem so intent on building between us.

Who am I ?

Well done to those of you who guessed that the answers to last month's Good News "Who am I?" questions were from Carol Walters. As Carol revealed, she was born in Leeds, but she moved at the age of two to Scarborough as her Father found it difficult to adapt to Leeds city life after returning to UK from India. Carol's love of cricket came from watching Yorkshire play at the County Grounds in Scarborough. However, she moved south after school to enrol on a teacher training course at Furzedown College in Streatham, a typical concrete building of the 1960's that featured in a 1965 edition of the journal Architect & Building News. I suspect that Carol was less interested in the design of the building than in the fact that it overlooked the house where a young man lived, David Walters! Carol and David met at the local Baptist Church and Carol stayed on in the area to teach at a primary school on the Brixton/Streatham border, a challenging role in a diverse community with 85-95% immigrant families. Carol and David married in 1968 and moved to Lindfield in 1977 when David's job brought him here. By then they had two children, Richard and Joanne, so Carol left full time teaching and had a variety of jobs, including at "Durrant's", the village café which was situated where Mansell McTaggart now is. With no established Baptist church nearby at that time, Carol and David joined LURC in the Richard Tucker era, where the children were happy and David volunteered with the Boys Brigade. So they have been part

of our congregation for over 40 years! Carol's passion for our church is to see more people recognize the need for prayer and, she is the driving force behind our prayer "Engine Room", so named because of Charles Spurgeon's belief that prayer is the engine room of the church. The Engine Room meet every Monday at 9:30 a.m. and on the 4th Thursday evening of each month at 8:00 p.m. – some 6-10 meet at present and if you would like to join them there will be a warm welcome to engage in this important aspect of our church life. There is also the opportunity to pray with 16-20 others from All Saints and the Evangelical Free Churches each Saturday at 8:45 a.m. – the venue moves between the churches on a monthly basis and will be back at LURC in July. Do have a chat with Carol over a coffee after a service, about Engine Room or anything else – perhaps you can even persuade her to try watching Sussex play cricket down at Hove!
