

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Dear friends

What a wet month we have had! As I have looked out the kitchen window into the back garden of Ryecroft, there have been times the patio has looked more like a pond, and I am surprised that the usual pigeons at the bird feeder have not been replaced by ducks waddling on the lawn and swimming in the flower beds. Our temperate climate should, of course, make us think of rainfall in the spring, and it was just a few years ago we were concerned about drvness and drought conditions, but there has come a time when the land is so saturated that one wonders what impact the next rain shower, let alone storm, may have on land and people.

The climate in the Holy Land is, of course, different, there is rain, and at times hail or snow, but the weather is generally much drier. It is this dryness that leads to the biblical view that rain is a blessing, but a blessing that is not isolated in whom it touches. Jesus says of God, in Matthew 5, "He causes His sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous."

I wonder what blessing we would like the "unrighteous" to know? Maybe when we feel aggrieved by someone we might want to shout or scream at the culprit. Online we might reach for the Caps Lock TO GET OUR POINT HEARD!!! We might alternatively, if it is someone we know, choose to ignore, or blindside them, and pretend they don't exist. Are these the ways of Jesus, or does such action make us equally unrighteous? The Lord tells us, "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven."

We are called to live and act differently from others in the world. We are to follow the example of Jesus, the Son of God, who was sent from the Father that we may know his Love, be forgiven our sin, and receive the hope of eternal life. Jesus did not aggressively respond with hatred, or ever act maliciously. We do see His anger at unrighteousness in the cleansing of the temple, but He, for these same people, and for us, takes the cross upon His shoulders, suffers and dies.

As rain falls this spring, let us consider the Love God has shown in sending His Son, and may we be moved to think of how His love may be showered through us to all we meet, for whatever we think of any individual, they are Loved by God.

"Faith Talk" Seminar Rev Andy Twilley, Training and Development Officer for URC Southern Synod

We were grateful and privileged to welcome back Andy Twilley to LURC one Thursday evening in February to give a seminar entitled "Faith Talk". This seminar was building on the one Andy gave us last year helping us to think about how we can ensure a warm, open and encouraging welcome to all who meet our church family.

The main message of the evening was that, ideally, we first need to be able to talk within our congregation openly amongst ourselves about our faith and its impact on daily living, before sharing with others who may wish to engage with us and ask questions about Christianity for themselves.

Our starting point related to fellowship. "Fellowship" describes the essence of being church: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." (Acts 2:42 NIV).

In brief, the seminar was a journey broken into four sections:

- Levels of conversation thinking about different levels of conversation from "formulaic", with no emotion attached to it, through to "fellowship", a more intimate form of conversation.
- 2 Talking faith with each other does not come naturally to most people and we were encouraged to explore ways to build on this.
- 3 Bringing faith into conversation think about things you have done relating to faith and consider how to make faith relevant when talking to others. Jesus related to people in a way that was relevant to them. The Bible is relevant to life today as illustrated by the word search Andy gave us (see on the opposite page). There is a topic for each letter of the alphabet have a go yourself! – answers found separately in the magazine.
- **4** Explaining faith we need to think about what our faith means to us as well as what it means to be a Christian?

After Andy's visit last year we ensured ground coffee was part of our welcome ... what will be the outcome of his latest visit? A challenge for all of us.

Boys' Brigade


All sections got underway following the Christmas break, and we are encouraged by the steady increase in numbers, although the Anchor section is still a bit low.

Spring has sprung!

really love the Spring and feel close to God at this time. Every year, no matter what weather we've had, or what's going on in the world, bulbs and new green shoots appear and, to me, this fulfils God's promise to us that He is always with us no matter what.

As the days get longer and the sun rises higher in the sky, there is a greater opportunity to get outside in the garden and get on with an increasing number of gardening tasks.

It's time to:-

- **1** Sow seeds, especially Cosmos and Sweet Peas for the flower border and Broad Beans, Tomatoes and Runner Beans but beware of the frost! Later in the month is a better time to start these.
- 2 Plant Shallots, Onion sets and early Potatoes – ideal to save money!
- **3** Cut back Cornus (Dogwood) for colourful stems.
- **4** Prune bush and climbing Roses.
- **5** Prune shrubs such as Hebe, Willows and Skimmia.
- **6** Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials and climbers.

- **7** Top-dress containers with fresh compost before re-planting with summer flowering plants.
- **8** Plant summer flowering bulbs such as Anemones, Dahlias and hardy Lilies.
- **9** Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control

10 Mow lawns on dry days if needed.

Finally, watch out for slugs – they enjoy the new, green shoots!

Happy Gardening – enjoy your partnership with God!

At Turning Tides, we believe that everyone should have a place they can call home, however we cannot achieve this alone. Community is the solution and your involvement has helped to build a compassionate place to live.

It means a lot to our clients that so many people care about them. You have not only helped through financial support for the charity but also demonstrated compassion and solidarity towards everyone who is experiencing homelessness, whether they are rough sleeping or insecurely housed. Our clients rely on the generosity and kindness of their community for many things including the absolute basics of washing facilities, food and water. Without our Community Hubs in Horsham, Littlehampton and Worthing they would find themselves without.

As you may know, our Hubs not only enable our clients to enjoy a hot meal, counselling, housing advice and medical checks but also to feel less alone. Most importantly, it would introduce them to support that could help end their homelessness for good through our year-round services. It costs £1,462 a day to run our Community Hubs (in Worthing, Littlehampton and Horsham), including specialist staff. In the first quarter of last year we had 228 people access our breakfast sessions across these hubs. Our hubs are truly a lifeline to 67 rough sleepers and the 68 insecurely housed men and women known to Turning Tides.

Who am I?



Congratulations to those of you who worked out that the subject of February's "Who Am I?" was the Reverend Michael Davies, one of the "elder statesmen" of our LURC congregation and a regular, learned and inspiring preacher.

MichaeljoinedLURCwithhiswife,Rosemary, in 1998, following a distinguished career in many varied aspects of church life, at both a national and international level. Michael and Rosemary met at their church youth club on the day Rosemary left school in 1955. Rosemary was just 17 and Michael was 22 when they went on their first date – to the movies to watch "Wizard of Oz"! They were married in 1959 and have three children, Peter, Jacky and Heather, five grandchildren and one greatgrandchild!

After business training in the City of London, during which he qualified as a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries & Administrators, Michael studied at Westminster College, Cambridge, for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church of England. He served local churches at Rustington in Sussex and Egremont in Wallasey and then for a period was Secretary General of the charity "Help the Aged" (now "Age UK").

When the URC was formed in 1972 Michael became its first national Youth Secretary for six years and then Moderator for Thames North Synod in north London for twelve. In 1990 his final appointment before retirement was as Assistant General Secretary of the World Council of Churches in Geneva.

Since retirement to Lindfield in 1997, Michael has kept busy as Treasurer of the Free Church Council, in various URC appointments at Synod and Assembly level and was a Trustee for 12 years until 2018. He was also a Lindfield Parish Councillor for eight years and is Secretary for the Sussex & Coastway Division of Railfuture. Railways have been a great love in Michael's life away from Church and, until recently, his hobby was railway modelling.

It was a real privilege and pleasure for me to spend some time with Michael chatting about things other than church finances – as, of course, Michael has been a LURC Treasurer and, with the oversight of his great experience, still plays a vital role on our Finance Committee.
