Last year by coincidence we met up with the Goodys, Barlings and Tingleys who were embarking upon the same adventure and again this year we shared our search with them. I can't wait until December when Joe (aged six) and I go back to dig it up and bring it triumphantly home!

Christmas 1965: We had to stay overnight at my parents with our two young daughters as the snow was too thick to drive home from Banstead.

1982: A very different experience sitting in the open air beside the garden tomb in Jerusalem for a carol service. Unforgettable.

2000: Spent in hospital (Princess Royal) after a major operation. Staff were lovely, even buying a present for each patient kept in over the period. Santa visited and I even managed some of the Christmas dinner – plus a large hamper from a daughter.

2004: We stayed for four nights at Pilgrim Hall with fabulous food, good worship, parties, games and loads of laughs.

My most interesting memory of Christmas present is of when I was doing my training in 1948-50 at University College Hospital....

In those days everyone (including Surgeons) worked over the holiday and patients were not sent home as they are today.

We spent days, if not weeks, making decorations for wards. We put them up on Christmas Eve and took them down on 27th December.

The highlight of the Christmas was carol singing around the wards late on Christmas Eve and then all going to the local church for the midnight service.

Getting up at 6:30 am was a bit of an anti-climax.

Sunday services explained...

The **9.30am service** is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. There is a crèche, and after about 20 minutes children and young people up to age 14 go out to their own groups on most Sundays.

Coffee is normally served between the morning services and after the evening one.

The **11.00am service** is usually more set and formal.

At **6.30pm** it is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Personal prayer is available after every service. Prayer requests and brief statements of praise for answered prayer can be put in the red book on the concourse table. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We **do not take up an offering** during the services, but all those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service. Thank you.

Cassette **recordings of services** can be borrowed free from the church.

Worthing Churches Homeless Projects

Once again during December we shall be supporting work amongst the homeless through the Worthing Churches Homeless Projects, an organisation with a distinctively Christian ethos offering support and help to mainly single adults. During our morning services on 11th December we shall be welcoming a visiting team from Worthing to get an update on recent news and plans for the future. Don't miss it!

Throughout the month there will be an eyecatching display in the church concourse, with photos and free literature. Browse at your leisure during weekday mornings when the church is open. To whet your appetite, Alison Godfrey, the Projects' Fundraising and Public Relations Manager, writes:-

"Greetings Friends!

Can you believe that December has come to us again! I am so looking forward to being with you again and telling you about our work.

We are celebrating winning the national Faithworks Community Award for our work. It is a reflection of the hard work and commitment of our staff, volunteers and the support we receive from the church community. The £5,000 grant that is part of the award will

be used for the direct benefit of clients by providing social activities. These activities will help clients to gain a sense of purpose and be an opportunity to explore their own potential. Thank you for the role you have all played in helping us to achieve this nationally recognised award.

The Recovery Project will be our new project for 2006. We have recently been blessed in finding the perfect property for this residential project and we have taken a step in faith by



purchasing it, with completion on 1st December 2005. This project will need £1.8m to purchase the property and secure its future for three years. At this time we have £1.1m, a fantastic achievement for a relatively small charity, I am sure you will agree, but still £700,000 short of its target. The Recovery Project will be a medium term accommodation project, for people to stay for up to two years whilst they address their drug and alcohol use. I will be telling you more about this when I visit. In the meantime we are working closely with our prospective new neighbours around the Recovery Project as we help them with any concerns or questions they may have. We would welcome your prayers and friendship at this time.

When did you learn to play the piano?

Attacks were "premeditated"

CHRISTIAN schools throughout Pakistan will go on strike today (17 November) in protest at the attacks on believers in Sangla Hill, Punjab, on Satu.

In Pakistan's worst outbreak of anti-Christian violence since gunmen attacked a church on Christmas Day 2002, a mob destroyed the Roman Catholic, Salvation Army and United Presbyterian churches in Basti Asyia, Sangla Hill village, accusing a Christian man of desecrating the Koran.

According to eyewitnesses, the attack appeared to have been premeditated, as the mob was brought into the village in buses.

It's a Boy

A Christian charity is sending a film about the Christmas story to every primary school in Britain after hearing of a young boy who asked his teacher why Mary and Joseph had named their baby after a swear word. The Breakout Trust raised £200,000 to make the 30-minute animated film, It's a Boy. Steve Legg, head of the charity, said: "There are over 12 million children in the UK and only 756,000 of them go to church regularly. That leaves a staggering number who are probably not receiving basic Christian teaching."

'We must learn to get out of God's way'

Church of England are like scenes from the film Groundhog Day, the Archbishop of Canterbury said last month. In a wake-up call to the Church's legislative body, Dr Rowan Williams told the 476 synod members to use their ingenuity to "get out of God's way when he is moving". He went on: "That depends a great deal on our working in a way that suggests we really do believe that God exists."

DEBATES in the General Synod of the

In his presidential address at Church House, Westminster, to the newly

elected synod, he said: "Synod may be a legislative body, it may be a sort of parliament, it may feel variously like a debating society, an amateur dramatic society, an interminable revising committee or a scene from Groundhog Day, but beyond all of this it is part of our Church's way of discerning God's purpose for us, and it is utterly meaningless if we lose sight of that."

In the film, a cynical weatherman has to relive the worst day of his life over and over until he becomes a better person.

Christian Viewpoint For Men (CVM)

One of the main reasons Lindfield URC became a member of CVM in 2004 is because CVM exists to try to equip every local church 'to introduce every man in the UK to Jesus Christ', which is clearly needed when you consider that of the 28 million men in the UK, less than 3% regularly attend Church.

CVM's Annual Conference for 2005 was at Britannia Royal Court Hotel, Coventry from 14 – 16 October, and this year as well as the writer, Alan Smith (80 years young), his son Michael & Peter Henton (Pete and Dee in fact moved to Rugby earlier this year) attended. The theme was 'A man after God's heart' and in the main sessions we were led, by 4 excellent Speakers, through the Old Testament Books of Samuel learning of David, of his calling by God, his actions/successes/failures as a husband/father, at work and as a Leader.

Additionally, there were further optional seminars Saturday afternoon and pre-breakfast prayer and praise times. The meals were first-class and allowed opportunities for the exchange of ideas with some of the other like-minded men.

Also, our emotions were stretched by a mime-artist, several moving testimonies and inevitably, with men meeting together, a good amount of humour/jokes (only one example this year of someone receiving a call on their mobile phone during one of the Sessions leading to a penalty of 10 press-ups up the front in view of everybody).

CHRISTMAS GREETINGS 2005

Had any surprises lately? I have: the totally unexpected blessing of satellite navigation in my new car (I call her Betty) - never again can I arrive late legitimately telling you I was lost! I was also surprised by overwhelmed by the kindness that has been shown throughout a year when Jess, our daughter, has been far less well than we would have wished; we are deeply grateful to so many of you - thank you.

So, yes, life is full of surprises. Some of them, of course, are grimmer than others as the personal lives of first anniversary of the tsunami that surprised us all in the most terrifying way imaginable on Boxing Day 2004. Even that horror, though, brought with it the heart-warming surprise of humankind's generous response as money was given for the rebuilding of communities and of devastated lives.

Of course, one might say it's bit sad that we are surprised by human kindness - after all, most of us know more nice people than nasty ones, don't we? But for me, the absence of surprise would be more worrying - it would suggest that we have started so to take for granted things like decency, generosity and thoughtfulness that we no longer give them the value they truly have as building blocks of a humane society.

It's not all that different with the incarnation, I think. Here is one of the core events, one of the fundamental doctrines on Christianity: that God is amongst us in the living Lord Jesus Christ, full of grace and truth. Some measure of understanding of that has been part of my life since, at the piano stool, my mother taught me 'Jesus loves me, this I know'. Every Christmas we recall it, celebrate it, contemplate how to respond to it. It's part of the warp and west of life. Yet still 'the Word made flesh' surprises me. And thanks be to God that it does. For surprise is what stirs wonder, wonder is what affords faith, and faith is what breeds hope. I hope and pray that I will never lose the surprise at the heart of Christian discipleship. It keeps my faith alive, it transforms many a disaster into a moment of opportunity, and it inspires one to remember whose the glory is.

As the United Reformed Church goes through its process of review and re-formation it seems to me that there is a tendency towards tiredness and disappointment. Even pessimism about where it will all get us to. As one of you put it to me, 'the vision is so ordinary'. And so it will be if it is rooted in our ideas, initiatives and energy levels. It's Christmas we need - every day in the church - so that we never lose our surprise, our wonderment that the Word is flesh and dwells amongst us full of the grace we need, full of the truth we crave.

So as Christmas comes round again - be surprised by the God whose we are and whom we serve; by hope for the church, hope for yourself, hope for the world, hope.

Love, Joy and Peace be yours, this Christmas and for 2006.


