Dear Friends,

June 12th is Pentecost Sunday, the Church's birthday, the day when everything began. The small group of Jesus' followers, probably no more than one hundred and twenty in all, burst out of their hiding place and began to tell the world what God had done in Christ. Until then, they had been a frightened bunch of people, trying to come to terms with Jesus' death and resurrection. On Pentecost Sunday everything changed.

Maybe you know the story. On the day of Pentecost, as they were praying, the air in the room where they were was suddenly filled with a strange kind of movement. It was as if wind was blowing indoors and fire seemed to pass from one to another. All of a sudden their fear had gone and they couldn't stay inside any more. They ran out into the street shouting because they just had to tell everyone about Jesus.

By a miracle, the barrier of language was removed and the foreign pilgrims who packed Jerusalem understood everything they said. It was quite literally pandemonium and the bystanders accused them of being drunk. Then Peter took charge. They couldn't be drunk he said, because the pubs weren't open. No! This was nothing less than the out-pouring of God's Holy Spirit, something that had been promised centuries before.

Birthday parties are great, but as we get older, they are usually celebrated with less and less enthusiasm – until we start getting telegrams from the Queen that is. This birthday is different. For Christians, every year it's an opportunity to re-discover the tremendous truth at the heart of our faith - that Jesus is alive and through His Spirit, He can fill us with power to live for Him.

Being a Christian is not easy these days. Contemporary society is less and less sympathetic to our message and atheism seems to be very fashionable. We could be forgiven for feeling a bit tired and fed-up. It's at those moments that we need to remember we've been given a birthday present and it's not something that can get lost or broken or put at the back of a cupboard and forgotten. We've been given the life of God Himself in the Holy Spirit. Every believer can tap into that life by opening

themselves to His power and influence, because Jesus promised that His Father would always give His Spirit to those who asked Him.

He also said that whoever asks, receives; whoever seeks, finds and to the one who knocks, the door will always be opened. God is so big-hearted! He never stints in His generosity. If you want a fresh share of His birthday present, you have only to ask.

What is God doing in Lindfield URC?

There's a question and a half! Since last September, when Ian Macfarlane came to lead our weekend at Walstead, things have been stirring in the fellowship. Folk have been reaching out for a deeper experience of the Holy Spirit in their lives and the Editor has asked me to put my own thoughts down in an article for this edition of Good News.

What follows is a distillation of two sermons I preached on May 8th on 1 Corinthians 12. Those sermons in themselves were part of a series which I hope to complete on Pentecost Sunday later this month. We've looked at Jesus' own teaching especially in the Last Discourses in St. John's Gospel. We've also paid some attention to the other Gospels and Acts. However, 1 Corinthians 12 contains so much of what is really important and significant in the New Testament's teaching about the Holy Spirit and that's why I've chosen to base this article on my exposition of that chapter.

An experience everyone can share

Before we go any further in trying to understand what God is doing here at Lindfield URC, we have to come to terms with something that should be at the centre of every Christian's experience.

It's been described in a number of ways – being filled with the Spirit – receiving the Spirit – being baptised in the Spirit – but they all refer to the same thing – knowing that God is at work in your life and again I stress it's an experience we can all share.

We have to keep a balance between experience and faith. We can never base faith on experience. Our faith is based on what God has done in Christ, on objective facts - the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. All the same, we cannot deny that experience has its place, because the New Testament testifies that every Christian can be filled with the Holy Spirit in a life-transforming way.

This is at the heart of what God is doing in our fellowship. He's opening the way for us all to have a deeper relationship with Him. He's showing us that we can all enjoy a new freedom in worship and a new ability to live

close to Him. So how can we claim this experience?

Jesus said that the Spirit is like the wind. We hear the sound and feel the breeze, but we don't know whence it comes or where it's going. Much as some people would like to, you can't put God in a box and tell Him to behave Himself. He will do what He wants in the way He wants. We just have to put ourselves at His disposal.

Over the weeks and especially when we looked at St. John 14 & 16, we saw how the Holy Spirit is present in every believer's life. He is the One

- Who awakens us to our need for repentance;
- Who draws us to Christ and;
- Who makes us the adopted children of God through an act of sovereign grace.

Again in St. John 14 &16, we've seen how Jesus had to go away, so that the Spirit could come and make His presence available to everyone everywhere. We've seen how He guided and led the infant Church through the Spirit and in 1 Corinthians 12 we've considered how we can all share in His gifts, strengthening and equipping the fellowship to be the Body of Christ.

So how does it work in practice?

1 Corinthians 12:3 is a key verse.

"I tell you that no one speaking by the Spirit of God says 'Jesus be cursed' and no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit."

"This is the test", says Paul. "If you want to tell a genuine experience of the Holy Spirit from a false one, Jesus has to be Lord." Then as now, the hall-mark of God's presence and power in anyone's life is whether they acknowledge the lordship of Christ and that doesn't mean just saying "Jesus is Lord". It means submitting your whole life to Him in complete surrender.

It's when we make that complete surrender that the Holy Spirit's presence and power can be released in our lives and we can share the gifts He has to give. Paul lists them later on in 1 Corinthians 12 –

- The message of wisdom which is followed by
- Knowledge a kind of special insight into what God is doing.
- Faith comes next and then
- The gift of healing.
- The power to perform miracles is followed by
- The gift of prophecy (which can also mean preaching).
- Then comes the ability to distinguish between spirits,
- And lastly come the two gifts which the Corinthians (and almost everyone else) have found irresistible –Tongues of ecstasy and the ability to interpret them.

These gifts are at the heart of what the Holy Spirit does, but they must be used in a corporate way. In other words they are for the good of the whole fellowship. They are not supposed to serve individual interests.

As a fellowship we need wisdom and knowledge and faith by the barrow-load. It would be great if our healing ministry grew and developed and that we lived so close to Christ that we were able to speak powerfully and effectively in His Name. We certainly need the protection of being able to tell which spiritual lead to follow and which to ignore and the gift of tongues can be a wonderful way for God to speak directly to His people.

Wouldn't it be fantastic if our fellowship here throbbed and pulsed with exercise of these gifts! Well, there's no reason why it shouldn't – apart perhaps from one – and that is that we don't want it to.

Perhaps we ought to take the safe way and close the door on the Holy Spirit. He won't mind will He? After all, He can give His gifts to someone else, someone who is prepared to take risks for God, someone who doesn't value security more than obedience and therein lies the challenge. Which do we value more - security or obedience?

Revive is a student-led organisation that exists to make Jesus Christ famous in the South Wales Valleys

by preaching the gospel, praying for revival and supporting local churches.

The Valleys is an area made up of 13 valleys from Swansea to Torfaen and are home to roughly 30% of the Welsh population. One hundred years ago this area was the industrial hub of Great Britain, and churches were filled with worshippers and communities were thriving. Now, however, the mines and steelworks have been closed and the Valleys have some of the highest unemployment rates in Britain. Wales has one of the lowest church attendance records in Europe, and outside of the cities and major towns the existing churches and chapels are often not evangelical in belief or practice. The Valleys also have serious socio-economic and health problems, such as high rates of depression, teenage pregnancies, drug and alcohol abuse, and heart-breaking suicide rates. The reality is that the South Wales Valleys are crying out for Jesus; He is the only answer!

Our message is simply the gospel; that Jesus Christ, God incarnate, lived a sinless life, died on a cross to take the punishment for all sin so that we can be reconciled to God, that He was raised from the dead on the third day and He ascended to heaven, where He now reigns glorified at His Father's right hand, and that He will come again to judge the living and the dead and only those who have receive Him through repentance and faith will spend eternity worshipping Him. Our goal is to see disciples of Jesus Christ made, this means not just ticking 'conversion boxes', but loving God, obeying His word, and loving others. We seek to do this through serving and working alongside the local Church.

We have been sending students to various locations in the valleys for 15 years to help run youth and children's clubs. Currently, we have 11 teams running each week with over 50 volunteers. Furthermore, every

year we take 50+ students for a two week mission to one particular community in the Valleys.

For this year's mission we are going back to Abertillery, where we send a team each week and also where we had the mission last year. The mission involves everything from youth work, kids work, street evangelism, social action projects, community fun days, discipleship and a whole lot more! We are praying for more volunteers so that God can use us all for His glory that Jesus would be made known to the people of Abertillery. People are still talking about last year, so we pray that we would be able to build on that.

I have been involved in 'revive' since fairly early in my first year at Cardiff University, and it has been so amazing to see how God is working in the Valleys. It has been heart-wrenching at times, seeing these young people growing up with little hope, and often losing the innocence of childhood, being forced to grow up too quickly. But God is shining His light in the darkness, and we have had so many encouraging stories of conversations and commitments even this last year.

Some prayer points:

- Please pray for the organisation of the mission, that we would do all things in God's strength and not our own – there is so much to do, whilst balancing exams and placement and all that uni throws at us!
- Please thank God for using our poor efforts, and please be praying that God would continue to build good relationships between the teams and churches and the young people and children we serve.
- Please pray that God would be raising up a generation of people in the Valleys who are disciples of Jesus Christ, who are passionate to see His name glorified.

Sunday Services explained....

The **9.30am service** is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. There is a crèche, and after about 20 minutes, children and young people up to age 14 go out to their own groups on most Sundays.

Coffee is served between the morning services.

Practical tips on Prayer (Part 4)

We say it all the time, don't we? "I'll pray for you." Some of us take that seriously and honour the promises we make. Then again, folk ask us to pray for them and if you are anything like me, you hope against hope that you will remember to do so. The question I want to ask this month is this – is there any point in praying for someone in trouble? Or to put it more simply, does prayer really work?

You would expect me to answer with a resounding "Yes!" And that is indeed my answer. Of course I believe in prayer, but if our intercessory prayer – praying for other people and the situations they face – is going to be effective, we have tackle some difficult problems, not least of which is the fact that sometimes God appears to say "No".

The most important of these problems is theological. Don't let that frighten you and make you throw down the church magazine in panic, complaining "Oh help! The minister is going all theological!" Prayer is communication with God and we need some ground-rules. That's bound to get a bit theological. So here's a theological question – can we alter God's mind? Clearly the answer is either yes or no and neither answer is very satisfactory.

- If the answer is yes, what has become of God's unchangeable purposes? Malachi 3:6 says "I the Lord do not change." How do we reconcile that with praying that God will stop doing what He's doing and do something else instead?
- If the answer is no, why bother to pray at all? If you can't influence a situation by praying about it, you might as well save your breath!

What does the Bible say?

• It says we should pray and not give up. In St. Luke 18, Jesus tells His disciples a parable with a very specific intention. It's about a widow who went on demanding justice from a Judge who was too lazy or corrupt to listen. In the end she got her way. St. Luke 18:1 explains Jesus' intention

"Jesus told His disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up."

That's pretty clear. Paul says roughly the same thing in Philippians 4, so we

can be sure that God wants us to pray and go on praying, but what about the problem of seeming to change His mind?

In Genesis 18, we have one of those mysterious incidents which give us a glimpse into how God's mind works. Abraham had settled temporarily close to the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. They were a by-word for immorality and God had decided to destroy them along with everyone who lived there. This caused Abraham great concern, because his nephew Lot and his family lived in Sodom, so when he was visited by an angelic deputation which turned out to be more divine than angelic, Abraham tackled God head on.

It was one thing to destroy the wicked people who lived in Sodom, but what about good people who lived there? Was God going to destroy the evil and good together? How could that be fair? And with wonderful gentle but insistent persuasion, Abraham appears to sway God's intentions to take account of as few as ten righteous people who live amongst the rest of Sodom's wicked inhabitants.

Was Abraham changing God's mind? I don't think so. I think that God was revealing his mind to Abraham.

There's a very helpful illustration which I've used sometimes in trying to explain how our prayers of intercession work. Picture a small boat which is coming into harbour. It approaches the jetty and as it gets near, a rope is thrown to haul it in.

Eventually the boat comes alongside and the rope is secured at either end – one on the boat and the other around a stanchion on the quay. Now, ask yourself this question; which has moved – the boat or the quay? Clearly the boat has moved. The jetty has stayed still because it is part of the land.

I believe it is always God's intention to heal, to bless, to protect, to help, to comfort, indeed to do anything at all which will lessen people's pain and anguish. As we pray for them, rather than we persuading God to be more loving and merciful (an impossibility anyway, because He is infinitely loving and merciful) He is drawing us closer to an understanding of His will both for us and those for whom we pray.

Just how that will is worked out may be different for different people and it may not always accord with how we want things done. Sometimes the answer

to our prayers may be "Not in that way" or "Not at this time". It may even be "No" but God always wills what is best, because that is His nature and His nature never changes. The real change takes place in us as we learn to trust God more, to be more confident in His love and care for us and those for whom we pray.

Nevertheless, it is true that sometimes situations do change. We have seen some remarkable answers to prayer in our own fellowship just lately – witness the way Mike and Jean Gardiner's son and daughter-in-law were able to join them for their Golden Wedding, inspite of problems over visas and flights from Thailand. No one knows precisely how prayer works. What we do know is that it does and that we have been commanded to pray and not give up. For now knowledge and understanding are not important. Faith and obedience count much more.

Spring Harvest Reflections – 2011 David Goodchild

We made our annual pilgrimage to Minehead this year with a sense of excitement and expectation. For the first time both children would be in the same group and Lydia and I would both be able to get to the evening sessions together. We arrived in good time and managed to get into our chalet nice and early. Zoe managed to get us all into a wonderful location, pretty near the centre of everything.

What struck me most this year was the morning bible study teaching time. We looked at the book of Malachi, only four chapters long, and the last book of the Old Testament. These sessions were lead by Gerard Kelly, co—founder of 'the bless network' and regular poet on Twitter under the name 'twitturgies'. We spent five mornings with Gerard in the big top with hundreds of others opening up this amazing book and seeing what God was saying to us today through it.



The story of Malachi ('Malachi' means 'messenger') is one of God speaking to His people. The people are not going through trauma, persecution or desperate times, it is just 'business as usual' for the

people of Israel in these days (about 430BC). They have come out of Exile, rebuilt Jerusalem and are just getting on with their lives in a time of peace. It is into this situation that Malachi speaks, challenging the priests and then the people about their half-hearted worship. The book ends with a promise that there is a greater prophet to come, one who will offer God's forgiveness to all people through repentance and faith. Gerard took us through each part of the book in the context of the Jewish people it was written for at the time and then we looked at the same passages 'through the Jesus window' which enabled us to look at them from the perspective of New Testament understanding.

One of the things that struck me most was when Jesus overturned the money changing tables in Matthew 21. The area of the temple where this happened is the court of the gentiles. This is where non Jews could come and seek the God of Israel. They were allowed no further, all they saw of the great God of Israel was the corruption, greed and extortion of the money changers. The money changers were employed by the priests, selling imperfect animals for sacrifice for extortionate prices. This was exactly what Malachi was criticising the priests for 430 years earlier. The Jews at that time were trying to 'keep God behind a wall' where only they had access. They were presenting nothing of His grace to the non-Jewish world. When Jesus overturned the tables He was announcing that this system was over and that God's love is now available to all.

The Spring Harvest experience this year taught me most of all that the bible is a truly amazing book. So often we will look at a book like Malachi and read it in ten minutes and move on. If we spend the time on it (shame we don't have an hour and a quarter for five days running every week!) we see that God has put real treasures in there for our times today.

Let's not put God 'behind a wall' where those who seek Him are put off by the image of 'the church' or the strange language we sometimes use (ecumenical eschatology anyone?). Lets show the God of love to the world around us by allowing ourselves to be transformed by our relationship with Him to show Him to the world around us.

We'll also be offering practical sessions for church leaders and those involved in leading worship. Keep an eye on our website for details as they unfold.

In the evenings, a choice of Celebrations let you encounter God with thousands of others for Spirit-filled worship and inspirational speakers. Many guests tell us these are the highlight of their week and a life-changing experience.

Bible by the Beach in Eastbourne

On the first Bank Holiday Weekend of May, a few of the church members attended the Bible by the Beach at Eastbourne — here are some thoughts on the weekend.....

It has been a privilege and a joy to be a part of Spring Harvest at Minehead, and Bible by the Beach at Eastbourne this year. Both are run along similar lines, but Eastbourne is closer and more convenient. It is a smaller venue and I chose one day out of four to attend, which provided me with excellent Bible teaching, lively worship and an evening concert led by Noel Tredinnick from All Souls.

Over the last few years circumstances have caused me to question my faith. This drove me to a spiritually dry place in which I was shutting God out of my life. The emptiness was almost unbearable. Then a Christian friend gave me a bookmark with this quotation from Psalm 37:4

"Delight thyself also in the Lord; and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart".

I knew that my desires were not necessarily God's desires for me, but the phrase "Delight thyself in the Lord..." satisfied a deep longing, so I made the effort to study the Bible every day with the help of Bible notes, and soon I developed what I can only describe as a hunger for more and more of God's word. My search for a deeper relationship with God has been helped by attending events like Bible by the Beach, where you can be in an environment which is totally focused on God, His Son Jesus, and the work of the Holy Spirit.

Bishop Wallace Benn, the main organizer of BBTB says: "What has the Church got to offer the Western world......nothing new or clever......but we have Jesus, the one who can meet the deepest needs of the human heart, in whom alone there is fullness, in whom alone there is knowledge of God, in whom alone we can find restoration."

With God's grace I have found restoration, answer to prayer, and the peace which passes all understanding.
