Dear Friends,

This year Palm Sunday falls on April 1st – All Fools' Day. That seems to me to be entirely appropriate. When He rode down the Mount of Olives to the welcoming cries of the people, Jesus knew that He was only days away from His death, but He went on without a backward glance. Who



but a fool would have done that? Surely life is precious. What's the point in throwing it away?

The Easter story is very well-known. If you go regularly to church, you will have followed in the Good Friday March of Witness and shared in the joy of the Easter greeting "Christ is risen!" many times. You will know most of the Easter hymns and you will often have heard the story of the resurrection appearances. It will all be very familiar and you know what familiarity is supposed to do – it's supposed to breed contempt. Could we ever get so used to hearing about Jesus' death and resurrection that boredom begins to set in?

I hope not, but that's why I want to smack you in the eye with this thought. Everything about the Easter story is crazy. It's all back to front. A man who knows He's going to be crucified rides calmly into the hands of His enemies. In the face of rejection, scorn and hatred, He goes on loving and forgiving. The hideous agony He has to endure, the depth of which is almost beyond comprehension, turns out to be the act which saves the world and to cap it all, in submitting to death He is able to destroy its power and open the gate of everlasting life. Have you ever heard anything so much against reason? Only a fool would act that way. Only a fool would believe it.

But that is what we are called to be – us Christians. God calls us to be fools for Christ. He wants us to love our enemies, to forgive those who hurt us, to face the kind of treatment meted out to Him and to do so with a glad and willing heart. Jesus said

"If anyone would come after Me he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for Me and for the gospel will save it." Mark 8:34-35. Those words were paraphrased by a young man who did something equally foolish. With four others he landed his aircraft on a stretch of sand in South America. They had gone there with love in their hearts to take the gospel to the indigenous people, but the people didn't understand and all the young men were killed before they had a chance to explain why they had come. His name was Jim Elliot and this is his version of what Jesus said

"He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."

"He is no fool" Jesus was no fool and neither is the man or woman who is ready to give up everything to follow Him.

Sunday Services explained....

Where there is a fifth Sunday in the month, normally a joint meeting is held at **10:30am**.

Personal prayer is available after every service. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We do not take up an offering during the services, but those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service. Thank you.

What on earth is Foodbank?

Maybe that is the question you have been asking yourself as you have heard this name start to be bandied around the church. Foodbank is a new local initiative, instigated and working across the churches of Haywards Heath. We aim to serve people who hit a crisis and need some food to tide them over a few days.

We have started to collect food from outside supermarkets (over 2 tons collected from outside Sainsbury's on 24-25th February), as people go in and leave, store and sort and then package it up into single and family sized amounts to be given out at our distribution point –that is No.9 Sussex Road, a shop front owned by the Baptist church.

How will we know who needs help? These families will be identified by front-line professional staff at job centres, health visitors, Citizens Advice Bureau, doctors, social workers – they will give a voucher we provide to the family who bring it along to No 9. Our trained volunteers then meet and greet these folk, listen if they want a listening ear, give them food, and signpost them to other agencies who can help them.

And who are our volunteers? People like you! Some of our fellowship have offered to help by registering as volunteers, either to collect food, sort in our storage space (at Kents Road church), meet people in No 9, do admin, or IT, to pray regularly, or help promote our work –there are many ways to get involved, and many people from across the churches have come forward, thank you God!

We are indebted to Lindfield URC and many other churches for the warm support, and profiling us on The Gift FM. Do pray along with us that many people realise the love of Jesus as we reach out to serve.

April Mission – Savannah Education Trust

Savannah Education Trust

The Savannah Education Trust provides an education for some of the poorest children in West Africa through the provision of Christian primary schools in northern Ghana. Registered with the UK Charities Commissioner in 2004 and publicly launched in 2005, with Trustees Paul Ramsbottom of Lindfield, together with brother Stephen and friend Howard Hickman, the Trust has seen the opening of three schools since 2006, the first in the village of Bagri in the Lawra Province of northwest Ghana. The work of the Trust is also ably administered in the UK by Karen, Paul's wife.

So, why education? In communities as poor as these, the purpose of education is not necessarily to improve job opportunities but (over time) to improve the quality of life. The education is focused both on traditional subjects like literacy, as well as on practical skills like hygiene and farming. Research shows that a primary education has a direct benefit on crop yields in subsistence farming. The rate of children surviving childhood and infancy increases dramatically when the mother has received even a basic education. This work started in an area where one child out of every four died before reaching the age of five.

There are three connected programmes: building schools, feeding pupils and training teachers.

The schools are built through a self-help programme. They are constructed by the local community, using local materials. The whole village is in no doubt that the school belongs to them. A borehole, funded by the Trust, provides clean water for the school and is also available for the villagers to use.



The Trust is working closely with government, represented by the Ghana Education Services (part of the local District Assembly). The government fund the ongoing costs of teachers. Each building project is managed by a small community committee. The schools are affiliated to the local Baptist church but are open to every child in the surrounding area, irrespective of religion. The education is free. As well as the main school building, each school has a separate nursery. This allows the older children to concentrate on their studies without having to care for their younger siblings.



The Trust is making funds available for a meal each day for pupils while they are at school. It is shocking to realise that, without this provision, village children will often miss school during the hungry (i.e. dry) season to scavenge for food (rats, mice, birds and fruits) in the bush. Children help around the home and in the fields with domestic chores and farming. A meal eases acute pressure on families, and enables parents to release children from this type of work. The cook is employed by the villagers themselves as their contribution to the programme.

Many schools, particularly in rural locations, struggle to attract qualified teachers. There is a shortage of teachers generally. This is compounded by the fact that many qualified teachers choose to work in more affluent areas of Ghana. Prospective teachers from the local area will be given scholarships to help fund their training. This will be on the understanding that, once training is completed, the teacher will return to work in Lawra District. The first teachers from this scheme have now qualified and are working in the Savannah schools. Others are undergoing training.

We are supporting Savannah again throughout April and recognise its vision and inception as being inspired by God and achievements to date as an outworking of Christian faith and love. THE WIDER WORLD

Iran

Following the news in last month's Good News of the continuing imprisonment of Pastor Yousef Nadarkhani in Iran there have been further events concerning acts against Christians across the country in the past few weeks.

Many Christians have been arrested in their own homes and workplaces, and even entire congregations have been rounded up during their time of worship. In Kermanshah authorities entered a house church and arrested all thirteen Christians present. Three are still in custody.

The Barnabas Fund, which works with persecuted Christians, said that international pressure on Iran from the West over its nuclear programme could be causing the intensification of the campaign against Christians, as they are regarded as our allies because of the misconception that Christianity is a Western religion.

Afghanistan

Women's Rights activists in Afghanistan are calling on the international community to maintain its commitment to their cause as they fear that the withdrawal of the military in 2014 could see their progress undone.

A spokesperson for Women's Activities & Social Services Association (WASSA), a partner of Christian Aid, Mrs. Hassanpur, said recently that women were afraid of losing all they had gained if their Government entered talks with the insurgents. They have achieved much over the past ten years and they don't want peace if it means losing their position in society once more. Mrs Hassanpur said that much still needs to be done and highlighted the amount of violence against women, a lack of education and health facilities.

Currently, the official Government still insists that "man are fundamental and women are secondary", and prohibit women from travelling without a man. The fear is that in 2014 the Taliban will return and conditions for women will become even worse.
