This year, on July 22nd, I will celebrate forty years in the ministry and although it's a long time ago, I can still remember almost every detail of the "Charge to the Minister" preached at my ordination. (In those days, two sermons were preached at ordinations, one to the Ordinand and the other to the Church he was going to serve.) The text of the charge to me was 2 Timothy 4:5 – Paul's words to Timothy

"As for you always be steady, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfil your ministry."

When he spoke of the work of an evangelist, the preacher said this.

"As fire exists by burning, so the Church exists by reaching out to the world. If more and more people are not drawn to Christ, just as a fire that is not replenished will go out, very soon the Church will cease to exist."

If we don't reach out to the world and bring men and women to Christ, the Church will die as it is dying slowly and painfully in so many parts of our nation today. Our mission is part – and only a part – of that attempt to reach out and draw people in. It's an opportunity to share the Gospel with our neighbours and friends, but unless we invite them, the opportunity will be completely wasted.

We have tried to target different groups by age and gender, so there is something for both the young and more mature, both for women and for men. It's up to you now to take the publicity material provided on the flyers and in "Lindfield Life" and invite as many people as possible. Apart from the events on Sunday, everything else comes with the promise of a meal, so it shouldn't be too much to ask to invite someone to come and eat!

The other essential is to pray. Take some of the prayer book-marks which Lydia Goodchild has so kindly provided. Put one in your Bible, leave another by the telephone, so that you can pray while you are bring put "on hold" by a call-centre. Pray every day that the Holy Spirit will give us courage and faith to persuade folk to come and share in the various meetings. Keep that thought of a dying fire in your mind and remember that unless we reach out and bring people in, very soon our church will go the same way.

Prayer Focus

There is a very short story in 2 Kings 13 concerning prayer. King Jehoash is



terrified that Israel is going to be overrun by the Arameans. He goes to Elisha the prophet for help. He is told to "Take a bow and some

arrows" – Elisha puts his hands on the Kings hands – then he is told to open the east window – the direction from which the enemy would come – and shoot. As he shot Elisha declares "The Lord's arrow of victory over Aram – you will completely destroy the Arameans at Aphek".

Then the sting in the tail! Elisha tells the King to take the arrows and strike the ground. He struck it 3 times and stopped. The man of God was angry with him and said, You should have struck the ground 5 or 6 times then you would have had complete victory but now you will have only partial success.

Jesus makes the same point about the necessity for persistence in prayer on more than one occasion. Are we passionate for God's kingdom?

We have a number of important events coming up in the next few months that will be successful only if they are covered with persistent prayer.

Two to highlight are the mission this month – for which prayer bookmarks and publicity are now available. If this is to be successful in bringing people to the Lord prayer is essential.

The second is the Church Weekend Away – Energise 2012 – this is the opportunity for the whole Church to spend time with the Lord together as we seek his power and vision for the future.

Other prayer items would include the newly formed housegroups, those in particular need of prayer, the recently formed food bank and other mission, national and world events.

WHAT WAS THAT AMAZING BOOK YOU MENTIONED?

Two or three people asked me what was the title of the book I recommended whilst preaching on Forgiveness a few weeks ago. If you remember, I ventured the opinion that it was the best Christian book written in the last twenty years. Well, the book is "What's So Amazing About Grace?" by Philip Yancey (Zondervan 1997), and it's nice to know that I'm not out on a limb, because ex President of World Vision, Bob Seiple, reckons it's the best Christian book he's ever read!

What's so amazing about the book, then? In my opinion, Yancey succeeds in prising the word "grace" from being a technical term in the theological textbooks and challenging us all, as individuals and churches, to exercise more of it in our walk with the Lord and with one another. He does this in his usual very readable style of drawing on examples from fact and fiction, present day and history, personal and denominational situations, with dozens of quotable quotes from Christians and non-Christians along the way. He is not afraid to crticise himself, nor to be controversial as he challenges us to think how we can contend graciously with moral issues that threaten all we hold dear.

Buy it, read it with an open mind, and ask God to help you be a more gracious Christian. Perhaps if enough of us take Yancey's message on board, we shall see a revolution of grace in our church.

From Youth Assembly, our Youth Exec has learnt that we must keep in contact with other synods, if we are to grow. I was rather amazed at the effort Wessex synod put in each year. For example, they have a summer camp each year, which would be very good if our synod could run in the future.

THE WIDER WORLD

Iran

I have written before about Youcef Nadarkhani, a Pastor from Iran, who has been held in prison since October 2009 for attempting to evangelise among Muslims. He was sentenced to death by Iran's Supreme Court and the case was then passed to Ayatollah Ali Khamenei for review.

Although Khamenei's verdict was due by the end of 2011, a statement was released in mid-December postponing the verdict for at least four months - maybe even a year.

The United States of America, the EU, Gt. Britain, France, Germany and Mexico have all condemned Iran's continuing imprisonment of Nadarkhani, arguing that the country is in direct violation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Although Iran signed the Declaration in 1948, their present Judiciary Chief claims that this was a mistake and that Iran would continue to impose Sharia Law.

This does not bode well for Youcef Nadarkhani who remains in prison with the threat of a death sentence hanging over him. Despite all this, he still holds true to his profound belief in Jesus.

Burma

The release of 651 prisoners has been hailed by Christians as a "positive and significant sign of progress" in Burma. The prisoners include political dissidents involved in the student movement in1988 and monks who took part in the 2007 demonstrations against the military regime. Those released included Min Ko Naing, a prominent leader of the failed 1988 uprising , who spent more than twenty years in prison.

Christian Solidarity Worldwide urged the Burmese Government to release all remaining political prisoners, and called for an end to other human rights violations in the country including forced labour, torture, religious persecution and the use of human minesweepers.

We pray that President Thein Sein will continue to establish genuine peace and freedom in Burma.

March Mission Giving – Project Ruth - Romania

We will be devoting our mission giving this month to Project Ruth in Romania. The Project was started some years ago by Oti Bunaciu, a Baptist Minister and many will still remember his visit to us a few years ago with a mandolin band.

Project Ruth gives life-changing educational opportunities to poor children, especially from Roma (Gypsy) communities.

For hundreds of years Gypsies have been living on the margins of society and are still the victims of persecution and suffering. Project Ruth was started in Bucharest, Romania, following the collapse of communism as a response to the desperate situation of the poorest of the poor in Eastern Europe.

Gypsies are almost always outsiders wherever they live. Their distinct culture, traditional clothing and itinerant lifestyle have made them the object of suspicion and discrimination in many countries. Gypsy communities are almost invariably subject to all of the problems associated with acute poverty – illiteracy, unemployment, lack of access to health care, high crime rates and low life expectancy.

Project Ruth is working to transform Roma communities and the lives of Roma children by providing:

- * Education
- * School meals
- * Vocational training
- * The Good News of hope
- * Literacy programmes
- * Medical and hygiene support
- * Humanitarian aid

Ruth School

The main focus of the work is the Ruth School in the poor Bucharest suburb of Ferentari. This is where Project Ruth began as an outreach to Roma children through a Sunday school and day centre in 1992. This initiative was undertaken by Providence Baptist Church.

What began as a Sunday School programme was extended to a day centre and soon evolved into a literacy class when it was realized that most of the children could neither read or write and had never been to school before. Since many of these children were already approaching their early teens, they had no chance whatsoever of enrolling in a regular school programme. At that time, the education system simply didn't recognize that an illiteracy problem existed. Anybody who failed to make it to school at the right age (7 years old back then, subsequently changed to 6) had nowhere to go: no special projects, no adult literacy classes, and no educational recovery programmes. After a few years, the literacy class was registered as a primary school and, soon, Fundatia Providenta provided the institutional form which now is the Ruth School. The Ruth School has Ministry of Education approval and is now an accredited private day school for poor and disadvantaged children with around 200 on its roll.

Building on the success of the Ruth School, the work is expanding through day centres and literacy classes in other parts of Romania. These centres are helping dozens of children to stay in school or to find a way back into the education system.

Humanitarian concern

This is the first initiative of Project Ruth's involvement to answer the needs of children from Roma (Gypsy) community. Project Ruth began by feeding children from the neighbourhood. Starting with just a sandwich, a soup kitchen soon developed to offer a hot meal every day to the children who were enrolled in the programme. It has now developed into a charity programme, which offers clothes and footwear. All these achievements have been made possible because of the constant support offered by our sponsors and partners.

Wellness

The wellness program aims to improve the well-being of children in need through hygiene & medical programmes that teach and provide basic medical care. Tooth brushing, hand washing, parasite control and vaccination are among the ongoing efforts of the wellness programme.

Community development – Gipsy Smith School

Since its initial start in 1997 over 120 Gypsy pastors, missionaries, and community leaders have been trained while over 60 students have "graduated with honours" and continue to serve faithfully in their churches and communities.

This approach has seen crime fall and fresh hope brought to some of the bleakest parts of the UK.

The launch in Mid Sussex which took place at the Triangle Centre, Burgess Hill, is initially based around the Burgess Hill area but many from Churches in Lindfield are supporters of this vision. For more information contact David or Carol Walters.

CHURCH MEETINGS - Why do we have them?

Unless you are one of the fifty or so people who attend, you may well ask the question "What happens at a Church Meeting and what is its purpose?" I'll try to tell you as I see it.

It is a meeting of the Church family. It begins with a short devotional time. Then follows news of church family members, and a time to pray for one another. Perhaps the main purpose of the Church Meeting is to discuss matters of Church business. This includes things going on here in Lindfield URC (either currently or in the future), and in the wider Church. We hear about the activities among our Children and Young People; the work being done on our behalf by the Managers who look after the Church premises and information about Mission and Outreach activities, and, of course, the Church's finances. On the agenda at every meeting is 'Members Time' – an opportunity for anyone to bring to our notice concerns or events in which they are involved. From time to time we have 'Buzz groups' when we break into small groups to discuss a specific topic. (This is intended to be a time for encouragement rather than a time to moan!).

Another vital function of Church Meeting is to make decisions, such as the election of Elders and to appoint the Secretary and Treasurer, and this is usually done at the Annual General Meeting in November. Of course attendance at these meetings is even more important during a pastoral vacancy. It is the Church meeting that is responsible for the calling of a new Minister.

Anyone connected with the church is welcome to attend Church Meetings, but of course, only members are eligible to vote. That brings me to another point. If you have been worshipping with us for some time and feel that LURC is your spiritual home, have you considered becoming a member? Our Pastor, Charles Martin, would be delighted to hear from you if you would like to find out more.

For me as a member, attending church meeting has always been important and very much part of my responsibility. (I've been to a good few since joining the church back in the early '60s). Currently only around a third of our membership come regularly on the second Thursday of the month. I realise that some are unable to come because of advancing years, poor health or family commitments. But here is the challenge: that in 2012 more folk will come along to the monthly meetings.
