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Dear friends

Can you pick a lock? TV detectives do it all the time. It needs a certain skill, but unless you possess it, you're stumped. It's a bit like that when you try to share the Gospel.

One of the drawbacks of having been a Christian for a long time is the fact that most of your friends are Christians too. Very rarely do Christians have a wide circle of non-Christian friends and that's a shame. You see the most effective way to share our faith is to make friends and share it with them. If all your friends are Christians already, you have a problem.

I'm not boasting, but on three mornings a week, I go to the gym. One of the byproducts of this self-inflicted torture is that I meet lots of non-Christians and over the weeks, I've got to know some of them quite well. This is my chance. Here are some captive non-Christians. They like me. They laugh at my jokes. I even get to know what they do for a living and the names of their children, so very gingerly I introduce into the Christianity conversation. Immediately I hear the door slam, the keys turn and the bolts slide into place. I feel just like someone on the wrong side of a locked door and there's nothing I can do to open it.

How do we solve this problem? Well, first of all, we must stop feeling guilty. Paul tells us in second Corinthians 4 that "the god of this world has blinded the minds of unbelievers." However, that doesn't let us off the hook, because the Bible also promises that when we share God's word, it will not return empty. It will accomplish His purpose, so the second thing to remember is don't give up!

The third and most important thing to hold on to, is that although we cannot unpick the lock of the human heart, the Holy Spirit can, so the most effective thing we can do is pray that He will. There you have it – a simple strategy for reaching non-Christians.

- Make friends with them and tell them, as simply as you can, what the Lord Jesus has done for you.
- Don't be discouraged when they don't want to listen. Sooner or later, another opportunity will come to share your faith.
- Pray that the Holy Spirit will find a way of picking the lock and opening the door that seems fast shut.

We have two wonderful opportunities to get alongside folk coming up soon – Bonfire Night and Late Night Opening (or Village Night) when the church will be open and full of hordes of people who don't know Jesus as their Saviour. Even if just one gets a better understanding of what we believe, it will be worth it.

Compton House

n November 1992 Compton House Nursing Home was established by a committee of individual members of the three Lindfield Churches when the Home was purchased from Mr and Mrs Blake, who wished to retire.

Later in 1996, Little Compton was purchased from Abbeyfield Lindfield providing sheltered accommodation for nine residents and together they are now known as Lindfield Christian Care Home.

Over the past twenty years, Compton House has been extended and is now registered to provide nursing care for 27 residents. Earlier this year, Little Compton became registered with the Care Quality Commission to provide personal care if required.

A high standard of care has continued throughout the 20 years and on the latest inspection the Home was awarded an 'Excellent' rating by the Care Quality Commission.

The Aim of the Home from the outset has been "To meet the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of all the residentswhether they are members of the Lindfield Churches or from the community at large – who have made Compton House their home". Over the years it has been a great joy and cause for thanksgiving to have seen so many enjoy and benefit from both Compton House and Little Compton. Although there has never been any formal or financial involvement with the three churches, individuals in these congregations have and do support Lindfield Christian Care Home through prayer, giving, volunteering and serving as Trustees.

We pray for the next 20 years and beyond, that this work which the Lord has inspired will continue to meet the needs of each resident and always be to His glory

When I retired I moved to Joan Nightingale House in Haywards Heath so I transferred my church membership to Haywards Heath U.R.C and still served as an Elder there.

My health started to fail in 2009 and I realised that I was beginning to need

24 hour care. Fortunately a room became available at Compton House in January 2012 and I moved in.

Compton House is so very caring. The staff are lovely and everything I need is well taken care of. I have learnt to paint, pat a dog (Lucy), exercise.

Attend lovely Sunday services in the lounge and have made lots of new friends.

The entertainment is lovely and I have been on two enjoyable outings.

The food is excellent like a 5 star hotel.

There is a lovely Christian atmosphere here and I feel I am now back home.

God has been so good to me.

Josh Thomas Writes… e have had a very good start back to zest this term and have done things such as a challenge night and have been on a trip out to laser quest which was a really fun trip! Our numbers have been good and at this time last year, we had a large number of boys and not many girls attending, this however seems to have changed and we now have about 25 young people coming along and a good mix of genders!

We have been taking the young people through a 'Christianity Explored Course' and have currently done two of these sessions, which have seemed to go down pretty well.

We really value all of your prayers and encourage you to keep doing so! We would really be grateful if you could pray for the sucess of our Christianity Explored Course, our leaders, the young people and our programme.

Local schools

As Youth Pastor my role includes working very closely with the local schools, this has been fun and a good opportunity to reach out into the community.

I thought I would write a short update on some of the things I am currently doing in the various schools.

Lindfield Primary School and Blackthorns

I am still very involved in the schools assembly team at both of the two schools. We do assemblies every week at both schools and aim to teach the children about Jesus' love for them in a fun and energetic way. It normally consists of reading a bible story to them in an interactive way and then singing a song (actions always go alongside this!) and then we say a prayer together.

Oathall Community College

Over the last two years a team of youth workers from the local area, have taken over running the Christian Union at the school

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I have been very involved in this team since the start. We go into the school every Wednesday lunch time, when we generally get up to about thirty young people, aged between eleven and sixteen coming every week.

We have recently started a study of the parables. The sessions usually start with a game and then we split into groups, to study the bible passage and always end the session praying together, for each others week and any concerns or needs that the students have.

Warden Park School and Great Walstead School.

I have been involved in both of these schools on a more ad-hoc basis over the past two years. I have been a part of a Christian organisation who teach Religeous Education lessons, on the subject of 'Relationships and Christian views on this'. We have done regular Religeous Education lessons at Warden Park and I get the occasional week in every term that is jam packed doing these!

My involvement at Great Walstead has included helping them to run their Christian Union. We looked at the identity of Jesus and what that meant to the young people.

As you can see, so much of the work I have been doing in schools, has been incredibly varied which has been a great challenge. I love going into all of the schools and seeing familiar faces from Boys Brigade and Zest. We have found that young people I have worked with in the schools, are now coming along to our own church groups, which has been fantastic!

Please keep praying for our local schools and all of these different aspects of kingdom work that is going on.

World News

Pakistan

A few weeks ago, a Christian church was destroyed in Mardan, near Peshawar, Pakistan, when thousands of people stormed the compound. They burnt down the church and ruined the homes of two priests and the head teacher of the church school.

The Bishop of Peshawar, Humphrey Peters is asking Christians to pray as the damage was very severe and much equipment at the school was destroyed including five newly installed computers. Fortunately no one was hurt during the attack, but it is feared that relations between communities will be further damaged.

The Moderator of the Church of Pakistan, the Most Reverend Samuel Azariah is calling on the government and faith leaders to provide the lead in preventing further attacks.

Sudan

Barnabas Fund, an organisation which supports persecuted Christians worldwide, is airlifting Christians from Sudan amid tensions following the predominantly Christian South Sudan gaining independence last year.

So far around 500 Christians have been flown to safety in an operation to rescue some 2,000 women and small children trapped in the north. Many have made their own way to South Sudan, but for others the journey is too arduous and it is believed that many thousands are still at great risk and the Barnabas Fund hopes to move the most vulnerable.

There is growing concern for Christians in Sudan as President Omar al-Bashir intends to strengthen Sharia law in his country and the Barnabas Fund is appealing for donations to support the ongoing airlifts. **Carol Marsh**

Silent retreat St. Cuthmans Coolham

Misgivings began to assail me as the date for the two day silent retreat drew near. How would I cope with the silence? How could I not chat to the three others of the group over coffee? What if I got the giggles --- how should I behave?

All of my fears melted away when we arrived and were shown round. The elegant house with its sense of calm gentleness pervading soon melted all of my fears.

I knew that GOD wanted to engage with me there; and He dealt quite firmly through Exodus chapter 34 verses 1-11a. He caused me to revisit the undeniable fact that He is holy. He is so holy as to be almost unapproachable. Only by the bridge of Jesus' dying on the cross can I be sufficiently cleansed and commune with Him. The reassurance that He is always available for me is breath-taking! Wonderful.

The patron saint Cuthman was born in 681 in Chidham near Bosham. His parents were shepherds, and his father died whilst Cuthman was young. Life became even harder for them when his mother was no longer able to walk. Cuthman felt he had to seek exactly where GOD would have him serve; and took to wandering the countryside for his destiny to be revealed. He took his mother with him seated in a singlewheeled cart [like a wheelbarrow]. One day the rope which Cuthman had put round his neck to help bear the weight snapped whilst they were in Steyning. Cuthman took this set-back as an omen from GOD that he should stay and preach and serve there.

Whilst building the church the largest roof timber was very heavy for the villagers to place correctly. The legend says that a stranger drew near and offered to assist saying " I am He in whose name you are building this church."

Saint Cuthman's Retreat Centre is a haven of calm. The house is panelled in dark oak in the entrance hall and the large library, and furnished with inviting easy chairs, and Persian carpets laid on polished wood floors. Comfort and well-being are actively present in the sunny lounges and spacious bedroom suites. All four of us had splendid views of the gardens and lake from the writing-desk position directly placed in front of the windows of our rooms. We could sit and look out at the verdant scene and let "the I AM" seep into us.

Twice daily there are short acts of worship held in the chapel. This is a modern building which adds to one's worship by its very simplicity. The minimalistic decor of a communion table made of rustic wood plus the uninterrupted vista through the large plate-glass window behind it of the natural gardens all culminate in a praise-filled space in which to worship. Amazing: especially at night with the lighting effects amongst the trees adding to the wonder ! Each participant was made to feel special as our names were included in the service by the leader who sat behind us, unseen.

The two day visit was over only too quickly for the four very thankful people.

Olympics Legacy

A quarter of a year has already passed since the London 2012 Olympics began! For some they are a distant and rapidly fading memory, but for those of us lucky enough to attend any of the events I am sure that the memory is much stronger and overwhelmingly positive. Everyone will have a very different set of memories, a personal legacy, of these London games.

I have many of my own to treasure: the Olympics volunteers welcoming us so

warmly, everywhere!; seeing Bolt jog his way to victory in a qualifying 200m race; actually finding a game of basketball (not my favourite sport) nail-bitingly exciting; enjoying special time with my family; even queuing cheerfully in Britain's largest McDonalds!

The Paralympics swimming session I saw was particularly inspiring – one competitor with no legs and just one arm swam as fast as I can with all four limbs! It was not just his being able to compete



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that was inspiring, but having the mental strength to get up each morning and want to compete when you think of all the difficulties faced on a daily basis. It makes any of my "struggles" seem rather pathetic!

What about the legacy for our country? After the Olympics' closing ceremony, the Bishop of Chelmsford, the Rt Rev Stephen Cottrell whose diocese includes the Olympic Park, praised the Games for their positive impact on community life. He said that in addition to the regeneration of a deprived area of East London, "



...I am beginning to wonder whether the Olympic legacy may bring a further change as well: a legacy of good will. This is an Olympic legacy worth holding onto: the desire to serve my neighbour and the desire to celebrate with my neighbour. It is with these things that communities are built,".

Figures just released reveal the contribution made by UK churches to the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games to be 'the largest ever', including over 13,000 hours of voluntary service to travellers from a team of 300 Games Pastors at major

rail stations, airports, and key tourist sites.

Elsewhere, family members of athletes from more than 20 countries enjoyed more than 2,000 nights of free hospitality and an estimated 500,000 people attended community events run by churches. David Willson, CEO of More Than Gold, whose mission was to enable the UK churches to engage with the Games, said, "This is by far the largest contribution from churches to any Olympics. It has been a very positive experience for the churches themselves.

Many have been seen in a new light by their communities, now have a new sense of confidence, and are experiencing more people taking an interest in what they offer."

As the 2012 Games drew to a close, More Than Gold, hosted the inaugural Legacy Award breakfast in honour of Fric Liddell. winner of 400m gold and 200m bronze medals for GB at the 1924 Paris Olympics. Liddell was known for his strong Christian faith, withdrawing from the 100m because it was scheduled on a Sunday. As the Guardian reported, "Liddell has already decided that the race he has chiefly to run in the world is not on the cinder track". The Fric Liddell Award honours one male and one female Olympian who display outstanding character at home, in their community and on the field of competition.

The female athlete honoured was British rower Debbie Flood, Olympic silver medallist in 2004 and 2008, who said, "Eric Liddell was a great man of faith and an example of an ambassador of God both in and outside sport. God has given me the gifts and abilities that I have and I have tried to use them to the best of my ability while also sharing my faith through how I play my sport on and off the water."

The male recipient was the 2008 Olympic decathlon gold medallist from the USA, Bryan Clay who said, "It's a huge award, it means a lot to me that people think that what I do off the track is worthy of praise. My faith plays a huge role in my life and it's amazing that somebody recognizes that."

After the 1924 Olympics, Eric Liddell went to China as a missionary, saying, "We are all missionaries. Wherever we go we either bring people nearer to Christ or we repel them from Christ.". In 1943 he was interned in a Japanese POW camp, where he died in 1945, just four months before the end of World War II. His eldest daughter, 77 year old Patricia Liddell Russell said, "He was a wonderful dad and it's great the award is given to these athletes because there's more to winning gold than winning gold."

What a wonderful legacy and it is so encouraging to see athletes today with the same love for God!

Gems from James

n his series on the Letter of James, the Pastor has been banging on about the fact that Martin Luther didn't like it. The reason for this is that before he began to preach on it, he shared Luther's opinion. It seemed to be full of hectoring admonitions about being better Christians and not much else. That was a great mistake.

Here are two verses which Charles has emphasised and which give a completely different feel to the letter.

Chapter 1 and verse 21

"Therefore get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you."

The implication is clear. We have to clean up our act, but it's not something we have to do by ourselves. As believers, implanted in our hearts is "the word which can save you". What James is talking about is the activity of the Holy Spirit in every believer's life, convicting of sin, encouraging repentance and nurturing holiness.

Chapter 3 and verse 17

"But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure, then peace loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere."

What a wonderful description of Christian conduct! Wouldn't you love to be that sort of person? Well, you can be! If you love Jesus, implanted in your heart is the "word which can save you". Don't make the mistake Luther made and think that James is just there to make you feel guilty. Actually, properly understood, it's one of the most encouraging books in the whole of the New Testament!

Memorial

This year is the 90th. Anniversary of the dedication of our village War Memorial, & as usual the Royal British Legion will read the names of those who did not return. There are many tales of tragedy, endurance & heroism endured by these men. Here are just a few.

The Newnham family from Compton Road lost four sons, three in the first war & one in the second. Alfred (Totty) Newnham was severely wounded at Troyon with the Royal Sussex and died in hospital in Paris, John was lost at Jutland serving with the Royal Marine Artillery on the Battle cruiser 'Tiger', and 16 year old Noel, who was a Royal Marine bugler serving on the dreadnought 'Vanguard' was lost with over 800 shipmates when the ship blew up at anchor in Scapa Flow.

Harold Percy Newnham was a merchant seaman on SS 'Ceramic' when the passenger ship was torpedoed by U 155 in the Bay of Biscay. All the passengers and crew got away in the life boats, but a violent storm swamped the boats and all 655 men, women and children were drowned.

Reginald Legge from High Beeches Lane was one of the first tank commanders. On September 15th 1916 at Flers, his tank 'D6' was leading the way before it was knocked out by German artillery

Reg was taken prisoner but died of his wounds the following day.

Our village doctor Dr.Fitzmaurice lost three sons, Lindsey at the battle of Loos, Richard on

the Somme, & Alexander, who died of disease in a remote corner of British Somaliland.

The Mason brothers John, Raymond and Sidney do not appear on our Memorial but they were all Lindfield lads, born in Lindfield and attended the village school. Their father was John Mason proprietor of the Bent Arms and fly carriage operator. Just before the war they were all living in Worthing, consequently their names are all included on the Worthing War Memorial

Tom Pranklin (from the shoe shop)and Joe Whall were lost serving with the Royal Sussex during the Suvla Bay landings on Gallipoli in 1915

Albert Prodger and Wilfred Boyes had the misfortune to be taken prisoner by the Japanese at Singapore and were either murdered or starved to death in captivity. In September 1944 Cyril Boston of the Irish Guards got married on Saturday but was recalled on the Monday. His wife Joan never saw him again as he was lost during the Arnhem operations in Holland.

Harold Tingley was from Scaynes Hill, but by 1918 lived in 3 Eastern Cottages. He served for four years on the Western Front with the 8th. Royal Sussex and was severely gassed. He took part in the 1919 Victory parade, but died of influenza in September. Sadly despite requests from his wife Emily, his name was never included on either Memorial.

He is buried in Walstead Cemetery. Let it be then, that on this day they be 'freshly Remembered' **Chris Comber**
