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Dear friends

With Easter behind us, we could feel a sense of anti-climax. It's great to rejoice that Jesus conquered sin and death, but the celebrations have got to end sometime. Then it's back to the "same old same old" and how boring is that! If you are ever tempted to feel that life is just a repetition of the same old routine, let me remind you that the best festival of the Christian Year is just around the corner – Pentecost – the day it all began.

The Disciples had said a final "goodbye" to Jesus and He had told them to go back to Jerusalem and wait. They did as they were bid, spent most of the time worshipping in the Temple and gathering together to wait - just that. He had told them to wait and obediently they waited.

Of all the things God asks us to do, I think waiting is the hardest. We want our prayers to be answered now. We want to solve the problems now, but Jesus is quite specific. We have to wait. Why? Because what He has in store will blow our minds. The truth of Pentecost is that the power that helped the first Christians turn the world upside down is available to us too. Life for a Christian need never be boring again.

When something wonderful happens, there's always a danger of someone feeling left out and I want to say a word to Christian people who feel they've never shared in what the New Testament calls the "Baptism of the Holy Spirit" and because of that they feel second class. Who is the Holy Spirit? He's God in our midst. He's the Spirit of Jesus, reminding us of His teaching, encouraging, challenging, strengthening and equipping us for His service. The New Testament also speaks about the gifts He gives – wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing etc: (You'll find them in 1 Corinthians 12 and there's another list in Romans 12.) The problem comes when someone wants so much to be filled or baptised with the Spirit, but they feel it's never happened for them.

No one who truly loves Jesus Christ and wants to live for Him should ever feel second class. He wants us all to be filled with His Spirit, but it's going to be a different experience for everyone. He told Nicodemus that when He reminded him that the wind (or the Spirit) blows where it wills. You hear it, but you don't know where it's come from or where it's going.

Do you want to be filled with the Spirit? Then admit your emptiness. Come with open hands and accept what God has to give. It's not about feelings. It's about facts. Don't try to copy what God is doing with other people. What He does with you will be unique because you are unique. If you ask, you will receive. If you seek, you will find.

Bible Insects

What's in a name ? the "St Mark's fly"

∧ Ithough insects are mentioned in the Bible numerous times, especially in the Old Testament, there are surprisingly few insects which have common names associated with Biblical characters or themes. Everyone is familiar with ladybird beetles, small domed, almost hemi-spherical spots of red, yellow or brown on our garden plants, usually covered themselves with spots. The name originated in Britain as "Our Lady's bird" or "Lady beetle", the "Lady" being Mary, Mother of Jesus. Mary is often depicted in paintings wearing a red cloak, similar in colour to our most common ladybird, grandly called Coccinella septempunctata or, less grandly, the seven-spot (= septumpunctata) ladybird. The seven spots on the back of this beetle were said to symbolise the seven joys and seven sorrows of Mary. In other European languages there are similar associations, e.g., the German name is "Marienkäfer", which translates to "Marybeetle". At the opposite end of the spiritual spectrum is another common insect, the "Devil's coach-horse", a black beetle that lurks under logs and stones during the day but emerges at night to hunt other insects and invertebrates, including slugs. So, despite the name and aggressive appearance when disturbed - it opens its jaws wide

and arches its tail end in a scorpion-like manner – it is actually a friend to the gardener.

Perhaps the most spiritual insects are the "praying mantids"; indeed the most common species in Europe is called Mantis religiosa. Unfortunately we do not find them in England, but anyone who has been to the south of France or further afield will recognise them. Their attention to a prayerful posture for long periods could teach us a thing or two with regard to prayer and they would be an appropriate symbol of the 24-hour prayer initiative. Whether or not they are actually praying for their "daily bread" I don't know, however their prayerful posture certainly does deliver their food, not so much bread as a juicy fly!

The St Mark's fly, Bibio marci, is probably the least well known of our British insects with a name of Biblical origin. However, if you are lucky and the weather is sunny, you should be able to spot many if you take a country walk straight after reading this article! The St Mark's fly is so called because it first appears each year on or around St Mark's day, 25th April. With the exceptionally cold and late Spring this year, I expect that the appearance of the flies will have been delayed by a few days. The hairy, black adults live for about a week, so there should still be some



active for you to find in early May. They are widespread, but a good place to spot them is along the River Ouse Valley and the accompanying photographs were taken on 27th April 2011 just downstream of the spectacular Balcombe Viaduct - so you can combine an archaeological and entomological walk, spot the WWII pill box too, just upstream of the viaduct on the north bank! The most noticeable behaviour of these flies is the mating flight of the males. They hover at and above head height and bob up and down in a dance-like flight that is all about attracting a female. The males have large eyes with which to spot females, which

they will pursue, and rival males, which they will chase away. Their long legs hang down in flight in a very distinctive manner and so, with outstretched wings, they resemble a myriad of tiny flying crosses. St Mark's symbol is a winged lion and, although not guite so impressive, these small winged crosses are an appropriate recipient of his name. The flies are around all year, but most of the time we do not see them because they are in the form of maggot-like larvae, which feed on decaying organic matter and grass roots, so very occasionally they can be a pest of lawns. The adults make up for this by pollinating fruit trees and other crops.

Many people can be somewhat disturbed by the large numbers of these flies, but they are completely harmless and it is one of the simple pleasures of a late Spring day to lie down in the fresh grass and gaze up at the mesmerising flight of so many small miracles of life, silhouetted against a blue sky, making the most of their brief adult life – try it and see!

Ascension Day

The highlight of this month is Pentecost, but how much do we dwell on Ascension Day, celebrated just 10 days earlier, this year on Thursday, May 9th? Unlike our friends in the Anglican and Roman Catholic traditions, it's not our custom to mark the day with a special service, but we should not overlook the significance of Jesus' ascension to heaven, just 40 days after his resurrection, and recounted in Acts 1v1-11. But what does this mean for us in 2013?

Jesus has been "exalted to the right hand of God" proclaimed Peter at Pentecost. The Apostle Paul added that Jesus is "seated at God's right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion." This means that we have security in an insecure world, because Jesus reigns in heaven and is King and Lord in all our circumstances, so that nothing can afflict us without his permission

2 During his ministry on earth, Jesus could only be at one place and time, but ascended now to heaven, he has poured out his Holy Spirit, enabling each one of us to know his presence as we serve him on earth.

3 The ascended Christ is Head of the Church, and gives gifts of the Spirit, anointing us with power and authority to be his body on earth.

We have Jesus' authority to preach the Gospel. When Jesus proclaimed his authority, he added "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations."

5 We have comfort in our suffering, knowing that we have a great high priest who has experienced human life, with its joys and sorrows, and is praying for us in heaven

6 Jesus' ascension embodies the promise of his return to this earth. We have a glorious hope, as we look forward, firstly, to being taken home to be with Jesus in heaven, then to Christ's return from heaven and the establishment of God's eternal kingdom in a new heaven and new earth

So let us exult with Frances Ridley Havergal as we celebrate Ascension Day:

 He who came to save us, He who bled and died now is crowned with glory At his Father's side. Nevermore to suffer, nevermore to die; Jesus King of Glory Is gone up on high.

May Mission

Throughout May we are again supporting the work of the Savannah Education Trust, a Christian Charity (Registered Charity No 1104896) registered in July 2004 by Lindfield resident Paul Ramsbottom, his brother Stephen and friend Howard Hickman and publicly launched in February 2005, to provide an education for some of the poorest children in West Africa. The work in Ghana is managed by Charles Karbo, son of the paramount chief of the Lawra area in NW Ghana and pastor of the Bagri Baptist Church who is assisted on a permanent basis by Alfred Sogsuo, deacon of the local Baptist Church, and also by others.

Savannah Education Trust

From small beginnings in 2003 when the Trustees first visited northern Ghana, the story of the Savannah Education Trust has been an inspiring and remarkable one, with the opening of the first school in Bagri in 2006, accompanied by programmes to feed the pupils each day and to train teachers. Since that time further schools have been opened in neighbouring villages of Pavuu, Gberi and most recently in Mettoh. Without the initiative of Savannah and the accompanying support of the Government of Ghana and local elders, children were often malnourished, poorly clad and many had to work and hunt for food at an early age. It is a shocking statistic that in this part of NW Ghana one child in four died before his or her fifth birthday. In neighbouring Burkina Faso, the poverty and culture of which were reflected in the area around Bagri, just 13% of adults could read and life expectancy was 47 years.



In communities as poor as these, the purpose of education is not necessarily to improve job opportunities but (over time) to improve the quality of life. The education is focused both on traditional subjects like literacy, as well as on practical skills like hygiene and farming. Research has shown that a primary education has a direct benefit on crop yields in subsistence farming. The rate of children surviving childhood and infancy increases dramatically when the mother has received even a basic education.

The Trust's Spring 2013 Newsletter is posted up in the Missions Display Area in the church concourse and shares news from a recent visit to Ghana by the Trustees. Ouch! Scorpions invade during the construction of the school buildings at Mettoh. Good news at the arrival of Alfred and Lydia's first child, Alan, and great sadness as one of the Gberi students died after a long illness. 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Sound Seminar

Can you hear me at the back?

Welcome to this, the second in a short series of articles looking at the work of the technical team in the church. Last month we looked at what the sound operator does to prepare for the 9.30 service and got as far as the start of the service itself. This month, we'll look at the role of the sound operator in the service.

During the service, the sound system doesn't only drive the PA speakers in the church. It also feeds the recorder from which we produce CDs of the services and upload the sermon to the Internet, and the loop system which is used by hearing aid wearers.

The loop is literally a loop of wire laid around the church at floor level. This produces a magnetic signal which is picked up by a small coil of wire in the wearer's hearing aid. This enables wearers to hear a much clearer output from the PA system than they otherwise would. The system is set up so that the music group are much louder than those speaking in the church itself, so that they can still be heard over the congregation singing. This would be annoying for loop users and CD listeners, so the levels there are much closer. Also, these signals contain the sound of the congregation so that it is the sound of the congregation singing rather than just the group which is heard on the CD. The system has been designed so that if the levels in church are correct. then the levels fed to the recorder and loop should also be correct.

So, we're ready for the service to start, and watching for the nod from the worship leader to indicate he's ready. We then fade out the music that's playing before the service; reduce the level of the congregation mics; start the recorder; check that the leader has turned on their radio mic, and fade it up.

Throughout the service, the sound operator will then have two main focuses:

Firstly, the practical.

The operator will be watching what is happening at the front of the church, ensuring that they are ready to bring up the microphones as needed, for what is going to happen next. This generally means thinking half a step ahead of where the service is at because you need to ensure the microphone is on for the start of the person speaking rather than half way through the first sentence. The operator will also be checking the various indicators on the sound equipment to ensure everything is running ok and marking off the different parts of the service on the recorder ready to be converted into tracks on the CD. They will

also be listening, to ensure that levels are ok, and that there isn't any feedback or other gremlins creeping into the sound, and when the group is playing continually checking that the balance of the group is correct.

Secondly, the spiritual.

As we gather together on a Sunday, in the words of the Matt Redman song: 'it's all about You, Jesus'. In the same way that the music group has a responsibility for the worship of the whole congregation, so too does the sound operator. As the service progresses, therefore, they need to be aware of where God's Spirit is leading, to ensure that anything they do will enhance the worship for the congregation, not cut across it. It can be a simple thing like not dropping the level of the music group when the congregation wants to crescendo, or vice versa, or leaving a mic up and getting feedback just as the congregation are moving into a time of quiet. Worst of all is to do something which results in 50 heads craned round and 50 pairs of eyes looking up at you in the balcony. Not 'the worst' because of the embarrassment, but because if everyone is looking at the sound operatorat that point the congregation's focus is on you and not on Jesus, so you have got in the way of worship not enhanced it.

So, hopefully, we get to the end of the service without any obvious mistakes and it is now time to quickly pack away any equipment not required for the second service, and ensure everything is reset, and then hand over the reins to whoever is on duty for that service. Next month we'll look at what happens during the week, including how the sermon gets on the Web.
