

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Dear friends

As I sit at the computer typing this letter the rain is pouring down outside (nothing new there), many places are flooded, people are without electricity, major rail routes have been damaged and many are longing to get back to some normality.

I must admit, as someone who worked all hours for many weeks on getting the power system up and running following the 1987 storm, I have some sympathy with the staff at agencies and utilities and think some of the criticism is a bit unfair, although my ex-work colleagues and I don't think they are making such a good job of it as we did! And, of course, my heart goes out to those whose homes have been under water for weeks and for the farmers whose fields are unworkable and whose cattle are having to be sold off.

By the time you receive this magazine the Winter Olympics will be underway and hopefully GB will have gained some medals to cheer us up. However, I hear on the radio that there is concern that there is not enough snow at present in Sochi for some of the events to take place and the organisers are trying to conserve what snow they have.

With all the progress made over the years it appears the one thing we cannot do is control the weather or protect ourselves from its extremes.

It is at times like these that we need to realise we are not in ultimate control, we cannot do everything ourselves and we need to hand it over to God. Of course we do need to 'play our part', we do need to be sensible and pro-active and not just sit back.

Compton House

A day in the life of Mary Moppitt

(Fictitious resident of Compton House)

ts 1.15am and I cannot sleep, I feel as if I have been awake for ages! I ring my bell and along comes a lovely nurse or carer. They will offer to make me comfortable, assist me to the toilet or make me a nice hot drink and snack if I fancy. I live in Compton House Nursing Home. I have not lived here very long and I did not really want to come if I am honest, but I cannot believe how quickly I have settled in. Yes it is true, it is not like living at home, but then I was not managing very well. I resisted the idea for a while and now I wonder why.

All fear and worries have disappeared, or if I do have a concern there is always someone I can tell. I have a chat every morning to the housekeeper when she brings my paper; my breakfast is delivered to my room by a smiling carer, what better way to start the day. When I am ready to get washed and dressed there is always someone to assist me. It is a nice part of the day, as I get to know the carers and they get to know me. The Nurses give wise advice; assist with the medications and treatments I need, with skill and compassion. The Deputy Manager has given me confidence in making decisions about my care and has encouraged me to make choices about all aspects of daily life and activity in Compton House.



My room is cleaned by one of the housekeeping staff, some are chattier than others but are always courteous and polite, and the maintenance man often pops in to see all is well too. I usually go down to the lounge, unless it's the day when the hairdresser comes in, I do like to have my hair done, it makes me feel better. In the lounge I might read, or chat or simply listen to music which is usually playing up until lunchtime. Every Wednesday and Sunday there is a service which I enjoy. I very much enjoy choosing and singing hymns and it is lovely to have people coming in from the community to conduct the service. Lunch is around 12.30. The cook has told me the food comes from local suppliers, meat comes from Cockhaise Farm and fruit and vegetables from Paul's Greengrocer. There is always a choice if I do not fancy the dish of the day. The cook also makes a cake every day for afternoon tea, which is usually hard to resist.

After lunch I sometimes go to my room as I like to listen to talking books, or watch a little bit of television. But most afternoons I like to join in any of the activities that our social activities coordinator puts on.

Entertainers visit every week, yesterday we had a visit from a wonderful person, who played the harp. Tomorrow it is a local artist, she runs weekly art classes. I have recently learnt once again how to play dominoes, so I hope to play with my grandchildren when they visit at the weekend.

Two weeks ago the Manager held a meeting for residents and told us about things that are going to happen in Compton House. This includes telling us about a new dining room extension which will be nice and also some of the events that are planned in the coming weeks.

I have seen a lot on the television about care homes and heard about care home inspections and then last week we had one. The inspector was here all day and spent a long time talking to me and other residents. I am sure we are fine as I could not be happier.



P.S.

The CQC have just informed Lindfield Christian Care Home that it is fully compliant. The Environmental Health Officer also made an unannounced visit that week, and following a thorough inspection we have retained our 5 stars.

The care home is supported by the three churches in Lindfield. The Lindfield URC Trustee is Stuart Marsh.

Food Bank

aywards Heath Foodbank opened in 2012 and by December 2013 food has reached 1,900 people. We are often asked whether the number of people we are serving is increasing. Our data shows that from April to December in 2012, 280 vouchers were given out and 700 people were fed, but in the same period in 2013, 400 vouchers were issued feeding almost 1,000 people. It might be interesting for you to know that 5.5% of the vouchers go to people with a Lindfield address.

Reaching people at Christmas

As a Christmas initiative we asked schools to identify families who they knew would struggle over the holiday period. In this way we were able to deliver 15 Christmas hampers to local families and we also gave hampers to 15 people nominated by Linwood Community Mental Health Centre. These hampers were in addition to the 38 vouchers brought in to Foodbank in the normal way which

meant that we gave food to an amazing 227 people in December (88 people per month was the average from January to November last year.)

Collecting tins have been in place by the tills in Pound Shop since May. In that time we have collected £430. Our volunteer Sue, who empties them regularly, said that often there are pounds amongst the





pennies but in her Christmas collection there were a few notes too. The Rag Bag box is situated in the window at the Co-op. It is a Trussell Trust initiative that earns our Foodbank 40p for each kilogram collected, or for a tonne of clothes that's £400. The title Rag Bag is a little misleading as they are happy to collect any used clothes , shoes, sheets, and bags rather than rags.

Community Lunch

Foodbank launched a community lunch in mid October after concern from the volunteers at the distribution centre that what many people who came for food also really needed, was someone to talk to. The aim of the lunch is twofold: to provide a nourishing meal and a safe place to talk. Many new volunteers offered to help and we have a team of over 20, about 9 are on duty each Monday. The Haywards Heath Baptist Church offered its facilities, and the MSDC gave approval to the hygiene standards of the facilities. The lunch got off

to a slow start in regard to the number of customers coming, but this enabled the teams to work out practicalities and get to know each other. One man has been along every week and greatly enjoys the company. Numbers started to pick up in time for the special Christmas dinner and those who attended that day took part in carols around the piano. Since the New Year the numbers have increased and a steady flow of people are coming. One volunteer said: 'To listen to some of the complex stories of difficulties and pain that our neighbours carry could easily be disheartening. But at the lunch it feels that we are offering something, however small, to show our support in their suffering. It is both humbling and rewarding.

Pastoral Vacancy

How are we progressing?

A lot has happened in the last couple of months. The Synod Scoping group visited to assess our current position Following that meeting it was agreed by the Synod Deployment Group and Central Sussex United Area that Lindfield would be scoped at 100%, meaning we would have a full time Minister; a rare occurrence these days.

The Pastorate Profile was completed and subject to some minor changes will be ready for issue to any interested ministers. A Summary Profile has been submitted which is available for ministers to view on the National URC Web site.

The Elders had a meeting with the Synod Moderator, Revd. Nicola Furley-Smith. She gave us some advice and took away information to share with the Moderators at their monthly meeting. It is at this meeting that vacancies and ministers seeking a move are discussed. We are also ensuring that our current position is known in other areas within the denomination.

And Ryecroft......well unfortunately we still have not secured a tenant for a short term let. A number of people have looked at the property, some

have shown interest but it has gone no further

Many want a longer term tenancy. We are now with two local agents with national coverage.

Church Members should continue to contact their Elder if they have any questions or concerns. Those within the fellowship, who are not Church Members can contact any of the Elders. House Groups are also avenues for pastoral caring and the Pastoral Group are, as always, available.

If you have a Pastoral matter or any other concern PLEASE SPEAK UP

Of course the whole process needs to be surrounded in prayer by the whole church. We are not just appointing someone to be chairman of our club or society we are about seeking Gods will for the future church in Lindfield.

Since the start of the new term, Pulse has officially landed! We are now meeting at the slightly later time of 7.30pm to 9pm on a Friday evening and the format has changed quite significantly!

We are using some new material called 'Rock Solid' which is a resource from 'Youth for Christ'. We have enjoyed the fresh approach with many new ideas for games and activities. It has also been good that the message for the evening has been intertwined throughout the session and the games and activities are designed around this, to reflect our teaching point for that evening.

Pulse Junior was also launched and on our first session we had ten young people. This was great for the first evening and there have been lots of enquiries since! We meet between 4.30pm and 6pm every other week and have a mixture of games, craft, a bible story and tea as well. It is for children who are at primary school and are aged 5years to 10years.

We have had a good few sessions and the young people who are coming along seem to be really enjoying themselves. We would really appreciate some help with providing tea for the children, and if you would be happy to do a very small amount of cooking for us every so often, I'd love to hear from you. We will of course provide expenses towards this!

Pulse + meet at our house every Sunday evening and we have around ten older teenagers who range in age from 14 years to 21 years old. We always have time for a game, pizza and some really interesting Bible study. We are currently working through a book called 'Bible from Scratch' and the young people seem to be really enjoying this and are learning some of the interesting facts they never knew about!



Weekend Away

Over the weekend of the 31st January to 2nd February, The Gift FM team was reunited for one weekend. The venue was the newly renovated 'West Watch Centre' in Horsted Keynes. We had a fantastic time and as well as getting to hear highlights from the radio station, we ran various Rock Solid sessions which is a 'Youth for Christ' material. Boys Brigade

y parents sent my younger brother and myself to Boys' Brigade in Thornton Heath, Croydon, when I was a child. At first, the tedious routine of drills, spit and polish, and a certain amount of rather heavy handed discipline, had only limited appeal. It did not really engage my imagination and I kept up my membership on a rather low key, half hearted basis. A week in camp at the age of 15 changed that perception completely. I realised how joyous the fellowship of The Boys' Brigade could be.


I was challenged to commit my life to Christ by an excellent Baptist Minister, for whose call to faith I shall always be grateful. I realised that to get anything from BB, I had to give to it first, so became wholeheartedly involved, and never looked back (and, incidentally, saw the point of all that drill - it was beneficial!). Among other things, I became a kind of junior preacher and leader in the Company Bible Class, passing on to other Boys the Gospel I had so strongly embraced myself.

Many decades have passed, and my passion for this work has if anything grown, rather than diminished. I am certain that The Boys' Brigade is the BEST way of communicating the Christian Gospel to Boys.



Not necessarily through overt preaching, although that is bv nο means unimportant. The BB helps Boys to grasp the true meaning of Christian living by a subtle process of example, comradeship, and the inter-weaving of a Christian thread into all it does. The leadership of the Officers themselves is the best sermon. I have seen plenty of evidence that this process changes Boys lives; even though that may take some time to become apparent.

I see the fresh faces coming in to our Company here in Lindfield, and relish the challenge of building Christian manliness into their lives. The potential is enormous: any one of these lads won over would be a big gain for us. I know we shall have the support and prayers of our membership in carrying out that task. However, before long we shall also need a new generation of committed workers to carry that task forward. Are we as a Church community, fully geared up to ensure that our work with young people has a long term future? We need to be clear that for all intents and purposes this is the future of the Church itself

Youth Assembly

Youth Assembly 2014 - All change!

S itting on the train up to Alrewas, Staffordshire with Johanna Harfield, I found myself in exactly the same position as 12 months earlier. Am I glad to be going to URC Youth Assembly? Are we finally going to see signs of change? Are we going to have a holy encounter with Jesus? The answer was a resounding yes on all counts.

Johanna and I travelled up on Friday 24th January (with a minor detour at Nandos), and was greeted in typical British fashion: rain and a train station that have similar characteristics to that of a shed. We then had to wait an hour until our backup transport arrived, so perhaps it wasn't the best start to Assembly. Despite that, we arrived at the centre with eagerness and anticipation, which didn't leave us until the Sunday afternoon when the event finished.

This year was somewhat busier than previous Youth Assemblies; more Bible studies, more workshops, and more resolutions. The main theme for the weekend was around being lost and found, in more ways than just spiritually. This was to prove a great success overall, the theme ran through all activities, and without a doubt left me feeling closer to Jesus than previously.



However, the highlight of the weekend was during one of the business sessions, which we were deciding what the URC Youth should be doing. It wasn't necessarily an enjoyable highlight, however without a doubt it was the most important period of the weekend. One of the young people whom I know very well came forward and started talking about his mental illness, and how it has affected him in recent years. I won't go into the nature of it. Feel free to seek me out if you want to know more. The outcome of this was to call upon General Assembly to commit to training ministers and pastoral assistants with regards to mental health issues. Should you want the full resolution seek me out.

The outcome of the weekend was a very tired Johanna and I, but spiritually refreshed. I hope Johanna will join me in this by saying Youth Assembly 2014 was the best yet, and we eagerly look forward to next year, though probably with a few more energy drinks to hand!. If there's anything you would like to know about Youth Assembly or the role Johanna and I have during it and at synod level, please, please, please don't hesitate to talk to us. Our Father

The Alive 2014, Living Faith programme continues as our Sunday morning teaching will be working through the Lord's Prayer during March.

Jesus said "Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9) and throughout His prayer Jesus grants us not just a template of how to pray but also a series of wonderful revelations about the heart and nature of God.

The prayer starts with the most personal revelation of all, that God longs to restore us into relationship with Himself, our Father.

"Our Father" reveals the intimacy which Jesus shared with God and invites us all into that same relationship with him.

Where we might rightly expect Old Testament phrases such as Sovereign Lord, Almighty God or King of the Universe; Jesus begins with "Abba". Daddy, a children's word, a simple word with the most profound implications.

Mostly I am known as Dan, to some Americans Danny, formally as Mr McQuillin and, when in trouble with my wife or my mother as Daniel. But there are 3 people on earth who call me Dad. Maybe one day they will consider it more adult to call me Dan, but I hope not. That is a name anyone can use, Dad is just for them. It marks them as special and grants them absolute access to me.

The fact that Jesus tells us we can call God Dad should shock and stun us as powerfully today as when the disciples first heard Jesus teaching. Jesus did not come to start a religion but to restore a relationship, a living faith with a loving God.

We will study the prayer in six sections; each exalting God with proper awe and powerful calls to worship, but also stunning intimacy, abundant love and generous grace.

I hope that it will not just shape our prayer life but transform our whole lives into those that our heavenly Father longs for us to live.

Thoughts on Motherhood

n Rob Parsons "The Sixty Minute Mother" a woman is asked at a dinner party, full of important guests if she worked. A stay at home mother to 3 children, one a teenager, a three year old and a newborn. Her body not returned to pre-pregnancy shape, she sits opposite a young, attractive female executive. Did she work? Her response is one I return now and again...

"Yes" she replies, "I'm in a programme of social development. At present I'm working with three age groups. First with babies and toddlers. That involves a basic grasp of medicine and child psychology. Next, I'm working with teenagers. I confess the programme is not going too well in that area. Finally, at evenings and weekends I work with a man aged thirty-nine who's exhibiting all the classic symptoms of midlife crisis. That's mainly psychiatric work.

The whole job involves planning, a "makeit-happen" attitude and the ability to crisis manage. I used to be an international fashion model – but I got bored."

I love this quote. As a mother, we think of others before ourselves. Those "others" tend to be small, occasionally antisocial and altogether oblivious of anyone else's needs but their own and on their time schedule. Tiny, demanding little tyrants who try to rule the roost. Boy is it a challenge to change that point of view!

When pregnant, I never considered what life was going to be like, day in and day out with the responsibility so completely for someone else. I do think it is a bit of a conspiracy that no one really tells you about the relentlessness of it. The worry, the hopes and dreams, the need for bottomless pits of patience... But then I'm not sure we weren't and we simply didn't hear them. It goes without saying that we wouldn't change a thing.

They bring endless variety and challenge to our lives and have taught us to love more deeply, be more selfless and try to be better people – surely all things that God desires of us too? If it were only a little easier from time to time!

I remember once watching Grace sleep one night while carrying Fraser and I was overcome with fear that I wouldn't love the child I was carrying as much as I loved Grace. It overwhelms you the feelings you have for these little people. And though there are times when I feel I could cheerfully throttle the pair of them (like the time they drew on Fraser's wall within hours of us finishing decorating it, or the time when I walked in to find they had emptied the shredder over the floor I had tidied and hovered. Or the time... well,.. you get the picture!) I'd walk over coals for them if they needed me, lift cars, move mountains, do whatever it took if they needed me. I'm a social secretary, tutor, disciplinarian, medic, bad dream warrior, moral compass, cheerleader, bankroller, tickle-monster, chef, PA, cleaner, warmer up, comfort provider,... and more. I'm a mother. It's exhausting. It's important. It's who I am now and one day, they won't need me like this.

One day, they will have their own lives and I will need to stand on the side and cheer on, and pray that they live life well. Until then, I will wipe noses, and hold hands and scold if they stand too close to the road. I will keep praying that I will raise them well, with Charlie beside me to help every step of the way.

omen's World Day of Prayer is international. inter-church organization, which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is extensive. An international committee works from New York and each participating country has its own national committee. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on March 7th, women and men will gather to celebrate using a programme of worship offered this year by women in Egypt.

The theme of our service is 'Streams in the Desert' and we are asked to reflect on our Christian role of being a 'stream in the desert' for those who experience spiritual 'drought'. We believe that the service from Egypt has universal appeal.

One of the oldest civilisations in the world, Egypt has long been home to Coptic Christians. Since the uprising in 2011 there has been conflict between religious groupings. Political change affects individual lives and we pray with the women of Egypt for peace.

We envisage a great wave of prayer, rising with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeping across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then WWDP services will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.
