

Messy Christmas

nce upon a time, in a land far away, there was a young girl called Mary who was engaged to a young man called Joseph. Before Mary and Joseph got married, Mary found herself to be pregnant by the power of the Holy Spirit. Joseph decided to leave Mary, but was told not to by an angel that appeared to him in a dream.

At that time, Joseph had to travel to his home town of Bethlehem to list his name in a register, under the order of Augustus Caesar.

Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem on a donkey, but when they arrived, they could not find anywhere to stay! Finally, an innkeeper was kind enough to let them stay in a stable he had behind his inn.

That night, Mary gave birth to a son and called him Jesus. She wrapped him in cloth and laid him in a manger. Jesus lay there peaceful and quiet, as animals that surrounded them watched over the baby.

Later that night, some shepherds arrived to celebrate the birth of Jesus. They had been told about his birth by a host of angels that appeared in the sky! Soon after the shepherds, three wise men arrived to worship the baby Jesus and they gave him gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh.

As you were reading the above nativity story, I wonder if there were one or two points that you queried. This is very close to the nativity story that is acted out by many children in schools

all over the country at this time of year and it does give an overall picture of the birth of Christ and causes people to reflect on God sending his Son into the earth to 'Be with us'.

However, is this actually what is written about the birth of Jesus? Is this really what we read in the books of Matthew and Luke?

- I have researched some common misconceptions of the Christmas story; see how many you are aware of:
- 1. Mary was 15/16 years old
- 2. Joseph was in his 30's
- Travelled to Bethlehem, but not on a donkey
- 4. Did not stay in a stable, a stable is not mentioned. Neither did they knock on lots of inns before finding shelter. The word inn was translated from the word Kataluma, which is closer to a guest room than an inn.
- 5. Most likely stayed with family in Bethlehem

- Lots of the family were probably there, which is why they were nearby a manger.
- 7. Mary did not necessarily have Jesus the night she arrived. 'While they were there the time came for Mary to give birth.' Luke 2:6.
- The shepherds arrived soon after Jesus was born as they still found him in the manger.
- The wise men were not Kings they were magi, people who studied the stars. This is why they followed the star that appeared in the sky.
- The Wise men did not find Jesus until he was about 2 years old and they were in a house, not still with the manger.

I am not writing this to say that we have the Christmas story wrong, but I am posing the question. So often, we think we know the Bible stories as we have heard them many times, but how often do we actually read them from the text in the Bible, and take in what is actually written?

Before writing this, I read the accounts of the Birth of Jesus that can be found in Matthew and Luke. One thing that struck me as I read the accounts was that the situation between Mary and Joseph seemed 'messy'. If you imagine a young girl engaged to a man, but became pregnant before they were married, the situation seems messy. If you imagine visiting family, but having to sleep in the garage during your stay, it seems messy.

To me, the story I read in the Bible about the birth of Jesus is a messy story, God did not choose a couple that were married and had everything together. He chose to work through the messiness of real life. This is something I want to remember this Christmas time. God does not wait for us to have our lives together and sorted before He works in us or through us, God works through the messiness. The birth of Jesus is a reminder of that to me.

It is possible that we have turned the retelling of the birth of Jesus into a nice story that is acted out each year. Whether that is a good or bad thing, I will leave for you to decide, but I challenge you to read the accounts of the birth of Jesus this Christmas time. Not just within a Christmas service, but on your own. Try to find something within the text that simply makes you go 'wow!'

This Christmas, try to remember; don't wait to have everything sorted before allowing God to work through you. Allow God to work through the messiness of your life.



Having Hope

In the most difficult of times

What can we learn about hope – Christian hope – from the Book of Job – a book full of woeful lament from Job and his three gloomy friends, who have become icons of despair as "Job's comforters"?

Job is a God-fearing man; a man of integrity. But in the space of a few verses in the prologue to his story, he suffers a series of disasters more than any man or woman might reasonably expect to endure: the loss of all his animals, and therefore his wealth, the death of his sons and daughters, and a loathsome outbreak of boils, covering the whole of his body.

He asks God why this has happened to him, as we might in such circumstances. He becomes angry with God, as we might too, but he never doubts God's existence.

In the end, Job comes to see that God is greater than our understanding permits. Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? God asks. (38.4) And Job comes to realise there is a whole dimension to God that he cannot understand. My ears had heard of you, but now my eyes have seen you, Job says (42.5).

When we have difficult questions that our faith seems not to answer, perhaps we do well to remember that God is God and we cannot always hope to fully understand God's ways, and we cannot expect God always to offer us neat and simple solutions.

Can we learn to cope with sometimes not knowing - with letting God be God? Many of us find that hard, because we want to be in control.

We looked at Job at the morning services on 26 October and were invited to consider six lessons we might learn from Job:

- That God can do anything
- That we can be tested when we are least expecting it.
- That there are things we cannot understand
- That we need faith most, at the very moment when faith seems hardest.
- That we shouldn't give up on God when bad or puzzling things happen.
- And that, in suffering hard though it may be - we can draw closer to God.

And, of course, we have that one huge advantage over Job, who lived before the birth and life of Jesus. Job's hope emerges when he meets God in his pain. We meet God through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for us, and his resurrection.

A prayer by Cardinal Basil Hume:

Hope is knowing that I have been forgiven, my guilt removed.

Hope is knowing that there is a future, a life after death.

Hope is knowing that there is love –
That there is a God, and I am loved by him.
Whatever happens he does care.
Hope is knowing that he has plans
Even if I do not understand them

And, on a lighter note, a poem illustrating hope in adversity:

Two frogs fell into a bowl of cream, or so I've heard it told.

The sides of the bowl were shiny and steep, the cream was deep and cold.

"Oh, what's the use?" said frog number one. "It's fate. No help's around. Goodbye my frog friend. Goodbye sad world".

And croaking and weeping, he drowned.

But number two was of sterner stuff. He paddled in surprise.

And while he wiped his creamy face, and dried his creamy eyes.


"I'll swim awhile at least" he said. "And try to keep my head".

Sunday Services

The autumn term is coming to an end and Christmas is just around the corner. The youth groups are all running smoothly, and they are beginning to pick up numbers!

This term, LED's have been making their way through the whole of the bible, and they are due to finish by the end of January. They are currently reaching the New Testament, and will be focusing on Jesus, as Christmas gets closer. LED's are encouraged to pray in many different ways, and we recently used post-it notes to write down our prayers.

On November 30th we had the LED's volunteer Sunday. LED leaders have encouraged the youth to choose an area

within the Sunday service that they could get involved with. It is great to see them using their gifts within the church they attend.

Since the half term at the end of October, I have been working alongside two of the boys from Boys' Brigade, within Company Section. Each week I have sat with them for half an hour, teaching them about the Christian lifestyle and beliefs. More importantly, it has been an opportunity for them to ask any questions they may have about Christianity, or life in general. The two boys seem to be enjoying the sessions, and it is amazing for me to see a change in their behaviour when they come and sit down for that half an hour.

Since September, I have slowly been getting more involved with school assemblies in Lindfield Primary and Blackthorns Primary. I have been going in with Val Upton, who organizes the rota, as well as one or two of the interns from All Saints. Just before half term, one of the interns and I led our first assembly on our own, focusing on the Parable of the Talents. We worked well together, and we are now on the rota as a duo!

The Christian Union at Oathall Community College, Refuel, is going great, and we are getting 20-25 pupils each week. The theme from half term until Christmas is about the Church in the New Testament, and the struggles it faced, linking it to the struggles we face today. We are building up to a planned event near Christmas where, once again, they will be able to invite their friends to come and learn about the true meaning of the season.

I have also begun to get involved in the Christian Union, Engage, at Warden Park School on Thursdays. Engage meet after school, so it shows commitment to want to attend each week. There are about 12-15 pupils who attend each week, which makes a good size for discussion. Engage are also planning an event towards Christmas that they can invite their friends too.

P.U.L.S.E. Jr. is getting about five regulars now, advertising the groups is a slower process than I had hoped, but it is still high on my priorities.

We have been learning about Moses and his journey with the Israelites. The time of the group has changed, and it is now running from 5pm until 6:30pm, as I had a few comments from parents that it was difficult to get the children home from school and to P.U.L.S.E. Jr. in time for 4:30. I am hoping this change with help the numbers pick up over the next few months.

P.U.L.S.E. is in full swing now, and we recently had a trip to Horsham Superbowl to go bowling. Every Friday evening is different, but the youth are always engaged in the activities. and the other leaders are great at thinking of new ideas and games that we haven't played before.

Some of the youth went to Synod Together on November 8th. The youth programme was run by those involved in the Youth Executive, with the help of a few others. We explored the theme of Lost and Found, focusing on Jesus' parables of the lost sheep, coin and prodigal son.

We also were able to encourage young people to attend Youth Assembly, which is held in January.

I hope you all have a fantastic Christmas!

Samaritan's Purse


Thank you to everyone for the shoe boxes donated for Samaritan's Purse.

NCS Experience

am Peter McCleery. I am 18 years old and one of the youth here. I am studying BTEC level 3 in IT at Central Sussex College Crawley for two years.

Now I did a programme which was set up by the Government called "NCS" which stands for National Citizen Service.NCS is a Government funded scheme which is for 16-17 years old and operates throughout the year.

I went on the summer scheme and had a few induction days to get me started, these were based at the Bridge Community centre in Brighton. We chatted about global issues e.g. poverty and talked about the NCS experience and what this would mean for us.

A few weeks later it was the first residential and we went to a residential centre in Somerset.

It was hard work, but it was well worth it in the end! On the final day we had a fundraising event which was a BBQ at the Yews. The event was a huge success and we raised £154 for The Yews.

Worthing Churches Homeless Projects

f you want to see the heartfelt joy of knowing Jesus, there's no better place to start than the face of someone who has been raised from the abyss. I recently had a conversation with such a person (a recovering drug addict) who described how he had tried to take his own life on many occasions and the times he had spent in 'mental wards' (his words, not mine). He told me how he had turned his back on cars and material wealth and described how his faith alone could keep him whole.

The goal of offering hope and a future to the lost has been the purpose of WCHP since 1991. It was founded by four Christians who took soup, blankets, and sleeping bags to the seafront, to offer them to local homeless people. From such humble, sacrificial beginnings the charity now has 54 staff members and over 200 volunteers engaged in helping the homeless make the necessary changes towards a sustainable, independent life.

The charity now offers five properties facilitating specialised opportunities to make the change from homelessness to independent living. There is a day centre for clients to have a shower and do laundry. There are three properties providing long and short term sanctuaries away from the chaos and destruction of living on the streets.

One property receives people who are still dependent on drugs and alcohol to help them to make a start on the path into a life free from these things.

They also have shops – this year WCHP opened its third shop in Littlehampton.



One shop in Goring specialises in repairing donated bicycles giving clients the opportunity to gain a Bike Mechanic qualification. Now you have found a good home to take those old bikes!

At Lindfield URC we have posters and further information on the missions display table regarding WCHP (as all mission donations in November and December will be given to the charity).

Peace

Philippians 4.4-9

What is it that enables Paul in prison, soon to be executed, to tell a small struggling church to rejoice?

What makes him be so upbeat in such dire circumstances?

He doesn't just say "rejoice", he says, "Rejoice in your union with the Lord".

It is the close relationship he has with Jesus, the risen Christ that gives him peace. Awful things can be going on inside or around us, but nothing can take away that supportive relationship. That's what makes the difference to having peace or not having peace. "I am with you always" said Jesus. That can give us peace.

It's like two people in love. Whatever is going on, they have each other. So Paul tells the church, enjoy that living relationship. Let others see it is enjoyable.

A relationship with God is not there to drag us down but to lift us up. Enjoy that union, no matter what. Secondly, to find peace in your heart, says Paul, have a "gentle attitude" towards other people. Stop getting agitated by them, criticising them, pointing the finger, judging, and blaming them. God knows them better than we do. It's us who are

robbed of peace by carrying resentment or unforgiveness inside.

Our "gentle attitude" towards others that will attract them to what we believe. The way we are will speak louder than what we say. God's peace comes when we have "gentle attitude" to others within us. Thirdly, to know God's peace, we need to stop carrying burdens about which we can do nothing. Worrying about someone, or a situation, or yourself, simply robs us of peace and does nothing for them

Handing over to Him whatever troubles us with a prayer restores God's peace. "Jesus you care more for that person or situation than even I do. I give them to you with trust and thanksgiving. You can do more than my anxiety can ever do" We are not God. Hand over the people, situations, events, to Him, says Paul, and know His peace.

Lastly he writes; fill your minds with good things, not negative depressing things. Yes, there is evil, injustice, inhumanity, cruelty, in the world. Yes, there are things which are not right, but there is also goodness, kindness, care, compassion, reconciliation, and people of faith. We have a choice.

We can look at a rose bed and focus on the sharp painful thorns or we can concentrate on its fragrant blossoming beautiful flowers. Don't be robbed of God's peace by saying how terrible the world is and passing on gloom and doom to others in conversation. God loves this world and will never leave it bereft of His presence or power. Evil will not have the last word ever. Be careful with what we fill our minds by what he listens to, read, or converse about.

Paul gave the four instructions to enable us know the peace of God which passes understanding,

- 1 Enjoy His friendship,
- 2 Be gently disposed to every other human being and to yourself,
- 3 Hand over the burdens to Him, and
- 4 Fill our minds with good things.
