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Dear friends

write this while in Scotland attending a couple of meetings about Church Related Community Work, a part of the URC which uses the slogan "Enabling Change."

Yesterday I met an evangelist. He spoke with humour and passion about a change that had occurred during his lifetime. He wanted others to experience something of this change, to have a fresh encounter and see something of a new life, a vibrancy, and a hope for tomorrow.

The person was not a church leader and he was not talking of the Christian faith, but was a taxi driver telling a group of five of us about the city of Glasgow as we journeyed in the back of his black cab from a church on one side of the Clyde to our "budget" hotel on the other.

Looking out the hotel window I can recognise some of that change. I can see the SSE Hydro, an arena built in 2013, where with my family I watched the commonwealth games gymnastics last summer.



I can spot the BBC Scotland building on Pacific Quay, with its giant roof top dish pointing heavenward, or at least to a communications satellite. Just the other side of the BBC is Glasgow Science Centre, with its fun interactive exhibits, which those of you with young children may be familiar with thanks to "Nina and the Neurons". These all stand on the banks of the river where there were once docks, and great cargo ships, and high employment of manual labour; those old things have gone, though the Finneston Crane still stands as a reminder.

Shiny buildings do not make a city, nor does its past or present industry. This city's current advertising slogan is "People Make Glasgow." But what is it that makes people? What gives real hope?

I first came here, on a day trip, as a young teenager, when the journey of transformation was starting to begin, and an advertising slogan "Glasgow's Miles Better" was being used. My lasting impression of that day was not desolate ship yards, or a drinks reception in the Provost's Chambers in George Square, but going to the Kelvingrove art gallery and seeing Dali's painting "Christ of St John of the Cross" where the face of Jesus is not seen, but under His enormous suffering comes a stillness; a peace to the world of His followers.

Despite there still being poverty, and a sense of the gap between rich and poor growing, there is something about this place and its people. I pray for the Church here in this city, that it may be able to serve and enable change to come in communities and individual lives, and that the hope of God in Jesus Christ may bring new life.

This prayer is also for us in Lindfield, a village that some may think has little in common with Glasgow, despite there probably being a similar large gap between those who have and have not wealth, though those without are smaller in number and so may be unnoticed by those of us who are in good homes and have regular incomes. There is something else in common, there are thousands surrounding us that do not know Jesus and have not made Him their Lord.

We need to be ready and willing like my taxi driver to share some stories, but to make it the real Good News.

The annual Bible conference - Bible by the Beach was held again in Eastbourne on the first May bank holiday. Richard Pratt, who is the President of Third Millennium Ministries spoke on the Unstoppable Mission of God. He had four points which he talked about at each session.

- We are created in the image of God therefore created for mission
- Called to go not for our benefit but for others
- We go because our focus is on our hope in Jesus

 We go because we are confident of the power of the gospel to change lives.

Richard spoke with great humour and honesty whilst talking about great facts which we as followers of Jesus can hold on to and act upon.

The children did their own activities on the same theme. They showed the adults what they had been learning about in the last session. They had obviously thoroughly enjoyed themselves whilst learning amazing truths about God.

Church Membership

At my induction to Lindfield URC, at the end of March, there was a lovely feast, which had obviously involved a large number of people preparing food and pouring tea.

Serving tea does not require any element of faith, you could simply be doing a good turn, and the same could be said of someone handing out hymn books, saying hello at the door, helping move chairs or taking flowers to someone who is ill; however I would guess that if not all of us, at least most of us who meet on a Sunday have some degree of faith.

Many people with faith in Jesus feel that they are happy to be a part of a church family without becoming a member of their local church, but as a church, within the one Church, we would like you to think of your faith and your commitment to this congregation, and consider church membership.

Becoming a member of a local church, such as Lindfield URC, involves making a public declaration of belief, and saying that your commitment to serve is not simply because it is a good thing to be kind, but because Jesus desires that his believers reflect his Love in word and deed.



It declares that you have something in common with the other members, and that you are happy to engage in mutual encouragement; serving each other. It also means that you, with the other members, will seek the growth of Christ's kingdom on earth. Above all things as a member you will seek to live being guided in the truth of God's way by the Holy Spirit.

Members therefore have a responsibility to engage in the life and work of the church, including attending Church Meeting whenever possible. Although anyone can attend Church Meeting it is only members that can vote to decide the way forward for the local church, for example they make the decisions about having a youth pastor, about building works, and only members can elect an elder, or become one.

I would like to begin saying thank you for all your continued prayer for the youth and children's work that goes on within Lindfield United Reformed Church.

LED's (11-16's) on Sunday mornings continue to study characters throughout the Bible. They are currently looking at Joseph, seeing how God was faithful to Joseph throughout his life. In the low points as much as he was in the high points.

LED's have another volunteer Sunday coming up. On May 31st, the LED's will be helping out in different areas around the church – some on welcome, one helping with the sound and visuals and one might even serve you a drink after the service! I received very positive feedback from the last volunteer Sunday and I am looking forward to the one coming up.

Sunday evening's P.U.L.S.E. Plus has finished the Youth Alpha course now. From what I hear they all got a lot out of it. They are now looking at how we can focus on God throughout different situations such as when they are with friends or during exams. They are each taking it in turns to lead an evening and a topic.

P.U.L.S.E. Plus has recently started a prayer diary, as we want to build on how much we pray and remember to thank God for answered prayer. Over the summer term we will be spending some time each week praying for each other and the church.

Boys' Brigade on Monday evening has now begun the summer programme. We are still getting good numbers; in fact we are now up to 13 in Anchors, the youngest section.

We are also now beginning to see links between company section boys and other church groups. I now see two of the boys regularly at P.U.L.S.E. on a Friday evening and one of the boys has started to come along to P.U.L.S.E. Plus as well.

Moving on to Stepping Stones – we are still getting very high numbers! We have recently had 40 children in the hall.

We are also beginning to consider different ways we can reach to parents and use the opportunity we have on a Tuesday to teach them about the God who loves them.

The Christian Unions that I am involved with at Oathall and Warden Park are looking at the Character of God this term. The numbers continue to increase; at Oathall this week we got 30 pupils to come along to the Christian Union.

P.U.L.S.E. and P.U.L.S.E. Jr. are running well. We have had a few new members at P.U.L.S.E. Jr. and we have been looking at some main events in the Christian calendar. We have covered creation; Christmas and we have most recently been looking at Jesus' death and resurrection.

Two weeks ago in P.U.L.S.E. we spent an evening in prayer. I set up about six prayer spaces around the church and allowed the group to go around and interact with each prayer space in their own time.

A prayer space is an area where people are given the opportunity to pray, ponder questions and reflect on their life. There is a specially prepared area or room set aside with items and instructions that provoke thought, wonder, prayer and reflection.

The prayer spaces we had focused on things like giving our worries to God, seeing ourselves as God sees us, we had a space where we could pray for the church and we had a space where we could be creative with paints as we reflected on our favourite Bible verses.


Three Boys, Matthias Fuller, Joshua Bland, and Ben Gault, went with Terry Ward

Surely, Jesus would have been better off going it alone without having the hassle and frustration!

Well, what is amazing, is that Jesus decided to limit Himself. He wanted the fellowship of close friends to share their good and bad times. He wanted to be involved with them no matter what happened. He enjoyed meal-times, discussions and, no doubt, a joke or two! Jesus came from Heaven to show that in God's Kingdom there is togetherness.

Trinity Sunday

Robin Parry wrote: "For many Christians the Trinity has become something akin to their appendix: it's there, but they're not sure what its function is, they get by in life without it doing very much, and if they had to have it removed they wouldn't be too distressed".

The Trinity is a core doctrine that Christians worldwide agree upon, but most have such difficulty fully explaining we are left concluding that it must be complex and unimportant. But the Trinity is not a PhD option on top of the Christian faith, an academic puzzle for intellectuals to ponder. It is central to how we can know God, how we can be rescued from sin, how we can understand the life and mission of the church, indeed what it means to be human.

God will always be beyond our complete comprehension and control. While we cannot expect to fully understand God, the entire purpose of the bible is a quest from God to restore us into relationship and community with him. He longs for his people, Israel, to return to him, gives up everything on the cross that we be restored into relationship and promises that by his spirit we will be lead to the truth and into the community that the Trinity expresses.

It is not theoretical, or just for other people. It is a deeply personal and intimate invitation, with your name on it. "I have much more to say to you, more than you can now bear. But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth. He will not speak on his own; he will speak only what he hears, and he will tell you what is yet to come. He will glorify me because it is from me that he will receive what he will make known to you. All that belongs to the Father is mine. That is why I said the Spirit will receive from me what he will make known to you."

John 16:12-15 NIV

The truth, the trinity is a picture of the unseen, knowledge of the unknowable. A revelation and reassurance to our hearts of that which our heads cannot fathom. If you seek it with too much intellectual strain you will miss the simple miracle that is a gift for you from the holy spirit.

The trinity was not a late invention of Greek philosophy but is a formula for the sum of all historical revelation; a shorthand for the big story of the Bible. From Gods relationship to his people Israel, the saving grace of the Gospels and the hope and comfort of his presence with us always. It is not learned but revealed; not known but experienced, it is as much part of us as the spirit is part of the Trinity.

What matters is not the detail of how it works, but the depth of what it means.

The miracle of this eternal relationship is central to our faith and the reason God has been seeking you with all of his heart for all of eternity.

The relationship between Father, Son and Holy Spirit has been depicted as 'Perichoresis' a greek word which means, literally "dancing around".

In place of complex theology then we can consider the Trinity to be a joyous, divine dance; expressing love for one another. You are not just invited to join the dance, you were born to dance!

(Even if like me you have two, or seemingly three left feet.)

The Trinity then is no appendix, but as critical to us as our heart. A heart that dances because it is filled by the Holy Spirit with wonder and worship for God. That beats so powerfully with the love and peace of Christ that our feet cannot keep still.

The dance of the Trinity is not complete until and unless we are restored and reunited into relationship with one another and the God who created us, the God who saved us and the God who even today longs for us to join the dance.

Mission Group

May/June 2015: Operation Mobilisation

Mission Giving in May and June this year is to support Operation Mobilisation with a Family House in Peja, Kosovo where refuge and rehabilitation is available for those women, and their children, subject to domestic violence and human trafficking.



At our morning services on the 10th May, Nick Fletcher of Operation Mobilisation (OM) told us about the work:

- Women have been given the skills and opportunities to support themselves and their children
- In one case a woman returned to her husband with the support of the family house team. Both husband and wife have become Christians and jointly work in a business founded by the wife

Wider World

EBOLA Liberia

A National Day of Thanksgiving was held on Monday 11th May after Liberia was declared free of the Ebola virus by the World Health Organisation. The country was declared free of the virus after going 42 days (twice the maximum incubation period for the deadly disease) without a new case being diagnosed.

Celebrations took place in the streets of Monrovia, the capital of the country with much rejoicing. In the churches on the Sunday, members of the congregations did not have to have their temperatures taken before they could enter the buildings - but they still did not hug or kiss at the end of the service. Both Christians and Muslims were asked to pray for the victims and their families. Some 4,700 people died during the outbreak.

Sierra Leone

n Sierra Leone life is slowly beginning to return to normal after the Ebola outbreak, but the surviving population is experiencing many difficulties. 1.8 million children were left without education when all the schools were closed down during the outbreak. They are now starting to re-open, but the education system is beset with problems, with the legacy of the Ebola virus leaving many families too poor to afford schooling. Thousands lost their businesses and incomes and poverty and hunger are widespread.

The health system is also struggling to cope after all their resources were drained and there are now many cases of TB and HIV. Sadly, It will take Sierra Leone a long tme to recover fully from this terrible disease.
