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# **Dear friends**

t is now a year since I knew that I was coming to be your minister, and about nine months since I moved to Lindfield and so am still experiencing many things for the first time and as a result sometimes am surprised by what I see or hear, and sometimes am mistaken in assumptions. The other day I sat in the balcony of the Dolphins swimming pool in Haywards Heath while my children were having a lesson. I briefly glanced towards a window where movement had caught my eye and realised I could see ripples of water outside. Oh, I thought to myself, I didn't realise they had an outside pool too, that must be chilly at this time of year. No sooner had this thought entered my mind when I realised that there was no pool there, it was a car park, the darkness of the outside world meant the window was acting a little like a mirror, I was seeing the reflection of the indoor pool my children were in.

Darkness and shadows often plays tricks on us, causing us to believe things which are not right. This is true not only with the darkness of night but the darkness of sin that the evil one brings. We might look out of the window at the world and see darkness; the darkness of the events in Paris, in Syria, the actions of Boko Haram in Nigeria, and the sinfulness of humanity in so many other places. It may seem that this darkness is enveloping the whole world, but it is not, and never will. In fact there will be a day when there is no more darkness, suffering and pain, and instead light perpetual will shine.

As we wait for that day we should remember how our account in Genesis of the Serpent in Eden is of one who confuses and tricks the innocent couple, Adam and Eve, to fall. We are people who in our human frailty can be easily entranced and led astray, confused by the darkness of the world, but God does not leave us alone to stumble and trip. In the darkness of the earth, in a small village, in humble surroundings, a baby boy was born and laid in a manger. The child was like no other before or since. He is the Son of God, coming into the world as a gift of Love, enabling us through His passion to be forgiven of sin and receive new life. The light of His presence is something that shines and cannot be extinguished, in it we can have hope.

Let us approach Christmas, and the New Year, with a confidence that allows us to have true joy, not made by the material things that so many find an important part of Christmas, but have joy in the hope, love and life that came with the birth of our Lord Jesus.

# **Home Groups**

We are now in the season of Advent, a time set aside by 'the church' to prepare and make ourselves ready. Which ,of course, begs the question: what or who are we making ready for and why and even how do we make ourselves ready? That is why in our home groups we are on this great Adventure into the Bible to try and answer together these questions; who are we preparing for, why are we preparing for Him and how do we prepare for Him?

These groups will be on 19th Nov, 3rd and 10th Dec. and everyone is welcome to come and join a group for these sessions as we prepare ourselves, our church and indeed our community for the return of Jesus Christ as King and Lord.

This highlights the reasons why we meet together in Home Groups. We come together to:

## Study the Bible

Kevin DeYoung wrote a book entitled - Taking God at His Word which he subtitled; why the Bible is worth knowing, trusting and loving.

He concluded his book by writing; ' let us not weaken in our commitment to our unbreakable Bible. Let us not wander from this divinely exhaled truth. Let us not waver in our delight and desire. God has spoken, and through that revelation He still speaks. Ultimately we can believe the Bible because we believe in the power and wisdom and goodness and truthfulness of the God whose authority and veracity cannot be separated from the Bible. We trust the Bible because it is God's Bible. And God being God, we have every reason to take him at his word.'

We study the Bible primarily to spend time with our God and to know Him better. As we spend time with Him we learn more about Him, what His plans and purposes are for His world, His church and for us as individuals. We don't just get to know what God is doing but our lives are radically changed as we learn about God's will and way and adjust our living accordingly.

## Spend time together

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul says that the church is like a human body. It only grows and functions properly when every part is doing its bit. This means we have responsibilities towards each other as believers. In our Home Groups we are also learning to share our lives with others through encouragement, care, support, service and the use of our gifts. It also means that we are mutually dependent on each other to actively work to help each of us to grow to be more like Jesus.

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### We pray

One of the main ways we support and serve one another is by praying, because it's through our prayers that God does His work. In our Home Groups therefore we set aside time to pray together for one another, our church and for the wider world.

Being part of a community can be a challenge (something the Bible is very realistic about!), however, it is where we grow best as Christians and as a church.

Our prayer is that through our Home Groups, together we can encourage one another as we: use our minds to engage our hearts and activate our wills to prepare ourselves, our church and our community to be as Christ would have us be, that is we will :

I fin all things grow up into Him who is the Head, that is, Christ

# Wider World

## Bangladesh

There are 1.2 million Christians in Bangladesh but, with a population of over 160 million, they are very much in the minority and life is not easy for them.

The state religion is Islam and although the constitution provides for religious freedom the reality is very different. Any converts from Islam or Buddhism face strong pressure from family, friends and local religious leaders to recant their faith.

Christians have been forced out of business and there is discrimination against many children in schools. There are few churches, only simple house groups and many families lack the knowledge and confidence to explain their faith properly to their children.

Due to poverty, many children in Bangladesh experience illiteracy, malnutrition and insanitary living conditions, leading to poor health and stunted growth. This is especially true for the children from Christian families who are often denied access to the few community facilities that do exist.

Because of the difficulties, some families prefer to send their children away to a Christian shelter home to provide better care for their physical needs while giving them the chance to grow in their Christian faith.

'Open Doors' supports this home in partnership with the Prime Evangelistic Church in Kewchala, Gazipur, providing food, clothes, books,utilities, teachers' pay and other related expenses, The home offers sanctuary to 36 children, aged six to fourteen and they receive a good education, nuitritious food and spiritual training to develop their faith in Christ.

# YOUTH

Hello

n November I attended Youthwork the Conference. The theme this year was 'Follow the Leader'.

I made some notes throughout the weekend and I want to share some of what I took away. I hope you get something from my notes!

• The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve. If you want to lead, you will have to serve!

Matthew 20:20-28

In Matthew 20:20-28 we find the mother of Zebedee's sons asking Jesus for her two sons to be sat at the right and left hand of Jesus. She is asking for her sons to be great in the eyes of Jesus, but Jesus points out that His way of being great is not one that fits with the world view.

Jesus says that whoever wants to be great, must be a servant. Whoever wants to be first, must be a slave.

Jesus doesn't say it is wrong to be great or to be a leader but that the way to work it is to be a slave. There are four points to focus on to be a great leader.

- **1** Jesus starts with the heart.
- **2** Jesus calls us to go small in a supersized everything world.
- **3** Jesus dreams of team.
- **4** Jesus calls us to go slow.

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### Start with the heart

If we want to change the world, we must start with our heart, our own secret motivation. James and John are aiming for the top jobs. They realise Jesus is about to make it big and they want the top jobs.

Jesus says if you want the top job you have to be willing to drink the cup I will drink; you have to be willing to suffer. There is always a sacrifice that comes through suffering – not from a title or position.

In suffering, in the odd bit of failure, we grow in authority. We must release our young people not just to succeed but also to fail. If we have set it up so they can't fail, then they won't learn. This is not to put them in danger or to be stupid but an opportunity to learn.

Robert M'Cheyne said "My people's greatest need is my personal holiness".

The young people's greatest need is not what we do with them but what we do without them. Building our own personal holiness.

### He calls us small

Not many of us choose the small, most of us want the big; but we must choose the small. Whatever our calling, we cannot be great from the start. We must begin with the little we have in front of us and God will make it grow. If we are faithful in the small that God has given us, then He will trust us with the big!

We must understand that we are small and it is God who is big.

Many times in the Bible we see those who are faithful with the small things, God trusts with the big things. David was a shepherd boy before God raised him up. Joseph continued to be faithful each step of his journey.

Jesus calls us to go small, and stay faithful.

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## He dreams of team

Jesus says serve one another, Paul says submit to one another. God Himself is relationship, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God's strategy for changing the world is 12 people loving one another. That was the team Jesus chose!

We must avoid comparison within a team. There are only two possible outcomes: we think we are better than others and we put them down; or we put ourselves down as we think they are better.

We are different, we are called. we need one another. He calls us to work together.

He goes slow

Finally, Jesus calls us to go slow. He had three years to change the world and He still had time for picnics, parties and to go fishing! Most of us don't have that time. Jesus is kind of a big deal and yet he had space to live in the world.

We live in a manically driven world and Jesus calls us to go slow. Discipleship is slow, it's a long journey over months and years. Maybe what we are doing feels slow, small and hidden but the Bible says Jesus is more committed to our fruitfulness than we are, He knitted us together in our mother's womb, He has plans to prosper us, He will build His church, the gates of hell will not prevail. We can trust Him, we can seek Him, and we can withdraw with Him and He will make us fruitful.

If we want to be great leaders, then we must serve. Serve our families, our friends and our communities. Ultimately, we must serve Christ in all we do.

A group of boys walked from Horsted Keynes to Blackland Farm where they cooked meals and camped overnight, being instructed by Terry en route.

On Remembrance Day, a select contingent from all three sections worthily represented us at the village commemoration and service at the Parish Church. Keith gave the address to a packed congregation. One of these years, we will have a newly trained drum team to lead the parade back to King Edward Hall.

We are so grateful for the constant encouragement we receive from members of our congregation: please may we ask that they help us to grow numerically – we want our small Company to be a bigger one!

# Leave Room



### O come to my heart, Lord Jesus.....

**S** o much of our Christmas preparations have been 'disinfected' to consist of warm fuzzy feelings. So it is not surprising that we forget that while Christmas celebrates the coming among us of a tiny baby as the Emmanuel, God-with-us, His coming was indeed a sign of contradiction. We understate the fact that Mary, who was heavily pregnant, and Joseph were turned away from the inn because there was no room.

We forget the slaughter of the Holy Innocents and that the infant Jesus was spared their fate only through the hurried flight into Egypt where the Holy Family lived in future hope for many years as what today we would call political refugees. Yet this is the Christmas reality experienced today by the ever-growing number of migrants and refugees throughout the world. There is a humanitarian crisis on our doorstep. The stark reality is that 12 million Syrians have fled their homes because of conflict; half are children. 4 million are refugees. Children affected by the Syrian conflict are at risk of becoming ill, malnourished, abused, or exploited. Millions have been forced to guit school. More than 700,000 Syrian refugees and other migrants risked their lives this year to travel to Europe. It's a heartbreaking situation but the headlines scream at us: that most people in the UK don't want refugees coming here.

It may be difficult to believe, but rather than drawing us closer to God, sometimes Christmas actually draws us away! No wonder the little girl who was praying "forgive us our trespasses" got confused and said, "forgive us our Christmases."

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Sometimes we need to be forgiven for our Christmases. We simply leave no room for Jesus.

Over the summer, our family was very fortunate to be able to attend a conference in Speyer, Germany, entitled "We are One". During our last night our host Sabine, a social worker, who has befriended a number of asylum seekers, invited them to a barbeque at her home. It was fascinating listening to Malik, Ali, Tarig and Issak, four young men from Pakistan and Afghanistan, tell their story of hurried flight and future hope. All four had been in Germany for over two years, Ali nearly three. All four were still waiting for an interview – an interview which would determine their right to stay. All four were graduates, intelligent young men in their twenties. All had left their homeland because they had to - their life was threatened. Tarig had left a wife and two children and hadn't seen them for over two years. As Issak said: we would not have left our families and our homes unless we had to. This is the Christmas reality: we are not one.

This encounter has left me wondering about the significance of 'no room in the inn' that first Christmas and for us in 2015. Perhaps one reason there was no room for Jesus was ignorance. After all, how could the innkeeper know the baby about to be born was the Son of God? Or perhaps the innkeeper was too busy what with everything else that was occupying his time. The choices which we make as human beings often lead to disaster for ourselves or others. The Christmas story teaches us that the faithful love of God is always seeking better outcomes than human folly dictates.

Christmas is the time we celebrate Emmanuel, this God-with-us, who makes the promise of God's faithful love real amongst us. This promise stands in a world which gives us cause to grieve as well as to rejoice. It is no accident that the gospel writers are at pains to set the story of the infant Jesus in a world of power politics, fear and injustice.

It is only when we have the measure of such challenges to our lives (such as we did this summer in our encounter in Speyer) that we can truly celebrate the God who comes among us as a helpless child and, in doing so, reveal to the world that the faithful love of God is greater than anything else.

Russell, Cameron and Ross join me in wishing you the gladness of Christmas, which is hope, the spirit of Christmas, which is peace, and the heart of Christmas, which is love.
