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Dear friends

s I returned to the pastorate from my sabbatical I noticed change. The change of season has a chill in the air, which led me to get my down filled jacket out of the wardrobe to walk to a meeting. Change can be seen in the trees, my car was so covered with leaves the other morning that it had seemingly turned from its normal strange grey colour (commonly known as filthy) to become a beautiful mottled orange and vellow, but I had to dust them all off before I could drive it. The seasonal change can be seen in the shorter evenings as the sun sets, and also as the stars come out and we start to see the winter constellations - My favourite Orion (because it is so easy to recognise) has been hidden for much of the summer but is now rising into the sky before I go to bed. These are all indications that we are moving towards the end of the year.

The times they are a changin', was written by Bob Dylan, this year's winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature. I doubt many who heard that song for the first time back in the '60's ever imagined its composer would win such a prestigious award, indeed this is the first time ever that a composer has received this accolade, I guess that is indeed an indication that change is around us in not just weather but in the understanding of the arts, and the politics of the generations. The hard – soft Brexit debate is barely off the news, nor the economy. Uncertainty and change makes the financial markets volatile, and it is possible we will see this impact our lives through what happens to our mortgage or the price of goods in the shops. Change may make us worried, but we need not be, because we know where our hope comes from, the Lord Jesus Christ who is "the same yesterday, today and forever." Hebrews 13: 8

We heard that verse on my first Sunday back, which was also the last Sunday for Adrian and Val Cookney as they head off to serve God in Bradford. Their answering of God's call demonstrates that although the Lord Himself is unchanging it does not mean His people in the church should be static; on the contrary we are called to be active. The very purpose of the church is to be God's Spirit empowered agent of change, yet too often people set in their ways reject this concept and try to stick with the status quo.

2000 years ago God's people were desperate for change, they were longing for the Messiah to free them from the world that had turned from His way. Perhaps as the nights grow darker, and the end of the month approaches, we too in the season of Advent will cry out loudly for Him to come and bring His change to the world. However the danger, as always when we pray, is that He will ask us to be part of the answer. May He give us the strength and courage to respond; to live out our faith as we engage in His mission, seeking transformation and redemption.

Life and Faith!

When Anne Elvin asked if I would write something about "my working career and how my faith has helped" it really set me thinking! So what have I (or rather God) done with my life?

I left school with a few GCE O Levels (GCSE nowadays) to work at the Bank of England in London – I disliked school, perhaps mainly because I was hopeless at sport. I studied at evening classes for A levels with the intention of gaining a place at a university.

My parents were members of Watford Congregational Church (my father was a deacon, treasurer and Church Secretary at various times) and I went, with a group of young people, each Sunday at 11am and 6.30pm. We listened quietly (some of the time) to some excellent preaching and had plenty of fun going to such places as Wembley Ice Rink, Palace Theatre etc; those were the (fairly) carefree days. During this time my faith grew, probably with three benchmarks which have stayed with me for the rest of my life. First, God is a God of Love, with an interest in everyone, even me. Second, His is the plan being followed, not always what I desire. Third, I must trust and have faith in Him, for He has a plan and a purpose vou never know what is round the corner. but God does!

This third point really played out when, one day, working at the Bank, I was

'phoned by my father who said he had two spare tickets for a concert at the Royal Albert Hall that evening; would I like them? Yes, please! At the time I had no regular girl friend, all friends were busy that evening, so I had no option but to ask the supervisor of the 25 girls in my section if she thought any would like to come out with me that evening. (I was prepared to ask myself but I was not sure which of the girls had regular boy friends and I could really get into embarrassing trouble asking the wrong one!). The girl she volunteered was Zena Birkbeck and this started a friendship and very happy marriage (when we were 22 and 21 years of age!) lasting 42 years 28 days. I'm sure God arranged for my father to have those tickets and for the happy outcome!

Clearly, God also had different plans about my going off to university. In my late teens I developed Crohn's disease and was told I was not to live away from home. So, I carried on with evening study taking 11 years to get my A levels, degrees, and finally a doctorate in mathematics from Imperial College. Such amazing support and encouragement from Zena, putting up with my three or more evenings a week of study. I'm sure God had a real hand in all this.

Meanwhile, the Bank had trained me in computing (remember this is the late 1950s, tape decks in large cabinets in air conditioned rooms etc) and after a few years I left to have a senior job at

Selfridges, concerned with developing their computer systems. This led to a move into Higher and Further Education, teaching maths and computer systems to undergraduate and post graduate students at London University and Brighton, and subsequently, after two or three more job promotions, being appointed principal of a large further education college in Hertfordshire where I stayed 11 years. Still under 50, I decided to do something different. I became Group Training Manager for BAA, the British Airports Authority, for a few years before retiring in 1992. Since then I've enjoyed various activities, including being a bus conductor on the Bluebell railway vintage bus. Retirement gave me extra time to be actively involved in church work, eq being Synod Clerk for some years, and preaching (although I lack any training).

I'm sure, going back to my three faith points, God's plan (rather than mine) was being worked out. Some surprising twists and turns that I couldn't have predicted; poor Zena's death in 2003, but a happy marriage to Mies since 2005 – God has given me two lovely wives.

Like everyone else, l've had ups and downs over the years but l've always counted on God's promised love and, even in the difficult times, tried to keep a steadfast faith knowing that His plan is evolving.

have very exciting news to share this month!

As you may know, I go into Oathall Community College every Wednesday to run a Christian Union with other leaders from other churches in Lindfield and Haywards Heath.

Over the past year, we have had a steady group of about 25 students come along, most of them from youth groups of the local churches. We have been focusing on teaching the students how to spread the gospel, and why to spread the gospel; encouraging them to tell their friends about their faith.

On Wednesday 5th October, we put on a 'Grill a Christian' event, where anyone can come along to ask the leaders questions that they have about their faith. We had done this a few times in the past and have always encouraged those who come to invite friends, though there have only ever been one or two extra people.

However, on the 5th we had 63 students squeeze into the classroom! There was standing room only! They all were keen to ask questions and it was such a shame that we only had 30 minutes to answer their questions! The leaders met quickly after, and discussed whether to do another 'Grill



a Christian' again the following week, as it had so much interest. We decided to do it again and we invited everyone back the next week.


Again, on the 12th, the room was packed! Some questions were about miracles, some about God's kindness, some about suffering. We are now in discussion as to how to 1) keep this momentum going and 2) direct those interested and with questions to youth groups where they can find out more.

Remembrance 100 years after the Somme

Remembrance Day this year will have a special significance. Almost exactly a century after the Battle of the Somme finally came to its inconclusive end (18th November) we shall once again be remembering all those who have lost their lives in war, or had their lives blighted by its consequences.

The unbelievable slaughter of the Somme – more than a million men were killed or wounded – made it perhaps the bloodiest battle of human history. The incessant bombardment of heavy artillery, the suicidal waves of attack by unprotected soldiers, the introduction, a few months from its close, of the first tanks in battle all contributed to the vast number of casualties, but so did the pointless efforts of both sides to break what was in fact a five month stalemate.

This was a battle nobody won but a million men lost.


This year we shall once again make our prayers for peace and our reflective remembrance against a back-drop of a world that is stubbornly inclined to think that problems can be solved by fighting over them.

In the Middle East and in parts of Africa there are still too many who believe that guns and bombs can solve things, when all the evidence of history is that they can't.

Today, a hundred years after the Battle of the Somme, historians still can't decide what the Great War was actually about. And the arrival of the Second World War in 1939 tells us that whatever anyone thought it was, five years of sickening killing had not settled it.

'We will remember them', we say. Surely the finest remembrance would be a world without violence. It still seems a long way off.

Mission Update

Release International

ast month LURC hosted Andrew Wilson who represents Release International, and he shared with us harrowing stories of Christian persecution around the world.

Release International provides Pastoral care and practical support to the thousands of Christians who are abused, imprisoned and martyred for their faith every year. Our prayers are so powerful, and God is providing them with the strength they need, His love, joy and peace to be with them, and He is using them to be fruitful witnesses to others.

Thank you for your generous monetary gifts which will give aid where it is needed.





Worthing Churches Homeless Projects (WCHP)

Our vision for the Worthing and surrounding area is a community where no local person needs to sleep out and everyone has the opportunity to fulfil their potential.

In November/December our Mission is Worthing Churches Homeless Projects.

Today WCHP helps over 1,000 people each year providing a range of services including a Day Centre and four Accommodation Projects. Any one night there are up to 58 people in their accommodation services and on average they have 20-30 people every day at the Day Centre. They work with them on a one to one basis to enable them to live independently once again.

The provision of these services, as well as the upkeep of their properties, costs in excess of £2.4 million annually.

There will be more information going up on the Mission Board and in next month's Good News magazine.

Wider World

International Christian Consulate

The ICC was established in 2015 as a non-Governmental Organisation to protect the growing need and interests of Christians in the Middle East, especially those fleeing persecution or subject to discrimination in their home nations.

At the moment, there is urgent need for action for the Christian minority within the overall refugee population in Greece. There has been a serious lack of understanding of their vulnerability within the camps and hundreds fear for their lives because of their religion.

Many of them have suffered targeted attacks involving beatings, threats at knife-point, death threats, rape, destruction of property and slashing of tents. They are forced to live covertly among radicalised Muslims, some of whom openly claim to be Daesh.

There is a very real and pressing need to segregate these people within the camps, as 88% say that they have been persecuted in some way. Some are being put into safe houses in the centre of Athens, and the ICC is opening a centre for 150 vulnerable Christians which should be open to welcome them just in time for Christmas.

A new Mission has been launched as Christian agencies have joined forces in a new outreach to evangelise people of other faiths in the UK.

The Evangelical Alliance is working with London City Mission and Global Connections to reach out with the Gospel to the five million people in this country who are part of a non-Christian religion.

The "Reaching the World on your Doorstep" event takes place on November 23rd at St Mellitus College, the evengelical college in West London. Ideas will be shared about how to engage more effectively with non-Christian people of faith.

In the past, missionaries went overseas, but, nowadays, people with different faiths are living amongst us and the methods of outreach and evangelism might need refining. The hope is that more can be learnt about reaching out and sharing the Good News of Jesus.
