

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Dear friends

Mission Group

Mercy Ships



Some years ago, my husband Ted and I went to London docks to look around the Mercy Ships' 'Anastasis', which was here for an overhaul. We were astonished to see how this ship had been transformed into a floating hospital, and from that day on Ted devoted a lot of his giving and prayer time to this worthy cause.

When Paul Hellyer came to speak to us he told us that he had been a dentist for 30 years and on retirement had volunteered on the Anastasis and also on their present ship, African Mercy. This independent hospital unit is manned by volunteers, from the captain, to deck hands, surgeons, cooks, teachers, people who clear tables etc.

There is a school, library, general store. In fact it is a floating village. There can be as many as 35 different nationalities on board at one time, and it has just completed it's second 18 month tour of Madagascar. It is now in South Africa being refitted, and soon it is going to Benin in West Africa.

It is advertised when the ship is coming, and on its arrival, there are thousands of people queuing for 'screening'. One father was bringing his seriously ill little boy, and he said "I knew God came with the ship". Mercy Ships attract crowds. JESUS attracted crowds who gathered, collected around him and followed him.

People were amazed at what He did. Jesus taught them, healed them, spoke in parables and had compassion on them. MERCY SHIPS USES THE JESUS MODEL. They teach people about health care, heal them, hire interpreters so that they can communicate and also get the Good News message across.

There are little or no medical facilities in these areas, and often dental and eye clinic patients have operations on the dockside as there is not enough room on the ship. The work performed is life changing for these people.

In Africa if you're blind you cannot get work, women cannot marry. A routine cataract operation changes this. Babies born with a cleft lip and palate were abandoned and starved to death because they think they're from the devil.

The ship operates a 'Walk in blood bank'-the crew is the blood bank! A Palliative Care Team and a Prayer Team go to villages where there are people who can't be helped.

Gary Parker who is a Maxillofacial surgeon, has dedicated his life to the organisation and brought up his family on board. Paul says he is top in the world and if he'd worked in America he could have earned millions.

Paul concluded his talk to us with a quote from St.Teresa of Avila.

"Christ has no body now but yours.

No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world.

Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good.

Ours are the hands through which he blesses the entire world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, and you are his body.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours".

Ever changing

Scenes of life

There is so much in life we humans take for granted - 'We're in control of our lives' - until one comes up against it. The prevailing nature of today's world impacts upon peoples' lives with such force; yet, notwithstanding this, there's an air of illusory thinking 'I'm impervious to such things; it can't possibly touch my life'! But life can suddenly be turned upside down by the unexpected – as mine has been!!!

I was overcome by severe osteoarthritis that hit me like a 'ton of bricks', reducing me to a helpless confusion of chronic pain that essentially, left me powerless to do the things I'd always been able to do, & yes, taken it for granted!

Having been so capable & self-sufficient - despite various medical problems I've had most of my adult life, I thought I could overcome anything - in my selfdelusion. Finally, however, following risky cervical neck surgery, I found myself in a vulnerable position; I implored God with every fibre of my being, to release me from this ordeal of hopeless despair. God heard my plea, and has blessed me with His providence, and I now, know more fully that, He is the only true source of my strength, joy and peace. Indeed, I still stumble and get things wrong, but it's so assuring to be gift-wrapped in the Lords' forgiveness and ever-loving arms.

He has led me to do voluntary work with the Chaplaincy team at the P. R. H. from which, I gain so much pleasure meeting, talking, and sometimes – if they wish it, praying with vulnerable patients and their relatives. I count it a privilege and a blessing to do this for God.

I find the words in the following poem, so amazing and profound, and I hope you are inspired by them, as am I.

'The Gate of the Year' is the popular name given to the poem, written by Minnie Louise Haskins. She was a remarkable lady, born and educated near Bristol where she studied informally at University College, Bristol while undertaking voluntary work for the local Congregational Church. By 1903 she was working in Lambeth for the Springfield Hall Wesleyan Methodist mission and in 1907 she departed for Madras with the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society to work in the Zenana mission to women.

The title given to it by the author was 'God Knows'. She studied and then taught at the London School of Economics in the first half of the twentieth century.

God knows

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way." So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

So heart be still: What need our little life Our human life to know, If God hath comprehension? In all the dizzy strife of things both high and low, God hideth His intention

God knows. His will Is best.

The stretch of years which wind ahead, so dim to our imperfect vision. Are clear to God.

Our fears are premature;

In Him, all time hath full provision.

Then rest: until God moves to lift the veil from our impatient eyes, When, as the sweeter features of life's stern face we hail, fair beyond all surmise God's thought around His creatures Our mind shall fill.

Background

The poem, written in 1908 and privately published in 1912, was part of a collection titled The Desert. It caught the public attention and the popular imagination when King George VI quoted it in his 1939 Christmas broadcast to the British Empire. The poem was brought to his attention by his wife, Queen Elizabeth the Queen Consort.

The book "The Servant Queen and the King She Serves" published for Queen Elizabeth II's 90th birthday, and with a Foreword by Queen Elizabeth, says that it was the young Elizabeth herself, aged 13, who handed the poem to her father.

The poem was widely acclaimed as inspirational, reaching its first mass audience in the early days of WW2. Its words remained a source of comfort to the Queen for the rest of her life, and she had its words engraved on stone plaques and fixed to the gates of the King George VI Memorial Chapel at Windsor Castle, where the King was interred. Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother was also buried here in 2002, and the words of "The Gate of the Year" were included in a reflection in her funeral order of service.



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

The remaining Lighthouse groups will remain the same; Glowworms is for children aged 3 years – Reception, Stars is for children for school years Reception – year 2, and Lasers caters for children in school years 3 – 6. Glowworms, Stars and Lasers use Scripture Union material so that each group is considering the same story or theme but the material is targeted at different age ranges and the LEDs and Neons will follow their own syllabus which is determined by the leaders.

Each group obviously seeks to engage with the children with activities appropriate for their age so that these vary slightly from group to group but it would be fair to say that they include lots of exciting crafts, games, stories, songs and discussion. If you like the sound of this but are over 16 while I regret we cannot cater within the groups for older 'kids' there is always a welcome for new helpers. If this is something you would like to consider then please speak to Danny or myself.

Once a month we have Jigsaw, this is a totally different session when the older groups all meet together. Then we have lights and music, worship, puppets and a lot of fun! We are drawing to the close of our current series which has been Gods Big Top (you may have noticed some suspicious looking clowns in services on Jigsaw Sundays!). We have learned about different Bible characters and their similarity to people that you might find in the circus and have thought about what they can teach us about following Jesus and being his disciples. If you want to know more then please ask one of the children! We are starting a new series in September so watch the Jigsaw board in the hall for clues on our new theme!

We have had a good year in Lighthouse and the children and young people in our congregation are always a blessing. It is a source of great encouragement that they are always so keen to get out to their groups and activities.

As well as our Sunday morning activities we have also enjoyed a 'make a pizza party' at Pizza Express for our Christmas outing and the staff at the restaurant were very impressed with the childrens' involvement and good behaviour.

Over the month of August the children have enjoyed being led by a number of different people and our grateful thanks go to all who generously give of their time so that the regular teachers can have time off over the summer. From September the launch of the new group means that we now have some additional resourcing requirements but this is a good problem to have and we trust that God will faithfully provide as He has always done in the past.

We would always love to welcome new children and young people but are also very aware that God has blessed us already with a fantastic group of young people and we seek to honour God and them week by week as we spend time together. Please keep the teachers and children in your prayers, that both teachers and children will deepen their relationship with God and that we will see growth, both spiritually and numerically in the next year.

Wider World

The Maldives

What do you think of when you hear of the Maldives? Probably a tropical island paradise with warm seas and beautiful beaches.

While these things are true, it is not the easiest place to live if you are not a Muslim. All citizens and holders of Public Office are required to be Muslims and stricter forms of Islam are now entering public life. Recently, a woman was sentenced to death by stoning for committing adultery, though this verdict was eventually overturned.

Foreign workers are under increasing pressure to wear more modest dress. There are restrictions on Bibles entering the country. Christians have to meet in secret and they do not have a full Bible translated into the Dhivehi language. The Maldives is actually thirteenth on the Open Doors watch list for Christian persecution, which is higher than Saudi Arabia.

Laos

aos has a repressive communist government, though the population is mostly Buddhist.

The Religious Freedom report states that local authorities are often intolerant towards non-Buddhist religions, particularly Protestantism. Church leaders have been threatened if they continue to preach and some have been arrested and killed. Numerous Christians have been pressured to recant their faith under threats from local authorities.

Freedom of expression is not highly valued in Laos, so deviation from the norm is often treated with suspicion according to Open Doors. When churches grow, tensions can develop between Christians and the local tribes over local resources. If Christians refuse to participate in Buddhist religious services it can cause friction in local areas leading to more threats and persecution.

The story behind...

The Hymn; Jesus Thy Blood and Righteousness

Jesus, Thy blood and righteousness
My beauty are, my glorious dress;
Midst flaming worlds, in these arrayed,

With joy shall I lift up my head.

Bold shall I stand in that great day,

Cleansed and redeemed, no debt to pay;

Fully absolved through these I am

From sin and fear, from guilt and shame...

Jesus, be endless praise to Thee, Whose boundless mercy hath for me, For me, and all Thy hands have made.

An everlasting ransom paid.

Some of the most unlikely people become Christians, never mind go on to write much loved hymns. People like Count Nicholas Ludvig Von Zinzendorf, for example. He was born 1700 into a fabulously wealthy family in Saxony, and after law studies at the University of Wittenberg, had set out to travel in great style. But Zinzendorf got only as far as an art gallery in Dusseldorf before he had a Damascus Road experience.

For here Zinzendorf encountered a painting of Christ. His head was bowed and the inscription read: 'This have I done for thee, and what hast thou done for me?'

Zinzendorf was stopped in his tracks. He could not give any answer to the question. Like Paul, the encounter with the living Christ left him awed, shaken and confused. He returned to his large estate in Berthelsdorf in inner turmoil. It was a spiritual crisis that would change the course of his life. For, at 22, on his wedding day, he and his bride put aside their rank of nobility in order to follow Jesus.

Shortly after this Zinzendorf met a member of the Moravian Brothers, an Order which had been founded 300 years earlier by John Hess of Bohemia. He welcomed the brotherhood to live on his estate, and within ten years 600 Moravians had arrived

Zinzendorf divided them into little missionary groups, and sent them off across the world.

Thus the Moravian Brothers went to Greenland, Holland, India, America and the Indies. In all, they had 165 missions scattered around the world. They accepted disease, poverty, loneliness and persecution in their determination to follow their Master

Zinzendorf was not only a leader and visionary, he was also a poet – he wrote 2,000 hymns. This one was penned while he was on board a ship set for the West Indies in 1739.

In late 1741 Zinzendorf himself began a mission to the Indians of Pennsylvania. As it was only four days to Christmas, he named the little colony Bethlehem. Today it is a great steel centre, and the Moravian capital of the USA.

The former Count spent his vast wealth on missions, and when he died at 60 there was not even enough money left to pay for his grave. He had laid up his true treasure in Heaven, instead.
