

### Knitivity It's not a spelling mistake, please read on!

April seems a little (or a lot!) too early but your help is needed to prepare for a special walking Christmas grotto depicting scenes from the nativity. ### Book Review Let There Be Science

Why God loves science, and science needs God

By Tom McLeish & David Hutchings



hy is it that science has consistently thrived wherever the Christian faith can be found? Why is it that so many great scientists – past and present – attribute their motivation and their discoveries, at least partially, to their Christian beliefs? Why are the age-old writings of the Bible so full of questions about natural phenomena? And, perhaps most importantly of all, why is all this virtually unknown to the general public?

As authors Tom McLeish and David Hutchings examine the story of science, and look at the part that Christianity has played, they uncover a powerful underlying reason for doing science in the first place. In example after example, ranging from 4000 BC to the present day, they show that thinking with a Christian worldview has been intimately involved with, and sometimes even directly responsible for, some of the biggest leaps forward ever made.

# **Jesus said**"Because I live, you will live too"

### **Christ is risen.** He is risen indeed. Allelujah! **?**

These are words which reverberate round the world every Easter – from the great Orthodox churches of the East to the evangelical and Pentecostal gatherings of the South – and even in the more staid worship centres in the North.

"Jesus lives!" – That's the Easter message - what the Gospel is all about.

When Rosemary & I went off to Switzerland in 1990, people commented "what a wonderful place to live". They had an idealistic, picture postcard idea of what Switzerland was like in winter – skiers swishing down crisp, white pistes under beautiful clear, blue skies.

As often happens, the truth was somewhat different. Where we lived, beside Lac Léman, there was no more snow than we have in Sussex. In fact Geneva had sold off its snow ploughs to save money, which brought a typical British chaos if an inch or two of snow did fall! And for much of the winter, a cotton wool blanket of cloud settled just overhead right across the lake, which meant that you did not see the gleaming white caps of the Alps and Jura mountains for weeks on end. It was rather dull, oppressive and depressing.

But then, just around this time of year, the thick cumulus would suddenly dissipate, the long lost sun would reappear and Mont Blanc would be there in its dazzling pinky white. The trees would bud, the blossom would burst out, the birds would sing and life was very different. Spring had come!

It is, perhaps, a happy accident of the calendar that we, in the northern hemisphere, celebrate Easter at this time of year when new life shouts at us at every turn.

Jesus lives! What does that mean?

First, Jesus is "Emmanuel", which means "God with us". Resurrection freed Jesus to be right here with us, now. Easter is all about the immanence of Jesus.

Human beings have many different concepts of God – for many religions he is a remote, austere and judgmental figure. Our God is a living God, a God who has visited his people, suffered and died alongside us. Jesus final words in Matthew's gospel were "I shall be with you always, to the very end of time".

"Jesus lives" means we can rely on him, lean on him, trust him – because he is alongside and ready to share the burden. Do you remember that lovely story of a man walking along a beach with Jesus and looking back he sees two lines of footprints in the sand. But sometimes there is just one line and he complains to Jesus "Why, at some difficult times did you leave me?"

'My precious, precious child' the Lord replied, 'I love you and will never leave you. When you needed me most, you will only see one set of footprints, because it was then that I carried you."

It's a lovely picture isn't it – Jesus carrying us piggy-back along life's beach when we cannot cope. That's what Easter is about.

But secondly, it's not just Jesus being with us – doing something for us. Easter means that we change.

We hear the phrase "born again Christians" often enough, but it leaves us feeling a bit uneasy. Maybe it's a bit of our British reticence showing through!

One of the things my time with the World Council of Churches taught me was that we here have become a bit too inhibited about our faith. I spent time in Harare, planning the Council's 8th Assembly, in 1998. On Sundays we used to be taken to local congregations – often worshipping in Shona rather than English, so we did not get too much of what was said.

But the atmosphere, the sense of a community of living faith, certainly got through.

Jesus was right there - he had changed these people. They think and act differently. They try to make the Gospel relevant in daily life, in the way they do their work and relate to their families.

New life means Jesus replaces self at the heart of things. As Paul put it so graphically to the Galatians (2:20) "It is no longer I who live, but Christ, who lives in me".

"As the Father sent me, so send I you" (John 20:21). So the risen Christ continues to call us in his service – to be his body, to love as he loved us, to reflect that love and new life into a desperately needy world. That is the Easter Day calling of the Church of the living Christ.

May Jesus' words ring in our ears... "Because I live, you will live also". Let your light so shine before others that they may see the good that you do and given glory to your Father, who is in heaven.

### **Spring has sprung!**

Things are really on the move in the garden. If you love gardening, that is really good news. If you don't, here a few tips that might help.

Do you feel that your garden seems to be getting longer or steeper these days? For some of us reading this it could be because we're getting older and less mobile! Don't worry help is at hand. There's quite a lot that you (or someone else) can do to make your life just that little bit easier.

For example, you could make mowing your grass a bit less of a chore by filling in any little annoying beds that are cut out in the lawn (and you don't have to edge them either!).

It may be obvious, but you may like to extend your patio: after all, if you are retired, you will have more time to sit outside and enjoy a cuppa. If you have room, you can easily brighten up this area by having a few colourful containers of plants which need little maintenance and can be moved about on wheels.


If you are not particularly keen on gardening, you might like to consider ground cover plants that smother those wretched weeds. Good examples include Hedera (Ivy). Vinca (Periwinkle) and the lesser know Pachysandra, all of which are available with plain or variegated leaves. Ericas (Heathers) need little maintenance and give you good colour.

Finally, just take time to look around you at God's marvellous Creation especially the seasonal bluebells, daffodils and other bulbs which never fail to appear each Spring no matter how harsh or wet the Winter may have been.

This is a wonderful example of His faithfulness to us all.

### What's so Good?

As we approach Easter our Diary has two dates – Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, but to those outside of the church there must be a sense of "what strange names", and particularly a question of why we use the word "Good" in connection with the day Jesus, the Son of God, died in agony upon the cross, but first let us think of "Maundy" because Thursday does come before Friday.

Much of the language of the church used to be in Latin. This would include prayers, some singing, and the reading of the Bible. On the Thursday of Holy Week, the day before we remember the crucifixion, the worship service would recall the last supper and how Jesus washed his disciple's feet.

A song would have been sung similar to "A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you" (Author unknown) based on the teaching of Jesus in John 13. The opening word of the Latin song was "Mandatum", which has the meaning "commandment". From Mandatum we get Maundy which became the name of the religious ceremony of foot washing on that day. Maundy Thursday is a day to remember to Love with a servant heart.

There are at least three different understandings of "Good."

The first is that Good has an archaic meaning of being Holy, it is a special, Holy Friday.

The second is that "Good" is a lengthening of "God", it is therefore God's Friday, a special day.

The third way it is understood, a way it is often taught to children, is that through dying for our sins Jesus has done a Good thing, because of that Friday we can be forgiven and become a hopeful people.

Whatever our level of Latin, or our understanding of what "Good" means, what we should remember from these two days is the Good News that the love of God was revealed by Jesus to his disciples, and to the world. He was blameless, we are not, but through his sacrifice our price of punishment was paid.

The story does not end stood at the cross, or with the sealing of the tomb. Easter Sunday allows a celebration because our Heavenly Father raised his Son from the grave and revealed to believers that death is not the end, we may know eternal life.


This year's theme is 'One for All'. We will be learning how to be One People, God's people, in His world.

If you could go anywhere on holiday where would it be?


I would love to go to Antarctica.

### ABBA Knowing Me Knowing You

It is now less than three months until our church weekend away at Pilgrim Hall near Uckfield on the 16th to the 18th June.

The programme for the weekend is being prepared and will be led by Lorna and the Reverend David Bedford from Dorking United Reformed Church.

As the theme of the weekend David explains that Jesus used the word 'Abba' (Aramaic), a very intimate title best translated 'Daddy' to speak to God: come and renew your intimacy with Him, with your brothers and sisters, and in the light of such a dynamic relationship share the hope in your heart with others. Jesus says "Lay all your love on me": come and discover what it is to be loved by God and by His Family, and to become a channel of His Love to others.

Throughout the weekend David and Lorna will lead teaching sessions. There will also be activities for children and young people, worship and time to grow together sharing this special time over meals and whilst relaxing.

We are encouraged by the number of our church family who have confirmed they will be attending. Our desire is to share this time with as many of you as possible and are pleased to confirm that you can still book your place. There is an opportunity for you to join us a resident for the weekend or to attend during the day. The accommodation includes disability friendly bedrooms and transport will be available to Pilgrim Hall. If we can assist with any additional needs please let us know.

We are blessed that our recent gift day raised 50% towards the £10,000 estimated cost of the weekend. There will be second gift day on Sunday 14th May.

# Round & Round Lighthouse

Larly in my working life I was trained in an engineering company that among other things produced the sweeping beams of light without which a lighthouse would have little purpose. To see up close the full lighthouse optics which was made of huge gleaming cut glass prisms that had been ground and polished, set in a cast pedestal which weighed 6 tons was inspiring. To an enquiring mind the application of this mass of glass and metal raised a number of questions but did not cause me to doubt the design really worked.

- Q: How can friction be reduced so that this structure can rotate its beams of light across the sea?
- **A:** Float it on liquid metal.
- Q: How come the light beam can be seen miles away?
- **A:** Install a light bulb with the equivalent brightness of one and a half million candles or more.



Around 2009 I was involved for a year or so in a UK government sponsored initiative about offshore wind farms. This involved working with a cross section of industry, a power company, a university together with small and large enterprises and, of course, a government monitor who attended our monthly meetings. task which created a lot of questions was to propose a viable solution to remotely monitor the integrity of structures on offshore wind farms so that maintenance was carried out in a timely manner and catastrophic failure avoided. This meant we had to establish the information required, how it would be measured. collected and then be available where and when it was needed. The latter was my part in the project.

Both of these work experiences remind me that there are always questions to be asked. It is a real issue however if we do not know what we do not know, so questions are not asked and therefore not answered and we find ourselves stuck when we need answers to questions that suddenly really matter to us.

Not all big questions have stock answers but what is needed is a firm foundation, values on which to build our life at work and leisure, with family, friends and colleagues. There are plenty of pitfalls in life some of which superficially look like a good idea and may be seem harmless, but is that really the case? Mindfulness for example when promoted as developing life skills is not sufficient. For me being mindful of the powerful beam of light was not sufficient. It was necessary to ensure I was not in this light beam as I knew what would happen. In that and many of life's scenarios, informed judgments need to be made.

### **Mission Update**

March-April 2017



#### **Operation Mobilisation**

House of Joy - Peja, Kosovo

During March and April this year our Mission Focus is on Operation Mobilisation (OM) and the work they are doing in Peja, Kosovo (The House of Joy). Here is an extract from a recent prayer newsletter received from one of the UK families which are members of the multinational OM team working in Peja:

"Kosovo is a very poor country. Youth unemployment hovers around the 60% mark and Kosovo is consistently in the bottom two poorest countries in Europe. It manufactures almost nothing and the economy is based on aid and nationals working abroad and sending money back. Almost every family has someone working abroad. The ones that do not, often struggle.

Kosovo has poor women's rights (rates of violence against women are high). The House of Joy, which we run, is a centre for victims of domestic violence and human-trafficking and their children.

When we talk about trafficking we generally mean girls from Kosovo being pushed into prostitution within Kosovo, normally by someone they know. It is a long-term work as the women have endured years of abuse and are deeply damaged with absolutely no one to care for them. Another branch of this ministry is a trade skills training centre which works with teenagers at risk of becoming victims or abusers. We are blessed with a good relationship with local authorities.

Please pray for us in this work. Your role is vital and we have often felt so strengthened and encouraged by the knowledge that people at home are supporting us in prayer."

Extreme drought conditions, often worsened by conflict, have left millions on the brink of starvation and it will only get worse if we don't act quickly.

Tearfund are providing malnutrition treatment for approximately 50,000 mothers and children in South Sudan, as well as food support and clean water to thousands of others in South Sudan and Somaliland. Their teams in Ethiopia and Kenya have been helping communities cope better with the challenges of drought and have plans to respond to this crisis as soon as funding is available.

# A Bible and a bus ticket home

n one trip to Mexico in the mid-1990's I frequently worked late in my hotel room counting flies on traps (as you do!) and I listened to music videos on the TV to help the time pass. One very catchy song that I heard many times, "That's my story", was by a US country singer, Collin Raye, and so I bought the album it came from, "Extremes", when I returned home.

Wikipedia says that Collin Raye was "... raised as a Southern Baptist but became a Catholic when he was 23 years old. On February 17, 2016, Raye performed at the "Two Nations, One Faith" celebration at Sun Bowl Stadium in El Paso, Texas, prior to the stadium's simulcast of the Mass performed by Pope Francis just across the Mexican border in Ciudad Juarez "The biography on his website says that he has consistently used his stardom to advance social causes and in 2001, at the Country Radio Seminar, he was presented with the organization's Humanitarian of the Year award in recognition of his issueoriented music and his tireless charity work. On the "Extremes" album is a song called "Little Rock", an anthem for those struggling with addiction recovery. When it hit the charts in 1994, its video led to over 100,000 phone calls to Alcoholics Anonymous from people seeking help with their addictions

Also on the "Extremes" album is a less well known, simple but profound song about letting your children go with all they need for the future, written in 1993 by Craig Wiseman and James Dean Hicks. A reviewer of the album wrote: "the warmhearted tale of a mother's farewell gift of 'A Bible and a bus ticket home' to a teenager leaving home with Nashville dreams, is tenderly sung and a definite highlight".

In the acknowledgements he wrote for "Extremes", Collin Raye thanks God and he also says how he is "Forever grateful to my Mama". Clearly God and his family are very important to Collin Raye and the song is essentially reflecting that – all we really need to get on in life is a Christian faith and knowledge of the love and support of family and friends.


#### Lyrics to "A Bible and a bus ticket home"

### Romania

There are many protests taking place in Romania at present. The main candidate for Prime Minister, Liviu Dragnea, was accused of stealing money from the government. His party then passed an emergency law decriminalising offences by government officials which involved sums of £40,000 or less, thus enabling Dragnea to become Prime Minister, which he couldn't do if he was judged for acts of corruption!

This is when the protests started, which are the largest seen in Romania since the revolution in1989. So far, the demonstrations have remained peaceful which is in stark contrast to the last time when many people died. The protesters want to show that they are a very different country nowadays, and they long to make Romania better.

Romanian Christians have been responding with the power of prayer. Many young people in the evangelical churches in the larger cities have been gathering together after the protests have finished to pray for the country and the people in power that they will rule in a godly manner.

Operation Mobilisation has been working in Romania and they want to equip the Romanian Church to be a launch pad for widespread spiritual change in the name of Christ. We ask God to bless this ministry.

### The Middle East

Two Christian pastors working in the Middle East were recently arrested and accused of blasphemy against Islam. Locked up in a secret jail, they were severely beaten by the brutal prison guards and then informed that would soon meet an horrific death

After a night of torture, they cried out to the Lord and prayed to Him for forgiveness and salvation. The following day a Muslim prison official came into their cell. The two pastors thought that they were about to receive their death sentence.

To their utter surprise, however, the official sat down with them and told them that he had dreamt about Jesus Christ for three consecutive nights, "He was sitting on a throne with an orb of light rotating around him", he said. On the third night Jesus told him, "My children are being tortured in your prison. They are the apple of my eyes." The dream had such a powerful effect on the official that he had rushed to the jail in order to release them. In another amazing twist, he accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour and Lord, asking the two pastors to baptise him, which they gladly did.

It is reported that many other Muslims in the Middle East have had similar visions, transforming their lives. We rejoice in this and pray that many more people come to Christ in this way.
