

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Dear friends

As I left my house the other night, to attend a meeting at the church, my heart suddenly was saddened. It was not the rain that was falling, the chill wind blowing, or something that I had overheard which had made me stop and briefly think in a glum way, but rather an absence of something I had become used to.

A light had gone out, or rather a few hundred lights had gone out.

The High Street was no longer illuminated by the string of colourful bulbs, and the trees, although still with tresses of wire and glass, were no longer sparkling white. It would seem the lights that we use at the time we celebrate the coming of God's light into the world had been extinguished, the switch thrown to the off position, not to be turned back on for another eleven months.

The impression to me was, "well Christmas is over, get on with the darkness." Darkness in the bible is often used to signify mystery, danger, and the presence of those who would do evil. It is in darkness of night that Jesus said a thief may come (Matthew 24: 43), it is in the darkness of night we stumble and trip (John 11: 10), and it is in darkness that the priests and temple guard arrested Jesus (Luke 22: 53). However as I dwelt on this darkness some other verses also came to mind; At the very beginning of our bibles we see that God does not leave the universe a place of darkness but brings light (Genesis 1: 1-5).

In John's Gospel we find that Nicodemus a Pharisee could come from the darkness of night to discover Jesus and learn of how we may be saved from our sin (John 3: 1-21), and the apostle Paul wrote to the Colossians saying "He has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son He loves" (Col 1:13).

Whenever we open a newspaper, browse news websites, turn on the TV news, or listen on the radio we will hear of darkness, of things that will sadden our hearts, of war and violence, poverty and sickness, suffering and death, but we should be assured by our faith that this was not how God intended the world to be, and He offers light and life to all who will turn to Him.

It is our place as the church to be in the dark world, and shine His light for all to see.

May God's light fill your heart, and illuminate your path.

have been asked to write an article on my spiritual journey, which has led me to recently being elected as a Church Elder.

As far back as I can remember I have known the presence of God in my life. My first crisis point came when I was 18 and diagnosed with TB. Until then there had been no guaranteed cure, and I accepted that my life could be cut short, but I prayed that if that was not God's will for me, I wanted Him to take my life and use it in His service.

My life took many twists and turns and it got very 'messy' at times. It is only now that I realise that what God says in Genesis 28:15 is true---

"I am with you and will watch over you wherever you go".

He has gently guided me, and with the help of good friends in the church, I am experiencing a closer walk with the Lord which has seen me through the most difficult times in my life.

The Psalmist (Psalm 37:4,5) says:

"Delight yourself in the Lord.... Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him" We have not been promised an easy life, but if we believe, we know that He is walking beside us through it all, giving us the strength that we need day by day, always ready to listen when we talk to Him, and giving us that deep peace which the world cannot give.

I am deeply humbled and honoured that people have seen something in me which has led them to ask me to be their Elder-a role which I have never considered to be one for me.

Many years ago I read a book on Angels by Dr Billy Graham. It was fascinating and thought provoking, but left me unsure as to my belief. Then, when I was working for Kingdom Faith we travelled all over the country and used to say the Angels jumped off when we exceeded the speed limit! So, what are my thoughts now?



What is an angel? Is it just a spiritual experience or something? Does it just appear and disappear? Can it only be seen and heard by the one to whom it is sent or also to others around? If the latter, do they realise the significance? When does the recipient realise? You can probably think of other alternatives.

Let me recount my recent experience. I was at the Brighton Hospital waiting to be taken to the theatre when, what to me, seemed initially like an apparition "floated" into our area. He had a flowing consultant's gown floating behind him and also long, white hair. He came up to me and said he was an anaesthetist, but although he was not on my case they had been discussing my problems. He was fascinated and wanted to see me for himself. He then felt my chest area and listened on his stethoscope before thanking me and floating back from where he had appeard. "What a lovely man" commented my wife and daughters, but to me he was more than that.

It did not finish there, as next morning when I was lying in bed in the High Dependancy Ward this same vision appeard in the ward, came past three other beds and straight up to me. He did not say a word to me or anyone else but he leant over, shook my hand with a very strong grip, turned and went back the same way. This seemd amazing, but, the next morning, the very same thing happened again. To me, there was no doubt this was "my angel" who had come to reassure me and convey God's healing love. Amazing, or what?

I would love to read your thoughts about something I will never forget. Have you experienced anything similar? Do you believe in angels? What, also, did the anointing and laying-on of hands mean to you? Did my earlier article "Why Me" get you thinking as there were many comments from inside and outside the church?

Why not do a 'letter to the editor and share them?" I am sure the Editor would be pleased to have some ongoing discussion, so please put pen to paper or fingers to keyboard.

I now strongly say "Yes, I believe in Angels".



Journeying with Jesus

t is nearly two years since I came to the church, and during my settling in time one of the first meetings I had was with Val Cookney who was the co-ordinator of our home groups. Among the many different items we explored was the fact it had been quite some time since the membership of the home groups had been shuffled. Home groups have a dual role in the church of allowing time to explore God's word but also to enable people to develop trusting friendships.

We want long term relationships to build so that members may pastorally support and encourage each other in their faith. We also need strong relationship building across the whole church rather than the development of isolated groups, or even cliques, and so to encourage the growth of a healthy church it is a good thing to mix people around the groups every few years.

The reshuffle was considered overdue when I came, and this has grown greater still as we looked for the right time. We chose to do something new in 2017, which fits with our year's theme of relationships, however it was felt that perhaps the groups have been too long established to switch straight from old to new.



So the concept of a brief time in a different format where the church gathers as one (or rather one at 11am and another at 8pm) for a bible reading, an address and then splitting into small groups, would provide a suitable segue, or bridge.



The timing of the series from Epiphany through Lent, was able to provide us with a theme for the series, looking at episodes in the life of Jesus. I do hope you will be able to continue with us on our Journey, even if you were not with us in Bethlehem, or by the river Jordan Maybe you can catch up as we move into the Wilderness, or on towards Capernaum. We will continue to meet in the first and third weeks of the month, until Easter. Membership of the new home Groups will be announced before the end of this series, and the new aroups will commence in the first week of May. 
Boys' Brigade

Digital or Analogue?

s it a digital or analogue watch that give the most accurate time?



As we approached the year change from three digits (1999) to four digits (2000) there was a lot of talk about the risk of computer failure and the adverse effects on us all if this were to happen. In the event the technical transition into the 2000's went without a major hitch.

Over the same period and with little public awareness, changes the major in infrastructure that deliver our phone and data services was The transition underwav. has been described as the equivalent of changing all four engines on a airliner in mid-flight. This success in which I played no part but of which I did have detailed knowledge resulted in an invitation for me to live and work outside the UK.

In the late 90's I was offered a job with Spring Harvest to oversee their conference technologies including the proposals to extend the reach of Spring Harvest into Europe. As this was not the right time forme to make this move I later became a consultant in a global company specifically to support their bid for business into the then new world of broadband technology. On joining the corporation some time later it was then not long before I was flying about (in planes) for meetings in other countries and speaking at conferences and exhibitions.

The invitation to move to HQ came following one such conference where I had been the keynote speaker. Asked by a senior director why I was not working for him I replied that he had not asked me. He soon arranged that I moved to Sweden to lead a multinational team working across Western Europe.

I caught up with the team in the French Alps, on ski's. Not being used to skiing I skipped the imminent night ski run and took my time as I was short of breath en route to the sanctuary of a small cafe where we all met up. This proved to be the first of many team building events.

Back to the watch, which I am sure you know, is not dependent on the outward display but on the inward resources for its accuracy.

Like the watch, the pressure is to look at the outside rather than accessing the inward resources which are available to all through Jesus for all time.

GEAR Renewal movement serving the United Reformed Church



t is easy to assume everyone knows about organisations we support. Our Church supports GEAR and some of our Congregation are individual members but it may be a number are not clear what GEAR stands for.

GEAR was formed in 1974, shortly after the creation of the URC. Our previous minister Charles Martin was involved with those who had the original vision and became one of the founder members. Today there are more than 400 members of this voluntary network and the national magazine 'In GEAR' is distributed free of charge to over 3,000 people. We have copies available on the Concourse for anyone to take and read. We have also had a number of GEAR members come and speak, the most recent being Paul Stokes who spoke at our last Church Away Weekend. The Romans One Eleven Trust is also linked with GEAR

GEAR is wholly dependent on the prayers, giving and participation of individuals who share their aims, but all the events, ministries and resources are available for everyone within the URC.

GEAR aims:

To emphasise that the heart of all Christian life and work is a personal relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ;

- To promote growth in Christian faith and life that is rooted in the Bible;
- To pray for and to foster renewal by the Holy Spirit in the personal life of members and the corporate life of congregations and councils;
- To explore ways of evangelism, and to encourage participation in forms of outreach relevant to today.

GEAR is convinced that effective ministry and fruitful mission can happen only under the anointing of the Holy Spirit. Therefore we work and pray for personal and corporate renewal, looking to see individuals and churches move into a deeper intimacy with Jesus Christ.

GEAR invests personnel and resources, actively participating in the life of the Church through:

- Mobilising Prayer prayer guides in print and online, and a network of intercessors.
- Conferences several inspirational annual retreats for adults and youths.
- ERAs (Evangelism and Renewal Advocates) - three field-workers funded by GEAR as a resource for local churches exploring evangelism and renewal.
- Ignite & Dunamis one-day introductory event, and in-depth training retreats, equipping people for Spirit-empowered ministry.
- Publications booklets, a national 'In GEAR' magazine and a resource for ministers in training. Booklets include:
 - Let us Pray Mission Enabled Eldership Renewal in the Local Church Over the Horizon A Refreshing Stream

So if you didn't know much about GEAR I hope you now have a better understanding of the group we are part of and support. If you want any more information or would like to obtain any booklets please have a word with me.

Good Samaritan


