# **Dear friends**

By the time you read this I will be back home in Lindfield, with my wife and children, next door to the church, but that is not where I am writing. Although I am in familiar surroundings as I type this letter, the world has changed from the time I called this place home, for I am in my old bedroom, where I slept from the age of 7 until I went to university. It still has reminders of that era with my old wardrobe and bedside cabinet.

There is also a noticeboard on the wall with stickers, badges and other mementos, and the back of the door has a huge poster stuck to it of the first space shuttle blasting off from Cape Canaveral. This is a world I once inhabited, and for the moment am surrounded by, but although there is still the loving presence of my parents this is no longer my home.



The feeling I seem to get as I think of this house is also that when I think of the wider world in which us Christians inhabit I may have strong memories of the past, I will have been shaped by what has happened in this place; the things that I have done, the family traditions, and the conversations that have taken place here, but this is no longer my home. In John 17 Jesus, after washing his disciples' feet, on the night he was to be arrested, prayed for his friends. He recognised that they, like him, were not of the world but were in it. We might think of ourselves as people of the world but that would be wrong, we are citizens not of an earthly nature but of God's kingdom. The ways and habits of the world used to be our focus, but we now belong in a family whose home is in the heavenly realm.

That we now belong in a new home should rightly change how we relate to where we are. Our ethical values need to be reoriented from what is "right" for the country of our birth to the kingdom we now belong to. As we look at the political manifestos for the general election we need to apply something similar in our lives – do we vote for the way of the world and ideas that are to our old personal gain, or look to make a sacrifice in our vote so that God's Kingdom is the winner?

Earlier in the week, when at the Southern Synod's ministers' spring school, the meeting was challenged to consider the question "What Would Jesus Do?"

Not attached to a particular dilemma but whether it is a useful question. A group of us pondered whether the answer is always clear cut. Looking at how he responds to a variety of situations in a number of Gospels we came to the conclusion it perhaps would be easier to answer "What would Jesus not do?" or, "what might Jesus do?" either of which may result in a number of answers, each fitting a moral frame provided by the Bible.

Applying this to the position we will find ourselves in, just a few days after Pentecost when it is the General Election, it may well be that you see different glimmers of God's way in different parties; how then do we choose what is right? As with all decisions I urge you to pray and seek wisdom from our heavenly Father.

Whatever the outcome on the morning of the 9th June, please spend some time praying for those elected to both government and opposition parties, so that they might each seek to serve in a way that sees the growth of the kingdom.

A picture of our 'salute' to Dame Vera is shown. Thank you Henderson. Several other pictures are on the Perdido.Players Facebook page. Thanks again.



## **Pentecost**



am very excited to be asked to write an article on Pentecost, which this year falls on the 4th of June. Those of you who are familiar with ancient Jewish agricultural festivals (created to remind the Jews to spend time worshipping their unseen, living God) will know that the Feast of the Firstfruits falls at the same time that Passover took place when God killed the Egyptian babies and Pharaoh finally released the Israelites from slavery

(if you struggle with this, remember the Egyptians were throwing newborn Israelite boys into the River Nile); and (years later) on the same date God's Son Jesus was crucified and became the ultimate lamb of redemption to save people like you and me from the natural darkness of our own souls, when He was resurrected from death to life. Hallelujah!!!

Anyway seven times seven weeks (49 days +1) after the Feast of First fruits or Passover the Jews celebrate the Feast of Weeks when the produce from the first fruits shows living abundance. This is at the time of year when God gave the law to Moses and also (600 years later) the time of Pentecost. The time when God sent HIs promised Spirit on 120 people in Jerusalem. The Bible has never been a random scramble of events put together by humankind. It is the inspired word of the living God.

'Tongues of fire' portray the presence of God. The violent wind can also be translated 'to blow or to breathe', so the violent breath and presence of God filled the room with tongues of fire. Awesome! Dispersed Jews had come from all over the known world to celebrate the Feast of Weeks. When dispersed, Jews go home they take the message of Christ's resurrection and promised presence of the Holy Spirit with them. The message of Christianity is spread to the known world like wildfire.

#### Acts 2 v2

Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them.

All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. 9 9

This is Pentecost when the church of Jesus Christ was born. When I was at university I remember a lecturer, who was a doctor, saying that the Bible had been written by schizophrenics. How little he sadly understood! If you are still reading this, Well done.

Two years ago I went to Big Church Day Out. I wandered into the 14th century chapel alone at midday. The entrance was dark and cool compared to the brilliant sunshine outside.

Matt Maher was reverently singing and playing his guitar alone. I snuggled up between two people on the old pews and took a deep breath. The scene was a million miles away from the strobe lights and dancing girls on the main stage. As I sat there staring at the pew in front listening to the music - a stillness filled my heart and soul. It was a place of reflection and perfect peace.

To my right in the transcept people were being prayed over. Others were lying prostrate on the floor. Some in floods of tears. There were people like me sitting with souls laid bare in love.

Nothing was staged. There was no embarrassment. There was no invitation to come to the front, or to put your hand up if you've just become a Christian. All forms of pretence had been left in the porch. Everyone in the room, with bleeding hearts of humanity, had been touched by the hand of God through His

Holy Spirit. As I arose to leave I was met by a crowd of people trying to get in. I have never experienced the power and presence of the Holy Spirit of Pentecost as I did in that room on that day.

A few weeks ago I was suffering from emotional and mental meltdown. I had one very bad day when a rage of wrath filled my head. I remember lying on my sofa. As I prayed I looked up and saw an old wrinkled, deflated balloon on my living room ceiling. It had been there since Valentines day.

As I prayed and looked I felt God repeat to me the words on the heart shaped balloon, 'I Love You.' We went to Spring Harvest at Easter and my wife went to the front for prayer. She found people wearing the same T-shirts who weren't on the prayer ministry team but they prayed for her anyway.

I quickly forgot about the prayers but I know that our family life has been transformed. I have been given patience and self control beyond my wildest dreams.

I know that God through His Spirit can meet our most intimate, deepest needs. The spirit of Pentecost is upon us. Praise the Lord for praying wives who have enough faith to believe in a God who cares. May the Lord Jesus Christ, in His mercy, fill your hearts and minds with His Spirit, wherever you find yourself, in your walk with Him.

Our mission focus for June 2017 continues with Christians Against Poverty (CAP).

CAP exists because it believes nobody should be held hostage by debt and poverty. It is passionate about releasing people in our nation from a life sentence of debt, poverty and their causes. Through its services, which are all run through local churches, it is tackling poverty head on. CAP's vision is to bring freedom and good news to people in every community through 1,000 CAP projects by 2021.

We were privileged that Adrian and Val Cookney came to LURC on Sunday 7 May to tell us more about the organisation. Adrian and his wife, Val, moved away from Sussex last year to take up a post with CAP. It was good to hear first-hand wonderful and often moving stories of people who were able to rejoice at having come through very desperate times in such positive ways. Their willingness to share their stories was truly inspirational and very humbling.

As well as debt services, CAP now helps people to step into employment through CAP Job Clubs; helps people get control of their addictions through CAP Release Groups and equips people to live well on a low income through CAP Life Skills.



# **Faith**

This pair were inspired by the concept of Faith, an essential aspect of belief even when it does not seem rational. The two designs attempt to symbolise examples of Faith recorded by scripture. The Old Testament design features, 'The Burning Bush

The Parting of the Red Sea and The Sacred Ark'. Each depicts responses o Faith found in the book of Exodus. Moses became an effective leader of the Israelites despite personal misgivings.


Faith allowed him to overcome huge problems and strengthen his resolve to serve God's purpose.

The New Testament design features The Miraculous Draught of Fishes, The Holy Lamb of God and The feeding of thousands of people with a few loaves and fish.

Christ told followers that they were to become "Fishers of Men", telling them also to "Feed my sheep". Faith is an important starting point but more effective if it leads to subsequent actions.

# **House Groups**

aving at the time of writing only had one meeting of the new Home Groups, which will be two by the time of publication, it is a little difficult to say much about how things are going, except that new friendships are being made, and in old friendships perhaps more is becoming known about each other.

Our home groups should allow fellowship and prayer as well as the study of the word. The guide we are using does not claim to pose "questions" on the text but rather has "discussion starters" around a subject heading so that we may grow in our understanding from one another, as well as the word.

For each session our book draws its scripture readings from across the whole of Luke, rather than working from the nativity to the resurrection.

By looking at a wide selection of readings it is possible to see something of the Gospel writer's thrust to communicate certain ideas of theology rather than simply seeing the story.

The first of these concepts is the understanding that God comes supernaturally into the world.

The second topic will consider how the Jesus the Christ came with power, but not in the way society expected, and will challenge us to consider our own political thinking; this is rather timely considering the approaching election, which was not on the radar at the time our book was chosen
