Dear friends



This bumper issue of Good News, combined with the very hot weather in mid-June, reminds us that it is summertime. That word often makes me think of Gershwin's jazzy lullaby from the musical "Porgy and Bess" perhaps made best known by Billie Holliday, though Louis Armstrong and Ella Fitzgerald also deserve a mention.

The opening line of the song says "the livin' is easy" though of course for many of the central characters of the story that is far from true. Written in the 1930s the show was rejected by many theatres and audiences for it included black actors, and then by the rise of the civil rights movement in the 1960s it was being rejected by African Americans for portraying an old stereotype of their community. In more recent times there has been a fresh discovery of the story by reimagining it in Soweto amidst the pain of the South African apartheid regime, which existed pre1990. Finding language, images, and music that allow different social groups to communicate without exclusion has always been hard and it is sometimes far easier to turn inwards rather than outwards at times of difficulty, as God's people we must ensure we remain people of hope who can express His love in ways that are understood by those outside of the church as well as within.

Our land does seem to be in a time of difficulty at the moment. The general election has not given a clear mandate for a government and we wait to see what happens. A year on from the Brexit referendum negotiations have started in Brussels, but we do not know how these will impact our lives or those of future generations. The devastation of the Grenfell tower fire, has left many stunned; the suffering and loss of life, the loss of home and all possessions by so many people, and the difficult matter of where they will now live. Terror attacks in Manchester, and in London, each upon innocent people going about their peaceful, daily life, have added to the grief and, as the Queen said at her official birthday, there is "a very sombre national mood"

However, despite the national gloom, our weekend away made us think of hope.

David and Lorna Bedford asked that we might each be disciples, and serve as kingdom people. They spoke of how in times of adversity we can make a difference. They wanted us to be able to point to the "champion of the world" and be able to speak of the difference He makes in our life.

They challenged us to pray for our communities; in particular to meet in small groups and pray regularly for individuals, that they may come to know the love of Christ our Saviour, and so give their lives to Him. We can be the earthly embodiment of God's love; standing, waiting, with outstretched arms ready to welcome and embrace.

May we this summertime recognise those in our fellowship, and outside of it, for whom the livin' is not easy. May we uphold them in prayer, and seek to serve in Jesus' name.





Summer of sports

ust when you thought the football Jseason was finally over, with England's capitulation to 10-man France on 13th June, barely 11 hours later the 2017-2018 Premiership fixture list came out! For the first time ever, this required a detailed scan to see which Brighton and Hove Albion matches we need to highlight as a "must see". Kicking off with a home match against Manchester City is definitely a mouth-watering prospect but, for me, I fancy some of the away games. There should be enough tickets for us to watch the Seagulls at some famous venues relatively nearby, for example, Wembley Stadium against homeless Spurs and at the London Stadium, in the Oueen Elizabeth Olympic Park, against West Ham, my first love! However, before then, and while the West Ham players are sunning themselves on a beach somewhere, the London Stadium returns to its original purpose and we have a great summer of Athletics to look forward to, starting with the warmup Müller Anniversary Games on 9th July, swiftly followed by the World Para Athletics Championships from 14th-23rd July and then the IAAF World Championships in Athletics from 4th-13th August, probably the last chance to see Mo Farah and Usain Bolt running in such events.

I sometimes wonder how the athletes manage to drag themselves to the training track each day, to run in circles yet again. I have especially been thinking of this as I prepared myself for the Mid Sussex Aquabike held on 11th June. My swimming preparation left a lot to be desired, just three evenings in the local pools proving to myself that I could keep going for the 400 metres required! This was also confirmed by the "Smart Tag" tracker that the Dolphin and Triangle pools can provide you with – by the time you get home the data on your swim (speed, distance, calories burned) has already been uploaded to your computer. Suddenly a boring "up-and-down" pool session is transformed into a statistical heaven that really appeals to nerds like me.

This is even more so with cycle practice, which I really enjoy now I have replaced my "not-so-smart" 'phone with one that actually works. I downloaded an App called "Strava" which gives more information than you would have thought possible on any bike ride you make. My test ride was a gentle 0.6 mile pedal to the shops and, when I returned home, I found out that I could instantly compare my performances, side-by-side, with other cyclists. I found that my 1 ride of 0.6 miles looked rather pathetic against son Jonathan's 194 rides of 3,543.9 miles. Clearly to succeed I needed to increase my monthly training schedule of 1 minute per week to something approaching Jonathan's average of 2 hours 27 minutes per week! However, "Strava" doesn't record my daily cycle from home to the station and back so the training picture wasn't guite so bleak. With a bit more training effort I soon found that Strava gave me all sorts of "useful" feedback - my personal record of 10 min 23 secs on the "Slugwash Lane Up" sector (2.2

miles and a 166 feet rise if you are interested) was ranked 457th fastest this year (out of 688 other mad/sad people who have bothered to record it). The number one ranked person cycled it in 6 min and 9 secs – how is that humanly possible?!

Without this modern technology I probably would not even have achieved my final result of 19th out of 26 competitors in the Aquabike (well, at least I was faster than the other "oldie" in the veteran 60+ age category)!! Spare a thought then for the athletes of the Bible era who, despite the lack of data feedback - not even a simple stop-watch in sight still went "...into strict training..." before competing (1 Corinthians 9:25). The biblical advice on training is as relevant now as it was then: "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it. Therefore, strengthen your feeble arms and weak knees." (Hebrews 12: 11-12). The last verse seems to be written for me, as it is my weak knees (a product of rugby/football in my youth) that limit me to the Aquabike rather than the full Triathlon. Of course, the Biblical encouragement for training can be extended to much more spiritual things than sport, to training in prayer, worship and scriptural knowledge for example. I pray that your discipline and faith will enable you to succeed in whatever you are training for right now and that the long, warm summer months will be a blessing to you, whether you enjoy sport or not!

Wider World

Sudan

Sudanese pastor Hassan Abduraheen has finally been released after being falsely imprisoned for his faith.

Abduraheen faced a possible death sentence after speaking at a Christian conference in Ethiopia where he showed the crowd a picture of a young man who was assaulted for attending a protest.

The pastor explained that he was helping to pay for the man's medical expenses. However, instead of seeing Abduraheen's Christian act of charity as a generous gesture, the Sudanese government claimed the money was going to support rebel forces.

In 2015 the Sudanese National Intelligence Security Service arrested Abduraheen and charged him with espionage along with several other false charges. He was convicted and sentenced to more than a decade in prison.

Human rights activists and lawyers from America advocated strongly for his release. More than 200,000 people from many parts of the world signed a petition, which finally resulted with the pastor receiving a presidential pardon in May.

Hot Favourites

As I sit down to write about plants for drought conditions it is hot dry and sunny, but by the time you read it, it could well be pouring in torrents!

Never mind, here goes:- Many plants survive quite happily in near drought conditions. They need little water and so are real labour-savers. Ideal if you don't have time, energy or are often away on business or holidays. They all appreciate hot, dry and sunny conditions and will thrive if planted in a suitable position.

Low-growing, sometimes ground-cover or rockery plants more or less look after themselves. These include Arabis and Aubretia with their carpets of white or mauve flowers in the Spring or early Summer.

Cerastium ('Snow in Summer') is also drought tolerant and enjoys some of space to become a bit rampant. Three well-known plants need little attention : Mesembryanthemum (Livingstone Daisy), Nasturtium and Portulaca.

Taller plants for the herbaceous border include Achillea (Yarrow), Helianthus (Sunflower) and Verbascum (Mullein).

Going on up the height scale, many shrubs and grasses are ideal for dry conditions and often enjoy being planted near larger plants who soak up the moisture. These include Berberis, Cistus (Sunrose), Cotoneaster, Heathers, Lavenders, Tamarix and Ulex (Gorse).

Some drought tolerants which climb and survive include : Ceanothus, Ivy (be careful!), Leptospermum and Wisteria which can grow to become large. These are the easy-to-look-after guys but, when you plant them, they need to be wellwatered for the first few weeks in their new position.

Our wonderful God has given us an amazing variety of plants, so let us enjoy their beauty.

I have always had a longing to visit the Isle of Iona. Many of you have had the wonderful experience of travelling to Iona but not me! Iona is a tiny island off the southwest coast of Mull, it is 1.5 miles wide and 3 miles Iong. In 563AD St. Columba and his 12 followers landed on the sandy beaches of Iona.

This Irish monk then set about converting most of pagan Scotland and northern England to the Christian faith. St. Columba built his first Celtic Church and established a monastic community on Iona.
