



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## **Dear friends**

s it that time already? As we get to April we are a quarter of the way through 2018, but it seems just the other day that we were in the depths of winter; though as I write this in late March, with small pockets of snow on the ground, spring has been feeling perhaps a little more chilly than normal. That said, the days have lengthened and when the wind has stopped blowing from the east some of the days have been getting into double figures, perhaps even feeling warm.

It is understood that the month got its Roman name from the verb aperire, "to open", from the idea that this is the time of year plants might bud and flower, an opening up of nature, and an end of hibernation. However, with Easter day being the first of April this year we can also think of a different opening, how the stone was rolled away from the tomb of Jesus revealing not a body but folded grave clothes. New life had come, the Son had risen, and joy could spring forth.

Easter gives a new beginning to our life, the living Lord demonstrated first to the women, then to the other disciples, and then to the wider world, a message that death need not be the end; we need not limit our understanding of who God is or what God can do, there is a resurrection and we too can be raised.

Are we still as excited as those followers who had been eating their evening meal after the long walk to Emmaus but, on seeing Jesus, chose to race back to Jerusalem immediately rather than bed down for the night?

May this be a month that we rejoice in the risen redeemer; with an openness of heart may we speak of God's grace, and the new life we've received. Please pray for the opportunity to share the joyful story of our Lord, with friends, colleagues and neighbours. Pray that their hearts may be open to receive, and that you might know the right words to share, so that God's love for the world will become known.

May the Lord's open and empty tomb give you hope this Easter, and each day.

## **Follow Me**



The sounds of the great hymns of celebration are dying away; the masses of spring flowers are confused by the weather; the chocolate eggs are eaten; the holidays are over and it's back to normal, back to routine, back to school, back to work. Yet, if our Easter celebrations have been true, nothing can ever be the same again, for Jesus Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Alleluia indeed!

Maybe the close friends of Jesus thought that it was back to normal again, after three years of uprooting, disturbing challenge and eventual tragedy. Their friend was dead, though rumour had it that he wasn't, and now they were back to the routine of life; back to their old fishing businesses; back to normality, if that was possible. Then it happened. They'd had a frustrating night's fishing and caught nothing, when a stranger appeared on the shore.

A stranger who started interfering and giving them instructions, 'Cast the net on the other side', he cried out (John 21:6). Perhaps the question to ask at this point is, who were the expert fishermen here, the disciples or the stranger on the shore?

But the amazing answer to that conundrum is solved of course when John, the disciple whom Jesus loved, recognises the stranger; none other than their risen Lord. (John 21:7)

What a morning it was. They hauled in the catch, secured the boats, had a meal with their Master, and then Jesus had a deep and meaningful conversation with Peter. A conversation that ended with just two words that seemed to echo across the lake and bounce back from the encircling hills. Two words that have echoed right through history so that we can hear them clearly today - two words: 'Follow me'. They're words that have transformed countless lives over many generations and which surely challenge us in the 21st century - 'Follow me'.

In the Bible there are different understandings of the meaning of God's call; with a call to keep pure and untainted from the world at one extreme, to the call to fully share God's love with the entire world at the other. Well, here the gospel writer makes it clear, that the call is to go into the world and tell the good news of the risen Christ.

Yet there is an important distinction between the work of fishing for fish and fishing for people. The fish are caught to die and be eaten; the people are found to receive new life in all its fullness.

To be a friend of Jesus and to follow him is the richest, fullest, most satisfying and most free way of living. You and I are called to go, to share, to proclaim, and to introduce people to our Master in order that they too may truly live in the freedom and joy of his love.

Will it be easy? Not at all. As Jesus says in the gospel, 'anyone who wants to be a follower of mine must take up his cross and come with me' (Mark 8:34). The story of Christian witness down the centuries is one of service and suffering, but the amazing thing is that God is able to take this service and suffering, and use it mightily for the work of his kingdom, and for the fulfilment of his people. There is no fruit without toil; no victory without struggle; no success without sacrifice; no progress without hard work; no resurrection without a cross.

Here, then is the ongoing invitation of resurrection, the invitation from a risen Christ who says, "Come and follow me".

I wonder, what's your response?

# Spring is springing!

t's time to get growing now that temperatures are rising. What's the first consideration? Just as the sower in the Bible found out (Matthew 13: 1-8), the best results are always obtained by using a good growing medium. The modern equivalent is a quality multipurpose compost. Hardy varieties can be sown directly into a bed, whilst half hardy varieties should be sown into a pot and then transplanted. Listed below are some you might like to try to add some summer colour to your beds (for more information read the seed packets):-

- Candytuft: hardy 4"-6", soft pink and purple shades.
- Clarkia: hardy 15"-18", bright fiery colours.
- Cosmos: half hardy various heights, daisy-like mostly pink and white shades.
- Echium: half hardy 18", hairy leaves and, unusually, blue shades.
- Godetia: hardy 12"-15" fiery colours.
- Nigella ("Love in a Mist"): hardy 6' wispy flowers.

Some annuals climb, e.g.:-

- Ipomea ("Morning Glory"): half hardy 6'-8', blue, white or stripy.
- Nasturtium: half hardy 6'-8', also some dwarf varieties, fiery colours.
- Sweet Peas: mostly hardy annuals to sow in pots or bought as plug plants to climb or for hanging baskets – there is also an everlasting variety.

Vegetables can be sown from early April onwards including:-

- Lettuce varieties: buy "living lettuce" from supermarkets, then tease them out to produce "pick and pick again".
- Spinach: easy to grow in open ground, pots or troughs.
- Tomatoes: best grown in large pots, troughs or hanging baskets under cover to eliminate blight – never grow tomatoes near potatoes.

If you have a greenhouse you can start to buy plugs to get ahead of the game, but you may have to heat them to avoid frost – maybe better to let garden centres look after them until all danger of frost is past.

# A captivating preacher with a charismatic nature

1 966 was an exciting year for a young East End boy, particularly one who enjoyed football and was looking forward to the World Cup football competition that, of course, England eventually won. However, for me, 1966 holds other special memories, including that of the great Christian evangelist Dr Billy Graham's Crusade.

In June 1966, the Billy Graham rallies were held in London's Earls Court. I was 14 years old and, even though I was fortunate to be part of a Christian family, I hadn't made a full commitment to our Lord at that time. Along with many others, I was taken to Earls Court in one of several coaches organised by my parents' church. I well remember the fascination and excitement of being part of the huge gathering and of seeing so many people answering the appeal or invitation to go forward at the end of the meeting. Billy Graham was a captivating preacher with a charismatic nature. I'd heard many sermons or addresses before expounding the gospel message, but I'd never heard anything guite like this. Statistics detail that some 18,000 people gathered each night at Earls Court and many thousands came to Christ.

However, my clearest and perhaps most cherished memory of Billy Graham wasn't at Earls Court. During the 1966 crusade, one Sunday afternoon, again with my family and others from the church, I went along to Victoria Park East London. There Rev. David Sheppard (the former England cricketer) addressed an open air rally and invited Billy Graham to speak. This was a smaller, more intimate affair. Billy Graham spoke from what I think was the back of a flatbed lorry, but, as at Earls Court, he spoke with authority and passion as he shared the gospel.

It was a while before I accepted or acknowledged my own need for salvation, but I still hold those memories of Billy Graham's ministry very dear.

In 1966 England won the World Cup, but more importantly, through the preaching and witness of Billy Graham, a great evangelist, many souls were won for the Lord

eather and I went to Earls Court to see Billy Graham. It was at the height of the Vietnam War and at the start of the rally the anti-war protestors raised their placards. They were quickly escorted from the arena by members of the Blue Lamp Fellowship. Bev Shea's singing of "I'd rather have Jesus" was very moving and, of course, Billy saying "the Bible says" whilst holding his Bible. In

1985 I attended another rally in Bristol, at Ashton Gate Stadium. I stood in the rain.

I am afraid the rain dampened my spirit.

# One could sense the presence of God Jean Gardiner

What shall I wear? That was my immediate response to an invitation to hear Billy Graham at Harringay Arena. I was a young teenager and in the Church that I attended the ladies were expected to wear hats for any religious event. So, I decided to wear a beret and my school raincoat. That was settled and I set off to join the coach that was leaving from our Church in Bromley, Kent. The coach was full and we were all excited as to what was to come

Later as we crowded into the arena one could feel the rising anticipation. We all joined in singing wonderful hymns and then Billy Graham came forward to preach. We all became quiet. Billy held his large black Bible aloft and repeatedly said, 'the Bible says.'We had no doubt at all that we needed to make our peace with God through Jesus His Son. Billy invited people to come to the front as the choir sang softly, "Just as I am, without one plea, but that Thy blood was shed for me, and that thou bid'st me come to Thee, O Lamb of God, I come". And the people came. It was overwhelming to see hundreds of people of all ages wending their way to the front. It was emotional and solemn. One could sense the presence of God. I wanted to go forward but I had already given my life to Christ as an eight year old.

Yes, I was young, but now in my seventies I have never regretted putting Jesus first in my life.

# Emmaus Encounter

The story of the two disciples walking the road between Jerusalem and Emmaus on the first Easter day is 'one of the immortal short stories of the world' (W. Barclay) and also a model for how we can meet him in our lives.

Hearts Opened. The disciples displayed 'downcast' faces, their hearts preoccupied with grief. They felt let down by God and bewildered by all they had heard. Their emotions prevented them recognising Jesus walking with them, even though their hearts burned within them. Despite our feelings, Jesus is still with us in situations of loss or desolation, as well as when we feel let down by God or other people.

Minds Opened. Although this pair knew the Scriptures, they didn't understand what they said about the Christ. Therefore, Jesus opened their minds to make sense of the events they were experiencing. The Holy Spirit also brings God's word alive for us, as He challenges our preconceptions about Jesus.

Eyes Opened. The couple only recognised Jesus when He broke the bread as they ate together. The turning point came when they invited Jesus into their home, and allowed Him to take charge. If we are to recognise Jesus' presence with us, we need to open our lives to Him.

Open eyes, minds and hearts will lead to open mouths. Having discovered Jesus, the disciples can't keep the news to themselves.

A Quick update from me... We are getting good numbers in our Anchors and Junior section, as well as Rooted and Pulse.



## A tale of two churches

was prompted to write about the two churches I recently visited in Devon as, hopefully, an encouraging counter to the depressing stream of statistics that we are regularly subjected to about the state of Christianity in Britain today. For example, we are told that while UK Church membership was 10.6 million (30% of the population) in 1930 it was only 5.5 million (11.2%) in 2010. Likewise, the URC had some 188,300 members in 1980, but the figure for 2015 was so small that I could not read it off the graph I was studying! It was apparently about 56,000 in 2015, but less than 50,000 in 2017. Finally, a survey in 2017 found that, of more than 4,000 respondents who claimed to be Christian, apparently 29% of them never pray, 33% never attend church and 55% never read the Bible - a strange understanding of what it is to be Christian (source: Church Mapping Survey, March 2017, ComRes).

However, there are glimmers of hope. While Methodist numbers fell by 15% from 2008 to 2013, the numbers in the congregations of the New Frontiers Church rose by 15% over the same period. Helen and I worshipped at Grace Church in Exeter in January on a family visit. Although now forging its own path as a community church, it started in 2003 as a New Frontiers Church. Believing that the Church is about people rather than buildings they have worshipped over the years in a number of halls and we met with them in a school hall.

However, it is no simple task to regularly transform a sports hall into a place of worship - as we found out when we helped pack up hundreds of chairs, tons of floor coverings and miles of electrical cables at the end of the service! The worship was powerful and the preaching of Pastor Stu Alred was excellent, based on the gifts of ministry that are discussed by Paul in his letter to the Ephesians 4: vs 4-14. It included a very helpful table showing how the five different types of ministry (Apostolic, Prophetic, Evangelistic, Pastoral and Teaching) are represented by very different types of people, all contributing different skills that, together, unite to help build up the body of Christ on earth.

A second church we visited, St Andrew's in Moretonhampstead, was, from the outside, a complete contrast, being a typical old English country church. Despite the cold weather, on the inside there was a real feeling of warmth, welcome and scriptural activity, reflected in the message on its web site: "We are an inclusive church in the tradition of a worshipping community that has occupied this site on Dartmoor since about AD 1100." There was a lovely script in a frame inside that read: "Welcome to this ancient place; we invite you to say a prayer as you come in, and we offer you GOD'S Blessing as you leave. May the love of God be with you always."

Adverts for 'Messy Church' confirmed the community outreach of this church. Their monthly magazine is called 'In Touch' and you can read it on their website – I was amused by the March letter from their Rector, Simon Franklin, calling for more eccentrics. This story related to his friend, vicar of a church in Sandwich, who was nearly arrested when the Police were called after he was heard shouting "Christ is risen" at the top of his voice one Easter Sunday, from the top of the church tower! Sadly we had no opportunity to worship there but we have to leave something for the next visit to Devon!

So, a tale of two churches, very different in many ways, but also very similar with their message of the importance of being in the community, of God's blessing and both providing such encouraging evidence that the body of Christ, the "church", is alive and well in Britain today.

For the weekend of 15 and 16 September the Missions Group and OM have organized a weekend of events at the Church from 2:30pm on the Saturday through to mid-day on the Sunday.

On the Saturday afternoon, from 2:30pm, there will be a learning experience with OM conducting a workshop on how we share our faith in our daily lives. From the injunction to "spread the Gospel at all times, sometimes with words" the Missions Group have suggested that the OM team address the "sometimes with words". In order that those with families can attend there will be suitable activity arranged for children too young to go to the workshop.

From 5:00pm there will be a time of fellowship with a short reception followed by a family-friendly two-course hot supper at 5:30pm.

Through the Church Mission Fund we support Simon and his wife, Becky, in their work with OM UK (London) in North-East London, ministering to the Middle Eastern communities living there. During the service there will be some sharing of the work both of this mission and also the, Church supported, OM team in Kosovo. Kosovo is the most desperately poor of European countries and presents massive challenges.

There will be an opportunity to hear rather more about this work after coffee when, of course, questions can be asked. The weekend takes place during the two-month Mission Giving period allocated to the OM work in Kosovo.

The Presentation Team will go out during the morning service and talk about their experiences to the older children.

Our Minister's vision for Mission is that, in addition to the essential work of prayer and providing financial support, the Church should engage more with the missions we support. The weekend is the outcome of the discussions that Keith and Missions Group have had over the past year with OM on this vision. We all hope it will be the start of a much greater engagement of our Church with the work of OM.

More information on what is planned will be forthcoming over the coming months but please speak to a member of the Missions Group if you would like to know more.


# **Jonathan Veira**


For more than twenty years Jonathan Veira has built a solid reputation as "one of our best buffo (comic) basses" (Daily Telegraph). Working in many of the world's leading opera houses, he has performed a wide range of comic roles and is described by Glyndebourne as one of their most loved artists.

Jonathan, who can sing in seven languages, is also that rare thing: an accomplished opera singer who has made the crossover into popular music and still retained his credibility.



Thoroughly adept on keyboard and guitar and sounding completely at home in a range of styles and sounds; from Louis Armstrong ("What A Wonderful World") to Billy Joel, to Gershwin, to Eric Bibb ("Want Jesus To Walk With Me").

Jonathan is also known to do an impressive Van Morrison, Bob Dylan and even Coldplay! In-between each song, this Guildford-based husband and father quickly wins the hearts of his audience with his convivial, down-to-earth personality.



Totally relaxed, Jonathan recounts unlikely anecdotes from his personal and professional life, mixing them with such a constant stream of humour that it's easy to imagine him earning his living as a full time stand-up comedian.

The big man from Harlesden with the Portuguese surname and St Vincent family roots is an able mimic - he does a great Elton John impersonation! He may, perhaps, be at his funniest when singing not-so-clever country and western tunes. At times it is easy to forget that Jonathan's operatic successes have included Don Magnifico for the Royal Swedish Opera and the Royal Danish Operas; leading roles for English National Opera; Frank in Die Fledermaus, the wicked stepfather Don Magnifico in La Cenerentola by Rossini and Father Augustine in Betrothal in a Monastery, all for the Glyndebourne Festival Opera.
