

Dear friends

ast Friday, from the greengrocer, I bought a small number of long green stalks held together by a couple of elastic bands. They looked a bit like spring onions with the white bit of the bottom removed, however this bunch was not to be eaten but put in a vase with some water on the kitchen table. A day later they didn't look that different, but when Sunday morning came the tops of a number of the stalks were starting to open up and a vibrant vellow flower was being released. This was a hint of things to come and by Monday a small number of golden trumpets were on display. The little bunch is hardly big enough to be Wordsworth's "crowd", and confined to their glass receptacle they don't stretch "continuous as the stars that shine," but the daffodils give a delightful contrast to the grey of the rainy world outside the window.

The yellow flowers give a sign of something coming, and make me think of the crocus flowers that will spring up along the High Street hopefully in the next week or so, and which welcomed us when we moved to Ryecroft in the February half term three years ago. These displays of brightness are a sign of life in a world where trees are bare and the news listened to on the radio, and viewed on the telly gives a bleaker picture. These flowers reveal things need not be so grey. As followers of Jesus we are to bring colour and vibrancy into the world. In Matthew 5 we are told to be "Salt" a mineral that doesn't simply preserve food but adds flavour, exciting the taste buds. In the same passage we are to be "the light of the world" something that is not hidden but visible for others to see, an example for all, which chases away the darkness.

As we approach Lent, which this year begins in the middle of February, consider not necessarily what you will give up or withdraw from, but think instead of how God introduces new hope. What extra opportunity will you give God to do that in your life? How might a new flavour come to you? How will He, the one that put the sun and stars in the sky lighten your day in a new way? Having considered that, think further on how you may brighten the day for those in darkness, and who you will be praying for throughout Lent that they might taste and see that the Lord is good.

May you be reminded of God's Glory each day.





Valentines Day

However, Valentine's Day can be a great reminder of God's love for us. On Valentine's Day, people show those around them that they are loved and valued, without expecting anything in return.

Lent What will you give up or perhaps take up for Lent?

Will you be having pancakes on the 13th February? Pancake day, also known as Shrove Tuesday, was historically a day where people would use up the rich foods in their house before Lent. It was a day of feasting, of celebration, before fasting for 40 days until Easter Sunday. Eggs and milk were included in the indulgent foods that were used up, and it was found that the combination of these (with the addition of flour) led to what we now know as a pancake.

My husband loves pancake day; it is the only day of the year where he eats the same thing for breakfast, lunch and dinner! Every pancake of his is topped with maple syrup, however the most popular pancake topping in the UK is classic lemon and sugar.

While we now see Shrove Tuesday as an excuse to load ourselves with sweetness, we should really be considering the roots of the day. The name Shrove Tuesday comes from the very old Christian ritual of 'shriving'. To shrive means to absolve; Christians would confess their sins and have the slate wiped clean before Lent.

Lent is the period of time between Shrove Tuesday and Easter Sunday, where 40 days (47 including Sundays) were traditionally spent fasting. Some Christians still spend this time fasting, but traditions have changed, in that many people choose something to give up for 40 days. Be it chocolate, alcohol or Facebook, it is often something that will be challenging. I once gave up chocolate, only to be taken as a surprise for a friend's birthday to a cafe that specialised in all things chocolate. I had a vanilla milkshake whilst everyone was dipping into fondue and munching on warm chocolate fudge cake. To this day I am proud to have withstood the temptation!

It is temptation that has inspired Lent; the 40 days represents the time Jesus spent fasting and being tempted by the Devil in the wilderness before he started his ministry. Lent can also be a time for taking something up, such as praying daily with a loved one, following a new Bible study, or taking more time to simply listen to God.

If you're after something new, over the last few years '40 acts' by UK Christian Charity Stewardship has gained popularity, with its tag line: 'What if lent could be more than just giving stuff up? What if it could be a time of radical generosity as well as spiritual discipline?'. They send out an email every day with a new challenge encouraging people to make a positive impact on their community.

Alternatively, Christian Aid are running 'Count your blessings', a resource with a daily thought, bible reading or story of someone supported by the charity. These are combined with small ways to make you think about others and how blessed you are, such as 'give 30p for every minute of your shower today'.

However you choose to spend Lent, I hope you find a way to grow closer to God, and enjoy a few pancakes along the way!




Boys' Brigade

Nothing is too hard

O n July 31st 2003, the adventurer Bear Grylls led a team of five across the North Atlantic Ocean in an inflatable rigid dinghy. They set out from Halifax, Nova Scotia, heading for John O'Groats Scotland. On August 5th, a great storm arose.

There were 100-foot waves. They lost satellite contact. They feared for their lives. Thankfully they survived to tell the tale.

Jesus said that we would all face the storms of life. Life is not easy. These storms may be many and varied.

Abraham, David and Jesus' disciples all faced storms in their lives, so what can we learn from their example?

Abraham was 100 years old and his wife Sarah was 90.

God promised them a son. They said, in effect, ' That is impossible ' but the Lord was gracious to Sarah and did what He had promised.

David, in the midst of storms says in Psalm 7, "My shield is God Most High....I will give thanks to the Lord because of His righteousness and I will sing praise to the name of the Lord Most High".

The Disciples, fearing they would drown in a storm on the Sea of Galilee cried out "Lord save us!"

Are you facing a seemingly impossible situation in your life? Whatever challenges you may face in the year ahead, nothing is too hard for the Lord.

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During the storms of life, it is natural to panic. We can all cry out as the disciples did, "Lord save us".

Jesus' words are the greatest words ever spoken. They are so challenging. The great challenge is putting Jesus' words into practice. His instructions are clear, but the standards seem impossibly high. Yet, nothing is too hard for the Lord.

So, stop worrying and start living. Jesus commands us not to worry about our life or material things. Think ahead, plan ahead, but don't worry ahead. Trust in our Heavenly Father to provide. He knows our every need. We cannot add a single hour to our lives by worrying. As Corrie ten Boom put it: "Worry does not empty tomorrow of its sorrow, but it empties today of its strength".

Live one day at a time. Don't borrow trouble from tomorrow: as it says in Matthew's Gospel 6:34, "each day has enough trouble of its own".

Make a decision today not to worry about tomorrow. Trust God to provide for you one day at a time. Trust Him even when things don't look great. He has the power to sort out even the most difficult situations (Matt: 8:26, 9:5-6).


A Dissenter in Dissenters Chapel

n October last year I was invited to give a talk on my work as part of the "London Month of the Dead", a series of 36 different events investigating the capital's relationship with its deceased residents. The profits from the events went to help with the upkeep of London's seven magnificent cemeteries. These seven "great gardens of sleep" were built by order of Parliament in the 1830s in an attempt to reduce the health hazard that was associated with the old parish graveyards. As London's population had mushroomed in the early 19th Century from 1 to 2.3 million, the old graveyards were literally overflowing, with visible body parts and decaving matter being flushed into the sewers and the Thames – new cemeteries were badly needed!

My curiosity in participating was piqued by the venue for my talk, the Dissenters' Chapel, built in 1831-1834 in the Kensal Green Cemetery, which itself was opened in 1832.

The engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel, the mathematician Charles Babbage, the surgeon who attended Nelson at Trafalgar and the original WH Smith are all buried there. When opened, the cemetery had 39 acres of consecrated ground for Anglicans and 15 acres of unconsecrated ground for dissenters (i.e. any who were not Anglican by confession), with each having a chapel for funeral services. The Dissenters' Chapel and its catacombs fell into ruin following WW2 bomb damage, but it was fully restored by the Historic Chapels Trust in 1997 and now houses the offices of the Friends of Kensal Green Cemetery.

The interior provided a wonderfully atmospheric location for my talk and, as I told the audience, it felt guite a privilege to be speaking as a Dissenter in the **Dissenters' Chapel!**



Nearer Home



Mike and I celebrated our birthdays recently and received many beautiful cards. One card for Mike from his House Group was entitled, "80 years nearer Home"! What an inspiring thought!

Many of us are nearing Home, that glorious place that Jesus went to prepare for us. I was reading recently the following passage and I thought that it might encourage all of us. The passage is entitled, "Getting Ready to Move." (Author unknown).

"The owner of the house which I have occupied for many years has given notice that He will furnish but little or nothing more for repairs. I am advised to be ready to move. At first this was not a very welcome notice. The surroundings here are in many respects very pleasant and, were it not for the evidence of decay, I should consider the old house good enough. But even a light wind causes it to tremble and totter and all the braces are not sufficient to make it secure. So I am getting ready to move.

I have consulted maps of the new country and I have been reading descriptions of its inhabitants. One, the apostle Paul, who visited that country and returned said that it is beautiful beyond description – language breaks down in attempting to tell of what he heard whilst there (See 2 Cor. 12, v.2). Paul said that, in order to make an investment there, he had suffered the loss of many things that he owned here and that he even rejoiced in what others would call making a sacrifice.

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Mission Update

Two or three times I have been down by the border of the river that forms the boundary, and I have wished myself amongst the company of those who were singing praises to their beloved King. Many of my friends have moved there. Before leaving, they spoke of my coming later. I have seen the radiant smile upon their face as they passed out of sight.

Often I am asked to make some new investment here, but my answer in every case is, 'I am getting ready to move to my new Home.'"

Here in LURC we thank God for every precious friend. And especially those dearly loved ones who are getting Nearer Home. We hold them in our hearts and in our prayers.
