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Dear friends

I woke up yesterday morning and looked out between the curtains of the bedroom window, and the sky was overcast with greyness, "mmm" I thought to myself. The news on the radio was pretty much like every other day for the past couple of months, if not years, Brexit this and Brexit that; half the people pulling in one direction with an equal response in another - no one said anything new, neither side open to compromise in the hope of a workable solution just more greyness of debate. I washed, dressed and stepped outside to the walk the dog, and I found it was raining - not heavily, quite light in fact, but the amount that makes one wonder whether to put the hood up or not. Just how grey, and dull, can a day be?

As I walked with the dog, my hair and beard getting damp, I spotted something. There was a small group of green leaves pushing upwards, taller than the surrounding blades of grass, and then I spotted another cluster, and another. God was doing something, He was watering the soil and causing bulbs to grow into plants. He creates the new day, and gives us the experience of life. He brings beauty to the world. I remember my arrival here in Lindfield on a February day 4 years ago and the High Street being a vision of delight due to the crocuses in flower, colour at the side of the road. A vibrancy which, here, is also reflected in the trading of the shops and cafes, in the bustling of people, and the pushing of prams.

I am blessed to live in a community where there is much going on; yet the first thought the morning glimpse of sky gave me, and I suspect others, was a sense of gloom.

How do we approach issues of grey and gloom? What is our outlook on life? God is doing amazing things, but perhaps we become distracted by the world's perceptions of how things "should" be and noticing the grey rain as a pain rather than a blessing. Indeed the rain should still be welcomed after last summer's dryness and what seems to have been a dry winter.

We do not always notice what God is doing under the surface. Flowers don't go instantly from bulb to bloom, from nothing to full on in an instant, and if we were to take our chair out onto the high street to watch the growth occurring we would have to be patient enough to sit for days and weeks rather than seconds and minutes. The same can be said sometimes about church life. Although some things seem to suddenly bloom, quite often the growth and change that brings us to that point might not have been noticed, but that does not mean there is no growth occurring. God is always at work, pouring out His love and seeking the growth of His kingdom.

ave you met the young girl Tis? Well of course not, as this Tis is a character in a novel. However you may well have passed by a Tis in real life whose life story has parallels with the character in the novel

Since the novel was published in 2013 an online blog to support the message of the story has been seen over 15,500 times in countries around the world. Countries as far apart as the United States and Russia, Brazil and Israel and many others have at least seen one of the 155 blogs that are on line.

Tis's story has also been published on YouTube in 21 half hour episodes for those who prefer to sit back and listen. You can also download each episode from the web site www.debvaren.org

The novel is set in the UK and in Brazil but published in English. After a long search to find translators who were willing and able to translate the text to Brazilian Portuguese this work has been underway now for over a year.

The writing of the novel initially took some 10 years plus more years proofing and publishing. The audio recordings of the music, song and story took another two plus years.

The most recent review of the novel starts with "This is an absolutely well written novel. It is compelling, inspiring and challenging. The characters come wonderfully alive with their different backgrounds and human traits."

Back in November, I attended the National Youth Ministry Weekend, which was held in Birmingham Resorts World.

The National Youth Ministry Weekend is an event for everyone involved in church youth work. A weekend of inspiration, training, teaching, worship and fun. A creative space away from everyday life where you can find fresh passion and new ideas for work with young people.

I joined 1000 other youth workers for the weekend all looking at the theme of 'risk'. One of the talks for the weekend focussed on Peter stepping out of the boat. There is an element of risk when following Jesus.

In Matthew 14:22-33 we read that the disciples are all in the boat when they see Jesus on the water, but only Peter takes the risk to step out of the boat.

The decision Peter made to step out of the boat was a foolish one – you don't jump overboard during a storm! (Unless Jesus is there!)

Most of us would stay in the boat. The boat is safe, it is what we know, it is sheltered. The stormier things get, the further into the boat we may go!

But not Peter. Peter hears Jesus' call to 'come' and does so!

Peter takes the risk.

What risk do we need to take? Some of us may need to take a risk to start something new. Some of us may need to take a risk to stop doing something we have been doing for a long time!

Whatever the risk, we can walk on water when our eyes are fixed on Jesus.

Look ahead to June, there will be a weekend camp at Blacklands Farm from Friday 28th to Sunday 30th for all those aged 10 to 14. Whether you attend Pulse, Boys' Brigade or even Messy Church – the weekend is for you! More details to come soon but keep that weekend free!

Boys' Brigade


We are now into the second half of our session and the programme in each section is progressing well. The Drummers in the Company Section continue to progress and can now play on the march, which is not an easy task.

Year of the Fly



This is the first issue of Good News prepared in 2019 and, as you all know, 2019 is the "Year of the fly"! What, you didn't know.....shame on you! Well, I have to admit that until I attended a congress last November I also didn't know. However, I fully support the initiative if it can encourage more people to talk about flies and the really positive impact they have in our world. In 1942 Ogden Nash published a short poem, "The Fly": "God in his wisdom made the fly; and then forgot to tell us why". The reasons are all around us; flies don't just spread disease, in contrast they are very important plant pollinators, waste recyclers, food sources, medical and genetics tools, biodiversity and environmental health indicators....and much more! So, we can truly thank God for flies and the 125,000 species named so far! The congress in Namibia was grandly titled the "Ninth International Congress of Dipterology" and attended by about 300 fly nerds (Dipterists) like me. Helen also came along to make it our first trip back to sub-Saharan Africa for 32 years!

In addition to the Congress we enjoyed a week-long tour around Namibia; it is a wonderful country of richly contrasting scenery, from game-rich savannah, through arid moon-like landscapes to the "skeleton coast", backed by magnificent sand dunes, some of the highest in the world. The tallest dunes are 325 m high – that's way higher than the tallest spot on the South Downs, Butser Hill near Petersfield, at only 270 m.

Our trip was sandwiched by visits to two contrasting churches. The first was to All Nations Church in the capital, Windhoek, with its tag line, "Real Church, Real People, Real Simple". We were made to feel very welcome there among a congregation of all races. We just happened to be there on the Sunday that their Junior Church performed a nativity show. The ages ranged from about 3 to 18 and the performances by about 50 young people ranged from song to drama to dance. It was very inspiring, even though the carol singing seemed slightly out of context with the 30+ °C temperatures! No less out of context were all the Christmas lights and decorations in even the small towns we passed through on our trip, with images of Christmas trees and snow never encountered in Namibial

On our day of departure, two weeks later, we attended another church, the Abundant Life Ministry, which just happened to meet in one of the conference rooms at our hotel.

Despite the name, human life was not in abundance as it was the start of the Christmas holiday season, when many worshippers travelled back to the countryside.

In fact, Helen and I were the only ones in the congregation when the service began; but the pastor started by reminding us of Matthew 18: 20, "For where two or three gather in my name, there I am with them". We might have been few in number, but the worship was more than lively, with joy in abundance the pastor strummed his guitar, his son beat the drums, his daughter mastered the computer projection and his wife led the singing with a wonderful gospel voice....and as promised we were soon joined by a group of only-slightly-late comers - well this was "chilled out African timing" after all! Again, we were made to feel so welcome by the church family and the Pastor singled us out during the service for hands-on prayer, a blessing before we prepared for our journey home - it was a real privilege to join in their service.

Later that day, on a flight to South Africa, we sat next to a Pastor from Johannesburg who had just competed in a 300 km bike race across the Namibian desert. We had a stimulating discussion with him about his evangelical church, "En route", while both time and we flew by. It is wonderful to be able to travel the world and yet feel a part of God's church almost wherever you are. The entire trip was a real blessing to us, time away to unwind from day-to-day pressures made us appreciate home on our return even more than before.

Mission Update

he mission focus this month continues with Romans One Eleven Trust.

"I long to see you so that I may impart to you some spiritual gift to make you strong - that is, that you and I may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith" Romans 1:11-12

This is the biblical passage which inspired and has continued to undergird the work of the Romans One Fleven Trust since its start in 1992. Its main aim is to provide mutual encouragement for churches in the UK and in African countries.
