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Dear friends

have been pondering lately how different Christians can sometimes have opposing views on the most important issues of the day. Sometimes we consider this is down to where on the huge theological spectrum we might sit, but it may be the reality that it is more likely to be down to our own vested interests and the world views which have formed through our personal life experiences.

One such example of the conundrum is the topic of climate change. This is one that has been hard to escape over the last few weeks with the young Scandinavian Greta Thunberg sailing the Atlantic to the United Nations, and Extinction Rebellion protesters causing disruption in cities such as London. To some these people are like prophets speaking to the kings of the Old Testament, to others these are misguided trouble makers, the prophets of Baal whose words are empty because they are founded on a falsehood.

Science is used to argue the case on both sides, with some rightly claiming that there have always been fluctuations in overall temperature, yet the body of evidence shows that since the industrial revolution there has been a dramatic rise in the temperature of the planet, which "almost certainly" is caused by human behaviour (scientists sometimes struggle to say something is 100% - the Met Office app on my phone tells me that there is, at the time of writing, a greater than 95% chance of rain, and it is chucking it down, but the app never says 100%).

One theological response to this rise in temperature is to proclaim that we are blessed by the resources God has given us, He is in charge, and the world will persist until the time of Christ's return. This view might be underlined by the Lord's response to Noah's worship in Genesis 8, "As long as the earth endures, seed-time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease." But isn't this a rather simple response to what we see happening? Just because the earth will remain does that mean we shouldn't do anything about the current episode of climate change? If we look a few chapters earlier we see, in Eden, an account of the first sin. Adam and Eve tasked with stewardship choose to plunder a resource that they knew they shouldn't. The very first sin of our bible is in some way ecological; humanity's gain of knowledge is at the cost of God's Garden. Among the things we learn from Genesis 3 is that greed damages Creation, and it is not really in our best interest, even if we try to convince ourselves it is at the time.

The danger with any topic is we choose isolated texts which seem to defend our argument, but really we need to take a broader look at what God teaches us throughout the bible. What is the overarching view of scripture?

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For me the answer on this topic (and others) is that humanity is sinful in nature, that we abuse creation, we must repent of our greed, and seek the coming of the kingdom of righteousness, joy, love and peace; that is the kingdom of God. Let us each consider what we can best do to show Love towards God's Earth, and then act accordingly.

Wet Boots!

oots full of water, cold clammy socks Dand chilly feet and toes! Mike and I on the 1st day of October were crossing the Pilgrims' Way to Holy Island on Lindisfarne in Northumberland. This crossing can be dangerous as the tides swirl in guickly but we had a good guide, Patrick, who saw us safely across the three miles of sand and mud. In the bright blue sky overhead we saw skeins of Brent geese and nearby on the mudflats were flocks of whooper swans and plenty of grey seals. It was an exhilarating walk.



On the mudflats there are two refuge boxes on stilts that are there for those who misjudge the tides. They have to wait for 6-8 hours before the tide goes out. Patrick told us of a couple spending their first Wedding Anniversary in one of these boxes! On the road causeway 11 cars this year have been almost submerged by the incoming tide!

We were following in the steps of St. Aidan and St. Cuthbert who brought Christianity into the North East of England. St. Aidan arrived from Iona to live on Holy Island in 635AD. He had been asked by King Oswald of Northumbria to bring Christianity to the North East. St. Aidan set up a monastic community. In 687 AD St. Cuthbert, a man famous for his piety and with gifts of healing, continued working throughout Northumbria. The Lindisfarne Gospels, those wonderful illuminated manuscripts were created on the island. The originals are now in the British Library. As we walked we gave thanks to God for these two dedicated men who brought the good news of Jesus to many people.

Slipping and sliding we eventually arrived on Holy Island. Oh, the bliss of drying our feet and putting on warm socks and shoes. Then we headed for a hot cup of coffee! The island is beautiful. We wished that we could have spent longer there but there was that rising tide to consider

Young Acheiver Award

ello All, I have some exciting news to share having recently been awarded the "Young Achiever Award 2019" at the Mid Sussex Applauds Ceremony on Sunday 13th October 2019.

I was awarded this award because of several criteria, I had managed to overcome the obstacles of finding meaningful and fulfilling work, I have also had the opportunity to deliver a beneficial contribution to the community through some implementation and close liaison with various figures in Central Government (Sir Nicholas Soames MP) and also Chichester College Group where I have been working hard to try and make a case for reopening Haywards Sixth Form College. This work not only includes the petition on Change.org, which reached nearly 3,000 signatures, but it also includes the series of documentation and further discussions about the various practicalities. concepts and designs/plans involved.

I had also had a massive milestone in my life and that was passing my Theory Test on my third attempt, through a series of perseverance and commitment, I managed to achieve my ambitious goal of being able to drive and now that I am one step closer to driving, I have moved on to driving lessons as we speak. The award was presented by Chairman of Mid Sussex District Council, Colin Turnbull and the High Sheriff who institutes law and order across the whole County and is specifically selected by the Queen to give service to their county.

I was nominated for this Award by Anne Elvin who wrote a brief description on the reasons behind the nomination of the award and it specifically explained why I deserved to win under this specific category. There were eight categories in the end, celebrating different types of organisations and individuals making a positive contribution towards their local communities and to wider society further afield.

Despite the weather we managed to have a lovely afternoon tea, followed by generous helpings of refreshments. The winners all got a chance to have a photo taken outside, where there was a lovely rainbow on display. Unfortunately the rain grew worse and we all had to make a dash for it and take the photo inside.

It was a great opportunity to get to know one another and discuss with the various other participants and their guests about their lives and their remarkable achievements. One woman who helped people with sight loss by organising various activities had been doing it for thirty eight years and was nearly ninety years old. Another young man creates playlists of songs and loads them into a headset for people with dementia, quite extraordinary remarkable stuff.

I personally believe that God had his hand in the whole thing and has managed to play a huge part in how my life is shaped around others, making a positive difference towards the local community. How he can work things out, so that we have the opportunities to tell others more about him, and to glorify him in our praise, worship, prayer, gifts, talents and above all our relationship and service to him, so that we can build and contribute positively and constructively towards his heavenly Kingdom.

Once again we gather to honour the sacrifice of the men of the two World Wars.

In Towns villages and cities, dedicated groups have in the last two decades identified and brought to life the otherwise anonymous names on their local memorials. Much work has been done but the task is still ongoing.

There are two groups of men who are often forgotten, the wounded, and the Prisoners of War.

There were 1,660,000 wounded in WW1, one third of these classified as severely wounded.



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By 1918 the hospitals, country houses and local units (The King Edward Hall etc.) were struggling to deal with these colossal numbers. Nursing staff were desperate for voluntary help and the surgeons and doctors were often overwhelmed by the horrific injuries. Men who suffered chest and stomach wounds often found full recovery difficult and those who had encountered mustard gas were never the same again.

During my childhood in Ardingly during WW2 every other veteran of WW1 seemed to be carrying the scars of that earlier conflict. In WW2 the wounded numbered 150,000, which was a merciful reduction for the medical units at least.

More than 180,000 men were taken prisoner in WW1, mainly on the Western Front. One of these was Ralph Walder of our Church (Graham Wood's Uncle). He was captured during his first attack, Ralph soon recovered and was recorded in the Middy as taking wickets on the Common soon after his release.

More than 180,000 also became POWs in WW2. Many of these surrendered to the Japanese and about one third of them died. My Uncle, Bernard Upton, was taken prisoner by the Italians. He was serving on the Tribal Class Destroyer HMS Bedouin when it was disabled in action with Italian Cruisers in the Mediterranean. Later that day it was torpedoed by an Italian aircraft, which was in turn shot down by the Bedouin's A.A. The 215 survivors were taken to Italy until 1943, when the Italians surrendered. They were then taken by the Germans to Stalag VIIIb near Breslau.

After an epic long march into Southern Germany where the Bedouin's CO. Commander Scurfield was killed by straffing American Thunderbolts, they were eventually flown home.

My work colleague Ron had a very different experience.

During the Dunkirk evacuations in May 1940 his Light Anti Aircraft Gun unit was unloaded on the Quayside at Calais, sadly much too late.

After a short pause a German officer appeared, thanked them sarcastically for 'delivering some nice new guns' and told them 'for you the war is over.'

Ron and two of his mates ended up on a farm in the Bavarian Alps where the food was good, the farmer had three daughters, and it was very rare to have contact with the outside world They were finally 'liberated' in May 1945

Who was it who said 'chance is the ruler of life' ???

Mission Update



The focus for the Mission during November/December 2019 is Turning Tides - whose strapline is 'Ending Local Homelessness'.

About Turning Tides:

Turning Tides is a community led homelessness charity that puts clients and local people at the heart of our mission to end homelessness. The charity has been providing help and support to the homeless community since its establishment in 1991. Help is available to anyone aged 18 or over in the local area who is homeless or insecurely housed. Help can take the form of housing, advice, counselling, emotional support and social engagement. Turning Tides works in Worthing, Littlehampton, Horsham, Mid Sussex and surrounding areas.

These are some selected quotes from The Guardian Newspaper article -(Wednesday 25th September 2019) -How Can You Best Help Rough Sleepers? "Britain's homelessness crisis is out of control, with the numbers of homeless people and rough sleepers at their highest levels since 2010."

"If you are worried that a homeless person is in immediate danger, perhaps suffering from hypothermia or the effects of drugs, then you should call 999 for an ambulance or contact the police."

"... homeless people are just that - people. One thing that irritates homeless people is if you talk to them as if they are children. There is nothing more humiliating than having someone stooping over you, literally talking down to you. Sit down, share a drink... or a bar of chocolate with them. Tell them about your day and ask them about theirs: whether they're getting enough help and if there's anything else you can do."

"... you can always offer to buy them some food or drink. Don't buy them in advance, though. Ask the person what they want."

Christmas is a time when loneliness, hunger, poverty and bitter-cold temperatures can be particularly threatening to quality of life, especially for vulnerable people who have no choice but to make the street their home. However, this is a year-round emergency; a little help will go a long way.

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Remember Remember Hot Chocolate this November!

You will be welcome on Bonfire Night as in previous years to enjoy a free HOT CHOCOLATE as a gift from Lindfield United Reformed Church. It has continued to be popular with everyone including the emergency services and has become part of the evening events as we await the procession on route to the common. Around 1,000 cups of the warming drink were dispensed last year. Although the cups are biodegradable please bring your own medium size reusable cups if possible to avoid wasting paper cups and straws. Every little helps as has been said before.

More volunteers are needed to transport and serve the hot chocolate on the night.

CSUA Area Meeting 2nd October 2019

he Central Sussex United Area (CSUA) holds a guarterly Area meeting. You may remember that the CSUA comprises 24 churches, about one third Methodist. one third URC and one third some sort of ecumenical combination, usually URC/Methodist. The Area runs from Crowborough and Lindfield in the north to Seaford and Eastbourne in the south. The Area meeting is an open meeting which all members of all the churches are welcome to attend. Usually, and this meeting was no exception, the majority of those attending are Methodist and so, not surprisingly, the majority (but certainly not all) the business has a Methodist flavour. I think this is unfortunate but URC folk have a poor attendance record

Enough of the moan! - what about that particular meeting? The chair was taken by the Revd Irena Byron (Methodist Superintendent) who welcomed everyone present (approximately 50), in particular two new ministers, the Revd Will Fletcher (Haywards Heath Methodist Church) and the Revd Memona Shahbaz a URC minister joining the Eastbourne team. You may like to know that Memona is from Pakistan and this is her first pastorate; she exudes pastoral skills!

The first few items were Methodist appointments then the announcement that a programme of LMMRs is to take place shortly. These Local Ministry and Mission Reviews are a URC idea where churches (all 24 in the CSUA!) will be helped to review their mission progress. It was said that a detailed timetable will be presented at the next meeting. (It will be interesting to see when Lindfield is scheduled!)

Some discussion took place on finance (Methodist, of course, because that is far more involved at local level than URC finance which, as far as the CSUA is concerned, is really only a question of when and how much each local church gives to the URC Ministry and Mission Fund). Recently a CSUA group tried unsuccessfully to create a combined URC/Methodist financial system; I have said frequently that if one attended a church service without observing the outside notice-board, it is likely one would not know if it was URC or Methodist, but if you asked about the financial set up or how they call or appoint a minister, boy, the differences really come to light!

There are major differences between CSUA churches, not just whether they are URC or Methodist - little Methodist chapels, medium-sized URC churches, and, in the case of Emmanuel at Eastbourne, I have watched the church start filling up 45 minutes before the start of the Sunday service because folk want a seat!

No, not all churches are like LURC and going to an Area meeting helps to emphasise this. Anyway, back to this meeting!

One of the exciting CSUA developments is the way the new Emmanuel Church is gradually coming together - at last, some might say! The Revd Paul Tabraham. Methodist minister in Eastbourne, now joined by Memona as mentioned above, gave an interesting description of progress. In short, the new building will be on the site of Upperton URC, the demolition of which was completed recently. Construction of the new building is expected to start around next Faster. Paul described some of the worship and community plans taking shape and some of the "consents" still required.

In terms of time, the major item on the meeting agenda was a discussion about marriage and relationships. This was required by the Methodist Conference to prepare for their Conference discussion and decision next summer However, I was disappointed when our meeting discussion turned out to be about when and how churches should discuss the issue, not about the issue itself! To me the most interesting part was when someone asked whether URC members should be allowed to take part, as the URC had already decided that local churches may register to offer same sex marriages if they wish. The Methodists were caught out on this and so we await an answer with baited breath!

A few "good news" stories were shared, for example that The Haven Church in Eastbourne recently baptised a number of people in the sea! - a witness to all who were gathered on the beach.

Do come to the next Area meeting at 7.30pm on Thursday 10th December at Christ Church, Lewes. I would love to see them having to put out more chairs to accommodate all the URC folk who had turned up!
