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Dear friends

ur view of the weather can be a bit strange can't it? While on our summer holiday there was a glorious day where the sun shone bright and the beautiful blue sky had barely a cloud floating along between our rented cottage and the sea's horizon, such a vision may bring delight and joy to our heart and make us feel more positive. A couple of days later blueness there was none. Grey had descended cutting the visibility and the far side of Portland harbour had completely been swallowed up. Some may think this grey depressing, but did it defeat us? No! We went out onto Chesil Beach with our hoods up against driving rain.

As I walked up hill through crunching shingle to the top of the stony bank the back of my trousers were saturated and my chin could feel the strong wind pulling my beard and gusts were giving it extra tugs. The wind, and rain were challenging but also exhilarating, and added to the experience of being there. I don't think I was alone in that reflection either. Out on the water were a handful of kite surfers skipping over waves at great speed and occasionally flying 15 feet or more into the air, demonstrating that this was not their first attempt at the sport, nor their first time out in such wet and windy weather. They revelled in the fact it was a day many would have declared miserable and staved indoors.

As we now move into October perhaps the number of those warm clear blue days will recede and the number of colder, damp, grey ones increase. Does the greyness of day, the wind and the rain mean that there cannot be delight in those days too? Surely not. In fact clouds in the Bible are often a sense of God's presence. In Genesis we hear of the rainbow set in the clouds. In Exodus God uses a cloud to guide the people in the wilderness. Moses enters the cloud on the mountain as he comes close to God. The Psalmists call the clouds chariots for God to ride upon. Daniel's prophesies speak of "one like a son of man, coming with the clouds of heaven" and Jesus echoes this in verses like Matthew 24:30. This vision of clouds marking the Lord's coming is in Revelations too. These are all encounters with clouds that we can rejoice about.

Perhaps this month as autumn takes hold we need to remember the presence of God is with us, His love and hope surrounds us, and that we can trust in Him. It could be the dull greyness you are experiencing is not due to the weather but issues in your family life, your health, or some concern for the future; remember the Lord is all powerful and always present, He knows of the issues in your life and cares deeply for you.

For our September meeting we swapped our church lounge, where we usually meet, for St. Augustine's Church, Scaynes Hill where we were warmly welcomed by their curate, Lucy Hollingsworth, for a quiet morning.

After a short time of worship we studied a reading from Luke 2 – "The Birth of Jesus". This passage was read to us three times and we were asked to imagine ourselves into the story – maybe as a bystander observing what was going on around us – what we could see, hear, smell and what we thought as we prayed ourselves into the story. We then had a short discussion in pairs on what had stood out to us more than before. Later we did the same thing with another reading on the Death of Jesus. This way of studying the Gospel really brought the passages alive to us.

Lucy told us the story of St Ignatius of Loyola who was a Spanish knight until he was injured and turned to God when he could no longer continue with his former life. We learnt about the Daily Examen which he used as a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and discern His direction for us, At the end of the morning which included periods of silence for prayer and reflection, we ended with a bring and share lunch, after which some of us took the opportunity to take a walk in the beautiful September sunshine.

We would like to thank St. Augustine's for their hospitality, and especially Lucy who led our study.

Love Lindfield

The church building is used each year by the Lindfield Arts Festival (LAF) for performance art and craft. This year, the tenth anniversary of LAF, the church with our community has contributed to the content available during the festival. The result is the 7 metre collage consisting of 14 art boards 13 of which each have a letter together read LOVE LINDFIELD. The 14th board placed between LOVE & LINDFIELD has the beautiful poem written by Dorothy Brown about Lindfield.

Working with the Lindfield History Project Group, Compton House residents, Oathall, Blackthorns, Lindfield Primary Academy, U3A, many local businesses and individuals, all of whom we are extremely grateful to, has resulted in the collage being well received by all who have seen it in the church during the arts festival.

The collage was inspired by the knowledge that God loves Lindfield and each individual who lives, works or visits the village. Working with common purpose in the community has enabled conversations and facilitated new contacts. We have learned a lot about Lindfield and its people and we hope the community having been into the church building and talked with those who hosted the collage have left feeling there is always a warm welcome inside Lindfield United Reformed Church. Talking with each other builds mutual trust confidence, and dare we say LOVE.

Food Bank



n early August, members of the Food Bank Team setoff on a warm sunny day to familiarise themselves with the Turning Tides Food Bank Depot and the Community Hub at St. Clare's and the many facilities on offer at the Turning Tides Ending Local Homelessness main base in Worthing.

St. Clare's offers support for rough sleepers and the insecurely housed, a breakfast drop-in Monday to Saturday and weekly workshops and group sessions supported by a team of specialists including Community Inclusion leads, Advice and Assessment Workers and a Substance Misuse Worker. We received a very warm welcome from Turning Tides and were privileged to be given a full guided tour of the facilities available at St Clare's Hub including – washrooms, showers, clothing/shoes/ bedding stockroom, individual rooms for medical services and counselling etc. We were delighted to meet and chat with some of the afternoon Art Workshop clients and enjoyed conversation and laughter and were able to see some of their wonderful artwork on display.

Turning Tides supports local people by providing hot showers, shelter, food, assistance in finding a stable home and help with CV's and employment applications. They also assist in fighting addictions to promote a healthy lifestyle and help domestic violence victims to find a safe environment.

St. Clare's has a fabulous committed team of staff and volunteers and we were so pleased to visit the Food Bank Depot in Worthing Town Centre.

Everyone was very friendly and helpful; they really do appreciate your kind and generous donations.

Eldership

We are approaching the Annual Meeting on 17th November, and so again come to that time where we as a church are challenged to pray and consider who God may be calling to serve as Elders within our fellowship.

The Elders are a team of people, female and male, that bring their different gifts together for the leadership of the church. The Elders, with the minister, look at every angle of church life; from worship to pastoral care, from youth and children's work to overseas mission, ecumenism, and the provision of the sacraments (Baptism & Communion). Elders of our church have the responsibility of being trustees of our charity.

Elders in the United Reformed Church need to have been a member of the local church for at least a year at the time of their election, and over the age of 18 years. If the individual has been elected for their first time, then they will be ordained to their new calling through the laying on of hands, seeking God's spirit to equip and empower them. At times difficult decisions need to be made by the Elders.

These things may not always be popular with everyone, but resolution is made with the discernment of the Holy Spirit, and so God's will for the church and the world should be seen in the outcome. In our constitution we declare that Elders are inducted for three years, but they are eligible for re-election at the end of each period. We do not have a limit on how many candidates for election there can be, or how many may be elected, however each individual will need the approval of 75% of voting members in a secret ballot at the annual meeting. Candidates for election need to be nominated and seconded by members of the church, a form for this is available from our church secretary, Sue Gooch.

Any nomination must be made to her before our church meeting on Thursday 14th November.

ONE WORLD WEEK 2019

"Climate Changes Everything – Now is the time to act"



We are exposed daily to headlines telling us of the "hottest", "wettest", "coldest", "driest" periods since records began. Unless you have had your head in the sand, or write it off as "fake news", it would be impossible not to be aware that climate change is happening and that addressing it - and its effects - is high on the agenda of nations worldwide. From 22nd to 29th October 2019, One World Week (OWW) is focussing on the strapline, "Climate Changes Everything – Now is the time to act".

OWW is a UK Development Education Charity that each year sets aside one week as an opportunity for people from diverse backgrounds to come together to learn about issues of global concern, to spread that learning and to use it to take action. OWW is supported by the United Reformed Church's Commitment for Life Programme, the world development programme of the URC in partnership with Christian Aid and Global Justice Now.

OWW offers inspiration and hope to encourage people to take action to build a just, more equal, inclusive and peaceful world that safeguards environmental resources for future generations. OWW seeks to raise people's awareness and understanding of the injustices which cause poverty and conflict across the planet and in our local communities and threaten a bleak future for our children.

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The common purpose of OWW events is to share understanding about some of the global issues that affect us all and to recognise we can all make a difference. Climate change is certainly a global issue and one in which we can all act to make a difference. It is easy to think that one person cannot make a difference to such an enormous problem as climate change, but if everyone made a small contribution it really would have an impact. After all, it is the cumulative effect of the contributions of individual people around the world that have created the problem in the first place.

OWW has some excellent information on its website about climate change and how we can act individually, as a faith community and in the wider world to make a difference. For example, ideas for a congregation include:-

Act to change our life style: Change to renewable energy tariff, use low energy products, highlight events like Walk to Church Sunday, use less paper, use real cups when possible and otherwise recyclable. Turn heating down 1 degree.

Act to better care for our neighbour: Support a charity locally and overseas that encourages tree planting, sustainable farming, Fairtrade, education. Collect recyclables for charity. Invite neighbours in, offer hospitality, adapt for disability access. Bring people to our worship. Use ethically sourced products, Fairtrade teas and coffees.

Act to secure a better future for all creation: Green any land around our place of worship. Try to create less waste, less plastic. Use electronic mailing where possible. Look at improving your energy efficiency. Use cleaning products without harmful chemicals. Look at eco church awards: https:// ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/

Young and old, we all really can make a difference to reduce the pace of climate change and make the world a better place for us and, especially, for future generations. Remembering that we have been appointed stewards of this planet, a prayer from OWW can focus our minds:

Praise and glory to the Lord our creator who knows and blesses everyone of us.

Guide us as we recognise our responsibility to each play a part in the flourishing of all creation, nature and humankind.

One world created, shared by all!

Sustain us to work together as good stewards of the earth, for Now is the Time to Act.

Amen!

Release International

This month we continue our mission focus on Release International (RI).

Many of you will have seen our article in last month's edition of "Good News" and be aware that RI is an interdenominational Christian ministry working through local church partners in more than 25 countries, helping persecuted Christians prayerfully, pastorally and practically. Its ministry is based on Hebrews 13 v 3: 'Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering.

We are very much looking forward to our mission weekend on 19/20 October which will be focussing on RI. We do hope you will be able to join us for at least one of the events if not all! We are delighted that Kenneth Harrod of RI will be with us throughout the weekend. On the Saturday evening, 19 October, we will be showing the film of the book "Tortured for Christ" to which an open invitation is extended to all but please be aware that RI recommend that parents/ carers consider the content of the film before showing it to children.

ongratulations to those of you who managed to work out from the clues in last month's "Who Am I" article that the answers to the questions were those of Alec Fruin. Alec and his wife, Vi, will be known to most of the congregation through their stewarding roles at Lindfield URC and Alec is a regular reader of the Bible lesson at our morning services. Perhaps fewer know that Alec is also a member of our Managers Group and Vi enjoys decorating the church for special events. Alec and Vi met on the running track that was shared by Mitcham Athletics Club (Alec) and Selsonia Athletics Club (Vi) in South London. Quite how Alec managed to catch Vi I am not sure as she was more of a sprinter while Alec was a middle- and long-distance runner, being a Cambridge Blue for the mile

However, catch Vi he did and they were married in 1961, living first in North London then in Redhill.

Alec and Vi used to go on motorcycle (BSA 650) and sidecar jaunts into the countryside and it was on such a trip in 1963 that they first came across Lindfield. However, it was not until 1977 that they finally moved to Lindfield, getting slowly closer through homes first in Burgess Hill and then Haywards Heath, while Alec was a commuter working at Philips in London.
