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Dear friends

When I was only three months old something truly out of this world happened. I obviously don't remember it occurring, though my sister who is two years older than me says she does. In the early hours of the morning of the 20th July, 1969 two men – Neil Armstrong and Edwin (Buzz) Aldrin – were the first two people to walk on the moon. Armstrong a few years later visited my home town, the seat of the Armstrong clan. He was declared the first ever freeman of the burgh and made a speech in the church that I attended as a child. Later he ate lunch at a reception in the hall which was immediately opposite my early childhood's bedroom window. I most likely will never walk on the moon, but I have often walked where the first man on the moon walked

On that day he was in Langholm, I do think I saw him, but having been but a three year old I wasn't on the guest list for the reception. However all who have shared in the Lord's Supper have shared a meal with that other astronaut, Aldrin. The story is less well known than "the small step" of Neil, but Buzz reportedly took communion on the moon while in the Lunar Module during the mandated rest time between the "Eagle" landing and the hatch being opened. An elder in the Presbyterian Church, Buzz had taken with him bread and wine in plastic containers along with a small silver cup from his church.

Any public mention of what he was doing, or the reading aloud of any liturgy could not happen due to the separation of church and state in the American constitution – NASA was being sued for Apollo 8 astronauts reading from Genesis 1 - but Aldrin invited the world to pause, give thanks and to reflect in silence. Members of his church in Texas shared communion at the same time, and bring it back to mind each year at the Sunday closest to the anniversary.

When we share in communion there is a connection with all others who have sat at the Lord's Table whenever and wherever that may be; from the upper room in Jerusalem to the Sea of Tranquillity. We are one with all God's people when we eat bread and drink wine in remembrance of love and sacrifice, the body broken and blood shed by Jesus. He is the vine, we are the branches, may we always abide in him.

I don't know how far you may travel on your summer holiday, we cannot yet go on a trip to the moon, though I guess some might go to the other side of the world, and others will be much closer to home. Wherever you travel remember God's love and goodness, how he takes the ordinary and makes it Holy. Let each day be a day of praise and thanksgiving

With every blessing for the summer, and beyond.

olidays - what memories that word evokes. Travel, planes, exotic places? Yes indeed, but for someone like myself, long past my 'sell by date', just blessed with a good memory, so many other things come to mind. Early travelling by steam train, watching for cows in the fields, then the first glimpse of the sea! Settling into lodgings, then down to the beach with a new spade and pail ready to make sand castles and paddle in the sea – such long, happy days. Then aged eleven, coming from North London to camp with the guides at Uckfield and receiving a visit from Lord Baden Powell's sister in full uniform, a great honour.

Wartime, 'holidays at home' - small events in local parks. Then the big one - a week's honeymoon on the Isle of Wight directly after the war. All the fuel for the D Day invasion of Europe, 'PLUTO pipeline under the ocean' had come from there and the seafront was derelict. No seaside booths or amusements of any kind. To us it was wonderful! Years passing quickly by acquiring our first car and travelling seven hours with young children to get to Cornwall. No motorways in those days! Venturing to foreign parts, Wales in fact. We stayed in a farmhouse near Harlech, the year was 1966. The farmer let my husband and eldest son watch the World Cup Final on a tiny TV set in their stone kitchen. 'They think it's all over it is now' famous words remembered. Touring Scotland was another venture, two sons and their friend in the back seat urging their Father on, 'Go faster Dad, go farther' until we end up staying a night in the John-o-Groats Hotel, such excitement!

Later on again, finding a holiday address in Paignton Devon, in the 'Congregational Monthly' owned by a very friendly couple, the husband being secretary of the local Church. Among other guests were a very young couple with a toddler, Charles, with whom we played and chatted, sometimes in the lounge. All became close friends with the owners and visited several times but never together, but some items of news filtered through occasionally.

Time moved on and many holidays in the Cotswolds and Sussex were enjoyed. When our elder son's work brought him to Sussex and they settled in Lindfield, we enjoyed many happy visits to the area. Retirement and health problems prompted us to move nearer the family. We were very reluctant though to leave the Church where we had been active for so many years, for me the whole of my life and parents before me. Introductions were sent ahead before we eventually moved at the end of March 2003. Who should be looking out for us on the first Sunday, but Elder Fo, the Fiona we had met all those years previously, now with two married sons. But where were we? As the service ended, so we arrived! In all the confusion of moving we had forgotten to put the clocks forward for British Summer Timel

Fo spotted us, looking rather confused, came out and greeted us before sitting and praying with us on the outside bench. A lovely introduction to a caring Church and a very dear friend. So time passes by, all too quickly it seems, but happy memories remain. Thanks be to God.

Special Holidays

When I read Anne's request for items about a particularly 'Special' holiday, I was in a quandary as I have three that fall into that category. So I'll try to briefly outline why each one was a great experience for me, and why I felt God's blessing in them all.

In 1996 my late husband Brian and I belatedly celebrated our Silver Wedding with a holiday in Western Canada. It was a place that Brian had long wanted to visit, though beforehand I was quite apprehensive. We spent some quality time with distant cousins of mine on Vancouver Island where we watched whales and enjoyed the scenery, and the isolation of some areas of the island.

Then we joined an organised tour of the wonderful Rockies! Such spectacular scenery! Brian took masses of photographs, which I can look back on and recall the happy memories. We were taken up mountains, onto glaciers, around lakes and into the contrast of desert lands, including a very scenic rail journey. During our holiday Brian was taken ill and spent 36 hours in hospital. He persuaded me to carry on with that afternoon's sightseeing. While walking alone in the beautiful town of Banff I had this deep feeling that God was preparing me for something, but I couldn't think what. Less than a year later I knew the answer when my dear husband died suddenly.



How glad I was that we had made that trip to the Rockies and Brian had fulfilled his dream! We were so blessed to share together and enjoy that beautiful part of God's creation.

My trip to Australia was something I never in a million years thought I'd be able to do! (I'm not a very brave or adventurous traveller, you may have realised!) However, in 2008 the opportunity arose to travel there with friends, so, much to my own surprise, I took it! My first port of call was to Perth where I spent a lovely time with other friends, Bill and Iris Green (former members of LURC). The next challenge was a four hour flight on my own, taking me to the other side of Australia to where I have two cousins living in southern Queensland. Cousin Patricia and I enjoyed visiting the Great Barrier Reef, (where I 'sort of' snorkelled!), an ancient Rain Forest, Uluru and Kings Canyon, the latter viewed, very bravely, from a four seater helicopter with a glass floor, and I'm sitting next to the pilot! Oh my, how God gave me courage in many different ways on that holiday! It was another experience for which I was so grateful to the Lord.

In 2013 I was extremely blessed and privileged to go with a small group of friends from this Church on a Pilgrimage to the Holy Land. For a number of years I'd thought what a special place it would be to visit, so when the opportunity came along God gave me the courage, (with a little encouragement from my fellow travellers), to go for it.

Other friends and family were anxious for our safety in travelling to that volatile part of the world, but we put ourselves into God's hands, and we were so blessed! Our first view of Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives was breath-taking - we could hardly believe we were actually there in the land where our Saviour. Jesus Christ was born and carried out His selfless Ministry. Jerusalem, with all the official sites commemorating events in Christ's life, was inspiring but also rather commercialised. One of the highlights for me was looking across to the actual fields where the shepherds would have been when the Angels appeared to them on the night of our Lord's birth. However, visiting Galilee was even more special! We saw various places where He preached, healed and carried out His Ministry. The highlights for me here were centred around the Sea of Galilee, having a boat trip and taking Communion on the shores of the Lake. Both were very moving experiences which I will remember always. When you've visited the Holy Land the Bible really seems to come alive in a new way. To be able to actually visualise the places you're reading about is just wonderful! What a blessing and privilege to have walked where Jesus walked, and to have had times of worship and reflection along the way.

I praise and thank God for all these special times in my life.

A Trip to New Zealand

n the morning of Saturday 13 April we took a Jet Boat ride on Lake Wakatipu. It was very exciting, for the young man who was steering the boat took us close to the shore of the lake and then at the last minute he swung the boat around in a tight circle and as a consequence we got a little wet! After this experience we went for a leisurely stroll around Oueenstown Gardens and then in the afternoon we made our way to the Skyline Gondola and up to Bob's Peak While the others had 5 turns on the luge I went down in the gondola to the Kiwi Birdlife Park and there I saw amongst other birds keas and kiwis.

The following day we did a four hour drive up to Milford Sound and took a boat trip passing Lion Mountain, the Bowen Falls (160m) and Stirling Falls (146m). The boat went right up to the falls and we got quite wet. Some dolphins joined us for part of the cruise and swam along in the bow wave of the boat. We also saw some fur seals sun bathing on the rocks. On the way back the boat stopped at the Underwater Observatory where there were many fish. High rainfall means there is a 10-13 ft layer of fresh water above the underlying salt water.

The following day we left Queenstown after dropping Abi and Jack off at the airport to return to work in Auckland.

We made our way back to Christchurch. The weather was beautiful again. It was a long drive passing Lakes Dunstan and Pukaki and Mt Cook where we stopped to take photographs. We stayed the night just outside Christchurch Amberley at a B&B called Barb's Place. Barb is a chef who has worked all over the world and we had home-made soup and bread in the evening with her and her husband. They told us about their experiences of the earthquake. Barb had actually gone into to the city on the day of the earthquake and said it was the most weird experience when she tried to walk. She just wasn't able to make any progress. They experienced aftershocks for a considerable time and were definitely pretty traumatized by it all.

Leaving Amberley on Tuesday 16th we travelled along mountain roads through Lake Sumner, Lake Hanmer and Victoria Forest Parks. We reached Nelson and visited the cathedral and then walked to the marina. We drove on to Picton where we stayed the night at the Picton Yacht Club Hotel.

The next morning we walked along the coastal path to Bob's Bay. Then we got the boat back to the North Island. After we disembarked we drove round Wellington on to Waikanae where we stayed the night in a lovely Air B&B.

The owner told us we were her last visitors of the summer and that she would be closing up the house and going down to the South Island for the winter not long after our departure.

Thursday 18th April found us on our way to Mount Egmont National Park which is dominated by the extinct volcano also known as Mount Taranaki. We arrived early so decided to do a walk to the Dawson Falls. That night we stayed in the Mount Egmont Lodge which was rather like a large log cabin. All the internal doors were painted with flowers and each bedroom had it's own little wooden balcony.

The lounge was all decorated for Christmas complete with Christmas tree because a film company had been there a few days previously taking photographs for an advertisement for Christmas venues.

Up early the next day we drove on to the Waitomo Glow Worm Caves. It was just magical to float silently through the cave in a boat looking up to see millions of glow worms twinkling in the blackness on the ceiling of the caves. We were not allowed to take photographs because we were told it would upset the glow worms. We continued back to Auckland to meet up with Abi and Jack again.

On our penultimate day in New Zealand the five of us took the ferry over to Waikeke Island. We had lunch on the terrace of a restaurant overlooking the beach and then my daughter and I paddled whilst my sonin-law swam in the South Pacific Ocean. It wasn't quite as warm as the Mediterranean but considerably warmer than the English Channel! Afterwards we went to the Cable Bay winery and then the Mudbrick winery for tasting. We returned home on the ferry and went to a Thai restaurant in the evening.

Sunday 21 April and it was our last day in New Zealand. We went to the Auckland Botanical Gardens and visited the two greenhouses after which we went back and had lunch with Abi and Jack and then left for the airport for our flight home. All in all it was an amazing holiday. We saw so many wonders of God's world, met some very pleasant people and were extremely blessed with beautiful weather so we saw all the mountains and lakes at their absolute best.

Pentecost

t was such a pleasure to join the Congregation at the Lindfield URC. for the Family Worship Service on 5th May 2019; led with much wit and humour by Rev. Simon Franklin. I found it very inspirational.

Simon spoke of Pentecost and raised our awareness regarding prayer to the Holy Spirit our ever-loving Father.

Definition of Pentecost: Pentecost is a Christian festival that takes place on the seventh Sunday after Easter and celebrates the sending of the Holy Spirit to the first followers of Christ.Pentecost is a Jewish festival that takes place 50 days after Passover and celebrates the giving of the ten commandments.

Quite a few years ago, I worked as a weekend receptionist at St Georges' Retreat in Ditchling, run by Catholic Nuns. I would often call in to the Church briefly, time permitting and sit quietly, silently praying these words from a prayer card at the Retreat:

O Holy Spirit Soul of my Soul, I adore you.

Enlighten, guide, strengthen and console me.

Tell me what I ought to do and command me to do it.

I promise to submit to everything that you ask of me, and to accept all that you allow to happen to me.

Just show me what is your will.

Amen.

I still use this prayer regularly, it brings me closer to God, guides and comforts me in many different situations.

Cardinal Mercier wrote the prayer, you can read the full prayer and more information, if you Google "Cardinal Mercier's Secret to Sanctity and happiness".

Speaking and Listening

I wonder how you keep in touch with distant family and friends, sharing the news of joys and sorrows. Maybe you write letters, or maybe drop them an email. When on holiday maybe you send a post card. It could be the case that you use the telephone, perhaps even skype or facetime where you could see each other. We sometimes encourage our children to draw a picture of something for their grandparents – if you are artistic, whatever your age, you may choose still to do that. Whatever medium you choose to use I imagine you are informal in your language, and relaxed in your style - it is quite different writing to a cousin you have known all your life compared to contacting a big business where you do not know the individual who will read it.

I wonder now how you approach your prayer life? We can write or speak our prayers, they may even come out in song words we sing or a form of artwork. God knows us intimately and has done from the time we were knit together in our mother's womb (Psalm 139). Likewise many of us have known of God, and perhaps been in a relationship with Him, from the earliest times we can remember. How then do we choose our language, is it clinical, like a hospital senior consultant, or even an Army general (someone I suspect few of us are likely to meet).

There is perhaps a difficult balance to be found. I remember some years ago a Spring Harvest speaker commenting that the one we adore is "God Almighty, not God all-matey" but in Jesus, the Christ, God makes himself known to us calling his followers friends (John 15). Paul later, in Romans 8 and Galatians 4, speaks of our "adoption to sonship" by the spirit's dwelling, meaning that we can rightly cry "Abba, Father", which is the call of a child to a parent.

Maybe we want to think of how we might speak to a member of the royal family. Princes William and Harry at an event like the trooping of the colour they are statesmen in military uniform, commanding authority, yet we will also have seen images of these young men as they have over the years engaged with the poorest of the world, such as those impacted by HIV/Aids in Lesotho. The language we would use depends on how formal we feel we need to be at the time.

Maybe we don't need to be concerned about what words we may use, but simply give some time to the Lord. There is no "wrong way" to pray. It can be loud or quiet, stillness or involve movement, being by one's self, in a small group or even with thousands of others. The only wrongness comes in not being honest to God.



Here is one way that you might want to try as a form of daily prayer. Find a place where you won't be disturbed, have a notebook, pen and a bible beside you. Calm your breathing and put any random thoughts that come aside - write them down if they are things you need to deal with later and that way they won't continue to interrupt. Don't do anything for a minute or two, simply breathe in, and out, then then start to tell God of what happened yesterday, what you are doing today, and of what you will do tomorrow. Tell God of the good and the bad, the things that concern you and what has made you glad. As you do this imagine you are talking with a friend -Jesus can be our best friend. Even share in your prayer the things that seem trivial, nothing is trivial to God.

Remember He uses our prayer times to speak to us as well as listening to what we say to Him, so be aware that the Spirit may cause you to look up a passage, give you a word, or a picture, or maybe prompt you to action. When you think you have told God everything you want to don't simply rush off, but stay in stillness, listening for a few minutes more. As you develop a prayer routine the topics of prayer may change and grow, but always allow some time to listen for what God might be saying to you. As your prayer time ends make a note of anything significant and also put the date, that way you will in future be able to look back and think of prayers answered

Boys' Brigade



A Teenagers D Day

n Tuesday June 6th my day began with a bike ride of six miles from Ardingly to Belvedere Prep School in Bolnore Road Haywards Heath. Normal bus services had been cancelled to clear the roads for the movement of military traffic.

We knew something unusual was happening as there were tanks, lorries and armoured vehicles constantly passing through Ardingly. Wakehurst Place was packed with the Sherman tanks of the Canadian Army where we had spent many happy hours clambering over these monsters and making friends with the crews. Later were realised that they had all gone from our area never to return.

I often wonder what happened to them; as the Canadian armoured division took heavy casualties both in tanks and men at Falaise in Normandy.

We did not get a lot of sleep on Monday night, as there was a constant roar of heavy bomber squadrons passing overhead. This continued all day.

When arrived at Belvedere we were called into the main hall and addressed by our Headmistress Mrs. Gregory (her husband Captain Gregory was with the invasion force), she told us that great events were obviously taking place and lessons would be cancelled. We then said prayers for our armed forces. We spent the day discussing the war, and hoped that this would see the end of the Germans.

As we all know; the enemy was on the run, but the Germans are a resilient bunch and by August we were enduring the Doodlebugs!!!

But that is another story!!

Book Review

How to Pray - Pete Greig


know many of those who visited spring harvest this year were greatly blessed by Pete Greig's teaching on prayer. I wasn't able to make it to Minehead this year but I was encouraged and inspired by reading Pete's book, how to pray, a simple guide for normal people.

Author, pastor and founder of the 24/7 prayer movement Pete's life is as steeped in prayer as it is grounded in reality.

This book on the sometimes ethereal spiritual discipline of prayer is as practical as it is profound, and as warm and funny as it is inspirational. This is a no nonsense and no nagging reminder of the privilege, power and purpose of prayer.

Following the template of the lords prayer the book looks at the nine paths of prayer Stillness, Adoration, Petition, Intercession, Perseverance, Contemplation, Listening, Confession and Spiritual Warfare. If all that sounds a bit much the book brings us back continually to the simple heart of prayer with four basic steps:

Pause Rejoice Ask Yield



This may not be typical summer blockbuster beach reading, but I recommend it wholeheartedly if your prayer life needs a little encouragement or if you want to delve deeper into the wonderful gift of prayer.

I hope this little book will help you to discern Gods voice, know Gods blessing and dwell richly in his grace and love.
