The Lord's Prayer

Recently I have been doing some study on the Lord's Prayer in preparation for a series of sermons and housegroup studies. I am sure that we are all familiar with the words of this prayer – a marvellous model given to us by Jesus – and many, like myself, can readily recite the prayer.

However, I have been challenged about "reciting." It is possible that some may think that prayer consists solely of reciting the words of the Lord's Prayer, but, as the great preacher C.H. Spurgeon once said, "To recite the Lord's Prayer and believe that you have then prayed is the height of foolishness". I would not want to deprive Christian congregations of the spiritual pleasure and joy of reciting together the Lord's Prayer, but I do want to encourage us to view it as a departure point rather than an arrival platform – to experience a growing confidence that we are praying the way Jesus taught.

An unknown author put it this way: "I cannot say 'our' if

I only live for myself. I cannot say 'Father' if I do not try to act like His child. I cannot say, 'who art in heaven' if I am laying up no treasure there. I cannot say 'hallowed be thy name' if I am not striving for holiness. I cannot say 'Thy kingdom come' if I am not doing all in my power to hasten that event. I cannot say 'give us this day our daily bread' if I am dishonest, or seeking something for nothing. I cannot say 'forgive us our trespasses' if I bear a grudge against another. I cannot say 'lead us not into temptation' if I deliberately place myself in its path. I cannot say 'deliver us from evil' if I do not put on the armour of God. I cannot say 'thine is the kingdom the power and the glory' if I do not give the King the loyalty due to Him from a faithful subject. I cannot say 'for ever' if the horizon of my life is bounded completely by time."

Statement from the Minister and Elders of Lindfield United Reformed Church Thursday 28th July 2005

The Minister and Elders of Lindfield United Reformed Church have been in prayerful discussion for some time about the right way ahead for the Church. The Moderator, Nigel Uden, has been involved. We all recognise that we have not been able to move forward quite as we would have wished.

The outcome of the discussion is that Colin Bones, our Minister, has asked the Moderator to find him a new ministry in the coming months.

Although we are sad to arrive at this position, all parties agree that this is right for Colin, his family and the Church.

Whilst it is somewhat unusual to bring such a statement to a church meeting before a Minister has secured another post, we believe an announcement made at this stage is in the best interests of the membership and the congregation. Colin now needs the time and space to work this through – and so do the Elders.

During this period we would like to assure the fellowship that we will endeavour to lead our Church in the way that God wants, with a spirit of open-ness and mutual co-operation.

In due time, the Moderator will advise us on the way forward in calling another Minister.

As this is a joint pastorate, this news is also being shared with members at Balcombe this evening.

We will all be grateful for your continuing prayerful support and understanding in the months to come.


Getting in the saddle around Sussex

Libby Purves, in this month's feature article, shares her passion for the Historic Churches Bike Ride in Suffolk. However, closer to home, the Sussex Historic Churches Trust is very much alive and well.

The event encourages anyone to cycle or walk around participating churches in a set area. The individuals are sponsored to collect 'stars' per church, where they sign-in at each. The sponsorship money goes to a church or chapel of the participants choice, and to the Trust. The Historic Churches Trust (HCT) gives grants or interest-free loans to churches (of all Christian denominations) of historic interest for essential repairs and restoration. Nationally there are 31 county Trusts, raising £1.5m annually (Sussex HCT accounted for over £52,000 of that).

In Sussex this year there will be over 400 buildings open - some providing refreshments. Lindfield comes into 'Area 7', which includes the likes of St Margaret's, West Hoathly; Ote Hall Chapel, Wivelsfield and All Saints and URC within the village.

Rural Life

in the country parish

ANY DAY NOW, A GREAT number of bicycles will be hauled from sheds and taken on a kind of pilgrimage. The Suffolk Historic Churches bike ride - the first of its kind - was started in 1982 as a fundraiser, and the challenge is irresistible. Everyone designs their own itinerary, to get their sheet ticked off in as many church porches as possible; volunteers hand out cold drinks to sweaty pedallers. I believe that the record stands at 64 churches, but am open to correction. The only time I did it I managed eight, but this year I should beat that. A parish boundary runs through our kitchen sink, so I can sweep up St Peter's and St James's without too much effort.

I am no expert on clerestories, pew-ends and piscinae, nor a very faithful churchgoer. But there is something special about

country churches, especially here in the east where they rear up from the flat landscape like young cathedrals. They are all different. Ancient St Peter's at Westleton, is a clear, pure, whitewashed space.

St James's at Dunwich is in fact an early Victorian brick construction with a domed tower, built to replace the last of the parish churches that fell into the sea. Later, the Victorians felt they ought to clad it in flint and give it a square tower, so it is in effect a fake. Down the road at Theberton there is one with a round flint tower. When I was a child, I was told it was the inside of an old well from before Noah's flood, until the land around it was washed away, leaving the stone lining standing.

These churches matter

There is something special about country churches. When empty they offer a place of quiet contemplation, when full, a profound feeling of rightness.

to unbelievers as well as Christians because they embody both history and community. Footpaths lead to and from them; they connect us to eternity but also to the wider world. I do not think there is any active church which does not, on a worn notice board in the porch between the bird-screen and the wooden doors, carry an appeal for the third world or for a poverty programme at home.

That feeling of rightness you get when a crowd fills and warms a church for Christmas, or a wedding or harvest festival, is a direct link to their function as a meeting place. In the Middle Ages it was understood that the sanctuary belonged to the clergy, the nave to the people. If there was an emergency or a raid or a flood or a fire, the people could flock in for safety, sometimes with their animals. If there had to be a meeting, it would be in the church.

Moreover, the church was where there was art; the only high art most people would ever see. In a grey winter world, as you stumped around in your homespun brown, it was the one place you would see bright colours: the expensive pigments and gilding in the sacred paintings (mainly stolen or wrecked by the Reformation) or the gleam of the stained glass.

Imagine what that must have meant, and how rich a place the church would be.

But, looking around the beautiful, spare, boat-like interior of white St Peter's this year, it occurred to me that this situation has been reversed. We are bombarded by colour and shine, from screens and hoardings and neon, clothes and ads and packaging. Even in the countryside we yearn for plainness, space, visual quietness, places where our thoughts can expand. So today, with most of the colourful paintings long gone, we have started to value our old churches for their serene greyness, their filtered light and silence. The churches that were hubs of old farming and fishing communities still play the same part for the office-bound, commuting, teleworking, labouring country people of today. They mark births, marriages, deaths, offer art and music and meeting places. In Southwold once there was a massive row about Waveney District Council's plans to build a development with a fake windmill on the marshes. The furious public meeting got too big for St Edmunds Hall and had to move into the church; it felt wholly appropriate.

The project in our church - Westleton - is a common enough

one: to build 'facilities'. Purists sniff at this, as if those people who come to churches should leave their bodies at home, but to me it affirms their relevance. They call the appeal Key Change: I like that. The key changes, the notes change, the tempo gets faster or slower as the centuries pass, but the song is the same as it was in 1340 when St Peter's was built. It is a song about living life well and kindly, rejoicing in the land and the harvest, giving thanks for the beautiful objects and sounds that people make and the things they do for one another. If you are a

Christian, it is a hymn. If not, it is still a pretty good tune.

Sunday services explained...

The **9.30am service** is an opportunity for all age groups to join in a relaxed informal time. There is a crèche, and after about 20 minutes children and young people up to age 14 go out to their own groups on most Sundays.

Coffee is normally served between the morning services and after the evening one.

The **11.00am service** is usually more set and formal.

At **6.30pm** it is sometimes a celebration, sometimes a quieter ministry time and sometimes an open communion service or something quite different!

Personal prayer is available after every service. Prayer requests and brief statements of praise for answered prayer can be put in the red book on the concourse table. We can also offer personal prayer ministry at home or in hospital.

We **do not take up an offering** during the services, but all those wishing to give are invited to place a gift in one of the bowls at the doors before or after the service. Thank you.



A guide to Sunday services in September



On the first Sunday we are still in 'holiday mode' with an all-age approach for the 9.30 am service. Both morning services look at the interesting theme of the beginnings of the nation of God's people.

The other Sunday mornings encompass a short preaching series on the Lord's Prayer. Throughout autumn our housegroups are going to focus on material based on the Lord's Prayer – "Entering the Prayer of Jesus." This short series gives a lead into the studies. The words of Jesus in this prayer, so seemingly simple, encompass every conceivable element in prayer and reduce it to a clearly understood pattern. Giving you power behind the wheel!

Recently I have taken out a couple of the Sunday service tapes, to listen to in my car. I have been really encouraged and inspired as I have listened to the worship and teaching on the tapes. I thought I would mention this, as recently I have been reminded how important it is for me to remain 'teachable'; allow me to explain.

I think sometimes it is easy for us to think "ah, I've heard this parable before" or "I've read this piece of the bible many times" and then sigh and sort of mentally tune out a bit – I guess most of us, if honest, would admit this. But it struck me recently how important it is for me to realise that there is always something new to learn. It is actually really important that I stay 'tuned in' – to be able to make the most of the teaching that is available – whether it be from the church family or teaching tapes from Spring Harvest, New Wine or Joyce Meyer etc.

I mention this because something quite astonishing happened to me this week, which doesn't happen to me frequently. I had been really struggling with God on the issue of why He allows suffering. Frankly I had been

raging – torn between anger, tears and resentment. Well, God decided apparently to call my bluff! Whilst I was reading a book written by Fiona Castle, a couple of verses popped into my head. I wrote them down. The next morning I was driving to work listening to one of the tapes of the services from our church. Lindfield Football Club

Lindfield Football Club was formed over one hundred years ago and has seen many changes over the years of its existence.

Playing in the beautiful surroundings of Lindfield Common in the early days, changing facilities consisted of a corrugated green hut situated at the bottom of the Common. Cramped conditions prevailed with 22 grown men squeezing into a very small area. No such thing as showers - tin baths of cold water were the order of the day!

Records of the early days are very sketchy, but Lindfield played in both the Mid' Sussex League and Crawley League up until the early 70's, with some successes.

The Club has grown in stature since those times and for the last ten years has run four teams in the Mid-Sussex League. Indeed, for the season 2005/6, a fifth team is to be introduced, encouraging youngsters from the youth teams to play at a higher level.

Past successes have included:-

- In 1983, the 3rd XI won Division 5.
- In 1991, the Is' XI won Division 1, and were promoted to the Premier Division in 1992. Unfortunately, they were relegated back into Division 1 in 1993 but regained Premier status when they were runners up to Uckfield Town.
- In 1995, the 1st XI won the Sussex Junior Cup, beating Maple Leaf FC (Worthing League) 3 - 1.

The highest point in the Club's history must be during the 2000/1 Season, when we won the
